COVID-19 UPDATE FOR WHITECOURT

Submitted by Town of Whitecourt

MARCH 11, 2021

As announced by the Government of Alberta on March 8, 2021, further restrictions were eased as part of the Province's COVID-19 Path Forward. Changes to restrictions involved retail, hotels, community halls, performance and recreation, and youth sports:

• Retail can open to 25% of fire code capacity (not including staff).

· Banquet halls, community halls, conference centres and hotels can reopen for meetings, events, and ceremonies to a maximum of 10 people; maximum of 20 people for funeral services.

· Adult performance activities for individual or group rehearsals and performances are permitted for up to 10 people, and varsity and post-secondary sports are now permitted to train; no in-person audience.

· Children and youth performance activities and sports are permitted to a maximum of 10 people (including trainers, coaches and participants); no games permitted or in-person audiences.

He said:

"Madam Speaker, the government has completely bungled its quarantine hotel scheme. Conservatives have been calling for a post-arrival testing regime since the beginning. The Calgary International Airport pilot project showed that this could be done successfully. I recently met with travel agents to discuss the impacts of COVID on the sector and its path to recovery.

When will the government abandon its failed hotel quarantine debacle and instead implement post-arrival testing?"

Reply:

Mr. Darren Fisher (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Health, Lib.):

"Madam Speaker, Canada has some of the strictest travel and border measures in the world. New variants of concern have made it very important that we take further steps to protect Canadians from COVID-19. We have been clear from the start of this pandemic that no one should be travelling. We have to get that message through. Doing so can put people and their loved ones at risk. From the start we have had the safety and health of Canadians in mind, and we will always act to protect that."

People know to protect their skin and eyes from the sun. Sun exposure can be dangerous for the body, but the sun's rays also can damage automobiles.

Leaving a vehicle exposed to sunlight for extended periods

search Facility found interior vehicle air temperatures have been recorded well in excess of 145 F. Interior surfaces exposed to direct sunlight have been recorded at temperatures in excess of 195 F.

The automotive repair service Fix Auto says the sun's ultraviolet rays can cause the vehicle's paint to peel and fade over time. UV rays break down the molecules in the paint and make it appear dull. The company says red paint is particularly susceptible because red paint molecules deteriorate faster in the sun than other paint colors.

To prevent potential sun-related damage, take these precautions.

Avoid direct sunlight. Park in the shade as much as possible.

Crack a window. If it is safe to do so, lower interior air temperature and equalize air pressure by opening up car windows a little.

Use a windshield protector. Reflect sunlight away and keep the vehicle cool with a windshield sun protector that unfolds and slides into place.

Use a protectant wax. A layer of wax can offer another layer of protection against the sun's ultraviolet rays.

Wash the car frequently. Washing and hand-drying the vehicle helps to remove dirt and other debris which can cause micro-scratches in the paint.

Install seat covers. Seat covers can protect leather and fabric upholstery. A leather conditioner can help prevent cracks and tears from sunlight and heat.

These easy steps are simple preventative measures that protect vehicles against sun damage.
