Albertans know that 2020 has been a uniquely challenging year for families and job creators and that now, perhaps more than ever before, we must boldly pursue new ways to diversify our economy.

I am excited to share with you that Alberta's government is introducing legislation this fall to attract new investment in Geothermal energy as part of Alberta's Recovery Plan.

Using emerging made-in-Alberta technology and our decades of drilling experience in oil and gas, we are setting our province up to harness earth's natural energy and diversify our innovative energy sector.

A strong Albertan geothermal sector has the potential to create jobs and economic opportunity for Indigenous and rural remote communities, while contributing to the global effort to lower greenhouse gas emissions.

Our government is also launching a new plan for diversifying and growing Alberta's natural gas industry that will position the province as a post-pandemic powerhouse for responsible energy development. In addition to fueling countries around the world, natural gas - expected to pass coal as the world's second largest energy source by 2040 - has many other uses, including being the foundation for creating hydrogen. Alberta's 300-year supply of affordable natural gas provides significant opportunity to attract investment and job creators back to the province, building back our economy stronger than ever.

Despite the COVID-19 crisis initially reducing demand for pulp and paper products this year, Alberta is now seeing record-breaking solid wood prices at \$1,288 per thousand board feet for western sprucepine-fir.

While competing jurisdictions reduced production levels in reaction to the pandemic, these have proven difficult to reverse as demand for wood products increased. In contrast, Alberta saw limited production curtailments, allowing us to maintain a competitive advantage.

Alberta's forestry and lumber producers are among the best in the world and through our partnerships they are in a position to keep our forests and communities safe from fires and infestation while supporting jobs and growth.

Members from Leduc RCMP conducted extensive patrols; however, the BMW was not located

Several hours later, RCMP Central Alberta District (CAD) Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) members were conducting patrols in the City of Leduc when they located the same unoccupied black BMW involved in the earlier road rage incident. CAD CRU initiated covert surveillance on the vehicle. During surveillance, CAD CRU members observed 3 individuals enter the BMW and were able to identify the 3 vehicle occupants as 2 individuals were wanted on outstanding warrants.

RCMP CAD CRU continued surveillance on the BMW and

a short time later, once the occupants of the BMW exited the car at a residence, along with the assistance of members of Leduc RCMP Drug Section, the 3 occupants of the vehicle were arrested.

A search of the BMW resulted in the seizure of the following items: a quantity of suspected stolen ID; a loaded, prohibited, sawed off pump action 12-gauge shotgun; bear spray; several knives. Possession of these items was in contravention of release conditions that all three individuals were bound in relation to previous charges. One of the occupants was found to be in possession of a small quantity of methamphetamine.

Warren Frederick Young (45), Kayla Marlena-Lynn Cramm (38) and Andre Robert Vromans (36) are charged with:

- Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose
- Unauthorized possession of firearm
- · Careless use of a firearm
- Possession of a restricted firearm
- Possession of a firearm in a motor vehicle
- Possession of a firearm when knowing possession is unauthorized

Kayla Cramm and Wayne Young are additionally charged with:

• Fail to comply with release conditions (x3)

Andre Vromans is facing the following additional charges:

- Fail to comply with release conditions (x6)
- Possess weapon contrary to order (x2)
- Possession of methamphet-

amine (CDSA)

Following judicial hearings, Cramm, Young and Vromans all chose not to speak to bail. Cramm and Young are scheduled to attend Leduc Provincial Court on Oct. 1, 2020, and Vromans is to attend Leduc Provincial Court on Oct. 15, 2020–all to speak to bail.

The RCMP investigation into the initial road rage incident continues.

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that the Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship announced yesterday the 2020 Parents and Grandparents (PGP) Program application for those interested in sponsoring a

parent or grandparent to immigrate to Canada. The application window for the interest to sponsor form is open for a three-week period until November 3, 2020, where interested individuals can apply to sponsor their parents and/or grandparents for Canadian permanent residence.

Refugees Immigration, and Citizenship Canada will then randomly select 10,000 interested applicants through a lottery to apply to become a sponsor for the Parents and Grandparents Program. Once selected applicants will have 60 days to submit their application.

### CANADA RECOVERY BENEFIT (CRB) NOW OPEN

OTTAWA: Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, Gerald Soroka wishes to inform constituents that the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) has opened the application process for the Canada Recovery Benefit (CRB).

The CRB provides \$500 per week up to 26 weeks, for workers who have stopped working or had their em-

ployment/self-employment income reduced by at least 50% due to COVID-19 and are not eligible for EI.

The CRA is providing an application process for the CRB similar to the one that Canadians used to access Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB). Those eligible can apply for these benefits online through the CRA's 'My Account' portal or toll-free at: 1-800-959-2019 or 1-800-959-2041.

To ensure the recovery benefits provide more targeted support for those who continue to need it, the application process for CRB includes new elements, such as:

- shorter eligibility periods of two weeks;
- retroactive periods, (those applying will be required to apply after the two-week period has ended);
- a 10% tax withholding at source; (will re-

ceive payments of \$900 for each two-week eligibility period);

- a three-to-fiveday window to receive payments for applications made by direct deposit, and,
- a 10-12-day window for cheque by mail.

# MP SOROKA'S STATEMENT IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS ON SUNCOR ENERGY LAYOFFS

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, rose in the House of Commons to address the job losses in the oil and gas sector following Suncor energy announcing it would be laying off 15% of it's staff as a result of hardships in the energy sector.

MP Soroka stated "Mr. Speaker, I rise today regard-

ing the layoffs recently announced at Suncor Energy. A total of 15% of Suncor's workforce will be laid off in the coming weeks. This comes directly as a result of the government's anti-energy policies. Instead of exporting our oil, the government is exporting our jobs.

Two weeks ago, the government delivered the throne speech. The only thing mentioned about oil and gas in the throne speech is how they will

play a role in getting to net zero emissions. I believe the Liberals' plan to get to net zero is to eliminate oil and gas in Canada. This is not a sound way to build back the economy while there is still a huge need for oil, gas and all the by-products it produces.

While the government does not support Canadian producers, it thinks nothing of bringing oil in from foreign countries, such as the United States, and instead support Donald Trump in making America great again. The Suncor layoffs are the most recent example.

# AutoTUNE-UP

### HOW OLDER DRIVERS CAN APPROACH VEHICLE MAINTENANCE AND SOCIAL DISTANCING

The outbreak of the novel coronavirus COVID-19 in the winter of 2019-20 required people of all ages and backgrounds to make changes in their daily lives. Elderly men and women were among the groups the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention identified as high-risk for severe illness from COVID-19. That forced people 65 years and older to be especially cautious when engaging in otherwise normal activities, including having their vehicles serviced.

In recognition of the threat posed by COVID-19, many auto dealerships and service shops implemented changes to their operations to ensure the safety of their employees and their customers, including those in high-risk groups. Seniors can

take additional measures to ensure they stay safe while having their vehicles serviced.

Inquire about safety measures. Before booking vehicle maintenance appointments, seniors should call the dealership or body shop to determine what's being done to keep everyone safe. Many such businesses quickly implemented new safety protocols so they should be ready and willing to share this information over the phone. Look for specific information about sanitization practices. Are vehicle interiors being sprayed with disinfectant before and after maintenance appointments? Are employees wearing masks each day? Are employees being checked for COVID-19 symptoms before

each shift? These are some of the simple yet effective measures many dealerships and body shops are taking to ensure the safety of their customers.

Ask about pickup service. Some communities that have reopened are encouraging high-risk segments of the population to adhere to stay-at-home measures. Elderly men and women are still vulnerable to COVID-19 even if the number of reported cases in their towns has decreased. Pickup service, in which a service shop employee will come pick up and then drop off a customer's car once the work is done, can be a great way for elderly drivers to have their vehicles serviced without going out in public. Even if pickup

is not policy, ask if it's possible and request that your vehicle be disinfected upon being returned. If pickup is not an option, ask a younger friend or family member to drive your car in for maintenance in your place.

Only visit safe facilities. Elderly drivers who must visit a dealership or body shop in person should confirm that waiting rooms feature socially distant seating. If possible, drop the car off and then go for a walk or find somewhere safe off the premises to read a book or listen to music while the work is being done.

Elderly drivers who need to have their vehicles serviced can take certain steps to stay safe in the era of social distancing.





## AutoTUNE-UP

#### CAR TROUBLE? CHECK THE FUSE BOX

Modern automobiles are technological marvels that rely on electrical components more than ever before. According to The Family Handyman, vehicles have 40 or more fuses grouped in two or more places.

Just like fuses in a home's electrical panel, automotive fuses stop excessive current flow that can overheat circuits, damage equipment or cause fires. Any electrical component in a vehicle, such as the radio or headlights, are tied to a fuse.

When something goes awry with automotive electrical components, drivers may be quick to believe the components themselves or even the car's battery or alternator are to blame. Mechanics say that it's entirely possible that a blown fuse

is the cause of the problem. Simply checking and/or replacing the fuse can alleviate the issue.

Finding the fuses

The location of the fuse box depends on the make and model of the vehicle. Drivers should consult their owner's manual to learn where the fuse boxes are located. Some vehicles have two fuse boxes that serve different purposes. Engine compartment fuse boxes protect certain engine components, including the anti-lock brake pump. Fuses inside or beneath the dashboard may protect dome lights or the air conditioning system.

According to How a Car Works, the individual fuses in the box are typically numbered. That makes it easier for drivers to determine which vehicle components aren't working. If the fuses are not numbered, then it's a matter of removing fuses to see which circuits stop working to help narrow down the issue.

Replacing fuses

Vehicles may have different types of fuses. It's important to know which ones are in the car so you can get the right replacement

"Blade" fuses are common and have a conductive horseshoe-shaped metal strip that runs through an outer plastic housing. If the metal strip appears broken, the fuse is no good.

Cylindrical glass fuses are found in some cars. They're also known as "Buss" fuses. If the metal strip that runs down the center is broken, the fuse needs to be replaced.

Older European cars have ceramic fuses built with an outer copper conductive surface. The narrow part of the copper piece breaks in the middle when the fuse blows.

Regardless of their design, fuses will be clearly labeled with their ampere ratings, according to Car-ID. Physically remove the fuse using a small, specially shaped fuse puller tool that may be included inside the fuse box. Replace the fuse with one of the same amperage by gently pushing it into place.

If the new fuse blows relatively quickly after replacement, or multiple fuses blow at one time, a larger current issue may be the problem. Consult a mechanic in this instance.

#### CITY OF LEDUC USES LRC SHUTDOWN TO INSTALL COST-SAVING DEVICES

The City of Leduc will be running cold this upcoming season saying good-bye to its reliance on hot water to create and maintain ice in the Leduc Recreation Centre (LRC).

"We couldn't be more excited for this new technology," says Mayor Bob Young with the City of Leduc. "With the facility shutdown earlier this year, it

was a no-brainer to utilize this time to install these devices that will help us save operating dollars after the first year of use. It only made sense to us, and it aligns with our Environmental Sustainability Plan."

In May, Leduc City Council gave the green light during the COVID-19 facility shutdown to install the new devices called REALice®which is a water treatment system for arenas eliminating the need for

hot water when building and resurfacing ice. According to their website, this system provides the following benefits:

- Reduction in energy costs
- · Creates a harder, smoother ice surface
- · Less condensation and rust on structural beams

The project is expected to save 236 tonnes of CO2 annually, which equals 51 passenger vehicles driven in one year.

turn-on-investment of roughly \$13,000 (annually) will be realized after two full years in operation for the three ice surfaces. The city's total investment is \$76,000, with potential access of up to \$50,000 through the Municipal Climate Change Action Centre grant.




