NOVA GAS TRANSMISSION LTD. EXPANSION PROJECT GETS APPROVAL

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead is pleased to inform constituents that the Government of Canada has approved the NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. (NGTL) 2021 System Expansion Project.

The \$2.3 billion NGTL project is of significant importance to Alberta, to Yellowhead riding and for economies across the country. It will add 344 kilometres of new pipeline to the existing NOVA Gas Transmission system from west of Red Deer to near Grande Prairie, Alberta. The project will also create up to 2,920 direct jobs during construction and provide natural gas producers and shippers with greater access to domestic and US markets. "This \$2.3-billion project will contribute approximately \$1.2 billion to Alberta's GDP giving natural gas producers better access to markets for their products" stated MP Soroka.

"This project was approved just two weeks after I rose in the House of Commons to question the government on the delays in approving the NGTL Pipeline," concluded MP Soroka.

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October 27, 2020 A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR **RE: Allocation of Federal Funds in GYPSD**

October 5, 2020 Dear Staff, Students, Families, and Stakeholders;

At the September 23, 2020, Public Board Meeting, the Board of Trustees for Grande Yellowhead Public School Division (GYPSD) discussed how the Division will allocate its share of the \$262.8 million the province received from The Government of Canada in its commitment to support a safe school re-entry across the country. The province distrib-uted most of the federal funds through a per-student grant. Our Division will receive \$1.57 million, which is 2.5 per cent of GYPSD's operating budget. The first half of the funds were received in September, and the second half of the funds will be coming later in the school year.

We will allocate the federal funds to address increased costs in staffing, resources and supports for students learning at home, and enhanced cleaning requirements.

To help address the needs of students, our Division will be hiring additional online teach-

ing supports to help with the delivery of at-home learning. This will include the hiring of French teachers to support French language development for French Immersion students. A portion of the federal funding will also be applied to the development of online lesson plans and resources to support students in Grades 1- 9. Additionally, sick time for certificated and non-certificated school staff will be covered centrally for illnesses that exceed three days.

With the federal funding announcement, the Division will centrally manage and supply all the necessary Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), sanitization, and cleaning supplies for the entire school year. The Division will reimburse schools any already identified for COVID related expenses that were spent over the summer in preparation to get schools ready for re-entry.

We will also allocate federal funds to support extra custodial staff to clean and sanitize Division schools during the day and to ensure that buses have the proper cleaning and disinfectant procedures to minimize any exposure to COVID during transportation.

I want to share our Board's appreciation for the additional federal funds and acknowledge the impact that the COVID 19 pandemic has had on GYPSD. want to applaud our school and Division leaders for moving quickly over the summer to ensure learn-at-home options for our families and for your diligence in implementing the safety protocols. Our first priority is student learning and ensuring safe environments for our students and employees. These additional funds will help keep as many of our resources focused on our classrooms both in school and online - and student learning as possible.

Is it just me or does the perfect autumn weather never seem to last nearly long enough before the colourful leaves have fallen to the ground and the air has acquired a frosty nip. With the end of fall once again comes the opening of the Alberta Legislature and a reinvigorated effort to fulfill our platform commitments. Only a year and a half into our mandate, our government has accomplished 68% of our prior election commitments, meaning over two thirds of our policy platform undertakings have been met or are in process. With plenty more incredible policy suggestions on the docket, I thought I would review some of the bills and legislation we passed so far in 2020.

Back in May, which easily feels like it could have been years ago now, session opened with Bill 1, the Critical Infrastructure Defence Act. This bill establishes harsher prosecution for individuals who choose to interfere with highways, railroads and other necessary public services and infrastructure while protesting. Bill 7, The Responsible Energy Development Act, builds on prior UCP campaign commitments to review the Alberta Energy Regulator, its unnecessary sector delays and the restoration of Alberta's reputation with investors as a leader in predictable and efficient regulation. Bill 8, the Protecting Survivors of Human Trafficking Act, extends the definition of sexual exploitation to persons of all ages, makes it easier for survivors to get protection orders, enables police to take quicker action to rescue survivors, and allows survivors to sue traffickers. Bill 8 also will help create a day of awareness to help ensure more Albertans are aware of the growing issue that human trafficking poses in our province. One Bill that I was proud to have played a larger part in was Bill 15, the Choice in Education Act. The Government of Alberta will now officially recognize that public schools, separate schools, Francophone schools, private schools, charter schools, early childhood services programs and home education programs all play an integral role in ensuring choice in education to students and parents based on their varying needs.

The introduction of Bill 16, Victims of Crime Amendment Act, will help play an important part in promoting public safety measures, while better protecting and supporting victims through resources and service-based programs. An important issue was resolved with the passing of Bill 28, the Vital Statistics Act, ensuring greater protection of children and vulnerable Albertans. Before the passing of Bill 28, sexual offenders could hide their past convictions from their community and intimate relationships by legally changing their name. Disallowing this process will allow for greater transparency and accountability while hopefully reducing future victimization.

Finally I wanted to mention Bill 32, Restoring Balance in Alberta's Workplace. The passing of this important bill will help save job creators upwards of \$100 million yearly by reducing red tape while also helping get Albertans back to work.

So far 2020 has been an incredibly busy year for legislation but as the fall session draws near, I am looking forward to the next round of important policy changes and decisions that need to happen to help keep Alberta on track during these difficult times.

2020 PARENTS AND GRANDPARENTS PROGRAM

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that the Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship announced yesterday the 2020 Parents and Grandparents (PGP) Program application for those interested in sponsoring a parent or grandparent to immigrate to Canada. The application window for the interest to sponsor form is open for a threeweek period until November 3, 2020, where interested individuals can apply to sponsor their parents and/or grandparents for Canadian permanent residence.

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada will then randomly select 10,000 interested applicants through a lottery to apply to become a sponsor for the Parents and Grandparents Program. Once selected applicants will have 60 days to submit their application.

STOLEN VEHICLE RECOVERED WITH TWO SLEEPING INSIDE

On Sept. 17, 2020, at approximately 3 p.m., an Alberta RCMP Traffic member was conducting traffic enforcement on Highway 11 west of Rocky Mountain House, when he came across a vehicle parked on the side of the road with the driver's side rear door open with a pair of legs

dangling out.

Out of concern for the person's safety, the officer stopped to investigate and a query of the vehicle showed it had been stolen out of Edmonton three days earlier. The keys to the vehicle were secured while the occupants remained asleep. The driver and passenger were then arrested and taken into custody for possession of the stolen property. The driver, a 25-year-old male from central Alberta was charged with Possession of stolen property over \$5,000 and Possession of stolen property under \$5,000 as further investigation showed the licence plate had been stolen from a different vehicle.

The passenger, a 24-year-old male from central Alberta was also charged and with Possession of stolen property over \$5,000 and Possession of stolen property under \$5,000. In addition, he had seven outstanding Criminal Code warrants for unrelated offences that were executed. He was held in custody for a judicial interim release hearing at a later date.

The apprehension of individuals committing rural crime is one of the top priorities of Alberta RCMP Traffic members.



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SIGNS HEADLIGHTS MAY NEED TO BE REPLACED

Automobiles require a little TLC to stay on the road and operate efficiently. When vehicle maintenance is ignored, vehicles operate less efficiently and, in many instances, less safely as well.

Jerking and stalling is a telltale sign of engine trouble, but some vehicle problems are more subtle. One such problem is fading headlights. Fading headlights can pose a significant threat to drivers and their passengers as well as fellow motorists. According to the National Safety Council, drivers do only one-quarter of their driving at night. However, the NSC notes that 50 percent of traffic deaths

occur at night. Such figures highlight the potential dangers of nighttime driving, which only becomes more dangerous if headlights are not operating at optimal capacity.

Since drivers do most of their driving during the daytime, it's easy to overlook headlight performance. However, it's important that drivers learn to recognize the signs that headlights need to be replaced.

Dimming

Dimming headlights do not necessarily require replacement. In some instances dimming headlights are a byproduct of a dirty car. The buildup of dirt and grime can reduce light output even when the headlights are otherwise fine. If your car is dirty, take it to the car wash and make sure the headlights are scrubbed clean of dirt and grime. Then drive at night to see if the light output of your headlights is still dim. If so, the headlight bulbs may need to be replaced. Flickering

Flickering headlights can indicate anything from worn out headlight bulbs to a weak car battery to loose connections. Flickering is one of the more dangerous headlight issues, as it can lead to headlights suddenly going dark while drivers are on the road at night. If headlights are flickering, take the car to a mechanic as soon as possible to have the issue resolved.

One light out

When one headlight goes dark, chances are the other is not far behind. Automotive experts recommend replacing headlight bulbs in pairs, even if only one bulb has gone dark, because this ensures equal light output.

Headlight maintenance tends to be overlooked. But recognizing the signs of fading headlights can help drivers avoid accidents and vastly improve the safety of nighttime driving.





HOW TO MAINTAIN A CAR THAT'S RARELY DRIVEN

Driving habits changed significantly in 2020. The outbreak of the novel coronavirus COVID-19 forced many professionals to work from home full-time. In addition, stay-at-home measures greatly limited how much people could or would travel in their free time. The result was a lot of cars spending a lot of time sitting idly in driveways.

Just because a car is not being driven very much does not mean its owner can forgo vehicle maintenance. Drivers can take these steps to ensure their vehicles stay in shape even as they're primarily staying in the driveway.

· Adhere to recommended maintenance schedules. Auto manufacturers typically recommend maintenance schedules based on the number of miles a car is driven or the length of time since its most recent maintenance appointment. "Whichever comes first" may be recommended for fluid changes and routine tuneups, and this rule of thumb should still be followed. Even if a car has barely hit the road in recent months, its fluids, such as oil, are still aging and still need to be replaced.

• Turn the car on every so often. Turning the car on, even if you only intend to let it sit idle in the driveway, keeps the vehicle components lubricated by allowing fluids to cycle their way through the engine. Turning the car on also ensures the battery stays fresh and doesn't die, a lesson many drivers have learned the hard way during the COVID-19 outbreak.

• Disconnect the battery if necessary. Drivers who own two vehicles or families who have only been using the family car in recent months can disconnect the batteries from their unused vehicles to prevent corrosion. Corrosion decreases battery life and performance. If drivers notice a white, green or blue covering around the battery terminals, posts or cables, corrosion is likely the culprit and the battery will need to be replaced.

Take the car for a spin. Of course, driving a vehicle every so often is a great way to keep it running strong. Multi-car families that tend to use the same car to shop for groceries or pick up takeout orders can periodically use their other car to run such errands.

Cars are sitting idly in driveways more than ever before. Vehicle maintenance must remain a priority even for cars that rarely hit the open road.



HOW TO GET A WI-FI ENABLED CAR

Staying connected is more important than ever, whether you're at home or on the go. Connecting to Wi-Fi is typically easy at home, but what about when you're in the car?

Wi-Fi-enabled vehicles are becoming hot commodities for drivers. There are various ways to access the internet in a car. Drivers can buy an add-on device. Even mobile gadgets that aren't specifically designed for vehicle applications can be easily connected. The devices plug into the 12-volt accessory outlet. OBD II devices connect to a car's OBD II port. This is most often located below the steering wheel. Mechanics use this port to run digital vehicle diagnostics. However, it also can be used to create a Wi-Fi hot spot with an OBD device.

Another option is to use a smartphone to create a mobile hotspot through a cellular data plan. Anyone in the car can then tether their phones or other devices to the smartphone to access the internet.

Many vehicles are now equipped with their own Wi-Fi capabilities. This means you will not need

an extra device to access the internet. However. you will probably need to sign up for an additional data plan through whatever service the car manufacturer uses to offer Wi-Fi capability or through your mobile phone carrier. AllConnect.com says Wi-Fi plans for vehicles start as low as \$10 per month and may include unlimited data. Furthermore, car Wi-Fi is often different from a mobile hotspot because it is likely to offer better connection and more security while preserving mobile data and phone battery life. Cars that are not

equipped with Wi-Fi can have it as an add-on with an installed wireless vehicle router. These routers range from \$200 to \$600 and are professionally installed.

Having Wi-Fi in a vehicle is handy when taking road trips or when work requires internet connectivity. Dedicated vehicle internet can help save on mobile phone data plans and battery life. Plus, people increasingly staying at home can rely on a vehicle's Wi-Fi system as a back-up should their home internet go down.
