In March 2021, Barrhead RCMP began investigating an alleged 'chop shop' that was operating at a rural residence in Barrhead, Alta.

On April 7, 2021 with the assistance of Westlock RCMP, Eastern Alberta Dis-

trict Crime Reduction Unit, RCMP Police Dog Service and the RCMP Auto Theft Unit a search warrant was executed at the residence.

Police located and seized several stolen firearms, tools, licence plates and what is believed to be methamphetamine.

Police also located several

stolen vehicles on the property. RCMP seized a large amount of stolen property during the search warrant and continue to determine the rightful owners of the property located.

Six people were arrested and charges are pending.

This funding will be used for bridge rehabilitation, culvert replacements, and more. This much needed funding will aid our communities within Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland to renovate existing infrastructure, while creating jobs.

"This is great news for Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland, with this new GTF funding 14 individual projects in our constituency have received funding. Not only do these projects create jobs, but they revitalize our municipality, or should I say God's country. These projects are great, all-around, for our communities and I look forward to seeing the construction once they're underway." - Shane Getson, MLA Lac Ste. Anne-Parkland

Notable projects within Lac Ste. Anne County include rehabilitating bridges on Range Road's 24, 25, 40, and 62 and on Township Road's 583 and 590. Collectively these bridge upgrades received over \$500,000 in funding. Lac Ste. Anne County will also be replacing the bridge culverts on Range Road 55 and Township Road's 583 and 590, with the over \$400,000 they received from the GTF fund.

Parkland County has received over \$9 million in funding for two major projects including the replacement of the bridge on range Road 64, and to upgrade and rehabilitate Parkland County Transfer Station and Recycling Center.

The Town of Mayerthorpe received almost \$400,000 to replace their watermain along 45 street, and Summer Village of Silver Sands receive over \$50,000 to upgrade their stormwater drain on Willow Avenue.

# MORINVILLE RCMP LAY HISTORICAL SEXUAL ASSAULT CHARGES FROM THE LEGAL / STURGEON COUNTY AREA

Legal / Sturgeon County, Alta - Morinville RCMP after a thorough investigation from two separate complainants laid charges on an adult male from Sturgeon County, Alberta. The incidents allegedly occurred between the years of 1995 to 1999. The victims were teenagers at the time of the offences.

As a result of the investigation, 53-year-old Richard Tremblay has been charged with two counts of sexual assault and one count of while being a person in trust or authority did touch a young person for a sexual purpose.

Richard Tremblay's next court date in Morinville Provincial Court is May 12, 2021

### **COMMENTS ON BILL C-7**

# Submitted by Gerald Soroka, MP for Yellowhead

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead commented on Bill C-7 'An Act to amend the Criminal Code (medical assistance in dying) after the votes were tallied.

"Tonight, MPs voted on Bill C-7 in the House of Commons. I have received many questions via email as to how I voted from both those in favour of the Bill and those against.

Prior to voting on Bill C-7 Conservatives tried to introduce an amendment to remove the expansion of MAID eligibility to those with mental illness. I supported this amendment in an effort to ensure we are not putting our most vulnerable at risk. Unfortunately, this amendment was defeated by the Liberals and the Bloc.

On Bill C-7 itself I thoroughly examined the legislation and thought about the different perspectives constituents raised with me on this issue. However, without safeguards to protect those that are men-

tally ill I could not in good conscience support this Bill.

I believe in extreme circumstances when someone is in pain and all other options have been exhausted, we must allow people access to MAID. This Bill however is too wide reaching and puts vulnerable populations at risk. I was disappointed to see this legislation passed."

# Letter to the EDITOR

I received a very nice letter in the mail from the County of Lac Ste Anne with the 2021 Solid Waste Utility bill. What a pleasant surprise when I read that the rate for this year has gone up 7% over 2020. The explanation for the increase is "due to a shortfall in revenue". I wonder how many tax payers in the County have had a shortfall in revenue this year, and how many have

received a 7% increase in salary or pensions to offset the shortfall. I know what the response would be if I wrote to my pension provider and said I needed an increase in my pension because I've had a shortfall in revenue! I would bet almost no one has received a 7% increase in income, except perhaps senior County administration staff. Perhaps the county council need-

ed to look at a decrease in costs to offset the shortfall, and not an increase in fees on the backs of hardworking residents of the county.

I think it is time that the county, elected officials and senior management staff, started to care about the residents whom they are supposed to serve and take a serious look at how the county spends our tax and utility dollars. I would

suggest that the first place to look at a decrease in expenses is councillor renumeration and senior administration staff salaries and benefits.

I know that I will be seriously considering this and other issues when I cast my vote in the upcoming fall county election.

# PARKLAND RCMP ARREST SUSPECT FOR TRAFFICKING CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

Onoway, Alta. - On April 8, 2021 at 3:15 a.m. Parkland RCMP responded to the report of suspicious vehicles parked on a rural private driveway in the area of Onoway.

Parkland RCMP identified Jeffery Russell (37) of Drayton Valley, Alta. as a driver of one of the vehicles. A 34-year-old female from Seba Beach, Alta. was the driver of the other vehicle.

Initially during the investigation, the 34-yearold female provided a false name and was subsequently charged with obstructing justice. Her first appearance is scheduled for June 2, 2021 at Stony Plain Provincial Court. She cannot be named at this point in time as her court documents are still in the process of being sworn.

Jeffery Russell has prior charges involving weapons and is not to have weapons in his possession. He was found to be in possession of a weapon and was arrested for failing to comply with this condition. Further investigation found Jeffery Russell with a substantial amount of controlled substances and drug paraphernalia. Investigators located approximately 10000 street

doses of methamphetamine, fentanyl, cocaine and LSD.

Jeffery Russell is charged with:

- Possession for the purpose of trafficking methamphetamine
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking crack cocaine
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking fentan-yl
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking LSD
- Weapons possession contrary to order and fail to surrender authorization

Jeffery Russell was held for a judicial interim hearing and was released. His first appearance is April 28, 2021 at Stony Plain Provincial Court.

The death has been deemed suspicious and the Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit is now investigating with the assistance from the RCMP Forensic Identification Unit, the Morinville RCMP General Investigation Section and the Office of the Fire Investigator.

An autopsy has been ordered and will be conducted later this week by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner. The cause of death has not yet been determined.

The RCMP is requesting the public's assistance and would like to speak with anyone who were in the area of 66 Street between Anthony Henday and Valour Avenue on Monday April 5, 2021, between 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m.

In addition, the RCMP is looking for any dash camera footage, or information on suspicious vehicles and/

The Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) program is looking for agricultural producers in Lac Ste. Anne County! The ALUS program is designed to support local farmers in creating conservation project on their farm, without disrupting day to day farm operations. This often looks like: resting margin-

al land and leaving it for the wildlife, fencing off creeks and wetlands to keep live-



stock out, and planting native trees and shrubs. The ALUS program cost shares these projects, providing \$3 per meter of fencing and \$3,750 towards alternate watering systems. The program is completely voluntary and the farmer retains ownership



on title.

Despite COVID, 2020 was very successful for the Lac Ste. Anne ALUS program. We enrolled 160 acres with 7 new participants and protect wetlands, riparian areas and mature forests. We helped establish 5.7km of fencing and 5 new watering systems. We



### **HOW TO ADD SHADE TO A DECK OR PATIO**

Homeowners eagerly await the arrival of the warm weather so they can cast off the remnants of cabin fever and bask in the sunshine. However, as summer nears its dog days, the same sun homeowners once coveted can contribute to uncomfortable conditions in outdoor entertaining spaces.

Meteorologists at WHASII in Kentucky took to their neighborhoods in July 2020 to test just how hot surfaces can get in the sun during peak daytime temperatures. Concrete sitting in the sun almost all day reached a temperature of 134.7 F, while the same concrete in the shade clocked in at just under 80 F. When air temperatures are around 90 F, unshaded concrete and asphalt can

be 125 F and 140 F, respectively. While wood decking may not be as hot as asphalt and concrete, it still can get steamy underfoot.

Homeowners who want to be able to enjoy their outdoor spaces in an array of temperatures can think about investing in shade solutions. Sun-blocking ideas like awnings, shade trees and large umbrellas can help people enjoy their yards all day long.

· Canopy: A patio canopy is typically a freestanding unit that can be installed over a patio or a deck. Some people prefer to bolt it down so it will not be knocked over in windy conditions. The fabric on the canopy can be removed during the offseason, helping to improve its longevity.

· Awning: Awnings may be stationary or retractable. Many are installed directly onto a home and can cast shade on specific areas of outdoor entertaining spaces.

· Shade sail: Similar to an awning but a bit less structurally rigid, shade sails are large pieces of triangular fabric installed over areas of a patio, pool or landscape, according to The Family Handyman. Shade sails are light and airy and can be customized.

· Trees: A natural way to increase shade in a yard is to plant more shade trees. If sun glare is an issue all year long, and it's not just the heat of the sun that is troublesome, think about planting evergreen trees. Deciduous cousins will drop their leaves

in fall and only be effective during the warm weather.

· Patio umbrellas: Many umbrellas start at around \$25. Umbrellas can be paired with patio tables, while stationary cantilever umbrellas sit out of the way on their own heavy-duty stands. A cantilever umbrella tends to provide more shade than patio table umbrellas.


· Curtains: Homeowners can block sunlight outdoors the way they do inside, offers MSN. Hang curtains from the sides of canopies or between posts on a deck to provide shade and cozy spaces.

# TYPES OF HOME INSULATION AND WHERE TO INSTALL THEM

When thinking about renovating their homes, homeowners may imagine changing wall colors, expanding room sizes or upgrading appliances and fixtures. However, unless people take inventory of the less glamourous components of the home, such as structure, plumbing, heating and cooling, and insulation, other improvements may be for naught.

A home insulation project certainly doesn't offer the wow factor of a kitchen remodel, but insulation serves a vital function in the house that helps keep people comfortable and reduces energy consumption. Insulation is typically placed in areas where air escapes, such as between the stud cavities inside the walls and in the attic, and serves to slow and reduce

heat transfer.

The U.S. Department of Energy says between 50 and 70 percent of the energy used in homes is for heating and cooling. By improving home insulation, homeowners can make their homes more comfortable, consistent and efficient. In fact. the ENERGY STAR program overseen by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says homeowners stand to save an average of 15 percent on heating and cooling costs by adding proper insulation. To do so, homeowners can take a crash course in home insulation and find the products that fit their needs

Blanket batts and rolls

Blanket batts and rolls typically are constructed with fiberglass, so proper safety gear,

such as a mask and gloves, is needed when handling them. Installing this type of insulation is relatively easy since the materials are designed to fit the standard width between studs, rafters and floor joists.

Loose fill

Loose fill is usually made of fiberglass or cellulose (recycled paper fiber). It is blown or sprayed into place with pneumatic equipment, according to The Home Depot. Loose fill can be ideal for hard-to-reach areas in attics or inside wall cavities. It's good for adding insulation to irregularly shaped areas. Since it requires special equipment, this is a job best left to professionals.

Sprayed foam

Sprayed foam is just as the name implies, a foam made

from polyurethane, polyisocyanurate, cementitious, or other materials that are applied by a spray container. DIYers who need only small applications can use canned products . Large quantities are pressure-sprayed by professionals.

Foam board/rigid foam panels Ideal for unfinished walls, such as basement or foundation walls, floors and ceilings, these are boards of polyurethane or polystyrene. Foam boards tend to reduce energy consumption more effectively than other types of insulation.

Homeowners considering upgrading their insulation or amending existing insulation should do their homework on the type of insulation that will be most effective for their homes

conventional turf and some novel installations in Alberta. The future is green and colourful and gardeners are key to making it happen."


