CHARGES LAID AGAINST GRACELIFE CHURCH

On February 8, 2021, the RCMP swore a charge against James Coates, the Pastor of the GraceLife Church, in contravention of Section 73(1) of the Public Health Act, for being over capacity and failing to adhere to physical distancing requirements. Coates has been served an Undertaking with conditions and is to attend in Provincial Court in Stony Plain on March 31, 2021.

The RCMP can confirm that in December a violation ticket was issued to the Pastor, and on Feb. 7 the Pastor was arrested and released with a court appearance date.

Since early December the RCMP have been working with AHS in an ongoing investigation into the activities surrounding the non compliance of the church. AHS has maintained a position of being the lead investigating agency. On Feb. 7, the RCMP, along with the Public Health Inspector with AHS, attended the church and determined that the facility was over double the current restricted capacity level. As a matter of respect, the church proceedings were not interrupted by the RCMP, and

Coates was cooperative with the RCMP following the end of the service.

"There are many different discussions and considerations at play in relation to the GraceLife Church and their non compliance" says Inspector Mike Lokken, Detachment Commander of Parkland RCMP. "We have ensured that the church is well aware of the conditions that they need to follow and they have been afforded repeated opportunities to comply. In collaboration with AHS, we have now followed up with escalated enforcement."

On Sunday, Feb. 14, 2021 the RCMP, with AHS, attended the GraceLife Church to assess compliance in relation to conditions issued to the Pastor on Feb. 7. Observations were made that James Coates was not complying with his Undertaking release conditions, and the church was not in compliance with the Public Health Order.

"To be very clear, the RCMP's objective is not to interrupt church services, prohibit services, nor deny peoples' right to practice their religion - merely to ensure that public health restrictions are adhered to while doing so" says Inspector Mike Lokken, Detachment Commander of Parkland RCMP.

On Feb. 16, James Coates turned himself in to the Parkland Detachment. He was charged in contravention of the Public Health Act (x2), and charged for failing to comply with a condition of his Un-

dertaking, under the Criminal Code. Following a bail hearing before a Justice of the Peace, Coates was to be released on conditions. He remained in custody overnight after refusing to agree to those conditions. This morning in Stony Plain Provincial Court he continued to refuse to agree with those conditions and a Judge's Order was issued compelling him to attend court on Wednesday, Feb. 24, 2021.

"We've been consistent in our approach of escalated levels of enforcement with Pastor Coates, and we were hopeful to resolve this issue in a different manner" said Inspector Mike Lokken. "The Pastor's actions, and the subsequent effects those actions could have on the health and safety of citizens, dictated our response in this situation."

Statement from Inspector Mike Lokken, Detachment Commander of Parkland RCMP Detachment:

"It has come to Parkland RC-

MP's attention within the last week that a member of the GraceLife Church Administration has identified himself as a former RCMP officer. We can confirm that Paul Claassen is a retired RCMP member as of October 2014.

Our response to the non compliance of the Church has been consistent with our overall RCMP strategy in the Province which is; education, an opportunity for compliance, and lastly, enforcement. Parkland RCMP has managed the investigation into the GraceLife Church with absolutely no influence from any member of their administration or congregation, regardless of any past or present affiliation with our organization.

The RCMP has conducted all their interactions with the Church in an impartial, professional, and respectful manner."

On Feb 21, Parkland RCMP and Alberta Health Services continued their investigation into the GraceLife Church as a

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NO SPRAY PROGRAM YEARLY RENEWA

Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires landowners who do not want herbicide applied adjacent to their property to enter into an agreement with the county prior to April 1st of each year. The landowner becomes responsible for weed and brush control in the designated areas, as defined by the no spray agreement.

If you cannot meet this deadline, please call our Agricultural Services Department at 780-325-3782 or 1-800-814-3935.

- Once an agreement has been completed **no spray signs must be purchased** at a cost of \$5.00 for two signs, at the Yellowhead County Edson or Wildwood Offices. These signs must be placed by the landowner in a highly visible area as close as possible to the property line.
- Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires each landowner who has signed the agreement to fulfill their obligations before the July 1st deadline. After the July 1st deadline, Yellowhead County re-assumes responsibility for weed and brush control and may apply herbicide adjacent to non-compliant roadsides if necessary.
- If you chose not to renew your agreement for 2021, we ask that you please remove your signs prior to the start of the spray season starting May 1st, 2021.

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

Sometimes Government is at its best when it thinks outside the box and provides targeted funding to help the citizens it represents. Recently the Alberta Government made a one-time investment of \$714.000 over two years to fund a veteran-friendly campus pilot program at the University of Alberta. I believe that this targeted funding to help our veterans is going to be money well spent. Alberta is leading the way by supporting one of the first veteran-friendly campus models in the country. This investcomplements ment strengthens other post-secondary supports, helping more veterans access the education they need to transition from military service to a civilian career.

The University of Alberta is currently exploring the needs of veteran students and their families in consultation with veterans, active service members, Veteran Affairs Canada, the Canadian Armed Forces, the Royal Canadian Legion, post-secondary institutions and researchers. This review will help inform the veteran-friendly campus model, and students who are veteran can expect to access supports and resources in the 2021-22 academic year. The program is presently under development, but we encourage students to reach out to the university with questions through the U of A student connect website, or by emailing the Dean of Students office at dosdean@ ualberta.ca.

Students of history will remember that as WW II ended our veterans came home and were able to receive Government funding to go to a post-secondary institution to receive the training they needed to transition into a successful peace time career.

This program, in some ways, is an echo of that WWII program as it is designed to help veterans have a successful post-secondary experience. Post-secondary education is key to helping those who risked their lives to defend our country find success in other professions once their service has ended. Many of our veterans have unique needs to support their learning. The pilot veteran-friendly campus initiative at the University of Alberta provides specialized support to

help veterans achieve their educational goals. The pilot initiative will support one of the first veteran campus models in Canada, with the other based in the University of British Columbia.

Healthy campuses benefit us all, and veterans have transferable knowledge, skills and experiences that enrich the campus community for all students, staff and faculty.

This investment will provide a sustainable model that institutions from across

Alberta can replicate, enabling veterans to access supportive campuses close to home. This program will also leverage best practices to provide world-class integrated support and services for veterans, helping Alberta to attract top students from across the country. Lastly, I believe that this is a good use of tax payers dollars promoting a veteran friendly campus seems to me to be a start in saying thank you to those who have served us so well.
