

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

As COVID-19 case rates decrease and more Albertans get vaccinated, our province is starting to see signs of getting back to normal. To support our entry into a post-COVID world, Alberta's government recently launched the Jobs Now program. Jobs Now

is the largest jobs-training initiative in the history of our province – a \$370 million program that will get 22,000 Albertans back to work.

The Jobs Now program will help employers offset the costs of creating jobs and training new employees while giving unemployed or underemployed Albertans the opportunity to find a job or receive training

that improves their skills. Our United Conservative government is launching this critical job-creation program in part with \$185 million in funding through federal transfers from the Workforce Development Agreement.

As part of the Jobs Now program, employers can apply for a grant equal to 25 per cent of a new hire's salary up to \$25,000 per em-

ployee. Employers hiring a person with disabilities can apply for a grant equal to 37.5 per cent of the new hire's salary up to \$37,500 per employee. The program is open to all businesses in the private and not-for-profit sectors regardless of size and can be used to pay wages or to teach new and valuable skills.

Ken Kobly, president and CEO of the Alberta Chambers of Commerce, recently said the Jobs Now program reflects what business owners have been asking for, adding the availability of industry-specific skills is a top barrier for employers trying to recruit talent. If the Jobs Now program is as successful as we're anticipating it will be, then our government will consider extending the program into the new fiscal year.



WE ARE FINALLY HERE

After 14 grueling months, Alberta's government has announced the Open for Summer plan – a three-stage plan that lays the path to lifting all pandemic restrictions by summer. Based on our plan, Albertans will get back to their normal lives faster than anyone else in Canada.

First and foremost, I want to thank you – the people – for all you have done to protect yourselves and each other from this pandemic. You aren't just helping us slow down the third wave of the virus. You're helping us crush it. Cases are down sharply from peaks in May. Hospitalization and ICU numbers are stabilizing. And the R-value, which tracks how fast the virus is spreading, has fallen from 1.13 when we announced the last series of restrictions to 0.67 now.

So far, over 2.6 million Albertans have received their vaccine. That number climbs higher each and every day. As of today, more than 58 per cent of all Albertans over the age of 12 have had their first dose. With this in mind, here's a look at the three stages we have to go through to get to the best summer ever.

By the time you read this, Stage 1 will likely be in effect. Stage one occurs two weeks after 50 per cent of Albertans age 12 and over have had at least one dose of vaccine and hospitalizations drop below 800. As part of Stage 1, capacity restrictions will loosen for things like worship services, retail and outdoor patio dining. Distancing and masking requirements will remain in effect.

Stage 2 occurs two weeks after 60 per cent of Albertans age 12 and over have had at least one dose of vaccine and hospitalizations drop below 500. We are anticipating this will happen around mid-June. At this point, capacity limits will go up again for worship services, retail and outdoor patio dining. We will also see a return to indoor dining, and increases for outdoor social gatherings, weddings and funerals. We will see gyms open their doors, as well as movie theatres, casinos, museums, art galleries and libraries.

Stage 3 occurs when we reach the 70 per cent vaccination threshold. We are anticipating this will happen around early July. This is the day we are all looking forward to. On this day, all public health restrictions will be lifted.

It is disappointing to know that the NDP want restrictions to last until the fall of 2021. The science simply does not support their view.

As Lorne Gunter, columnist for the Edmonton Sun, said, Premier Jason Kenney's bold reopening plan for Alberta is based on science, not fear.

I am ready for the best summer ever and I hope you are too. I urge you to read more about our Open for Summer plan at Alberta.ca/opensummer. If all goes according to plan, this won't just be a reopening, but a grand reopening for our province.

SELF-EMPLOYED WORKERS WHO REPAID THE CERB TO BE REIMBURSED

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that starting on May 27, 2021, self-employed workers who meet the remission order criteria and who had voluntarily repaid all or part of the CERB to the CRA or Service Canada can request a reimbursement of their payments only from the CRA. These workers can do so by completing the CRA form at: T180 CERB reimbursement application for self-employed individuals - Canada.ca and submitting it to the CRA electronically or by mail.

The CRA will begin processing applications after June 15, 2021. Eligible Canadians who repaid the CERB can expect reimbursements within approximately 90 days of submitting their applications to the CRA.

Self-employed workers whose net self-employment income was less than \$5,000 and who applied for the CERB


will not be required to repay the CERB, as long as:

- They have filed their 2019- and 2020-income tax returns by December 31, 2022.
 - Their gross self-em-

ployment income was \$5,000 or more in 2019 or in the 12 months prior to their initial application; and

• They met all other CERB eligibility criteria.

The CRA will review the 2019and 2020-income tax returns of workers in this situation to verify that these conditions are met

FEWER THAN ONE-IN-FIVE ALBERTANS SUPPORT DRAFT CURRICULUM

Just 17 per cent of Albertans agree that the recently released draft K-6 curriculum will provide students with the knowledge and skills they will need for success, according to a new Environics poll conducted

for the Alberta Teachers' Association. That's compared with 53 per cent who disagree, including 34 per cent who strongly disagree, that the drafts will fulfill the government's stated objective.

"Parents and the public have a clear understanding that this draft curriculum is not appropriate for use with students. That is why we are calling for the government to halt implementation and conduct a full, independent review." –ATA president Jason Schilling

The poll also shows that the unpopular curriculum has led to record low levels of approval for how the government is handling K-12 education. In all, 60 per cent of Albertans disapprove of the government's performance on schooling, including 38 per cent who strongly disapprove. Just 34 per cent approve—which is the lowest approval rating in the past decade.

"Albertans are saying to us that the curriculum is poorly done, and it is inappropriate for students. They also recognize that the problem was largely created because teachers were left out of the planning.

I know government of-

ficials will say 100 teachers were included last fall, but until they produce an unfiltered report on those sessions and release the teachers from their gag order, I have no reason to believe that those teachers were meaningfully engaged or that their feedback was even used." –ATA president Jason Schilling

Environics Research surveyed 900 adult Albertans by telephone between April 19 and May 1, 2021. The sample results in a margin of error of ±3.3 per cent, 19 times out of 20.

COVID-19 HOSPITALIZATIONS DROP BELOW 500

The province has reached another milestone, with the number of people hospitalized due to COVID-19 dropping to only 478.

If this trend continues, Stage 2 easing of restrictions could start on June 10, given than 60 per cent of Albertans are now vaccinated. Alberta Health will continue to closely monitor hospitalization trends over the next two weeks.

"Fewer people in hospital shows Albertans are responding to our call for vaccinations, and is yet another welcome sign that we are on the right track. Health officials will continue to monitor this trend closely in the weeks ahead as we move towards reopening the province." - Tyler Shandro, Health Minister

Alberta's government is re-

sponding to the COVID-19 pandemic by protecting lives and livelihoods with precise measures to bend the curve, sustain small businesses, and protect Alberta's health care system.

Stage 2 of the Open for Summer Plan:

- Outdoor social gatherings increase to 20 people, with distancing.
- Wedding ceremonies may occur with up to 20 attendees. Receptions are permitted outdoors only.
- Funeral ceremonies remain unchanged with up to 20 people permitted, not including facility staff, funeral clergy or organizers not considered guests. Receptions are permitted outdoors only.
- Restaurants may seat tables with up to six people, indoors or outdoors.
- Dining parties are no longer restricted to households only.

- Physical distancing and other restrictions still apply.
- Retail capacity increases to one-third of fire code occupancy (must maintain ability to distance).
- Capacity for places of worship increases to one-third of fire code occupancy.
- Gyms and other indoor fitness open for solo and dropin activities with three-metre distancing between participants and fitness classes may resume with three-metre distancing.
- Indoor settings may open with up to one-third of fire code occupancy, including indoor recreation centres. This includes arenas, cinemas, theatres, museums, art galleries and libraries.
- Indoor and outdoor youth and adult sports resume with no restrictions.
- Youth activities, such as day camps and play centres, may resume, with restrictions.

- Personal and wellness services can resume walk-in services.
- Post-secondary institutions can resume in-person learning.
- The work-from-home order is lifted but still recommended.
- Outdoor fixed seating facilities (e.g., grandstands) can open with one-third seated capacity.
- Public outdoor gatherings increase to 150 people (e.g. concerts/festivals), with restrictions.
- Distancing and masking requirements remain in effect.

Indoor masking and distancing requirements will remain in place throughout this stepped approach and some degree of restrictions will still apply to all activities within each step.



EXTENDING RELIEF FOR ALBERTA BUSINESSES

Application intake for the spring 2021 payment from Alberta's small business grant has been extended to June 30.

In April, Alberta's government reopened the Small and Medium Enterprise Relaunch Grant program for a new payment to businesses affected by the April 2021 public health orders. Extending the application intake enables organizations subsequently affected by the May 2021 health orders to apply for this additional COVID relief funding. The program budget remains at \$350 million.

The Small and Medium Enterprise Relaunch Grant (SMERG) offers financial assistance to Alberta businesses, cooperatives and non-profit organizations with fewer than 500 employees that have faced restrictions or closures due to COVID-related public health orders, and have experienced revenue losses of at least 30 per cent.

Eligible organizations will receive a payment of up to \$10,000, which follows the previous intake that provided up to \$20,000. Funds can be used as business owners see fit.

Alberta's government is responding to the COVID-19 pandemic by protecting lives and livelihoods with precise measures to bend the curve, sustain small businesses and protect Alberta's health-care system.

Quick facts

- Application intake for the Small and Medium Enterprise Relaunch Grant Spring 2021 Payment opened April 23.
- Organizations that did not apply under the previous run of SMERG will not be able to apply for the prior payments only the new \$10,000 payment.
- Organizations may only apply to the current SMERG program once.
- Money received under SMERG does not need to be repaid.

- Small and medium enterprises are an important part of Alberta's economy, accounting for more than 99 per cent of all businesses and nearly 55 per cent of all employment.
- Alberta's government has provided billions of dollars in supports to job creators since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, including:
- Deferring corporate income tax collection for six months, providing \$1.5 billion in relief.
- Deferring education property taxes and freezing the rate at 2019 levels.
- Deferring WCB premiums and paying 50 per cent of them for small and medium businesses, saving them \$350 million.
- Providing a 90-day deferral for utility payments last spring.
- Banning commercial evictions, rent increases and late fees for commercial tenants.
- Additional supports for businesses are available through the federal government.






