Parkland RCMP Search For Missing Boater At Wabamun Lake

Parkland RCMP attended and a boat search on the water was conducted by fire services, and ground searches by Parkland RCMP until conditions would not allow the search to continue.

On July 24, 2021, at approximately 10 a.m., Parkland RCMP, along with the assistance of the Central Alberta Recovery Dive Society (CARDS) team, resumed searching with boat patrols that included CARDS' sonar technology and a robotic underwater vehicle. The search continued until approximately 8 p.m.; however, the swimmer was not located.

Today, July 25, 2021, at approximately 9:30 a.m., Parkland RCMP, along with CARDS' assistance and the assistance of Alberta Conservation officers, resumed the search of Wabamun Lake for the missing swimmer. Search efforts are ongoing.

Parkland RCMP are asking anyone on Wabamun Lake in the area of the search to remain clear to allow room to work.

Parkland RCMP are also asking anyone who is on Wabamun Lake for recreational purposes to keep an eye out for signs of the missing swimmer. If anyone believes they have seen anything, please contact Parkland RCMP at 825-220-2000. 

SUPPORT FOR FARMERS FACING

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that

the Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has announced support and resources for producers in areas affected by extreme weather. The early designation of the Livestock Tax Deferral provision for prescribed drought regions will allow beef producers who are forced to sell a significant amount of their breeding herd due to drought conditions to offset the resulting revenues with the costs to replace the herd.

Also announced was federal support to all Prairie provinces for immediate bilateral adjustments to the cost-shared AgriInsurance program to make drought-damaged crops available for feed.

AgriRecovery assessments are underway which could include direct assistance to producers for the added cost of livestock feed, transportation and water infrastructure.

Provinces affected by drought can invoke the late participation provision of AgriStability as well as apply for interim payments.



July 27, 2021 CANADA CHILD BENEFIT

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that the maximum annual Canada Child Benefit will once again be increased to keep up with the rising cost of living. For the 2021–2022 benefit year, the maximum annual benefit will be \$6,833 per child under age 6 and \$5,765 per child aged 6 through 17.

Additionally, in 2021, in recognition that many families are struggling with a wide range of expenses during the COVID-19 pandemic, families entitled to the CCB are receiving additional temporary support of up to \$1,200 for each child under the age of 6 through the CCB.

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise on September 7, 2021, provided that the domestic epidemiologic situation remains favourable, our borders will open to any fully vaccinated travellers who have completed the full course of vaccination with a Government of Canada-accepted vaccine at least 14 days prior to entering Canada and who meet specific entry requirements.

Subject to limited exceptions, all travellers must use ArriveCAN (app or web portal) to submit their travel information. If they are eligible to enter Canada and meet specific criteria, fully vaccinated travellers

•Equalization payments – Should the principle of making equalization payments be removed from the Constitution?

•Daylight saving time – Should Alberta end the practice of changing our clocks twice a year?

Equalization

Over the last 25 years, Albertans have contributed more than \$400 billion more to the nation in tax dollars than they have received in federal spending. Albertans make an immense contribution to equalization through federal tax contributions, which are transferred by the federal government to other provinces for programs and services. The current program has many issues, including a formula that requires it to grow automatically with Canada's economy, even if contributing provinces like Alberta are experiencing immense economic challenges. Daylight saving time Across Canada and the United States, more governments are bringing forward legislation to move to permanent daylight saving time, also known as summer hours. In 2019, Service Alberta asked Albertans if they thought we should make a similar shift. More than 141,000 Albertans responded, of which 91 per cent were in favour of year-round summer hours.

Senate elections

Along with the municipal elections and the two referendum questions this fall, Albertans will elect three Senate nominees – one for each of the two current vacancies and one in case of early retire-

The Senate nominee election enhances democracy in the province by allowing Albertans to choose the individuals who will best represent them in Parliament. Having representatives elected by Albertans would increase senators' accountability to Alberta voters to defend the province's interests.

Provincial police and pension

For the topics of creating an Alberta Police Service and Alberta Pension Plan, further analysis and work are underway before next steps are determined.

"Through the Fair Deal Panel, Albertans who are policed by the RCMP said that they want to see Alberta build its own provincial police service to improve policing in their communities. We are continuing to study what this could look like and how it could improve the safety and security of Albertans and their property, as part of making an informed decision on the next steps." Quick facts

• The equalization question will be: "Should Section 36(2) of the Constitution Act, 1982 – Parliament and the Government of Canada's commitment to the principle of making equalization payments – be removed from the Constitution?"

• Between 2014 and 2019 alone, Albertans made a net contribution of more than \$100 billion to the federal government through federal taxes that helped build critical infrastructure.

• Alberta has not received an equalization payment since the 1964-65 fiscal year.

• In March 2020, the Yukon stopped changing their clocks and adopted Pacific daylight time year-round.





HOW TO HELP KIDS GET INTO GOLF

Golf is a game of skill that can take years, if not decades, to master. Many golfers find their time on the golf course both rewarding and relaxing, even on those days when the fairways seem impossible to find.

Though many players nev-er swing a golf club until they reach adulthood, it's never too early to hit the links. Some of the world's most accomplished golfers, including four-time Masters champion Tiger Woods, began plaving as toddlers, and many feel that getting an early start can lead to a more successful game down the road.

Purchase the correct equipment. Even the best golfers are bound to struggle when using the wrong equipment. While it might be unwise to invest in especially expensive equipment for youngsters likely to grow out of it in a few months' time, deals can be found on used kids' equipment. Used kids' equipment is typically subjected to less wear and tear than used

equipment for adults, as kids tend to play less often and fewer holes than adults when they do play. But make sure to find correctly sized equipment that kids feel comfortable using.

Play some holes. Instructors may teach kids the differences between the types of clubs and how to swing and putt. But golf is most fun when players are out on the links going from hole to hole. Instruction is important, but don't forget to play a few holes with your child each week as well.

INVESTMENTS IN LOCAL HOSPITAL TO IMPROVE HEALTHCARE

More than \$650,000 will be spent on Emergency Department (ED) triage desk renovations at the Drayton Valley Hospital and Care Centre thanks to the Alberta government's Rural Health Facilities Revitalization Program (RHFRP).

The renovations will include a complete redesign and renovation of the ED triage area to improve operational efficiency and patient safety. Work on the ED renovations is expected to begin in the coming years and more detailed timelines will be shared once the project is underway.

"All Albertans, no matter where they live, deserve and need access to our world-class health system, and they need it close to where they live," says Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health. A further \$3.8 million of government funding has recently supported other upgrades at the local hospital and care centre, including repairs to the roof, boilers, sidewalk, elevator and updates to the nurse call system.

ensure our patients receive quality care in the best environments," says Dr. Verna Yiu, President and CEO of AHS. "So it is vital we keep our health care infrastructure current and up to date." 
