

STYROFOAM NOW ACCEPTED AT ECO STATION IN LEDUC

Service enhancement tested in one-year pilot project

Submitted by City of Leduc

TUESDAY, JULY 6 - As part of a one-year pilot project, the Eco Station in Leduc will now accept white block Styrofoam for recycling.

This service enhancement will allow residents to drop

off limited quantities of Styrofoam at the Eco Station for free during regular hours of operation. A mobile processing unit that uses new technology will collect the Styrofoam from the Eco Station one or two times per month. The Eco Station in Leduc is a shared facility between the City of Leduc, Leduc County and the City of Beaumont. In total, the pilot project is estimated to cost roughly \$12,000 per year.

What is accepted and how it works:

White block Styrofoam, often used to package electronics, appliances and furniture.

Styrofoam must be clean and all contaminants (i.e., tape and staples) must be removed.

The accepted Styrofoam will be compressed into large bricks and shipped to recyclers to form plastic pellets used to make new items (i.e., moldings for cabinetry, tiles and frames).

What is not accepted:

Coloured or dirty Styrofoam.

Plates, cups, take out containers and packaging materials (i.e., peanuts/popcorn).

These items should still be disposed of in the black waste cart.

Additionally, Styrofoam will not be collected in the blue recycling bag through curbside pickup. These blue recycling bags go a facility that cannot recycle Styrofoam.

RESIDENTS PLEASED WITH QUALITY OF LIFE IN LEDUC

Now available: 2021 Citizen
Satisfaction Survey and 2022
Budget Planning Survey results

MONDAY, JUNE 28 - Results from the 2021 Citizen Satisfaction Survey were presented to City Council on Monday, June 28, showing that 95 per cent of residents are pleased with the quality of life in Leduc and consider maintaining infrastructure and managing growth to be the top civic priorities in 2021.

Results of the 2022 Budget Planning Survey were also presented and indicate that 71 per cent of respondents rated perceived value received for taxes paid as good, very good or excellent.

"The City of Leduc is pleased to offer a variety of services and amenities to residents and business owners, and we are proud that citizens continue to enjoy a high quality of life in our community despite COVID-19 and the challenges it has presented," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "The people who live and work in Leduc have demonstrated incredible resilience and community spirit."

In total, 401 participants completed the Citizen Satisfaction Survey from March 2 30, and 485 participants took part in the annual Budget Planning Survey from May 1 31.

Survey Result Highlights

• That the most significant factors contributing to a high quality of life in the community are its size, parks and trail network, services and community spirit. These top-rated services were also identified as providing the highest value for tax dollar.

- The majority of respondents say Leduc is on the right track, and recommend keeping budgets the same next year.
- 37 per cent of citizens reported that need access to community resources, help coping with challenges and/or financial supports. This focus area received the most support for a budget increase next year.

Thank you to all who participated in these surveys. Your feedback is valuable and will help the City of Leduc continue to grow our community, and provide the programs and services that are important to you.

LEDUC'S OPEN FOR SUMMER IMPORTANCE OF WATER SAFETY

TUESDAY, JULY 21, 2021 - As the City of Leduc progresses under the Government of Alberta's Stage 3 Open for Summer, essential water safety programming is ramping up to support Leduc and area residents to ensure everyone has a fun and safe summer.

"We see that with the absence of swim programs for our patrons, it may have a challenging effect on their confidence when getting back into the pool, especially with young children," says Jackie Kamlah, director of Recreation Services with the City of Leduc. "Children may be more nervous than usual and parents might notice their child's skills have regressed. Please know that all of these ac-

tions and feelings are normal and our swim instructors are ready to provide a fun and safe learning environment for everyone."

Leduc's aquatic programming team has prepared our Red Cross Water Safety instructors with training, resources and industry updates to offer a wide range of programming from parented swimming lessons teaching caregivers strategies on how to effectively supervise children in, on, and around the water to lifeguarding skills for youth and adults.

These instructors, trained through the Red Cross Swim program, will focus on three learning pillars to support:

• Skills and water safety – to help reduce the number of prevent-

able incidents by teaching self-rescue skills and safe behaviour for injury prevention

- Fitness activities designed to build endurance and promote individual success while encouraging lifelong physical activity as part of a healthy lifestyle
- Swimming participants learn the five main swimming strokes (front crawl, back crawl, elementary back stroke, breast stroke, and sidestroke) and develop effective techniques using logical progressions and proven teaching strategies

"Swim lessons are just one of several important layers of protection needed to help prevent emergency situations that may lead to a tragic result," says Kamlah. "We recommend that non-swimmers and young children up to the age of 12 have constant supervision when around water, where infants and toddlers never be more than an arm's length away; and youth 12 to 17-years-old should employ the buddy system."

Water safety practices are encouraged for any water activities, whether indoors at the Leduc Recreation Centre, or outdoors whether enjoying an Alberta lake or the Alexandra Outdoor Pool.

AB RCMP ADVISE OF CONCERNING TREND OF EXTORTION USING SOCIAL MEDIA

Edmonton-Alberta RCMP have received a number of reports throughout central and southern Alberta where social media platforms were used in an effort to extort money from individuals.

In a number of cases, the victims received friend requests from what has been typically a female, or other messages on Facebook, Snapchat, Instagram and/or on a

dating application, that subsequently moved to direct messaging on various platforms. The victims involved have sent a nude image(s) and the suspect(s) subsequently made demands that the victim send them money or their image(s) will be sent out to all of their contacts, friends and/or family.

It is common for offenders to follow a victim's friends and family on social media platforms as a way to demonstrate they can follow through on

threats to share the image(s) if the victim does not comply.

Beware that offenders are utilizing filters available on certain apps that allow them to appear younger than they are on images and also on live streams.

Prevention Tips:

- Do not accept friend from individuals who are unknown to you
- Do not send nude images
- Immediately stop all communication if someone is demanding

money

- Do not comply with the threat and report to your local police
- Keep the correspondence





OLD FIRE HALL (LEDUC) TO BE DEMOLISHED IN PREPARATION FOR FUTURE AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Leduc, AB – Leduc Regional Housing Foundation (LRHF) announced today that the Old Fire Hall located at 4906 – 47 Street in Leduc, Alberta will be demolished, during the month of July, in preparation for future affordable housing units to be built on the site.

Built in 1955, the Old Fire Hall replaced Leduc's first municipal building, a combination town hall and fire hall, which was built in 1907. The first municipal building was originally located along Main Street and then relocated in 1910 to the north side of the current Bank of Montreal.

In July of 1954, Town Council moved forward with plans to build two separate municipal buildings - a new town hall and a separate fire hall. Architecturally designed by Patrick Campbell Hope & Associates, the tender for construction of the Old Fire Hall was awarded to the Brunsch Bros. of Leduc, on March 24, 1955. The construction of the Old Fire Hall was completed in October of 1955 at a cost of \$24,000.

While the Old Fire Hall was used primarily by Leduc Fire Services from 1955 – 2004, the Leduc Public Library had temporarily shared the space from 1963 – 1973. Since 2004, it has been utilized as commercial space by local businesses.


