According to The Pathfinders 1978, 176 residents served in the Armed Forces. Many were lucky and returned home uninjured. Others spent months in a hospital in England as the result of injuries received on a World War I battlefield. Some had been taken as a prisoner of war and spent time in German POW war camps before returning to Canada after the Second World War ended.

Back here in Canada, families waited anxiously for letters from the front. Receiving a telegram, however, often meant bad news. And during World War II, food rationing was introduced for basic foods like sugar, butter and later, meat. Housewives were encouraged to conserve in every way - to re-sew a piece of clothing for another family member from a worn-out garment rather than buy a new one. Another aspect of World War II was the many war brides - young women in Europe who met and married Canadian servicemen. What a traumatic move that would have been!

There is so much history waiting to be discovered at the Onoway Museum! Check out this new military exhibit.. Local residents may wish to consider gifting some of their family mementos to the museum so that others in our community can share that history.

The museum is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. but wearing a mask is required. Add this visit to your to-do list!

Parkland RCMP arrested a 58-yr-old male in connection with an investigation dealing with Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Assault that occurred on Sept. 17, 2020.

The accused followed and attempted to engage two young males, ages eleven and twelve, while at the Tri-Leisure Centre swimming pool. The accused touched one of the young males inappropriately. Staff at the Tri-Leisure Centre did not witness the actual event, but suspected inappropriate behavior, immediately intervened and prevented further abuse.

As a result of the investigation, Leonard Frostad (58) of Spruce Grove, Alta. is charged with the following offences:

Sexual Exploitation

Sexual Assault

Following a Judicial Hearing, Leonard Frostad was released from custody with numerous conditions, including not to have any contact or communication with a child under 16-yrs-old and not to attend any public areas where youth could be present. His first appearance is Nov. 25, 2020 at Stony Plain Provincial Court.





SIMPLE MAINTENANCE PROJECTS TO **KEEP CARS RUNNING SMOOTHLY**

One of the ways to keep vehicles running strong for years on end is to adhere to the manufacturer's recommended maintenance schedule. Although there are many factors drivers cannot control, including recalls, weather and road conditions, proper maintenance is something drivers can control, and maintaining a vehicle can be very simple. **Oil Changes**

Motor oil lubricates the engine and keeps it in good working order. Old oil becomes more



viscous and can lose its efficacy. While changing motor oil is important, motorists should follow the owner's manual or the factory maintenance schedule regarding how often it needs to be changed, as all vehicles are not alike. The old myth that cars and trucks need oil changes at set intervals has changed as digital check capabilities have evolved.

Car computers can now keep track of more than just mileage. Computers now track starts and stops and trip durations to determine when cars need oil changes.

Coolant Levels

AutoTUNE-UP

Coolant helps prevent vehicles from overheating and also prevents the water that it mixes with in the radiator from freezing or boiling. Coolant is nearly as important as motor oil in vehicle maintenance. Coolant is typically comprised of a 50/50

mix of distilled water and antifreeze. These two substances work together to maintain a proper ratio of heat energy and prevent eventual breakdown and destruction of the engine.

Coolant is usually changed once per year or at 30,000 miles. This keeps the coolant working properly and will help prevent corrosion and deposits from forming inside the cooling system. Coolant levels might be checked during a full-service oil change appointment.

Check Battery Contacts

Many modern car batteries do not require a lot of maintenance. However, one problem that may occur is a buildup of minerals or corrosion from leaking battery fluid on the contacts. In such instances, use a battery cleaning brush to clean the contacts and then replace the cables.

Tire Maintenance

Properly inflated, balanced and rotated tires make for a smooth, safe ride. Check that tires are wearing evenly and that the vehicle is not pulling to one side. A lack of tread on tires requires they be replaced. Because tires can be expensive, many drivers put off routine tire maintenance. But this can be a costly mistake. Tires that are worn or not properly inflated can cause skidding, problems braking and accidents. Blowouts also may occur, putting drivers, their passengers and fellow motorists in danger. It's best to be proactive with regard to tire maintenance.

Maintaining a vehicle in adherence to manufacturer guidelines can prolong the life of the car, improve its safety and increase its trade-in or resale value







PROTECT YOUR VEHICLE FROM SNOW, ICE AND DAMAGE FROM THE COLD

Winter can be an unforgiving season. Freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can take its toll on people who live in climates where cold weather is a fact of winter life.

While winter can test people's patience, it also can be harsh on cars and trucks. Understanding what components of a vehicle can be compromised by dropping temperatures and snowy roads can help drivers take action to safeguard their automotive investments.

While the Canadian Automobile Association notes that winter can wreak havoc on just about every part of a vehicle, there are some parts that seem to bear the brunt of Old Man Winter's abuse. Properly servicing and caring for a car or truck can help.

Drivers should take their vehicles for a tuneup and inspec-

tion before wintry weather arrives. A mechanic will examine the car battery and check antifreeze levels and make sure that the thermostat, defroster, brakes, and even wiper blades are working effectively. Have the tires inspected for adequate tread, which can make navigating roads safer. If the treads are worn, replace the tires.

In addition to visiting their mechanics, drivers can perform some inspections and fixes themselves.

Check that all of the vehicle's lights are operational so your car can be easily seen during inclement weather. Exchange your existing windshield washer fluid with one that will not freeze in cold conditions. Check the nozzles on the windshield-washer system routinely and clear out

any blockages of ice or debris. While addressing windshield washer fluid, also replace worn out windshield wiper blades with ones that can withstand snow and icy weather.

A new coating of wax can serve as a shield against road salt, snow, sleet, and rain. Try a polymer wax to protect the paint. Whenever possible, rinse off salt and grime so it does not dry on the car and gradually wear away at the paint. Some drivers mistakenly believe that salt stops being a problem once it dries simply because moisture is the active ingredient for a corrosive reaction. But humidity in the air is enough to keep the salt eating away at the car's paint, and that can contribute to rust. Be sure to rinse off the undercarriage of the vehicle as well.

Have your tires' align-

ment checked toward the end of winter or early spring. A season of traveling over pothole-ridden roads or hitting curbs buried under snow drifts can affect the alignment. Get everything back on track. Similarly, inspect tires routinely, as weather changes can affect tire pressure and strength.

Use a soft snow brush or a foam brush to clear snow off of the car. Avoid hard plastic scrapers you might use on your windshield, as they can scratch painted surfaces.

Try to park the vehicle in a garage or under a car port, each of which can protect cars and trucks from the often harsh elements of winter.

Vehicles can be affected by the cold weather. Keep them running efficiently to prevent damage this winter.








WOODLANDS COUNTY AND THE TOWN OF WHITECOURT AGREE TO PROCEED TO ARBITRATION TO FINALIZE THE INTERMUNICIPAL COLLABORATION FRAMEWORK

Woodlands County and the Town of Whitecourt have agreed to proceed to arbitration to conclude the legislated requirement of an Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework (ICF) agreement. In 2017, the Government of Alberta introduced legislation requiring all municipalities to prepare ICFs. The frameworks are intended to formalize how municipalities that share borders will manage growth, coordinate service delivery, and optimize resources for citizens. Whitecourt and Woodlands

County have been working

together to negotiate new, cost share service agreements that will represent the needs and interests of constituents throughout the region. The cost sharing agreements will be part of an overarching Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework (ICF) which the Province requires to be complete by April 1, 2021. Both municipalities acknowledge that there are fundamental differences in key areas required for a completed ICF agreement. The joint decision to proceed to arbitration will bring resolution to this process and allow for a positive relationship for the future, which will benefit all residents and stakeholders of the region.




