The Town of Whitecourt is pleased to announce that the Arts & Culture Centre/Library Project has been approved for approximately \$15.6 million from the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP). Honourable Prasad Panda. Minister of Infrastructure,

has been a topic of discussion for several years in our region," stated Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak. "It is exciting to see that with this financial contribution we can move forward to the next stage in our community planning process for the facility."

In February 2018, the Town applied to the ICIP grant for funding for the Library and Arts & Culture Centre components of the proposed Municipal Centre. The application was made following the November 2017 approval of Municipal Centre Concept Plan which includes floor plans and preliminary cost estimates for the facility components. The Plan is available for viewing on the Town's website.

Now that grant funding has

been confirmed, Whitecourt can move to the next stage of planning, which involves confirming municipal partnerships and re-engaging the community.

"The Ad Hoc Building Steering Committee will be working with community stakeholders to confirm partnerships and educate the community on the project," stated Director of Community Services, Chelsea Grande. "The need for a multi-purpose culture centre/ performing arts facility has been a topic of discussion for over 10 years, and multiple public input initiatives have been completed over this time period."

The project will be discussed at the next Regular Meeting of Council.

Recognizing how COVID-19 is impacting Whitecourt and our region, community members are asked to remain vigilant in mitigating the risk of getting sick or spreading COVID-19 locally.


The Town of Whitecourt continues to follow the Province of Alberta's public health guidelines, and monitors the COVID-19 statistics daily to determine how our community is being impacted by the virus and how we may be impacted in the future.

How you can help

To help mitigate COVID-19 infections in our community and across the province, people must continue practicing physical distancing to help limit the spread of COVID-19 and reduce the risk of getting sick. Physical distancing involves taking steps to limit the number of people you come into close contact with. To protect yourself and others:

• Keep at least 2 metres (about the length of a hockey stick) distance from people outside your household or cohort group.

As part of the Province's gathering restrictions people should establish a COVID-19 cohort consisting of a small group of up to 15 of the same people who can interact regularly without staying 2 me-

• Avoid travel outside Canada. • Watch for COVID-19 symptoms (see the full symptom list www.alberta.ca/covid-19testing-in-alberta.aspx#symptoms).

Get tested when:

• you are exhibiting any symptom of COVID-19,

• you have no symptoms but are a close contact of a confirmed COVID-19 case,

• you are linked to an outbreak at a specific outbreak site.

• Follow mandatory isolation requirements:

• 10 days minimum if you develop any COVID-19 symptoms, or until the symptoms resolve, whichever is longer.

• 14 days if you recently returned from travel outside of Canada or are a close contact of someone who has tested positive for COVID-19, plus an additional 10 days from the onset of symptoms, should they occur, whichever is longer.

When people share the responsibility to establish appropriate cohorts, practice physical distancing, and take personal steps to limit the spread of COVID-19, we are better positioned to protect our health and limit the magnitude and effect of the virus on our community.

NOVA GAS TRANSMISSION LTD. EXPANSION PROJECT GETS APPROVAL

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead is pleased to inform constituents that the Government of Canada has approved the NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. (NGTL) 2021 System Expansion The \$2.3 billion NGTL project is of significant

importance to Alberta, to Yellowhead riding and for economies across the country. It will add 344 kilometres of new pipeline to the existing NOVA Gas Transmission system from west of Red Deer to near Grande Prairie, Alberta. The project will also create up to 2,920 direct jobs during construction and provide natural gas producers and shippers with greater access to domestic and US markets.

"This \$2.3-billion project will contribute approximately \$1.2 billion to Alberta's GDP giving natural gas producers better access to markets for their products" stated MP Soroka.

"This project was approved just two weeks after I rose in the House of Commons to question the government on the delays in approving the NGTL Pipeline," concluded MP Soroka.

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead stood in the House today and asked the Minister of Veterans Affairs the following:

"Madam Speaker, many Royal Canadian Legions across my riding have expressed financial concerns since the outbreak of COVID. The legions continually support veterans in these difficult times. Branch No. 8 in Rocky Mountain House contacted the Minister of Veterans Affairs and was told that an aid package was in the works, but that was over a month ago.

Legions are in need of financial assistance. When will the government help legions and our veterans?"

The Parliamentary Secre-

tary to the Minister of Veterans Affairs replied:

"Madam Speaker, the well-being of our veterans and their families are top priority. We fully understand the vital role that legions play in supporting veterans and their families in all communities. That is why I am proud to share with the House that Bill C-4 was passed in the House a few weeks ago and includes \$20 million to support organizations such as the Royal Canadian Legion and other partners.


As a result of the investigation, Russell Drury (41) of St. Albert, Alta. is charged with the following offences: Sexual Exploitation







INDICATORS IT'S TIME TO CHANGE AIR FILTERS

Vehicle maintenance can protect drivers' investments and help their automobiles run efficiently. One area drivers should pay particular attention to is their vehicles' air filters. When operating at optimal capacity, an air filter improves fuel efficiency while ensuring vehicles accelerate smoothly without taxing the engine. But when air filters are clogged, fuel efficiency is reduced and emis-



sions are increased, a 1-2 punch that costs motorists money and hurts the planet at the same time. Drivers can check their owners' manuals to determine the recommended intervals to replace air filters, but the following are a handful of indicators that suggest it's time to change them.

Gas mileage: Unless you just purchased your vehicle, you likely know how many miles you can drive on a full tank of gas. If that gas mileage is suddenly slipping and you find yourself visiting the filling station more frequently, then it might be time to replace your air filter.

Engine light: Drivers may be alerted to engine issues

when the "Check engine" lights up on the vehicle's dashboard. This light may come on to indicate a problem with the air filter, as clogged air filters reduce air flow to the engine, resulting in an imbalanced air-fuel mixture that adversely affects the engine.

Starting and idling problems: Vehicles sometimes don't start up as smoothly as they once did, and drivers may also notice vehicles are not idling smoothly. These symptoms may indicate misfiring spark plugs that are being polluted (and made less effective) by a dirty air filter that is reducing the flow of air to the engine.

Acceleration difficulties:

Automobiles that are operating at peak capacity accelerate quickly. But dirty, worn out air filters adversely affect acceleration. Drivers who notice that their cars are struggling to accelerate when stoplights turn green or on highways may need to replace their vehicles' air filters.

Dirty air filter: Perhaps the biggest indicator that an air filter needs to be replaced is the filter itself. If you cannot find the air filter on your own, consult your vehicle owner's manual to determine where it is. Once you find the air filter, examine it in broad daylight. Clean air filters are white, so if the filter has darkened, it may need to be replaced.





4 REASONS FOR A CHECK ENGINE LIGHT

Vehicles rely on many components working harmoniously to function at optimal capacity. Any number of systems can go wrong, and oftentimes the first indication that something has gone awry is an illuminated dashboard signal.

One such signal is the "check engine" light. Many drivers have little idea what to do when this indicator lights up, and this light can cause some anxiety. According to Consumer Reports, a check engine light turning on does not usually require immediate action. However, it does mean that you should make an appointment to have the vehicle inspected for potential problems. Check engine lights are part of a car's onboard diagnostics. The light turning on may indicate something minor, such as a loose fuel cap, or something more serious like a misfiring engine. When the light turns on, drivers wondering why may want to see if the answer is related to one of the following issues.

1. Loose gas cap: Fuel vapors can leak out and air can get in when the fuel cap isn't secured correctly. This can compromise the fuel system and make the check engine light come on. Take off the cap and then reseal it to see if that alleviates the problem. Cracked caps will need to be replaced.

2. Dirty oxygen sensor: A

faulty or clogged sensor may not provide the right information about unburned oxygen from the vehicle's exhaust. This sensor monitors how much fuel is burned. Compromised data can cause a decrease in fuel efficiency. Some doit-yourselfers can replace an oxygen sensor on their own, but those who can't should have the issue addressed immediately by a professional.

3. Too much speed or load: Towing a trailer or another heavy item may put strain on the vehicle and cause the light to come on because of loss of power. Lightening the load and reducing speed can help fix the problem. Always consult with the owner's manual to determine the towing capacity of your vehicle.

4. Short or faulty code: Computers aren't always fool-proof, and sometimes an electrical short or another similar problem can cause a light to come on. Bring the vehicle to an automotive supply store. Such stores typically have diagnostics tools that can be hooked into the car's computer and provide a more detailed understanding of what is triggering the check engine indicator.

In many cases, a steady check engine light is not a serious concern. However, when such a light comes on, drivers should try to find out why as soon as possible.




