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UFA Grant Will Help Preserve Onoway's Agricultural History

Just over a year later, UFA Director Harvey Hagman was all smiles as he stood in front of a huge newly-constructed pole shed situated just behind the Onoway Museum. He said that over 200 applications were received for the Rural Communities Foundation grant and the Guild was the very first winner – a \$50,000 no-strings-attached grant!

This shed means that all the

equipment used for the annual Threshing Bee can now be housed on one site, on Guild property rather than on different farms in the area. The building was designed to be more than just storage space; the long-term plan is that this will be an exhibit area where museum visitors will be able to see agricultural equipment and learn about agricultural practices from many decades ago. Thanks to UFA, said Hazel Bourke, the goal of a heritage village is now looking realistic.

Brian Turnbull, head of the Guild committee overseeing the project, recognized that much volunteer help was necessary for the completion of the project as well as assistance from the Town of Onoway Public Works (who hauled away the debris after a working bee took down the trees) and Lac Ste. Anne County (will supply asphalt for the flooring).

One last-minute surprise was information that the Guild is a beneficiary in a will and will be the recipient of a Farmall Model A tractor purchased in 1946 from local agricultural implement dealer John Lafleur.

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
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PARKLAND RCMP SEEK PUBLIC ASSISTANCE TO IDENTIFY MALE SUSPECT

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that Veterans Affairs Canada's Second World War Tribute program, a symbol of our country's enduring pride and gratitude to all those who served, will receive a commemorative lapel pin and certificate of recognition to any living Canadian or Newfoundland Second World War Veteran.

The Second World War Tribute program concludes at the end of 2020, roughly coinciding with the 75th anniversary of the end of the war. The goal is to have as many Second World War Veterans as possible receive the tribute.

I encourage all Veterans organizations in the Yellowhead riding to identify living Canadian Second World War Veterans who have not already received the tribute.

Veterans that qualify for the Second World War Tribute can submit their application (individuals can also submit applications on behalf of a Veteran). Misplaced Second World War Tributes can be replaced by submitting another application.

The design of the commemorative lapel pin is based on the original "Victory Nickel", a coin that was circulated from 1943 until 1945 and re-issued in 2005 to commemorate the 60th anniversary of V-E Day. The coin featured a flaming torch and large "V", which stood for both victory and the coin's value in Roman numerals.


"Fire Chief Randy Schroeder has served our town and the entire region with distinction and dedication. His devotion to ensuring his

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WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

PME Inc. has been awarded a contract to complete the Water Systems Upgrades Contract "A" project. The project, funded in part by the Building Canada Small Communities Fund, includes installation of underground components and modifications to the Hilltop Reservoir and West End Booster Station. This project is part of a larger initiative to enhance capacity and flow within the municipal water system. This portion of the project will create 26 jobs, and involve business with five local subcontractors/suppliers. The estimated money to be spent in our community during construction is \$275,000, including expenditures at local service businesses (hotels, restaurants, etc.).

The Whitecourt Fire Department presented its 2019 response statistics to Council as information at the September 14, 2020 meeting. In 2019, the Department responded to 311 calls, up from 299 calls responded to in 2018.

2020 Whitecourt Free Clean Up Week, held the last week of August, was a success. Almost 650 residents took advantage of the initiative and disposed of 137,965 kilograms of waste at the Whitecourt Regional Landfill. The initiative was created in lieu of the annual Spring Clean Up program which was cancelled earlier in the year due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Town of Whitecourt has been invoiced \$43,201.21 for repairs to the overhead light and cantilever of the railway crossing warning system at Dahl Drive resulting from a hit and run incident on December 28, 2019. Whitecourt has made a claim for consideration under its insurance and is awaiting a response.

Councillor Derek Schloss-

er has been appointed Acting Deputy Mayor until October 18, 2021.

Whitecourt Town Council has decided not to implement a mandatory face covering bylaw at this time. Over the past month, several municipalities across Alberta have either considered making face coverings mandatory or have made them mandatory. Throughout the COVID-19

pandemic, the Town of Whitecourt has deferred to Alberta Health Services on all health-related decisions, and the Province continues to stress that the best way to stop the virus is for people to maintain 2-metre physical distancing, wash hands frequently, and stay home when sick. Face coverings continue to be required on Whitecourt Public Transit as 2-metre

physical distancing cannot be maintained on the bus. The Town of Whitecourt will continue to monitor the COVID-19 pandemic, and implementing a mandatory face covering bylaw may be revisited at any time depending on case numbers in Whitecourt and the region, and advice from the Province's Chief Medical Officer of Health.

Preparations and discussions for the 2021 Budget have begun. Town Council encourages you to share your thoughts on projects and plans at the 2021 Budget Public Input Session. The session is scheduled during the September 28 Regular Meeting of Council at 7:00 p.m.

Whitecourt Town Council has endorsed Mayor Maryann Chichak's bid for the Towns West Director and Vice President – Towns positions with the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association. Mayor Chichak previously served in both positions, and should she be elected it would provide an opportunity to advocate on behalf of municipalities and ensure

Whitecourt's needs are represented on a provincial level.

Whitecourt will be applying to the Municipal Stimulus Program (MSP) for financial support of the Dahl Drive Rehabilitation project. The project, valued at \$1.4 million, involves drainage improvements and asphalt overlay resurfacing of the arterial road.

The Town of Whitecourt will be submitting two applications to the Forest Resources Improvement Association of Alberta. Both projects, which involve the development of a FireSmart Working Group and hiring of a Summer Crew for 2021, will help raise awareness of FireSmart principles and practices within the community.

Ernst & Young LLP has been awarded the contract to complete the Targeted Industrial Base Diversification, Resiliency and Attraction Pilot Project. The project, funded in part by the Community and Regional Economic Support (CARES) Program, will provide capacity and resources to explore investment opportunities and to develop a diversified plan for the future. This will include working with existing small businesses on diversification opportunities, and actively pursuing new investment opportunities that create new employment.

Roszko Construction Ltd. was awarded the Blue Ridge Road Gravel Tender project, valued at just over \$107,000. The project will involve replacing the gravel base and subbase and installing geogrid and geotextile materials in locations along the road within Town boundaries. Work is expected to begin in late September.

Council has approved the cancellation of a portion of 2019 municipal taxes for Roll 006018. The property owner requested the cancellation due to a fire that resulted in the loss of the industrial building on the property.

Whitecourt Town Council has recognized October 1, 2020 as International Day of Older Persons.

Councillor Tom Pickard will serve as Deputy Mayor from September 1 to December 31, 2020.

HOW TO PROTECT WOOD FLOO FROM INCLEMENT WEATHER

Wood floors are a worthwhile investment that can improve the beauty and function of just about any room in a home. Even though wood floors are durable, and new protective treatments help seal out many of the things that may have damaged floors in the past, homeowners still need to prioritize protecting their hardwood floors.

Certain seasons of the year can be more harsh on wood floors than others. For example, seasons characterized by moisture and precipitation, particularly the early spring, winter and fall, can be hard on wood floors. The experts at ServiceMaster Clean say that cold, snowy days can damage wood floors, and Lumber Liquidators agrees that winter weather

can be harsh on flooring.

Homeowners need not give up on hardwood if they live in an area that sees all four seasons. They just need to take a few steps to keep floors looking beautiful.

Clean up the salt. Salt that keeps sidewalks and streets clear of snow and ice inadvertently gets tracked inside a home. Hard chunks of salt can scratch wood floors, and, if left to sit, that salt can eventually cause white marks and other stains. Routinely vacuuming and sweeping up salt is necessary to protect wood

Invest in shoe storage. Wet or snowy boots can create puddles around the house. Have a special mat or tray by the front door where

wet shoes can be kept. A nice bench in the entryway makes it easy for residents and quests to remove their shoes until it's time to go back outside.

Use water-wicking mats. Homeowners will probably need a few extra mats around to tame errant drips and wipe shoes. Any entrance that might be used by people or pets should be protected. Try to avoid petroleum-based, rubber-backed mats, as they could discolor the wood floor.

Control humidity indoors. Cold, dry air in a home can be problematic because the moisture in the wood can eventually evaporate into the air. The heat will suck that moisture from the flooring, causing it to shrink, creak and splinter and become more

brittle. Think about investing in an in-line humidifier for the home's HVAC system that can keep a moderate amount of humidity in the home. Hardwood floorboards are installed to accommodate minor temperature and humidity fluctuations. This is typically a range of between 60 and 80 degrees F with a relative humidity range of 35 to 55 percent, advises ServiceMaster.

Use the right cleaning products. Avoid excessive water to clean wood floors, and select soaps that are specially designed for wood flooring. Consult with the flooring manufacturer for a list of detergents that are safe to use.

With proper care, hardwood flooring can survive rain, snow and cold weather.

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Although crown molding is generally identified as trim for the area where a wall meets the ceiling, molding is used for many other home décor applications. Molding creates an appealing visual element when used at chair height along a wall, sometimes with thin vertical pieces attached to accent a wider area. Molding also serves as an attractive window cornice or as a frame for a wall-hung flat screen television or vertical mirror. The possibilities are only limited by homeowners' imaginations and finances.

"Crown molding is an inexpensive approach to adding beautiful detail to your home, Woodcraft national power tool sales manager Andrew Bondi said, "and Woodcraft is the goto source for tools and supplies for molding and trim projects."

King Crown Molding Jig or the Kreg Crown-Pro Miter Saw Guide that features a bonus measurement transfer angle finder. If your project involves a coped cut, Woodcraft stocks Eclipse Coping Saws and Gröz Coping Saw Frames.

"Remember to protect your eyes," product manager Jessica Douglas said. "Pick up a pair of SAS Safety Classes before you begin your project. The lightweight glasses can be worn alone or over eyeglasses."

For all the marking and measuring necessary to prepare the molding, you will find the multipurpose Kreg Multi-Mark Marking Gauge indispensable. To fill any small gaps, Woodcraft recommends Famowood Wood Filler, along with Norton 5X Small Area Sanding Spong-

es for smoothing filled holes.

Once the molding is cut and ready for fastening, use the Grex 18-gauge Green Buddy Nailer, which offers precision control and both sequential and contact trigger applications.

"If you are going to back your molding with an adhesive prior to nailing, Titebond's No-Run, No-Drip Wood Glue for molding and trim is a great product to use," said Woodcraft senior product manager Peter Collins, "especially if you are going to use a headless pinner to install trim."

Painting crown molding can be simple - blending in with the wall or ceiling color - or new color can be introduced to match furnishings or accent the overall décor. "General Finishes Milk Paint and Old Fashioned Milk Paint, both water-based, are available in many colors and can be mixed to create an extensive palette of custom colors," product manager Kent Harpool said. "Both brands also offer related products to produce special decorative effects, such as antiquing and distressing."

Harpool recommends Redtree Bristle Brushes or Foam Brushes for applying paint. Use Microfiber Tack Cloths to remove sanding dust before applying paint or after distressing.



Aim for an R-50 or a depth of 16 inches.

4. Backyard Care - Save your property from potential damage by trimming overgrown trees and shrubs to prevent ice-laden branches from thrashing against electrical wires and your home's exterior. Drain/shut off any exterior faucets and sprinkler systems

to prevent freezing. Ensure rain or snow drains away from the house to avoid foundation problems.

Use roofing cement and a caulking gun to seal joints where water could penetrate, such as around the chimney, skylights or vent pipes. Spruce Grove, Alta. - On July 8, 2020 at approximately 5:20 p.m., the Parkland Drug Unit along with Parkland RCMP members, conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in Spruce Grove in relation to a drug investigation. A large amount of illicit cannabis was located and seized.

A search of the vehicle was conducted and the following was seized:

- 1. \$7440.00 of Canadian Currency
- 17 grams High-Terpene Full Spectrum Extract
- 3. 120 grams Cannabis Infused Candy
- 4. 16 grams Distillates
- 5. 110,000 milligrams or 110 grams - THC Vape Oil
- 6. 12 grams Shatter
- 81.3 grams Dried Cannabis
- 8. 2 OxyContin Tablets

Chad Harker (21) and William Chandler (19), both from Spruce Grove, were arrested and charged with the following charges:

- Section 9(2) Cannabis Act - Possession for the Purpose of Distributing
- Section 354(1)(A)Criminal Code - Possession

of property obtained by crime over \$5000

Both are scheduled to appear in Stony Plain Provincial Court on October 7, 2020.
