## PARKLAND RCMP DRUG UNIT INVESTIGATION LEADS TO SIGNIFICANT DRUG SEIZURE

### SUSPECT IN ROAD RAGE INCIDENT IDENTIFIED

On April 26, 2021 Parkland RCMP requested assistance from the public to identify a suspect involved in a road rage incident. Numerous

tips were received and, as a result, the investigator was able to identify the suspect.

During the search warrants, several items were seized including what is believed to be:

- 11 kg of cocaine
- 2.5 kg of fentanyl
- 8700 Etizolam (sedative) capsules
  - •15 litres of liquid cocaine
- •100 kg of buff (cutting agent) Police also located drug paraphernalia, a firearm, over \$2000 in Canadian currency and items consistent with drug trafficking.

"This is one of the most significant drug seizures we've seen in Parkland", said Insp. Mike Lokken, Officer in Charge of Parkland RCMP. "This seizure will undoubtedly have a major impact on the organized crime and illicit drug trade in our area."

At the April 21, 2021, Public Board Meeting, the Board of Trustees approved a motion giving the central office curriculum-working group, comprising teachers and central staff, permission to share feedback regarding their review of the draft curriculum with the Minister of Education. The Board felt they could still provide Alberta Education with meaningful and con-

structive feedback through the curriculum-working group rather than through schools.

At the Public Board Meeting, the Superintendent and Trustees applauded GYPSD staff for their flexibility, resiliency, and incredible professionalism, managing shifts between online and in-person teaching in response to the pandemic. They also shared the feedback received from parents, teachers, and community members who have deep concerns about the draft. However, the Trustees voiced their belief that providing feedback was too important of an opportunity to miss, given the many years the province has been without an updated curriculum: thus, the decision to task the Division's curriculum-working group to provide feedback to Alberta Education. This approach aligns with how many school jurisdictions in the province are also providing input.

The development and approval of the provincial curriculum are under the authority of the Alberta government. Members of the public are encouraged to review the draft K to 6 curricula and provide feedback to the Ministry of Education until Spring 2022 via the Alberta Education website: https://www.alberta.ca/curriculum-have-your-say.aspx.

The suspect then returned and spun his tires spraying the cyclists with gravel. The suspect continued to harass the cyclists until they stopped and pulled into the ditch. He eventually left without further incident.

The 26-year-old male suspect was issued a provincial ticket for stunting. A stunting ticket has 3 demerit points and the fine is \$567.00.

The suspect's name will not be released as the charge is a provincial ticket and is not public information.


Cyclists are vulnerable road users. It is important to remember:

- Be aware of road conditions. While cyclists are required to ride as close as practicable to the right curve, they may need to ride further out to avoid hazards like pot holes, debris, gravel etc.
- When passing a cyclist, change lanes like you would for other vehicles
- When you are preparing to turn right, watch for cyclists who may ride beside your vehicle and shoulder check to your blind spots to the right.
- Cyclists using the streets and highways are to ride single file except when passing another bicycle

#### **9 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR GOLF GAME**

Warmer weather sends scores of golfers to their favorite courses each and every day. Golf is a challenging pastime, but a few pointers can help golfers hone their short games, long games and everything in between.

- Choose the right clubs. There is more to selecting clubs than pulling any old iron out of your golf bag and whacking away. Wind, hazards and obstructions in landing areas should influence your decision of which club to use. Novice golfers may want to rely on their caddies to make club recommendations, and as they become more confident in their abilities they can start to make their own choices.
- Anchor your feet. Anchor your foot behind the ball to drive the ball further. Right-handed players will keep the right foot anchored, and lefties will do the opposite. Do not lift your foot prematurely; otherwise, you can lose power and distance.
- Identify your weaknesses. As with any hobby, identifying those areas that need the most work can help you be-

come a better golfer. Keep track of each shot you take, and then look at the results to see which areas of your game need the most work.

- Fix your alignment. Align your shots by assessing the target from behind the ball. Then set the clubface behind the golf ball and align it with the target before you enter your stance.
- Use your torso for power. The torso is essential to a solid swing. Prac-

tice rotating from your core to control your backswing and then maintain the same spine angle and posture on the downswing.

Use the wind. Not every golf game will be played in perfect weather. A good player knows how to make adjustments for the wind depending on the shot. Use the wind to your advantage when you can, and adjust your swing when hitting into the wind.

- Become a better chipper. Many players put so much emphasis on their backswings and putt shots that they fail to devote any practice to chips. All shots are important for golfers trying to shed strokes off of their scores.
- · Keep fit. Maintaining or improving your physical strength and overall health can help your golf game. Exercise and eat right, and you will have more endurance on the links.

## INSURERS URGE ALBERTANS TO PREPARE FOR THE 2021 HAIL SEASON

June to September is hail season in Alberta. Homes are being damaged more frequently not only by hail, but also by heavy rainfall and strong winds. In preparation of this year's hail season, Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) is sharing tips and information to

help consumers protect themselves and their property.

During a severe weather event, such as a hailstorm, everyone's priority must be their own safety, and the safety of their loved ones and neighbours. With the COVID-19 pandemic still being a major factor across Canada, there is a greater need for Albertans to plan ahead and be prepared.

Be prepared

- Keep a current, detailed inventory of your home's contents.
- Assemble an emergency supply kit.
- Create an emergency preparedness plan for your household.
- Monitor the local weather forecasts and Alberta Emergency Alerts for watches and

warnings for thunderstorms (which often include hail).

• Know your risks and review your insurance policy with your insurance representative.

How to get ready for severe weather

- Secure barbecues, and secure or store patio furniture indoors when severe weather is in the forecast.
- Park your vehicle in a covered area.
- Ensure proper grading around your home.
- Have someone check your property if you are away.
- Install a sump pump, and a sewer backup or backflow valve.
- Consider resilient building materials when completing repairs.

How to protect yourself before and during a storm

- Stay away from windows, doors and skylights during a storm.
- Do not drive through flooded intersections or large puddles.
- Watch for flooded areas.
   Excessive hail combined with heavy rain can plug storm drains and create local flooding.
- If driving, find a place to safely pull off roadways and protect yourself from shattered glass by facing away from all windows.
- If you are caught outdoors with no immediately available shelter, crouch down, face away from the wind and protect your head and neck with your hands.

If you need to make a claim, here's how to start the process

- When safe to do so, assess, photograph and document the damage.
- Call your insurance representative or company to report the damage or losses.
- Be as detailed as possible when providing information of the damage to you property.
- Water damage to vehicles is usually covered under comprehensive or all-perils auto insurance policies. Contact your insurance representative

This decade, Alberta has experienced more severe weather events than any other region in Canada. Taxpayers and insurers share the cost for severe weather damage. For every dollar paid in insurance claims for damaged homes and businesses, all levels of government and taxpayers pay much more to repair public infrastructure. Yet Canada still lacks a national climate adaptation strategy with measurable targets and the accompanying investments needed to protect Canadian homes and businesses from natural disasters.

Canadians continue to experience accelerating financial losses from the changing climate. In 2020, the federal government created the Task Force on High-Risk Residential Flood Insurance and Strategic Relocation. Through this task force, insurers will work with governments across the country to better protect properties from flooding and to ensure that every Canadian has access to affordable flood insurance. Currently, this is a standalone effort. IBC believes it should be part of a larger climate adaptation plan that coordinates action by governments and the private sector to address the growing physical risks of climate change.

## TIPS TO STOP

- Take it seriously. It's easy to say, "Kids will be kids" and assume it will pass. But if your child is coming home upset and is suddenly anxious about school because of the way a kid (or kids) are treating him, you should pay attention.
- · Drop your kid off at school or stand on the sidelines during recess. Bullying tends to occur when adult supervision is lacking, so before school or on the playground at recess.
- Talk to other parents. Young kids are talkers. If you're friendly with a parent in your kid's class, ask them if their child has mentioned anything about kids being picked on at school.
- Tell the teacher. It's really important to let your child's teacher know what your kid is telling you -- especially if someone is getting hit.
- Empower your children. Let your kids know that it's not their fault that they are being

Protect machinery from theft by leaving valuables locked in a shed or storage facility and by marking equipment with your drivers licence and province of issue (an engraver can be borrowed free of charge from most local police detachments).

Protect livestock by checking herds regularly and keeping accurate records of livestock born, sold or purchased.



"Grain Fette" or "Grain Guard" is a unique approach to identifying your crops. Small bits of paper, each one imprinted with your special code number, are mixed with grain as grain is being augered into the storage shed. This is approved by the Canadian Grain Commission. The paper used is also digestable in animal feed.

Utilize the Report-A-Poacher Program. Their toll free number is 1-800-642-3800.

Rural Crime Watch Members are concerned citizens who are watchful for unusual activity in their community. They record information on suspicious people and vehicles and pass it along to local police. Join together with your neighbours to install a crime watch program in your area.Do not approach suspicious individuals on your own.

## BULLYING Tips for Dealing With Bullying

 Take complaints of bullying seriously. Do not dismiss your child or expect your child to work through the situation alone.

2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

3) Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone


Tips about Strangers

A stranger is anyone you don't know. There is no way to tell by the way a person looks if they are dangerous or not. A dangerous person does not always look mean or scary, so judging by the way people look is a mistake. It's not so easy to tell who is okay and who is not. Just because someone looks nasty doesn't mean that they would hurt you and just because someone looks nice, doesn't mean that they are a nice person.

There is only one person that is with you all the time and can be responsible for keeping you safe at all times. THAT PERSON IS YOU! Safety rules need to apply ALL THE TIME, not just when someone who looks bad or scary is around. One of the most common ways that kids get hurt by strangers is when being friendly and helpful to adults who pretend to need help. When you are without your parents or other adult you know, it is your job to protect yourself. It is not your job to offer help to any adults, even if they ask! A grownup who needs help should get help from another adult, not a child. So remember, looking out for yourself is your biggest job when you are not with your parents or another adult, so you have permission without your parents' permission. You should learn whose to ignore or refuse adult requests for help

#### Stranger Tips:

- · Walk and play with others and use the buddy system. If you walk somewhere, walk with other children.
- Adults do not usually ask children for directions or help, they should be asking other adults. If someone in a car should stop to ask for directions, you should not go near the car.
- · Stay an arms reach or more away from strangers. Stand up, back up and run to someone who can help you if you feel afraid.
- · If someone is following you on foot or in a car, go to a place where there are other people--to a neighbor's home or into a store, a police station or even a library for instance--and ask for help.
- · No one should ask you to look for lost items such as a "lost puppy" or tell you that either of your parents is in trouble and that he or she will take you to mom or dad. If someone tells you this, run the other way immediately and find help with an adult you know or run into a safe place you know.
- Never go near a car with someone in it or get into a car cars you are allowed to ride in.



Signs of impaired driving include:

• Failure to turn on headlights at night. • Illegal or sudden turning. • Turning within an unusually wide radius. • Nearly striking other cars or objects. • Sudden or erratic braking. • Drifting, swerving or weaving. • Driving with the face close to the windshield. • Drinking alcohol in the vehicle. • Driving much slower than the posted speed limit. • Rapidly accelerating. • Tailgating. • Driving in the middle of the road, or with the left tires on the center line. • Responding slowly to traffic signals




