TAKING A STAND AGAINST HATE CRIMES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is targeting hate-motivated crimes and racism with new law enforcement resources and a fresh approach to working with affected communities to ensure Albertans of racialized backgrounds are protected and heard.

A new community liaison on hate crimes will connect directly with ethnic and religious groups and sexual minority communities most targeted by hate-motivated crimes. Working with these groups, the liaison will provide government with a range of perspectives and expertise on how we can tackle hate-motivated crimes and incidents across the province. Alberta will also set up a provincial Hate Crimes Co-

provincial Hate Crimes Coordination Unit. This unit will work with law enforcement to improve and harmonize hate crime mitigation efforts across the province and facilitate training opportunities, intelligence gathering and investigative supports. This includes strengthening the approach to successfully prosecuting individuals charged with hate-motivated crimes.

"Hate-motivated crimes and racism are unacceptable - full stop. We're taking action to help support and empower the communities and groups most affected by this deplorable behaviour. In light of the recent attacks on Canadians simply because of their chosen faith, I hope the new community liaison and Hate Crimes Coordination Unit show Albertans our province is fully committed to protecting those being targeted." - Kaycee Madu, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

"Alberta's government is committed to the safety and security of all communities that have been impacted by these despicable hate-motivated crimes. From Black Muslim women in Edmonton and Calgary attacked for wearing hijab to the recent rise in anti-Semitism and anti-Asian hate, these incidents have had a significant impact on Albertans from diverse backgrounds. The new community liaison and Hate Crimes Coordination Unit is a critical step in addressing racism in our province and is the result of strong government leadership and community advocacy." - Leela Sharon Aheer, Minister of Culture, Multiculturalism and Status of Women

Both the new liaison position and coordination unit are in the early stages of development. More details will be shared in the coming weeks.



A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: EQUALIZATION

For decades, Albertans have watched as their hardearned tax dollars were seized by Ottawa and redistributed among other provinces under a system of Equalization that has siphoned wealth from our job creators and our provincial treasury. In 2019, Albertans elected a United Conservative government to put an end to the Trudeau-Notley alliance and fight for a fair deal for Alberta. Over the course of the government's mandate legislation the Alberta Parole Board has replaced a federally con-trolled parole board. Once the details of an agreement are finished Alberta, not Ottawa, will appoint a Chief Firearms Officer and Albertans will soon have the opportunity to start addressing the issue of equalization.

Canada's system of Equalization is fundamentally unfair to Alberta, pulling billions of dollars out of our province – even during times of economic recession - and funneling that money into provinces with strong, even booming economies. This includes provinces run by anti-oil politicians who benefit from Alberta's generosity while attacking our economic interests and implementing policies detrimental to our province and our people.

This is why Premier Jason Kenney recently introduced a motion in the Alberta Legislature seeking approval to hold a referendum on whether Albertans think the principle of making Equalization payments should be removed from Canada's Constitution. The motion was debated and passed and areferendum will be held along with the municipal and Senate elections this upcoming fall.

The question facing Albertans in the proposed referendum will be: should section 36(2) of the Constitution Act, 1982–Parliament and the government of Canada's commitment to the principle of making Equalization payments–be removed from the constitution?

If the majority of responses support removing equalization payments, the Alberta government will move forward with pursuing renewed negotiations with the federal government to get a fairer deal for Albertans. In order to make a change to the Constitution, the proposed change must be approved by the federal House of Commons and Senate, and by the legislative assemblies of at least seven provinces, representing at least 50 per

cent of the population of all provinces.

Quebec's ability to monopolize the national spotlight and command attention from Ottawa after they held contentious referendums in 1980 and 1995 has demonstrated what can be achieved when people, not politicians, are given the power to decide their future. A referendum on Equalization will be an opportunity for Albertans to be heard and to make a strong statement to Ottawa that Equalization does not work for Alberta.

Albertans are proud of the role our province has played within confederation. With an energy industry that forms the bedrock of our national economy and a competitive business environment unmatched by any other province, we have served as our county's economic engine and a beacon of hope for ambitious Canadians from every region.

Between 2014 and 2019, Albertans made a net contribution of more than \$100 billion to the federal government through transfers to the rest of Canada. Over the past 25 years, Albertans contributed more than \$400 billion. This is hundreds of billions of dollars from Albertans that is filling the treasuries of hostile governments instead of supporting healthcare, education and families right here in Alberta.

Enough is enough. Albertans are demanding a fair deal in confederation and that is what we will secure with a referendum on Equalization.

WAR AMPS KEY TAG SERVICE CELEBRATES 75 YEARS

The War Amps begins its 2021 key tag mailing to Spruce Grove residents this week with the theme "You Are a Part of What We Do," marking the 75th anniversary of the Association's Key Tag Service and paying tribute to the public for helping make it a success.

In the letter accompanying the key tags, parents Tracie and Jeremy describe how The War Amps has supported their family, from the day their daughter, Michaela Blakslee, was born missing part of her left arm, as well as some fingers and toes.

As a member of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program, Michaela receives financial assistance for artificial limbs and devices and also attends regional seminars where Champs and their parents learn about the latest in artificial limbs, dealing with teasing and staring, and parenting an amputee child.

Michaela's artificial arms,

which she calls her "helper hands", include one for everyday use and another that she uses for activities like bike riding. "Without the funding from The War Amps, it would be very difficult for us to get her any prosthetics at all," says Tracie and Jeremy. "Whatever isn't covered through our workplace insurance and the government, The War Amps steps in so she has these devices to help her through daily life."

The Key Tag Service was launched in 1946 so that re-

turning war amputee veterans could not only work for competitive wages, but also provide a service to Canadians that would generate funds for the Association's many programs. The Key Tag Service continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys to their owners.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox in Canada, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants and its programs are possible through public support of the Key Tag and Address Label Service.

ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER

Golfers rejoice! Those dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.

With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjustable driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have an en-

tirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. Engineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into the air. Adjustable drivers can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory. According to data from

golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put adjustments into their own hands, it is still advisable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.



UNDERSTANDING ELDER ABUSE

June 15 is World Elder Abuse Awareness Dav. During this time, we are asked to consider the older people in our lives, and recognize that some may be experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, elder abuse.

Elder abuse is violence, mistreatment, or neglect towards older adults. The abuse often comes from individuals in situations of power or trust. It can come from close company, such

as spouses, children, other family members, caregivers, or other service providers. It can also come from more removed individuals. The abuse can occur in either private residences or outside the home.

Common signs of elder abuse can include:

- Confusion
- Depression or anxiety
- Unexplained injuries
- Changes in hygiene
- Seeming fearful around certain people


• Fear or worry when talking about money

If you suspect that an elderly person is at risk from a neglectful or overwhelmed caregiver, or being preyed upon financially, it's important to speak up. It is best to ask questions away from the place where you suspect the abuse is happening. The person may be afraid to speak up if there is a chance of being overheard by the abuser or someone who will relay the information.

If you or someone you know is being abused and you don't know how to help, please call 2-1-1. You'll receive confidential, prompt aid and a referral to resources to help you deal with an abusive situation. If you believe someone is in immediate danger, do not hesitate to contact 9-1-1.

Everyone deserves to live in safety, and to be treated with dignity and respect. These guidelines can help you recognize the warning signs of elder abuse, understand what the risk factors are, and learn how to prevent and report the problem.
