concert. Stay tuned for more information for this event, scheduled for August 14 as part of Alberta Open Farm Days. **Continued on Page 4** 



# **HOW ERGONOMIC TOOLS CAN HELP GARDENERS**

Gardening is a rewarding activity that has been found to provide a host of benefits beyond ensuring readily available access to fresh fruits, vegetables and awe-inspiring blooms.

How ergonomic tools differ from traditional gardening tools

Ergonomic gardening tools are designed to ensure that using them has as little effect on the body as possible. Ergonomic tools align with how a person naturally moves his or her body, which can reduce the likelihood that gardeners will suffer any strains or sprains while gardening or experience any aches and pains after a day spent tending to their landscapes.

Choosing the right tools The West Virginia University Center for Excellence in Disabilities notes that gardeners will know they have chosen the right ergonomic gardening tool for the job when they do not have to adapt the tool. Ergonomic tools should match gardeners' heights, fit their grip and feel comfortable when in use.

Specific benefits of ergonomic tools

Ergonomic gardening tools are designed in a way that can reduce stress on the body while performing various tasks. Gardeners know that aches and pains can add up after a day spent kneeling in the garden, raking soil and carrying supplies from a shed or garage around the property. But the WVUCED notes that ergonomic tools do more than just reduce gardeners' risk of injury. Ergonomic tools increase efficiency. Wasted motions are less likely when using ergonomic tools. That

can improve efficiency in the

garden, allowing gardeners to get more done in the same amount of time. And because ergonomic tools are designed to work with the body, gardeners likely won't need to take breaks due to aches and pains, which also makes it easier to be more efficient when working in the garden.

Ergonomic tools increase gardeners' capabilities. The WVUCED notes that principles behind ergonomics keep gardeners using the tools in natural positions. That means gardeners won't lose power to bending and twisting, enabling them to do more in the garden than they might be able to do when using non-ergonomic tools.










# ALBERTA RCMP INTEGRATED NATIONAL SECURITY ENFORCEMENT TEAM LAY WEAPONS CHARGES

Edmonton – The RCMP's Integrated National Security Enforcement Team (INSET) in Alberta have laid charges against an individual in relation to an ongoing investigation.

Kelvin Benjamin Maure (pronounced "more"), 26, of Parkland County, Alta., has been charged with a total of 34 criminal charges:

• Possession of a Prohibited Firearm or Weapon contrary to Section 88(1) of the Criminal Code (x7);

• Possession of a Prohibited Firearm in a Motor Vehicle contrary to Section 94(1) of the Criminal Code (x5);

• Possession of a Prohibited Firearm or Weapon Knowing he was not the holder of a License or Registration Certificate contrary to Section 92(1) of the Criminal Code (x5);

• Possession of a Loaded Prohibited Firearm or With Readily Accessible Ammunition contrary to Section 95(1) of the Criminal Code (x3);

• Make or Possession of an Explosive Substance contrary to Section 82 of the Criminal Code (x3);

• Personation of a Peace Officer contrary to Section 130(1) of the Criminal Code (x2);

• Careless Storage of a Firearm contrary to Section 86 of the Criminal Code (x3);

• Possession of a Prohibited Firearm without Holding a License contrary to Section 91(1) of the Criminal Code (x2);

• Carry a Concealed Firearm contrary to Section 90(1) of the Criminal Code;

• Importing a Prohibited Device contrary to Section 103(1) of the Criminal Code;

• Break and Enter contrary to Section 348 of the Criminal Code; and

• Mischief contrary to Section 430 of the Criminal Code;

Maure was the subject of a larger ongoing investigation into a number of associated individuals since September 2020. In January 2021, Maure displayed escalating behaviour leading investigators to believe he presented a threat to critical infrastructure, police, and the public.

Maure is alleged to have made several online posts with comments and photographs deemed to be a threat to critical infrastructure, the police and the public. These online activities together with other actions taken by Maure resulted in RCMP taking him into custody.

On Feb. 13, 2021, Maure was arrested with assistance from the RCMP Emergency Response Team and was remanded into custody following a judicial hearing. Subsequent to his arrest, RCMP executed search warrants on several properties resulting in the seizure of numerous firearms and other paraphernalia (photos shown).

Maure remains in custody. His next court appearance is scheduled for May 7, 2021, in Stony Plain, Alta.

"An ever increasing concern and challenge faced by law enforcement is the use of the internet and social media as a platform to inspire, radicalize or espouse extremist messaging or calls for violence," said Inspector Scott Isaac, Officer-in-Charge of "K" Division INSET.

"As experienced in this recent investigation, the accused was interacting online with like-minded individuals in posting extreme views that ultimately escalated towards him engaging in criminal activity that posed a considerable risk to public and police safety, ultimately resulting in his arrest. As the investigation continues, we are attempting to determine whether the accused's actions were motivated by a specific ideology or if there were broader intentions to his activities."

INSET would like to thank Parkland RCMP and various supporting RCMP units during the course of this investigation.







# SUPPORTING WOMEN SEEKING SHELTER AT JESSIE'S HOUSE

### Submitted by Government of Alberta

Jessie's House is a 35-bed women's shelter in Morinville, serving women in rural Sturgeon County, St. Albert and the wider Edmonton region. This investment will help the shelter open at full capacity once COVID-19 restriction are lifted, and provide much-needed supports to help women and children live free from domestic violence.

'Women's shelters do vital life-saving work supporting women and children impacted by domestic violence by providing critical supports to help families break free from abuse and live healthy lives. We know the pandemic has increased incidences of family violence, and supports are required now more than ever. This new funding will ensure those supports are in place at Jessie's House." - Rajan Sawhney, Minister of Community and Social Services

Since opening, Jessie's House has been operating at half capacity. This funding will support the shelter to fully operate 35 spaces, support staffing and the development and delivery of programming for families in shelter and in the wider community.

Emergency women's shelters provide many services through outreach and community supports. Skilled shelter staff can provide risk assessments and safety plans for women unable to leave, develop individualized supports designed to meet the unique needs of each client and help educate the community on the impacts of domestic violence and building healthy relationships.

Domestic violence issues can be made more challenging during times of crisis, such as during the COVID-19 pandemic, and supports are available for those in need. The Family Violence Info Line at 310-1818 is available toll-free 24-7 in more than 170 languages.

Alberta's government is re-

sponding to the COVID-19 pandemic by protecting lives and livelihoods with precise measures to bend the curve, sustain small businesses and protect Alberta's health-care system. An additional \$5 million has been provided to women's shelters to help women isolate in safety and to increase community outreach to support women unable to leave abusive relationships.

sie's House to fully operate the 35-bed women's shelter.

• Jessie's House opened in May 2020.

• Jessie's House is named after Jessica Martel, who was killed in a domestic violence incident.

• This funding is reallocated from existing ministry resources.

• Budget 2021 maintains funding for women's shelters at \$51.3 million.

· Funding supports program-

ming and operations for 30 women's emergency shelters, 16 second-stage shelters, two seniors shelters and five fee-for-service shelters.

• General funding covers costs for:

- 721 beds in women's emergency shelters

- 189 units in second-stage shelters

- 16 spaces in elder abuse shelters



Beginning June 1, the government-sponsored Palliative Coverage program will cover the costs associated with pre-filling syringes, making it easier for people receiving palliative care and their caregivers to administer important medications, such as pain medication, and reducing costs for Albertans in palliative care.

"Albertans in palliative care often face intense, unrelenting pain and other symptoms over the course of their illness. Eliminating the cost of pre-filling syringes with medication is a significant way in which we can support these Albertans during this difficult time." -Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

The Palliative Coverage program provides supplementary health benefits to Albertans in palliative care who choose to stay in their home or a hospice. The program covers the cost of eligible prescription drugs, diabetic supplies and ambulance services. When this change comes into effect, the program will also cover

the cost of syringes for injectable medication and the pharmacy's cost for filling the syringes.

In 2019-2020, 5,200 Albertans received supplementary health benefits through the Palliative Coverage program. Almost 2,000 of these Albertans used injectable medications for pain management. On average, a patient receiving palliative care may require 10 to 12 syringes of pain medication each day.

"This program expands palliative care services for Albertans with life-limiting illnesses so they can receive the treatment they need in the places they call home. Appropriate and timely palliative and end-of-life care is essential and we are moving in the right direction to support palliative care patients with dignity and comfort." - Dan Williams, MLA for Peace River

**Quick** facts

Alberta's government has committed \$20 million over four years for improving palliative care and caregiver support.

Effective March 1, 2020, prescription drug co-payments were eliminated for Albertans receiving their medications through the Palliative Coverage program.

# COMING SOON: ROADSIDE CLEAN-UP PROGRAM

# Deadline to apply is June 11

The County is seeking interested community groups to perform roadside clean-up on some of our roads. The date for the roadside clean-up will be coordinated with the selected groups.

## The following roads have been chosen for the clean-up program this year:

- Division 1: Rge Rd 30 South from Hwy 633 to Hillcrest Transfer Station (1.5 miles)
- Division 2: Hwy 777 from Hwy 37 to Onoway Transfer Station (1.5 miles)
- Division 3: From Hwy 43 South on Rge Rd 35 to Regional Landfill entrance (0.5 mile)
- Division 4: From Hwy 43 South on Rge Rd 65 to Sangudo Transfer Station (1.0 mile) – Transfer Station Access Road to Cherhill Station (1.0 mile)
- Division 5: From Hwy 633 Access road to Darwell Transfer Station (0.5 mile)
- Division 6: Twp Rd 574 South on Rge Rd 91 to Mayerthorpe Transfer Station (1.0 mile)
- Division 7: Twp Rd 574 From Rge Rd 80 to Rge Rd 81 (1.0 mile) – RR 74 North of Hwy 43 (1.0 mile)

Lac Ste. Anne County will pay \$200.00 per mile of roadway cleaned (both sides). Garbage bags will be provided by Lac Ste. Anne County to the groups chosen to participate. You will be responsible for your own safety vests this year.

# SCAM ALERT: DON'T PLANT MYSTERY SEEDS FROM CHINA

# Be wary of unknown packages

Unmarked seed packets have been arriving in local mailboxes with no

explanation or reason, and with a return address in China. Residents should remain mindful of what's known as a brushing scam, and are advised to follow the following precautions if they encounter any of these packages.

### Do not open or plant unknown seeds under any circumstances.

If you receive seeds in the mail from an unknown source, keep all the packaging, labels, and seeds in a sealed plastic bag. DO NOT DISPOSE OF THE SEEDS IN THE GARBAGE WHERE THEY WILL ENTER THE LANDFILL. 

# **GOLFING IN THE ERA OF SOCIAL DISTANCING**

Golfers enthusiastically look forward to the day when their favorite courses reopen to players each year. That anticipation was even greater in 2020, when social distancing measures forced many courses to stay closed even as the weather warmed up. Thankfully for golfers, golf courses were among the first businesses given the green light to reopen as governments began to lift restrictions.

Colfing in the era of social distancing may not be quite the same as it was prior to the outbreak of COVID-19, but golfers can still have fun as they hit the links. That's especially true when they take steps to understand just what it means to golf while social distancing prior to teeing off.

Assess your personal health before going to the golf course. Golf attracts athletes from all age groups, including some that are more vulnerable to COVID-19 than others. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, age is a risk factor for COVID-19, as older adults are more vulnerable to severe illness if they are infected with the virus than younger adults. Social distancing requires a collective effort on the part of everyone to keep vulnerable people safe, and golfers are no exception. Golfers young and old who are under the weather or experiencing even mild symptoms of COVID-19 should avoid golf courses until they feel better. In addition, young golfers can choose tee times when they're less likely to come into contact with older golfers. Early morning tee times tend to be popular among older golfers, but speak with staff at the course to see if they have rules in place to safeguard older golfers. If they do, respect those rules. If they don't, work with staff to choose a tee time when you're less likely to be around older golfers.

Disinfect clubs before or after playing. Disinfecting clubs and other equipment before and after playing is a simple measure that can reduce golfers' risk of getting the virus or spreading it if they have it but are asymptomatic. Simply wipe down clubs and other equipment with disinfectant or an alcohol-based cleanser that is at least 60 percent alcohol. If playing with a friend, resist the urge to share clubs, no matter how tempting it may be to take your playing partner's new driver for a spin on the first hole.

Refuse valet service. Many courses have temporarily stopped offering valet services to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Golfers who visit a club that is not taking such precautions can opt to refuse the service. Doing so decreases the risk of getting or spreading the virus by limiting the number of people with whom you come into direct contact.

Pack supplies. Contact the course in advance to determine if the dining room is open and if the course is providing hand sanitizer at each tee. At-risk golfers may want to skip dining at the course after their round is over, opting to pack their own lunch or eat when they arrive home after playing. If the course is not offering hand sanitizer at each hole, pack your own as an extra precaution.

Golfing in the era of social distancing may be different, but there's no reason golfers cannot still enjoy a summer on the links
