If you are thinking about running, I encourage you to get a nomination and information package from your municipality. In there, you should find important information about what it is to be a councillor. These can typically be found on your municipal website or by contacting administration. It may also be helpful to talk to current or former councillors or even the Chief Administrative Officer to find out what kind of a commit-

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ment and pay you could expect should you choose to run for office.

You are eligible to run for office if you are eligible to vote in the election and have been living in the municipality in which you are running for at least 6 months prior to nomination day. If you are thinking about running there are some important dates that you should be aware of, for all municipalities, except summer villages:

- Jan 1, 2021, municipal nominations opened;
- Sept 20, 2021, official nomination day (nominations may be submitted any time before this date)
- Oct 18, 2021, election day. The rules for summer villages are different. You are eligible to run for office in

a summer village if you are eligible to vote in the election (this includes residents as well as property owners and spouses of property owners, even if they do not reside in the summer village) and have been a resident of Alberta for at least 12 months. Summer village elections are also held during the summer and they set their own nomination and election dates, with many nominations closing in June. You can check your summer village website or contact your administration for more information.

MP SOROKA WANTS ACTION TAKEN TO REDUCE THE MOUNTAIN PINE BEETLE POPULATION

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, asked the following question today during Question Period.

He asked: "Madam Speaker, in my region of Canada, the forest industry needs help from the government. It is facing an epidemic caused by the Mountain Pine Beetle. The

species destroys many acres of pine trees every year and are expanding east, causing damage along the eastern slopes of the Rockies. The Mountain Pine Beetle in Jasper and Hinton are a genetic mix of the northern and southern Mountain Pine Beetle that are stronger and more destructive.

Will the federal government take action to reduce the population of this harmful inva-

sive species?"

Reply: Mr. Marc Serré (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Natural Resources, Lib.): "Madam Speaker, we are working closely with provinces and municipalities to help slow the spread and mitigate the impact of forest pests in Canada as well as reduce the risk of infestation in areas that are not affected.

Our government invested

\$20 million annually in scientific research to address the risk posed to our forests. We remain focused on science-based solutions. We will continue working with our partners and invest to protect Canada's trees from infestation."

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that the Department of Families, Children and Social Development, has launched a call for concepts for innovative projects to prevent and eliminate homelessness under the Community Capacity and Innovation stream of Reaching Home: Canada's Homelessness Strategy.

Approximately \$6 million

over three years will be provided starting in 2021–22, for scalable projects that will test and develop new and innovative approaches to addressing homelessness in communities across the country.

Project concepts must address at least one of the following three priorities:

• Testing or developing interventions for specific populations, such as Indigenous people, youth, seniors, LGBTQ2, women fleeing violence, veterans, or Black and racialized

Canadians.

- Developing strategic partnerships that contribute to community collaboration, increase capacity building within the homeless-serving sector, or build connections between sectors or different levels of government.
- Developing effective practices or innovative techniques to measure the scope of homelessness or address data gaps related to homelessness, including hidden homelessness.

Priority consideration will

be given to large-scale multiyear projects, projects serving Indigenous communities and projects addressing homelessness in the territories.

Concepts can be submitted by completing a concept application form and submitting it via email to: -dci@hrsdc-rhdcc.gc.ca by June 11, 2021.

Concepts will be evaluated by a review committee, and selected applicants will be invited to submit full proposals for consideration in the summer.

Whitecourt Town Council Update

will be implemented:

- The extension of no-parking zone along the 47 Street and 55 Avenue intersection to increase visibility of the crosswalk and ensure that stopping sight distances and turning sight distances are maintained.
- The addition of pedestrian crossing signs along 47 Street to increase awareness of the crosswalk.
- The placement of temporary radar speed signs to make drivers aware of the speeds they are travelling.
- Increased enforcement presence along 47 Street to change driver habits of speeding.
- E Construction has been awarded the Dahl Drive Improvement project. Knelsen Sand and Gravel has been awarded the contract for Whitecourt's 2021 Street Improvement Program. The program, valued at over \$620,000, is scheduled for this summer and will include overlay projects at the following locations:

- 47 Street, from Graham Road to 25m north of Harolds Hallow:
- Harolds Hallow (portion of);
- Noves Crescent (cul de sac);
- Atkinson Crescent;
- 39 Street (entrance to Rivervalley Estates);

- Baxter Crescent and Feero Drive intersection:
- 47 Street from Sunset Boulevard to 135m north of Sunset Boulevard;
- 42 Avenue, from Highway 43 to Kepler Street;
- Blueberry Drive east of Park Drive:
- 33 Street and Caxton Street intersection.

Additional lighting will be installed along the Highway 43 Pathway to 51 Street and the Blueberry Drive/Park Circle North pathways. The lighting projects are part of a larger goal to enhance the community trail network and increase the connectivity of the community.

Whitecourt Town Council has awarded \$15,000 in funding under the 2021 Tourism Enhancement Grant Program.

Recipients include:

- \$6,600 to the Whitecourt Golf & Country Club for patio dining enhancements and a marketing plan;
- \$8,400 to the Whitecourt

Mountain Bike Association for feature expansion at the Bike Park.

Lawn & Garden

HOW TO CARE FOR PERENNIALS

Perennials can add color and vibrancy to any garden. One of the more desirable components of perennials is that they come back year after year, meaning homeowners do not have to invest in a gardenful of new flowers every year. That can add up to considerable savings. Perennials often form the foundation of beautiful gardens.

Annuals only grow for one season, produce seeds and then die. However, perennials die back to the ground every autumn and their roots survive the winter. So the plants reemerge in the spring, according to The Farmer's Almanac. Some perennials are short-lived, meaning they will come back a few consecutive years; others will last for decades.

Though planted perennials require less maintenance than annuals, they are not completely maintenance-free. Certain care is needed to help perennials thrive, and that starts with the soil. In fact, soil is the single most important factor for growing healthy plants. Penn State Extension says most perennials grow ideally in well drained, fertile soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0. In addition, organic matter can improve soil texture and water-holding ability.

When including perennials in the garden, make sure you wait for the right time to plant them. The ideal time is during the spring or fall. Perennials come as container-grown perennials, which already have been

established in the soil. Bareroot perennials are just roots that are often packed in peat moss. In order to plant bareroot perennials, soak the roots in water for several minutes before gently planting in the ground, indicates the how-to resource Tip Bulletin.

Perennials should be watered deeply, especially during the first growing season. However, the soil should never be overly dry or wet. Most perennials do not need to be fertilized heavily. A single application in the spring typically is all that's needed.

Care along the way can include deadheading spent flowers so that plants can use their energy on seed production and reblooming. Perennials should be divided when they grow large, every three

to four years when the plants are not in bloom. Perennials produce fewer flowers or may look sickly when the time has passed to divide them. Early spring often is a good time to divide perennials, advises The Farmer's Almanac.

A thick layer of mulch can help perennials to overwinter successfully. Perennials planted in containers will need to be transplanted into the garden before it gets cold because most containers cannot thoroughly insulate perennial roots.

Apart from these strategies, perennials pretty much take care of themselves. As long as sunlight requirements match plant needs, the perennials should thrive.

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
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
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
