GOVERNMENT OF CANADA ADDRESSES CERB REPAYMENTS FOR SELF-EMPLOYED INDIVIDUALS AND ANNOUNCES INTEREST RELIEF ON 2020 INCOME TAX DEBT DUE TO COVID-19 RELATED INCOME SUPPORT

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Government of Canada has provided urgently-needed income support to millions of Canadians, which has helped

them put food on the table and keep a roof over their heads during this crisis. The federal government is committed to continuing to support Canadians throughout this crisis.

On Feb. 9, 2021 the Government of Canada announced that self-employed individu-

als who applied for the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) and would have qualified based on their gross income will not be required to repay the benefit, provided they also met all other eligibility requirements.

RURAL DUGOUTS FOR RURAL PROPERTIES

Submitted by Lorraine Horticulturist/ Taylor, **Conservation Coordinator** | Lac Ste. Anne County

Over the last 100 years more than 250,000 dugouts have been constructed on rural properties across the prairies. Four counties are partnering to host a twopart Zoom webinar with information about ways to care for these important sources of water on farms and other rural properties.

During his presentation, Shawn Elgert, Agricultural Water Engineer with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry, will cover a wide range of topics including planning considerations, design, construction, operation and protection, water quality issues and treatment solutions, and dugouts for

stocking fish. The sessions also include time for questions.

These water reservoirs serve many uses: for livestock watering, outdoor and greenhouse irrigation, recreation, and a source of water for pesticide application and fire fighting. Elgert says dugouts are miniature ecosystems and require proper design and maintenance to provide suitable water quality and quantity for the intended uses. Because runoff surface water is usually the source of water for dugoutss, the water quality can be poor. However, dugout water quality can be managed, improved, and treated to meet most farm needs. Good dugout management starts with the dugout watershed and extends right through to the final use. As

dugouts age they fill with sediment and their water storage capacity becomes smaller. The life span of a dugout can be extended significantly through effective management.

The webinar series runs Wednesdays on February 10 and 17, 2021 from 7:00 -8:30 p.m. Admission is free. To receive the Zoom link for the webinar please register before 4:30 p.m. February 10. 

Government of Canada Addresses CERB Repayments for Self-Employed Individuals and Announces Interest Relief on 2020 Income Tax Debt Due to COVID-19 Related Income Support

The same approach will apply whether the individual applied through the Canada Revenue Agency or Service Canada.

This means that, self-employed individuals whose net self-employment income was less than \$5,000 and who applied for the CERB will not be required to repay the CERB, as long as their gross self-employment income was at least \$5,000 and they met all other eligibility criteria.

Some self-employed individuals whose net self-employment income was less than \$5,000 may have already voluntarily repaid the CERB. The CRA and Service Canada will return any repaid amounts to these individuals. Additional details will be available in the coming weeks.

In addition, today, the Honourable Diane Lebouthillier, Minister of National Revenue. announced that the Government of Canada will provide targeted interest relief to Canadians who received COVID-related income support benefits. Once individuals have filed their 2020 income tax and benefit return. they will not be required to pay interest on any outstanding income tax debt for the 2020 tax year until April 30, 2022. This will give Canadians more time and flexibility to pay if they have an amount owing.

To qualify for targeted interest relief, individuals must have had a total taxable income of \$75,000 or less in 2020 and have received income support in 2020 through one or more of the following COVID-19 measures:

- the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB);
- the Canada Emergency Student Benefit (CESB);
- the Canada Recovery Benefit (CRB);
- the Canada Recovery Caregiving Benefit (CRCB);
- the Canada Recovery Sickness Benefit (CRSB);
- Employment Insurance benefits; or
- similar provincial emergency benefits.

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) will automatically apply the interest relief measure for individuals who meet these criteria.

Additionally, any CRA-administered credits and benefits normally paid monthly or quarterly, such as the Canada Child Benefit and the goods and services tax/harmonized sales tax credit will not be applied to reduce individuals' tax debt owing for the 2020 tax year. Canadians are strongly encouraged to file their tax returns by the filing deadline to ensure that their benefit payments continue without interruption.

The Government of Canada recognizes that many Canadians continue to face serious financial impacts as a result of the ongoing pandemic. The interest relief measure announced today will provide an estimated 4.5 million low- and middle-income Canadians with the flexibility required to feel confident about accessing the COVID-19 income support without facing additional stress at tax time.

Quick Facts

- All individuals are encouraged to file their income tax returns.
- Any amounts owing are determined based on an individual's personal circumstances and the credits and benefits they may receive.
- Like Employment Insurance (EI) benefits, the COVID-19 emergency and recovery benefits, including similar provincial benefits, are taxable. Although 10% of the benefit amount for the three Canada Recovery Benefits (CRB, CRCB, and CRSB) is withheld at source, many other emergency benefits, including the CERB and the CESB did not withhold tax at source. Today's announcement will give those Canadians who owe any taxes as a result of accessing these benefits more time and flexibility to pay those amounts.
- The CRA has not extended the tax filing deadline. Canadians should complete and submit their tax returns by April 30, 2021, the filing due date for most individuals. Canadians are strongly encouraged to file their tax returns to ensure that their benefit payments continue uninterrupted.

WHITECOURT SHIFTS 2021 BUDGET INPUT ONLINE

Whitecourt is moving its annual budget input initiative online, and invites community members to share their thoughts on the 2021 budget throughout the month of February.

With current public health Whitecourt restrictions, Town Council is unable to host its annual budget information open house. The 2021 Interim Budget Report and a gallery of budget infographics are available online at www.whitecourt.ca/Government to provide community members with information on Council's priorities and plans for 2021. Members of the public are asked to review the information, and forward questions and comments to administration@whitecourt. ca by Friday, February 26.

"Developing a budget, especially one for a municipality with such diverse needs, is an involved process," stated Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak. "It's unfortunate that we can't host the open house as it offered a great opportunity for Council to share priorities and plans, and have one on one discussions and meaningful interactions with community members. I feel that under current circumstances, this option will give the public the information they need in order to provide feedback to Council prior to final budget deliberations."

The interim budget was passed in late December 2020, and the comments received from community members throughout the month of February will be reviewed and considered by Council during development of the final budget. The final budget is scheduled to be approved in April, once the Provincial budget has been announced and final assessment figures have been established.

CHARGES LAID AGAINST GRACE LIFE CHURCH

On February 8, the RCMP swore a charge against James Coates, the Pastor of the Grace Life Church, in contravention of Section 73(1) of the Public Health Act, for being over capacity and failing to adhere to physical distancing requirements. Coates has been served an Undertaking with conditions and is to attend in Provincial Court in Stony Plain on March 31, 2021.

The RCMP can confirm that in December a violation ticket was issued to the Pastor, and on Feb. 7 the Pastor was arrested and released with a court appearance date.

Since early December the RCMP have been working with AHS in an ongoing investigation into the activities surrounding the non compliance of the church, AHS has maintained a position of being the lead investigating

agency. On Feb. 7, the RCMP, along with the Public Health Inspector with AHS, attended the church and determined that the facility was over double the current restricted capacity level. As a matter of respect, the church proceedings were not interrupted by the RCMP, and Coates was cooperative with the RCMP following the end of the service.

"There are many different discussions and considerations at play in relation to the

Grace Life Church and their non compliance" says Inspector Mike Lokken, Detachment Commander of Parkland RCMP. "We have ensured that the church is well aware of the conditions that they need to follow and they have been afforded repeated opportunities to comply. In collaboration with AHS, we have now followed up with escalated enforcement."

HOW TO AVOID WEDDING RECEPTION SEATING MISTAKES

Weddings are great opportunities for people to gather and celebrate the melding of two families into one. to create new friendships. If it's meant to be, they'll connect in a more organic way.


Mistake #4: The dreaded kids' table. Young children can probably get away with sitting at a dedicated kids' table, although it may mean their parents have to interrupt their experiences by checking on their kids throughout the night. A bigger faux pas is to sit teenagers or twentysomethings at the kids table even if they seem like youngsters to you. Set a strict cut-off age for a children's table.

Mistake #5: Being too strict in seating. It's one thing to direct couples or singletons to specific tables, quite another to assign specific seats. Do not dictate exactly where at the table a guest should sit. Some people arrive early, others late, and it is up to them to work out how to arrange

themselves at the table.

EXPANDING COVID SUPPORTS FOR ALL ALBERTANS

Prior to this expansion, only Albertans in Edmonton and Calgary were eligible for the \$625 payment when they completed self-isolating in their assigned hotel.

Now, Albertans across the province – including First Nations individuals living both on and off reserve and people living on Metis Settlements who cannot isolate safely in their own home – are eligible.

Upon referral by Alberta Health Services, Albertans who must isolate or quarantine and cannot do so safely at home are eligible for a free-of-charge hotel room stay of up to 14 days, complete with culturally appropriate food and other supports.

COVID Care Teams will continue to provide on-the-ground supports and interventions to limit the spread of the virus. Supports include care packages with masks, sanitizers and information translated in multiple languages. Safe transportation to COVID-19 assessment and testing facilities is also available.

"Expanding the isolation supports to include people on First Nations and Metis Settlements is the right thing to do. Everyone should have the chance to isolate safely while having the financial support to cover expenses while they recover." - Rick Wilson, Minister of Indigenous Relations

• The COVID Care Team program launched in December 2020 as an integrated way to reach communities with

particularly high levels of COVID-19 spread.

- The Government of Alberta also developed an outreach campaign to communicate important public health information directly to Albertans who may have English language barriers through expanded access to translated materials and other supports.
- Messages are being delivered in 10 languages through radio, television and print advertising, as well as through various social media channels and web platforms.
- Since the launch of the COVID Care Teams and outreach campaign on Dec. 15, more than 850 Albertans have accessed hotel accommodations for self-isolation purposes.

MORE HEALTH MEASURES STARTED TO EASE ON FEB. 8

Step 1 of Alberta's four-step framework to ease restrictions is based on a COVID-19 hospitalization benchmark of 600, including intensive care patients. This benchmark was reached on Jan. 28.

though restrictions will remain in place, the path forward gives us all more options in our daily lives." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

Indoor and outdoor children's sport and performance

- Children's sport and performance activities are permitted if they are related to school activities, such as physical education classes.
- This will allow K-12 schools and post-secondary institutions to use off-site facilities to support curriculum-related educational activities.

Indoor fitness

- Only one-on-one training is permitted for indoor fitness activities (e.g. fitness in dance studios, training figure skating on ice, one-on-one lessons).
- One-on-one sessions cannot interact with others and there must be a minimum of three metres distance between sessions in the same facility.
- Sessions have to be scheduled or by appointment.
- · No drop-in for individuals

or groups is allowed.

- No sports games, competitions, team practice, league play or group exercise of any kind.
- Trainers must be professional, certified and/or paid trainers who are providing active instruction and correction. Passive supervision of a physical activity is not considered training.
- Trainers should remain masked during the session; clients are not required to wear a mask while exercising.
- More than one trainer and client 'pair' are allowed into the facility, studio, rink, court, pool, ice surface, etc., as long as:
- Each trainer and client stays three metres away from all other trainers and clients at all times, including in entryways and exits.
- Each trainer only interacts with their assigned client, and each client only interacts with their assigned trainer.
 - No interaction between cli-

ents or between trainers is allowed.

- No 'cycling through' multiple trainers, as in circuit training.

Restaurants, cafes and pubs

- Restaurants, cafes and pubs must collect the contact information of one person from the dining party.
- Up to a maximum of six people per table; individuals must be from same household or the two close contacts for people living alone.
- Liquor service ends at 10
- In-person dining must close by 11 p.m.
- No entertainment allowed (e.g., no VLTs, pool tables, live music, etc.)






