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NORTHERN GATEWAY TEACHERS AUTHORIZE STRIKE VOTE

Teachers employed by Northern Gateway School Division have voted 99 per cent in favour of authorizing the Alberta Teachers' Association to request a government-supervised strike vote.

The teachers have been

working for over two years without a finalized collective agreement. Northern Gateway is one of only seven school boards in the province that have not reached a local settlement for the 2018/19 and 2019/20 school years.

"Northern Gateway teachers are frustrated, and disappointed that they are

being treated without consideration, in light of everything they are being challenged with while teaching in the middle of a pandemic. While the teachers were trying to negotiate, the employer decided to stall the finalizing of a contract that expired two years ago.

"There is enough stress right now, and teachers do not need to deal with contract negotiations that could lead to job actions because the employer won't settle on standard working conditions." –Katrina Zack, President, ATA Northern Gateway Local No 43

At a general meeting held November 16, the teachers reviewed the last offer proposed by the division, which attempts to strip their collective agreement of a number of long-standing provisions that are standard parts of collective agreements elsewhere.

Zack says a work stoppage can be avoided if the board returns to bargaining and bargains constructively in an effort to reach a reasonable agreement in line with those already signed across the province.

"Our teachers just want to be treated similarly to the over 98 per cent of teachers who have settled their agreements. We are not making unreasonable demands; we just want to be treated fairly. We are prepared to negotiate if the board is willing to engage in meaningful discussions—a work stoppage is a last resort."—Katrina Zack, President, ATA Northern Gateway Local No 43

A government-appointed mediator concluded that the two sides were too far apart to reach a mediated settlement and chose to "write out" of the process on November 2. This left the parties free to reach an agreement on their own or, following a two-week cooling off period, to begin the process of moving toward a strike or lockout. Following

the November 16 authorization vote, Northern Gateway teachers can now apply to hold a government-supervised strike vote at any time. If a strike mandate is approved, teachers could legally strike after providing 48 hours' notice to the employer.

The Alberta Teachers' Association is the professional association of teachers in Alberta and acts as the bargaining agent for all teachers employed in public, separate and francophone school divisions. Based in Whitecourt, Northern Gateway School Division employs approximately 300 full- and part-time teachers in public schools serving the communities and surrounding areas of Alberta Beach, Onoway, Rich Valley, Darwell, Sangudo, Mayerthorpe, Whitecourt, Fox Creek and Valleyview.

Town of Mayerthorpe seeks a Public Works Supervisor who will report to the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO). This position will be responsible for providing leadership and direction to the Public Works Department. The successful candidate will be responsible for the efficient and effective customer service provided through operation of the public works and utilities functions. The Public Works Supervisor is responsible for planning, organizing, and directing all functions including the maintenance of streets, lanes, maintenance and operation of all water, wastewater, stormwater facilities, and management of operational and capital projects. This position requires teamwork and coordination between the Public Works Supervisor, Recreation Coordinator and Facilities Maintenance Personnel.

Duties and Responsibilities: Plan, organize, and promote a variety of programs that meet the needs of the community including: Roads, sidewalk and boulevard maintenance, signage, and snow removal. Planning and directing of a comprehensive maintenance program for: Streets, lanes, and related facilities. Snow removal and ice control operations. Potholes and asphalt maintenance. Sidewalk safety. Traffic, information, community, and direction signs, weed control, tree safety and trimming, outdoor monuments, fencing and access control barriers. Plan improvements to infrastructure and maintenance projects and coordinate the activities with those affected. Oversee and coordinate the activities of any contractors working for the Town or on Town property. Provide clear communication on upcoming maintenance activities and projects to the public, other agencies, and Town departments. Operation of the utilities operated by the Town including the water source system, water treatment facilities, sanitary sewer system, sewage treatment plant, lagoon, and storm water system. Provide safe operations that meet current industry standards and provincial or federal regulations, and specific licensing requirements. Plan and direct a comprehensive maintenance program for storm water, water and sewer utilities and related facilities. Ensure there is an acceptable operational and risk management plans outlining processes that covers the operation and delivery of utility services including: Water testing, system security and safety. Sewage treatment process plan. Storm water management extreme events plan. Establish and maintain an ongoing working relationship with representatives of Alberta Environment, other utility operators and regional municipalities. Manage all programs to ensure Health & Safety operations for staff, contractors, and the public. Meet all safety standards, fully participate in the safety program, ensure employees participate in the safety program. Manage the interface with Engineers and Consultants working on behalf of the Town. Explore new opportunities to coordinate public works programs with community organizations and to enhance programs through a strong connection to other municipalities in the region. Establish operational standards, assess infrastructure needs and provide a staffing process to meet the needs in an efficient manner. Ensure that all equipment is maintained in good working condition through Public Works staff, Parks & Recreation staff, or contracted services. This includes the seasonal equipment used by Parks & Recreation staff for green spaces and arena operations. Respond and document public enquiries and complaints in a timely & professional manner. Ensure that all processes and information are available on the Town's website wherever possible and that staff actively refer customers to the website. Supervise all fulltime, temporary, and casual staff in the public works area. Conduct vacant position reviews and hiring of all staff in the operations area in accordance with approved processes. Provide ongoing performance management including: establishing clear performance expectations, assessing performance with timely feedback to the staff member, regular reviews and recording of performance in the employee's personnel file, and follow-up to support the individual's strengths and areas that need focus. Plan staff development processes and ensure that all staff are supported in providing excellent service and are ready for future opportunities. FACE COVERINGS ARE NOW REQUIRED

in all Indoor, Enclosed Public Spaces and Public Vehicles in the Town of Whitecourt

NOVEMBER 17. 2020

The Town of Whitecourt has adopted Temporary Mandatory Face Coverings Bylaw 1560. Whitecourt is designated a "watch" zone by Alberta Health Services, and as such the bylaw is now in effect, and will remain active for a period of 30 days following the removal of the Provincial "watch" status. As per the bylaw, face coverings are now mandatory in all indoor, enclosed public spaces, as well as within public vehicles.

The practice of wearing a face covering or mask will complement other prevention and public health measures that the Town of Whitecourt has been promoting to the community, including: physical distancing, cohorting, good hand hygiene, staying home when sick, and increased cleaning of surfaces.

Per the Whitecourt Temporary Mandatory Face Coverings Bylaw, a "face covering" means a mask or other face covering that covers the mouth, nose and chin ensuring a barrier that limits the transmission of infectious respiratory droplets.

The following exceptions are identified in bylaw:

- Children that are 5 years old and younger;
- People unable to wear a face covering due to a mental or physical concern or limita-

tion, or protected ground under the Alberta Human Rights Act:

- People consuming food or drink in designated seating areas or as part of religious or spiritual ceremony;
- People engaged in water activities or physical exercise;
- People providing care or assistance to a person with a disability where a face covering would hinder that caregiving or assistance;
- People engaging in services that require the temporary removal of a face covering:
- Areas exclusively accessed or used by the Public Place's employees or a Public Vehicle operator, provided that physical barriers or physical

distancing practices are implemented between any person not required to wear a face covering by operation of this exception and any other person.

This bylaw does not apply to the following places: schools, post-secondary institutions, daycares and childcare centres governed by the Child Care Licensing Act, hospitals and health care facilities. For more information, please refer to Bylaw 1560.
