MP SOROKA QUESTIONS THE MINISTER ON HIGH SPEED INTERNET

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, rose in the House of Commons to question the Minister on holding providers accountable in ensuring spectrum deployment in rural communities.

riding is offered to constituents at speeds of zero megabytes and up. However, with access to more spectrum, they could receive 50 megabytes download and 10 megabytes upload.

On January 21, 2021, a Whitecourt residence was searched to conclude a short-term drug trafficking investigation between Whitecourt RCMP and ALERT Grande Prairie's organized crime and gang team.

Inside the residence, police located approximately \$28,000 worth of drugs and cash, including:

- · A shotgun;
- 179 grams of methamphetamine;
- 43 grams of cocaine;
- \$13,610 cash.

"Harmful drugs, such as methamphetamine, bring an assortment of negative consequences to our community. Whitecourt RCMP is grateful to partner with ALERT and get these drugs off the street," said Sergeant Ted Zadderey, Whitecourt

RCMP Operations NCOi/c.

"ALERT was able to successfully leverage intelligence developed by the Detachment. The arrest highlights a successful partnership and ALERT's ability to enhance capacity across the province," said Inspector Sean Boser, ALERT Regional teams.

TO FENCE OR NOT TO FENCE?

Submitted by ALUS

This county is eco-rich with wildlife moving across our landscape. Animals don't care where roads, bridges, culverts, fences, and property lines are and often get in the way. We have a love-hate relationship with appreciating nature; we love the beautiful plants and animals out there but are also wary of the hazards they can cause. As an agricultural producer, what can you do? You can put up wildlife friendly fencing! This can include temporary electric (that can be pulled when not in use) or lowering the top wire on the traditional four strand fence to less than 40 inches from the ground. Smooth wire can also be substituted for barbed on the top and bottom strands and have the bottom wire at least 18 inches from the ground. Do what works best on your farm, and if you are looking to fence off a wetland or forest, reach out to the Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) Coordinator.

The ALUS program works with farmers to complete environmentally sustainable projects on private land and compensates farmers for land they are no longer farming or are unable to farm effectively. We cost-share fences, watering systems, nest boxes, and some tree and shrub planting to protect wetlands, old growth forests, and sensitive areas. Farmers are paid to grow clean air, clean water, and wildlife habitat with no change in land title. Perimeter fences and cross fencing is not covered as a part of this program.

The LSAC ALUS program runs on a Provincial grant from the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program and this is the last year for funding under this grant. When the government is auctioning spectrum, what is it doing to hold providers accountable to ensure they deploy spectrum in rural communities?"

Hon. Maryam Monsef (Minister for Women and Gender Equality and Rural Economic Development, Lib.) replied: "Mr. Speaker, I thank my colleague for his important advocacy both with spectrum auctions and subsidies for those communities where the business case to connect households to high-speed Internet sim-

ply is not there.

Our government is there. Spectrum auctions include a carve-out for smaller rural communities. We have worked diligently to ensure smaller Internet service providers receive at least a third of our investment, the other third has gone to in-

digenous communities and that last third goes to larger ISPs.

DOS AND DON'TS OF CARING FOR WEDDING AND ENGAGEMENT RINGS

Jewelry is a key component of weddings. The financial resource CreditDonkey notes that, in the United States, the average amount spent on an engagement ring is \$5,500, while Canadians spend an average of \$3,500. Jewelry costs can add up, especially when adding in the cost of wedding bands, which can cost as much as \$1,000. The cost of jewelry only underscores the importance of learning how to care for it and preserve its value.

The best way to maintain jewelry depends on the makeup of the rings. The online jewelry guide Jewelry Notes says gold rings without gemstones can be cleaned effectively with only soap and water. Simply prepare a solution of lukewarm water and mild dish soap in a small bowl.

Soak the rings for 20 to 30 minutes. Use a soft brush or cloth to clean the jewelry of dirt. Rinse the residue under clean water.

Rings with diamonds can be treated similarly with a mild soap-and-water solution. The Diamond Information Center also says to soak the diamond ring in equal parts cold water and ammonia for half an hour and let it air dry. Brand name jewelry cleaner also is another good option. This method only should be used with diamonds; ammonia can't be used with other gemstones.

Maintaining jewelry also should include twice yearly visits to a jeweler who can check the prongs and make sure the setting is not loose; otherwise, the diamond can become dislodged, according to Martha Stewart


Weddinas.

Avoid touching diamonds and other gemstones as much as possible when putting rings on and taking them off. Precious stones often are magnets for dust, dirt and body oil, according to Taylor Lanore, diamond consultant and engagement ring designer for Lauren B. Fine Jewelry and Diamonds. Grab the ring by the band.

Use discretion when wearing rings while engaging in hands-on activities. Activities like cleaning dishes, moving furniture, gardening, or diving through waves at the beach warrant caution; otherwise, you risk damaging or making jewelry unnecessarily dirty. Store the ring in a safe location until you can safely wear it again.

One of the most important steps to safeguard wedding and engagement rings is to insure the jewelry. The description of the ring, its cut, carat weight, metal, and other information offered through a certified independent jewelry appraisal will be needed to insure the ring. Take a close-up photo of the jewelry as well. Other items like laser inscription or a home security system can qualify jewelry owners for discounts on insurance. Consumers also can add a jewelry rider to a homeowner's or renter's insurance policy.

These are some ways to care for wedding jewelry. Always consult with a jeweler before attempting to clean items made of various materials.

QUESTIONS TO ASK BEFORE BOOKING A PHOTOGRAPHER

Various components combine to make weddings beautiful and memorable. Couples rely on photographers to capture the smiles and moments that helped make their events unique and to ensure the big day is remembered for years to come.

The trusted wedding resource The Knot notes that an internal study found that, among 27,000 couples who got married in 2019, an average of \$2,400 was spent on a wedding photographer to document their big day.

Couples who want to find the best photographer for their wedding day can ask several questions before making their final decision.

Will photos be color balanced and retouched? Skilled photographers are capable of capturing winning photos. But photos can be enhanced further in the studio with retouching software to bring out specific effects. Some photographers will polish all proofs, while others only will work on the images ultimately ordered. Confirm retouching details before signing the contract.

What's included in the photo packages? A detailed price list helps you compare one photographer to another and decide which elements are covered. Additional

prints, having a photographer's assistant, ordering albums for the parents, or ordering a large framed print can alter costs significantly. Explore all prices to ensure you're getting the best value. In addition, consider how many hours of event coverage are included in the price.

What is the payment timeline? Photographers may accept deposits for their services but expect a different timeline of payment. Some may require payment in full before the wedding, while others may offer a payment plan that includes a final payment when picking up proofs or albums.

Wedding photography is one of the essential elements of a wedding and helps tell the story of couples' special day. Asking key questions can help couples find a photographer who will produce the desired results.



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
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
