Emergency Medical Services attended the scene and provided first aid to a resident of the home, James

Kenneth Gantz (65); however, he succumbed to his injuries and died on scene.

The circumstances of James Gantz's death warranted Alberta RCMP Major Crimes taking over carriage of this investigation. On Dec. 18, 2020, Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit charged Clayton Jackie Desjarlais (34) of Sangudo with:

- Second degree murder
- Failure to comply with release conditions

Following a judicial interim release hearing, Desjarlais was remanded into custody to speak to bail and is scheduled to attend Mayerthorpe Provincial Court on January 14, 2021.

An autopsy is scheduled at the Edmonton Office of the Chief Medical Examiner the week of Dec. 21, 2020.



### MLA SHANE GETSON, LAC STE. ANNE-PARKLAND: 2020 YEAR IN REVIEW

At this time last year I was personally looking at 2020 as the year of clarity, where the work we had completed in 2019 would start to bear fruit. By all indicators in Q1, it indeed was trending that way for Q3. Then the black swans came to roost, oil price war, global economic downturn, and COVID 19. We as MLA's and our government needed to adapt, react, and overcome the new set of challenges facing us as Albertans, while not losing sight of the work required to meet the long term objectives regarding jobs and the economy. Below are a few of the highlights that I am proud to report were achieved in 2020, which will allow us to recover and make the gains we deserve as a Province in 2021.

We launched the 2020 legislative session with the Critical Infrastructure Defense Act to protect our roads, bridges and railways from illegal protestors who want to shut down our industry. I was able to table a private members motion (501) which urged the government to pursue trade transportation and energy corridors, providing Alberta much needed deep sea port access. I was able to assist in the drafting and approval of Bill 31, which in essence prevented a catastrophic blow to the sand and gravel industry, as well as preventing a setback of all construction in the province by 2 years due to lack of aggregate supply.

We finished the session after passing 50 pieces of legisla-

tion that will make life better for everyday Albertans, protect lives and livelihoods, and support Alberta's Recovery Plan – a bold, ambitious strategy to build, diversify and create tens-of-thousands of good jobs right now. The Alberta legislature was the busiest legislature in Canada this year, in fact for most of the year being the only legislature still functioning carrying out the work that people expected, and needed us to do.

While working to protect Albertans from COVID-19, we also worked hard to make life better for families and businesses. Among other important pieces of legislation, we passed the Protecting Survivors of Human Trafficking Act to fight the scourge of human trafficking and better protect and empower survivors. We made amendments to the Builders' Lien Act to ensure contractors and sub-contractors are being paid in a timely way. We made amendments to the Vital Statistics Act to ensure convicted sex offenders cannot change their names and hide in our communities. Unlike the loud opposition who represent a minority of Albertans that want to 'defund the police,' we undertook a review of the Police Act to ensure necessary reforms are made that build trust between citizens and law enforcement. We passed the Choice in Education Act, honoring our commitment to enshrine in legislation that

parents, not politicians, should have the right to choose the kind of education their children receive. And we passed the Financing Alberta's Strategic Transportation Act to provide creative ways to build new infrastructure projects faster while ensuring Albertans always have access to fee-free alternatives.

In addition to the busy legislative agenda, our UCP Caucus also worked hard to fight for a fair deal for Alberta. I was fortunate enough to attend three of these town halls, and to sit as a panel member on two of them, one of which was held out at our very own Villeneuve airport. The Fair Deal Panel submitted 25 recommendations to give Alberta a stronger position within the Canadian confederation. Alberta's government has already acted on many of these recommendations, including working to establish a Provincial Chief Firearms Officer and committing to holding a referendum on equalization in the fall of 2021.

We worked to protect the lives and livelihoods of Albertans by responding quickly to the COVID-19 pandemic and launching Alberta's Recovery Plan - an ambitious strategy to create jobs, build and diversify which includes the largest infrastructure investment in provincial history. We have continued to implement strong, evidence-based restrictions to protect our health care system and avoid shutting down Alberta's economy and harming the livelihoods of people across our province. While the recent news of a vaccine being approved in Canada has provided us with a light at the end of the tunnel, we are remaining vigilant to protect our friends, families and neighbors.

We also announced historic support for small businesses to help Alberta entrepreneurs cope with the challenges of the pandemic and the public health measures. We are tripling the second round of the Small and Medium Enterprise

Relaunch Grant from \$5,000 to \$15,000. This means many Alberta businesses will be eligible for \$20,000 of support, between the first and second rounds of the benefit. This funding will help support job creators and ensure our Province can come out of the pandemic stronger than before.


I was named to lead a task force focusing on the energy corridors in our province, across the country, and obtain international access inclusive of our rail network in the Province. I was named to the Skilled Trades Task Force and that team produced a report that is under review and consideration that will form policy going forward. I was also named to the Firearms Task Force to consult with all Albertans, and make recommendations on how to support the rights and freedoms of Albertans regarding the responsible ownership and use of firearms in the Province.

We managed to secure the funding for the highway 60 overpass and expansion in Acheson, a much-needed piece of infrastructure for the region, which will enhance safety and facilitate growth of the regional economy. The WILD Water project received additional funding and approvals to provide fresh drinking water to many constituents, as well as a new water line into the Villeneuve airport which will mitigate impediments that have stalled the growth for years. The new Camilla school construction is well under way, and as is the new gymnasium at Rich Valley School.

2020 certainly wasn't the year any of us expected, but your UCP MLAs have been working hard to serve you, in our area, and throughout the Province. As we approach the Christmas season, please take some time to reflect on the positive moments from this year, and begin to look forward to life after Covid, 2021 will be a great year for all of us.

### A TIMELY CANCER DIAGNOSIS MATTERS, COVID-19 PANDEMIC OR NOT

We are currently trying to do the right thing - wearing masks, keeping our distance, and staying home more than we ever thought possible. Dr. Deena Hinshaw's messages remind us to be careful and cautious in our daily activities. For some people this means working from home, avoiding recreational activities, or seeing fewer family and friends. For some people it also means delaying a visit to see a doctor, and this can be a potential problem if serious health concerns then go unchecked.

Cancer is the leading cause of death in Alberta. Prior to the pandemic, approximately 2000 Albertans were diagnosed with cancer every month, and approximately 600 died from cancer every month. We know that early cancer diagnosis results in less advanced disease, more effective treatment options, better survival and quality of life outcomes. However, diagnosing cancer early is a complex process that requires a person to notice a change in their body that is persistent or worsening and seek medical attention. It also requires an assessment by their family doctor or another physician in order to investigate any worrisome signs or symptoms with a series of tests. Multiple interactions between patients and different healthcare providers are often needed to get a cancer diagnosis. Sometimes this happens quickly, but it can also take significant time. The sooner this process starts, the better.

No symptoms are specific for cancer, but it is important to see your doctor so they can investigate worrisome new, persistent symptoms such as: an unusual or growing lump; significant blood in stool, urine, or phlegm; growth or darkening of a mole; trouble urinating for men; or unexplained significant weight loss. A more complete and detailed list of potential warning symptoms can be found on the MyHealth link: https://myhealth.alberta.ca/Alberta/Pages/Symptoms-of-cancer.aspx.

Diagnosing cancer later at more advanced stages results in shorter survival, reduced quality of life, and more hospitalizations. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, delays in cancer diagnosis and inadequate supports for patients and family physicians were issues facing Albertans and healthcare providers. The Cancer Strategic Clinical Net-

work™ of Alberta Health Services (AHS) has initiated work on the creation of a comprehensive provincial cancer diagnosis program, and will soon add diagnosis programs for lymphoma and colorectal cancer to build on those created for lung and breast cancer.

The pandemic has made these gaps in cancer diagnosis worse and has resulted in a decrease by more than 30% during the first wave in the spring with some recovery through the summer and early fall. We are seeing a reversal of that recovery through wave 2 and cancer diagnosis is declining again. We find this concerning. Similar decreases in cancer diagnosis have been reported globally, including the USA, Europe, and Australia. The pandemic has not made cancer go away, but may worsen cancer outcomes.

This spring, Alberta implemented several measures to protect the public, and divert health care resources to COVID-19. This meant many people stopped seeing their family doctor for routine visits or opted to have their visit over the phone. My colleagues are meeting newly diagnosed cancer patients who first noticed symptoms or lumps in April, but did not book an ap-

pointment to see their family doctor until later in the summer because they were worried about catching COVID-19 or bothering their doctor with a non-COVID-19 issue, or thought their doctor was not seeing patients in-person. The public needs to be assured that physician offices and testing facilities are safe places to visit because of strict COVID-19 precautions such as masking, extra cleaning, distancing, and prescreening protocols. Testing potential COVID-19 cases occurs at other specific locations.

The fact is that cancer has not gone away. Without exception, we all need to follow recommendations to safely manage and control the pandemic. However, an important part of taking care of your health during the pandemic is also seeing your doctor and going for tests when needed. As clinicians, we will always be here to help you with serious medical concerns.


