



The accused followed and attempted to engage two young males, ages eleven and twelve, while at the Tri-Leisure Centre swimming pool. The accused touched one of the young males inappropriately. Staff at the Tri-Leisure Centre did not witness the actual event, but suspected inappropriate behavior, immediately intervened and prevented further abuse.

As a result of the investigation, Leonard Frostad (58) of Spruce Grove, Alta. is charged with the following offences:

- Sexual Exploitation
- •Sexual Assault

Following a Judicial Hearing, Leonard Frostad was released from custody with numerous conditions, including not to have any contact or communication with a child under 16-yrsold and not to attend any public areas where youth

could be present. His first appearance is Nov. 25, 2020 at Stony Plain Provincial Court.

Parkland RCMP are seeking information on any other potential victims.



NOVEMBER IS FAMILY VIOLENCE PREVENTION MONTH

When thinking about Intimate Partner Violence, the picture of seniors rarely comes to mind.

Abuse can happen at any age. If you suspect a loved one is being abused, report the abuse and call 911 if they are in immediate danger. Covid-19 has also caused many seniors to be isolated, which could lead to an increase of abuse in the

home. The most likely victims are women, people with cognitive impairments and people without relatives nearby to assist them. Elder abuse may occur when there is an imbalance of power and control. Types of elder abuse can include physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, financial abuse, neglect and self neglect.

It is important that family and friends pay attention to warning signs as not all seniors are able to communicate what is happening to them. Some signs that you may notice are unexplained bruising, broken bones, changes in financial situation, depression, withdrawal from previous activities, poor hygiene and weight loss.


Seniors are just as likely to experience domestic violence from their intimate partners as anyone else. Some reasons that keep seniors quiet are that they grew up and lived in a time when domestic violence was silenced and often accepted. Some seniors may have lived so many years in a controlling abusive relationship that they see it as normal behaviour. Seniors may also be financially dependent on their partner. Fear of being alone later in life may scare them into silence. Some seniors may feel that they do not have the supports so that they can confide about the situation. There can also be a fear of losing their independence if they report the abuse to someone, however, the seniors wishes will always be the first thing considered when a situation of elder abuse is reported.

Seniors can fall victim to financial abuse by people that they feel love them or by those they have recently met or those have never met. Seniors are often targeted through their telephone or online and their information taken and used by people who do not have the senior's best interests in mind. This could be done by strangers posing a scheme or by a family member they trust. Financial institutions are often the first to notice some form of financial abuse happening.

Some warning signs of an abuser can be jealousy, possessiveness, a bad temper, cruelty to animals, verbal abuse, extremely controlling behavior and strong beliefs about roles of men and women in relationships.

Any mistreatment can leave an elderly person fearful and depressed. Often the victim feels this is their fault and are ashamed to report it to the police. If you see signs and have concern, try talking with the older adult to get them to tell you what is happening in their life.







Auto TUNE-UP

PROTECT YOUR VEHICLE FROM SNOW, ICE AND DAMAGE FROM THE COLD

Winter can be an unforgiving season. Freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can take its toll on people who live in climates where cold weather is a fact of winter life.

While winter can test people's patience, it also can be harsh on cars and trucks. Understanding what components of a vehicle can be compromised by dropping and snowy temperatures roads can help drivers take action to safeguard their automotive investments.

While the Canadian Automobile Association notes that winter can wreak havoc on just about every part of a vehicle, there are some parts that seem to bear the brunt of Old Man Winter's abuse. Properly servicing and caring for a car or truck can help.

Drivers should

vehicles for a tuneup and inspection before wintry weather arrives. A mechanic will examine the car battery and check antifreeze levels and make sure that the thermostat, defroster, brakes, and even wiper blades are working effectively. Have the tires inspected for adequate tread, which can make navigating roads safer. If the treads are worn, replace the tires.

In addition to visiting their mechanics, drivers can perform some inspections and fixes themselves.

Check that all of the vehicle's lights are operational so your car can be easily seen during inclement weather. Exchange your existing windshield washer fluid with one that will not freeze in cold conditions. Check the nozzles on the windshield-washer svsany blockages of ice or debris. While addressing windshield washer fluid, also replace worn out windshield wiper blades with ones that can withstand snow and icy weather.

A new coating of wax can serve as a shield against road salt, snow, sleet, and rain. Try a polymer wax to protect the paint. Whenever possible, rinse off salt and grime so it does not dry on the car and gradually wear away at the paint. Some drivers mistakenly believe that salt stops being a problem once it dries simply because moisture is the active ingredient for a corrosive reaction. But humidity in the air is enough to keep the salt eating away at the car's paint, and that can contribute to rust. Be sure to rinse off the undercarriage of the vehicle as well.

Have your tires' alignment checked toward the end of winter or early spring. A season of traveling over pothole-ridden roads or hitting curbs buried under snow drifts can affect the alignment. Get everything back on track. Similarly, inspect tires routinely, as weather changes can affect tire pressure and strength.

Use a soft brush or a foam brush to clear snow off of the car. Avoid hard plastic scrapers you might use on your windshield, as they can scratch painted surfaces.

Try to park the vehicle in a garage or under a car port, each of which can protect cars and trucks from the often harsh elements of win-

ter.

Vehicles can be affected by the cold weather. Keep them running efficiently to prevent damage this winter.

FATAL RESIDENTIAL STRUCTURE FIRE IN PARKLAND COUNTY




