The start of the growing season is a good time to set up a compost bin. Instead of throwing out many organic materials, you can make compost and return it to your vegetable garden, flower beds, and lawn.

Composting does not need to be complicated. You can compost in an open pile, in a commercial bin, or in a homemade bin. When we supply the basic requirements of organic matter (like vegetable peelings, green garden waste, grass clippings, and dried leaves), water (from rain or irriga-

tion during dry spells), and oxygen (by regularly turning your pile), the naturally occurring decomposing organisms do the hard work.

Visit the Lac Ste. Anne County website for resources about how to start composting, plans for building a compost bin, what to include in your bin, and how

to use finished compost. All summer the compost bins at the George Pegg Botanic Garden are hard at work. The Garden is open from June to August, stop by for a visit, the summer staff are always happy to talk about composting.

ARRIVAL OF MORE VACCINES

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, asked the following question today during Question Period. He asked:

"Madam Speaker, as other countries are coming out of this pandemic, small communities in my riding, such as Breton, are just beginning to receive their first doses because of the Liberals' failure on procurement. Many of these communities have expressed concerns with delay and uncertainty of the timeline getting their first and second doses. In March, witnesses at the health committee confirmed the off-label interval was a decision exclusively based on procurement schedules.

When will we get enough vaccines so we can stop rationing and use the manufacturers' recommended interval?"

Reply: Mr. Steven MacKinnon (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Public Services and Procurement, Lib.):

"Madam Speaker, I know that the member will join me in hoping that the citizens of his riding in Yellowhead and, indeed, all Canadians have access very soon to the dose and the evidence is their first dose will be coming very quickly. The 50 million vaccine doses that we are expecting by the end of June are, of course, more than enough to cover the first dose and, indeed, will make a significant dent in the second dose for all Canadians. We know that Canada is third in the G20 in getting that first dose to its citizens.

We all look forward to the end of this pandemic and I know the hon. member joins me in encouraging his citizens to get vaccinated when it is their turn."

COVID-19 UPDATE FOR WHITECOURT

Submitted by Town of Whitecourt

APRIL 30, 2021

The Government of Alberta recently announced targeted public health restrictions to address growing COVID-19 cases in hot spot communities across the province. Effective April 30, targeted restrictions will apply to hot spot municipalities or regions where there are at least 350 cases per 100,000 people and 250 currently active cases. For those communities that meet those thresholds, additional restrictions apply for schools, indoor fitness, and indoor sport and recreation.

Whitecourt, based on the criteria mentioned above, is not considered a hot spot and additional public health restrictions do not apply in our community at this time. Case numbers for Whitecourt (as of April 29, 2021) are as follows:

- Active case rate per 100,000 population: 449.1
- Active Cases: 64

This is the highest active case number Whitecourt has experienced throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, and the community is asked to remain vigilant in following public health restrictions and preventative practices. Simple steps can slow the spread of COVID-19. Wash your hands, physically distance, wear a mask and, if you're even slightly showing symptoms, stay home and get tested.

Current provincial public health restrictions currently in place in Whitecourt include:

- Masks or face covers are mandatory in indoor public places, workspaces, places of worship, and when 2-metre physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- All indoor social gatherings are prohibited public and private.
- Outdoor social gatherings are limited to 10 people maximum and must not

have an indoor component.

- Out-of-town visitors cannot stay in other people's homes while gathering restrictions are in place.
- Faith services are limited to 15% of fire code occupancy for in-person attendance.
- Retail and shopping malls must limit customer capacity to 15% of fire code occupancy (not including staff) or a minimum of 5 customers. Curbside pickup, delivery and online services are encouraged.
- · Restaurants, pubs, bars,

lounges, cafes and food courts can open for outdoor patio dining, takeout, curbside pickup and delivery only.

- Libraries, entertainment businesses and entities must remain closed.
- Facilities used for indoor recreation may open only for individual or household one-on-one fitness training and youth group physical activities.
- Banquet halls, community halls and conference centres can open for wedding

ceremonies (up to 10 people) and funeral services (up to 20 people).

- All personal and wellness services can open by appointment only.
- Working from home is mandatory unless the employer requires the employee's physical presence to operate effectively.

WHITECOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

APRIL 29, 2021

Whitecourt Town Council has approved the 2021 Budget. Valued at \$51,193,613, the budget supports priorities identified by Council in the 2021 Strategic Plan and its intention to sustain service levels while at the same time planning for the future.

A 1.99% tax rate increase is required to support the budget. This is a 0.33% decrease from what was proposed in the interim budget that was adopted in December 2020.

Whitecourt Town Council has taken a conservative approach in the development of the 2021 Budget in recognition of the financial challenges faced by local residents and businesses. In addition to the \$800,000 in reductions made last year, an additional \$500,000 in cost efficiencies and reduced spending have been implemented in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and an unpredictable economy.

Based on the approved budget, Administration is preparing the Tax Rate Bylaw which will be presented to Council at the May 10, 2021 Regular Meeting. The 2021 Budget Report will subsequently be published in mid-May and will be posted online at www.whitecourt. ca and paper copies will be made available at the Town Office.

Whitecourt Town Council

approved the 2020 Financial Statements for the year end of December 31, 2020. A presentation was made by the Town's auditor, Curtis Friesen from Metrix Group, who reported that the consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of the Town of Whitecourt as of the end of 2020.

Whitecourt Town Council has adopted the 2021 Strategic Plan. The plan outlines Council's current priorities and identifies where it will focus resources. A copy of the Plan is available on our website at www.whitecourt. ca/Government.

Whitecourt awarded \$21,388 to three local organizations under the Enhancement Grant Program to provide assistance with start-up or development of new community events, or assistance with enhancements to existing programs or facilities.

The funding was awarded as follows:

- \$4,052 to the Little Sprouts Fundraising Society for an outdoor play space;
- \$2,951 to the Whitecourt Potters' Guild for guild stor-

age and glaze chemical handling improvements; \$14,385 to the Whitecourt

Golf & Country Club for the

capital improvement of a John Deere Gator TX Turf. Sweet Rolls Creamery has been awarded a one-year lease agreement for conces-

sion services at Rotary Park. The concession will operate from May to September this

Whitecourt has temporarily relaxed regulations for outdoor patios and retail spaces for the 2021 season. Under current provincial public health restrictions, many local businesses are wanting to develop temporary outdoor patios/retail spaces on public lands so that they can remain open for business or expand their retail capacity. Council has agreed to waive development permit fees for temporary outdoor spaces, retroactively to April 6, 2021, in an effort to support local restaurant and retail businesses during the economic recovery due to COVID-19. The waiving of fees, as well as Council's decision to allow Development Officers to issue and approve necessary permits, will fast track permit processing while supporting local businesses. The Town of Whitecourt is preparing for the upcoming October 2021 Municipal Election. Similar to previous elections, Whitecourt will be offering special ballots, advance and institutional voting. WHITECOURT'S ECONOMIC RECOVERY GRANT PROGRAM NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Whitecourt has launched the Economic Recovery Grant Program that will help local businesses respond to the challenges of COVID-19 and provide flexible funding to strengthen business models.

"Some of the most severely impacted sectors of the economy will require enhanced service delivery and resources in order to support an inclusive economic recovery for all residents and businesses," stated Whitecourt Mayor Maryann Chichak. "Supporting businesses is a priority of Whitecourt Town Council, and the actions we take, and protocols we put in place now will have a great impact on our community's success and recovery in the future."

The program was created with the support of Community Futures Yellowhead East's Regional Business Resiliency & Diversification Partnership Initiative Fund. Community Futures Yellowhead East is a vital resource in Whitecourt and the region, and its strategic partnership in initiatives such as this grant program are what help build a resilient community.

"We are still in the midst of dealing with COVID-19 and our small business community has been hard-hit," added Economic Development Officer Rhonda Hough. SUSPECT IN ROAD RAGE INCIDENT IDENTIFIED

On April 26, 2021 Parkland RCMP requested assistance from the public to identify a suspect involved in a road rage incident. Numerous tips were received and, as a result, the investigator was able to identify the suspect.

On Friday, April 16, 2021, sometime between 5:20 p.m. and 5:29 p.m., two cyclists were travelling east on Woodbend Road near the Woodbend Community Hall. A Dodge Ram pickup, travelling west,

veered towards them. The male driver yelled obscenities and continued west. The suspect then returned and spun his tires spraying the cyclists with gravel. The suspect continued to harass the cyclists until they stopped and pulled into the ditch. He eventually left without further incident.

The 26-year-old male suspect was issued a provincial ticket for stunting. A stunting ticket has 3 demerit points and the fine is \$567.00.

The suspect's name will not be released as the charge is a provincial ticket and is not public information. Cyclists are vulnerable road users. It is important to remember:

- Be aware of road conditions. While cyclists are required to ride as close as practicable to the right curve, they may need to ride further out to avoid hazards like pot holes, debris, gravel etc.
- When passing a cyclist, change lanes like you would for other vehicles
- When you are preparing to turn right, watch for cyclists who may ride beside your vehicle and shoulder check to your blind spots to the right.

Cyclists using the streets

and highways are to ride single file except when passing another bicycle

On November 1, 2021, penalties to current arrears will be applied at 9%, and on January 1, 2022, a 9% penalty will be applied to the entire outstanding balance.

1) Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.


2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

3) Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone




Tips about Strangers

A stranger is anyone you don't know. There is no way to tell by the way a person looks if they are dangerous or not. A dangerous person does not always look mean or scary, so judging by the way people look is a mistake. It's not so easy to tell who is okay and who is not. Just because someone looks nasty doesn't mean that they would hurt you and just because someone looks nice, doesn't mean that they are a nice person.

There is only one person that is with you all the time and can be responsible for keeping you safe at all times. THAT PERSON IS YOU! Safety rules need to apply ALL THE TIME, not just when someone who looks bad or scary is around. One of the most common ways that kids get hurt by strangers is when being friendly and helpful to adults who pretend to need help. When you are without your parents or other adult you know, it is your job to protect yourself. It is not your job to offer help to any adults, even if they ask! A grownup who needs help should get help from another adult, not a child. So remember, looking out for yourself is your biggest job when you are not with your parents or another adult, so you have permission without your parents' permission. You should learn whose to ignore or refuse adult requests for help

Stranger Tips:

- · Walk and play with others and use the buddy system. If you walk somewhere, walk with other children.
- Adults do not usually ask children for directions or help, they should be asking other adults. If someone in a car should stop to ask for directions, you should not go near the car.
- · Stay an arms reach or more away from strangers. Stand up, back up and run to someone who can help you if you feel afraid.
- · If someone is following you on foot or in a car, go to a place where there are other people--to a neighbor's home or into a store, a police station or even a library for instance--and ask for help.
- · No one should ask you to look for lost items such as a "lost puppy" or tell you that either of your parents is in trouble and that he or she will take you to mom or dad. If someone tells you this, run the other way immediately and find help with an adult you know or run into a safe place you know.
- Never go near a car with someone in it or get into a car cars you are allowed to ride in.






