Libraries Open For Curbside Pickup And Remote Service

All three branches of the Yellowhead County Libraries system have remained open for curbside pickup and remote service during the latest round of provincewide restrictions put in place to limit the spread of COVID-19. Library users can request items through the online cata-(https://catalogue. tracpac.ab.ca), by phoning the library or by sending an email. Those items are then

safely shipped to the library and processed by staff following all safety protocols. Once the requested items are ready to be picked up, patrons are notified and can collect their items in front of the library.

"We aren't able to safely host patrons inside our libraries right now, but with many people spending more time at home and looking for free entertainment options, we're grateful we can still put library items in the hands of library users" McClure states. "We're also very happy we can still connect with our patrons virtually".

Free public wi-fi is available outside each library branch. Residents are encouraged to drive to the libraries or dress warmly to sit outside and use the internet. A library card is not required to access the wi-fi. Library programs are also continuing via social media and other digital platforms. Curbside pickup and reference services are offered at each branch during the times listed below.

Residents interested in learning more are encouraged to phone or email their local branch, visit the website or check social media. The libraries will remain closed for in-person patronage until provincial health restrictions are lifted.

"It's a tough time for everyone," McClure concludes. "The underpinning philosophy of the public library is that by providing citizens with access to information, life enriching works and avenues to connect with others, the fabric of society is strengthened. Hopefully, it's that same strength that will see us through the pandemic and beyond".

Our Canadian parliamentary system of democracy is the result of a series of long struggles between ideas, powerful kings, the people and the exercise of political power. Through it all we have evolved a system of government that pursues ordered liberty. These two words would appear to be in opposition and yet the balanced combination of these two critical democratic values are foundational to protecting our way of life and will help us to live peacefully together. Unrestricted liberty results in societal anarchy only when individual freedom is bound by reasonable restrictions will all individuals in the wider society have true freedom. Ordered liberty is articulated in the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms when it says,

The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guarantees the rights and freedoms set out in it subject only to such reasonable limits prescribed by law as can be demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society.

Freedom is the foundational value in a democracy and in our Charter of Rights. Placing restrictions on our democratic freedoms should never be done lightly, yet it is sometimes necessary. When our freedoms are restricted those restrictions must meet the standard of reasonableness for a free and democratic society.

Recently, some constituents exercised their rights as engaged citizens and taped a series of posters of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and a series of messages all over the front of the Drayton Valley-Devon Office in Drayton Valley, the Town Hall of Drayton Valley, and the Brazeau County offices. They believe that the recent pandemic restrictions placed on Albertans and their businesses are an unreasonable restriction of their Charter Rights and they exercised their right of **ORDERED LIBERTY** free speech to send their mes- I supported the latest rour

sage to me, their MLA. So this begs the question, is

the government acting unreasonably when it places Covid restrictions upon Albertans?

During this Covid pandemic the Alberta government has argued that it has a duty to protect both the lives and the livelihoods of Albertans. For me, the ordering of these two duties is important to recognize for it speaks to a hierarchy and to when a government can reasonably place restrictions on people. The primary reason I supported the latest round of temporary restrictions was to protect life, by temporarily placing restrictions on Albertans being able to congregate. It was regrettable that we had to temporarily enact these restrictions but it was, in my view, reasonable because we had to protect the lives of all Albertans by safeguarding their access to emergency care.

Are Albertans split on this issue? Absolutely, in this constituency I have had conversations and correspondence that represents all positions on this issue. For those Albertans who disagree with the Covid restrictions you are right to be concerned any time government unreasonably restricts democratic freedoms. Are these temporary restrictions unreasonable or do they meet the standard of reasonableness? I believe they are reasonable but I will also support your right to disagree with that conclusion. Good people can disagree but that disagreement needs to remain within the boundaries of the law and maintain our ordered liberty.



District Priority 1: Student Learning

Board Chair Rosadiuk offered encouragement to high school students who are writing their final exams and submitting final projects this month as the first semester, or second quarter comes to an end. Diploma exams are optional for students in 30 level courses for the remainder of the 2020-2021 school year.

The Board enjoyed a presentation describing the vision and plan of Hinton parents at École Mountain View for the creation of an outdoor classroom. Once completed the outdoor classroom space will serve to integrate nature and curriculum.

Superintendent Lewis acknowledged the welcome news for many families to return to in-school learning on January 11, 2021, announced by Minister LaGrange, noting the research

around social-emotional benefits for students to be with their peers and teachers in person.

GYPSD is excited to promote innovative learning opportunities for students and families including the new Christian Learning pilot, the Learn-at-Home option, and becoming an official Home Education provider within the province.



As you may know, on June 1, 2020, the Government of Alberta rescinded the 1976 Coal Policy. The old policy had become outdated and new environmental policies and land use planning have taken its place to better protect our air, water, land and wild species. Stronger regulation and modern protections include the Environmental Enhancement Act, the Eastern Slopes Policy, Integrated Resource Plans, regional plans and sub-regional plans.

While there are many important discussions to be had on coal and the future of the industry in our province, it is critical that we have factual debates in order to get the best possible outcomes for Albertans. For instance, Alberta isn't just on pace to phase out emissions from coal used for heating purposes by 2030, we are ahead of schedule. While there is movement away from coal used for heating purposes it is a fact that the world relies heavily on metallurgical coal as a primary component in the production of steel, which is used to build everything from buildings to bridges. Alberta has significant coal resources that provide thousands of jobs in several communities across Alberta.

Recently in the news some would have you believe lands that used to be protected are now open to development, when in fact coal development continues to be restricted in former Category 1 public lands, many of which are automatically protected because they are national parks, provincial parks or other protected areas.

Some people think that recent coal policy changes means an end to restrictions on Category 2 and 3 lands, when in fact responsible coal development was always permitted on these lands, subject to environmental considerations. The Alberta Energy Regulator is a world-class organization, and will continue to work tirelessly to ensure our air, water (including our headwaters) land and wild species are protected from harm. Responsible coal development will not change our mountain landscapes as companies must adhere to strict rules around land reclamation and environmental effects; and the Piikani nation, whose people have been stewarding the eastern slopes for a millenia, recently offered their full endorsement for the Grassy Mountain Coal project, which has been under review since 2015. We know this is an important issue to Albertans. To ensure Albertans are heard, Alberta's government has cancelled 11 leases issued in December 2020. I strongly encourage you to visit CoalHardFacts.ca to find out the facts on coal, share your thoughts and concerns, and learn more about coal and its role in our province


