
JOKE of the week

of the many poems she has memorized.


From Memory which includes 322 handwritten poems. The book is a small part of her legacy to encourage those along the way that one day, "I will meet them all in heaven".



Council has approved a request to close a portion of 35 Street on August 28, 2021 from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. for a car show and motorcycle show and shine event. The event, hosted by Ralcomm and Balon Corporation in support of the Whitecourt Cancer and Wellness Society, will include food vendors and door prizes.

The Town of Whitecourt is preparing for the 2022 budget, and has set timelines for the months of September, October and November. • The 2022 Budget Public Input Session will be held September 27, 2021 at 7:00 p.m.

• Special Meetings of Council are scheduled for September 28, 2021 and October 14, 2021 at 5:00 p.m.

Whitecourt has been selected as a community host as part of the 2021 Inventures Outbound Event. The 3-day conference is hosted by Alberta Innovates and is designed to provide learning and networking opportunities for businesses, community leaders, economic developers and organizations on a variety of topics. The event will be



live-streamed at the Whitecourt Golf & Country Club September 22-24, 2021.

Ownership of the Whitecourt Wolverines, as announced on July 27, 2021, has transferred to Craig Kibblewhite and Jason Fischer. With the change in ownership, Council has approved entering into new agreements with the new owners pertaining to the Wolverine Dressing Room Renovation Agreement and Arena Use Agreement.

Page 8 CommunityVOICE September 7, 2021 ROAD CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS ARE PROGRESSING THROUGHOUT TOWN

Crews have been out in force over the last couple of weeks, and local road and infrastructure construction projects are continuing to progress.

With the 2021/2022 school year starting this week, higher traffic volumes throughout the community are expected. Community members should be aware that there may be traffic delays due to construction, in particular along Dahl Drive, and are encouraged to use alternate routes when possible.

Dahl Drive Improvement Program The outside lanes continue to be closed along Dahl Drive, and we ask that motorists continue to drive with caution in the area. This is the biggest road construction project undertaken in our community this year, and we realize this project has had an impact on our residents. The Town of Whitecourt appreciates your understanding and patience as we work to complete this project.

• Preparation of gravel base

and lane widening underneath the new curb is now complete, and new catch basins have been installed.

• Following concrete curbs pouring, milling of the existing pavement surface and overlay of new asphalt will commence. Line painting and traffic lights re-signaling are scheduled as the last phase of the project.

The Town was awarded \$1,212,940 through the Municipal Stimulus Program (MSP) to complete improvements to Dahl Drive. The project will improve the road structure, increasing its strength and longevity; and will also address drainage and erosion control issues, which will reduce maintenance and repair costs in the long term, and make the road safer in wet and icy conditions. 2021 Street Improvement Program

As part of the 2021 Street Improvement Program, Knelsen Sand and Gravel has been hard at work at various locations around town. Major paving locations for the project include: 1. 47 Street, from Graham Road to 25m north of Harold's Hollow 2. Noyes Crescent (cul de sac)3. Atkinson Crescent

4. 39 Street (entrance to Rivervalley Estates)

5. Baxter Crescent and Feero Drive

6. 47 Street, from Sunset Boulevard to 135m north of Sunset Boulevard

7. 42 Avenue, from Highway 43 to Kepler Street

8. Blueberry Drive, from Park Drive to end

9. 33 Street and Caxton Street Asphalt milling is complete in all major paving areas, and concrete removals are underway. Crews may also be working at various other locations for smaller asphalt and concrete patching; please use caution in construction areas and around workers. Concrete removals are scheduled for completion on September 7 and concrete forming and pouring shall begin on September 8, weather permitting.

Residents should be aware that there may be travel delays in the areas listed above, and are encouraged to use alternate routes when possible. Roads will remain open to traffic, and motorists are asked to obey all posted speed limits, and parking restrictions.

Further information on paving will be provided to the public as the schedule becomes available.

Blue Ridge Road As part of a new initiative to get the most out of roadworks projects, millings from both the Dahl Drive Improvement Program and the 2021 Street Improvement Program will be repurposed to improve the road surface of Blue Ridge Road. Application of millings on gravel roads creates a smoother, more compact driving surface and helps to reduce dust. Over 1,000 tonnes of millings from the Street Improvement Program have been applied to the roadway to date, and additional millings from Dahl Drive are scheduled to be placed in late September. Blue Ridge Road will remain open to traffic during this time, though the public is asked to use caution when travelling through the area.


RCMP HISTORICAL HOMICIDE UNIT SEEK PUBLIC ASSISTANCE REGARDING THE DISAPPEARANCE OF STEPHANIE STEWART

Hinton, Alta. – Today marks 15-years since the disappearance of Stephanie Stewart, while working at a wildfire lookout tower, where she was monitoring for potential wildfires near Hinton, Alta. When she didn't respond to a morning radio check-in on Aug. 26, 2006, coworkers contacted police to report her missing. Initially first responders thought Stephanie may have been a victim of a predatory animal attack. A conservation officer with Alberta Fish and Wildlife, also an expert in animal attacks, attended the scene and searched for some tell tale signs of an animal attack, such as animal hair, prints and scat. An animal attack was quickly

ruled out. Major Crime and Forensic Investigators examined the scene and determined Stephanie's disappearance was suspicious.

Alberta RCMP's Historical Homicide Unit (HHU) remains dedicated to this ongoing police investigation into Stephanie's disappearance. Alberta RCMP resources continue working in partnership with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry and civilian search and rescue teams in hopes of locating Stephanie and other missing persons. Investigators have nothing further to report at this time, however, RCMP believe there are people who know what happed to Stephanie and would like to speak with them.



ADD CURB APPEAL TO YOUR PROPERTY

Many people are familiar with the idea that a strong first impression can go a long way. While that idea is most often referenced in regard to personal interactions, it's also applicable to real estate.


Projects that improve curb appeal can be vast undertakings or simpler projects, and the following are a handful of projects to improve a home's curb appeal that run the gamut from simple to complex.

· Clean up the yard. Cleaning up the yard is among the simpler yet most effective projects to improve a home's curb appeal. When selling their homes, homeowners should clear the yard of any clutter, including kids' toys, grass clippings or items that might be scattered throughout the yard. A cluttered yard suggests homeowners do not care much about their home's appearance, and that may lead buyers to think that indifference extended to maintaining the home's interior as well. Many buyers will ignore properties without any external aesthetic appeal, but cleaning up the yard does not require much effort or expense on the part of sellers.

· Make the main entryway more inviting. Creating a more inviting entryway won't be as simple as cleaning up the yard, but it can help create a strong first impression without breaking the bank. To begin, remove plants and furniture from the front porch or area surrounding the doorway, as such items can create a cluttered feel. If the front door is old, replace it. Custom doors may be expensive, but they might add the wow factor buyers are looking for.

If a new door is beyond your means or just unnecessary, repaint the door, ideally in a color that complements the color of your home and the surrounding landscape.

· Address pavement problems. Paving problems are not necessarily an expensive fix, but the cost of repairing driveways and walkways can add up if it's been awhile since these areas were refurbished. Still, one of the first things buyers will notice when getting out of their cars is the ground they're walking on, so patch and repair or even replace driveways and walkways that have fallen into disrepair.

· Add or upgrade outdoor living spaces. Outdoor living spaces also can set a property apart from others on the market. A recent study from the National Association of Realtors found that buyers would not hesitate to pay asking price for homes with outdoor living spaces. When adding or upgrading outdoor living spaces, try to depersonalize the spaces as much as possible, as buyers want to picture themselves, and not the sellers, enjoying these areas. Include some comfortable furniture, adequate lighting and a dining area in your outdoor living space as well.

Curb appeal can add a lot to a home, while lack of such appeal can make a home difficult to sell. Homeowners who want to sell their properties for asking price or more should address curb appeal before putting their homes on the market.







Leaves cascading down from trees indicate the arrival of autumn. However, colorful and awe-inspiring autumn leaves can be a hazard if left to lie on the ground too long.

Fallen leaves form a dense insulator to protect trees' roots and prevent competing plants from growing. Decomposing leaves also provide nutrients for the tree. But wet leaves can be a safety hazard and leaves left on the lawn through the winter can pose a threat to the grass. These are just a couple of reasons why so much effort is placed on leaf clean-up in the fall. The following are some creative ways to recycle leaves that fall from your trees in the weeks to come.

• Mulch: Shredded leaves can make for a great amendment to fertilizer for garden beds and even the lawn. Leaves lying on the grass can be mulched into small pieces with a mulching mower so they don't choke the blades of grass. Leaves also can be broken down with a string trimmer, a leaf blower that has a vacuum function or a commercial shredder/chipper. Add the shredded leaves to a compost pile or use them to fill container plants before adding regular potting soil.

Insulation: Collect leaves to mound over delicate perennial plants and shrubs. The leaves will add more warmth to the soil and may help plants make it through harsh winters. Just remove the leaves slowly when spring arrives so that the soil underneath can get the sunlight and water it needs to thrive. Leave some leaves in the yard so that animals can use them as nesting material and line their dens for the winter.

• Stuffing: Create whimsical scarecrows as part of your autumn decoration scheme. Gather older clothes that you no longer use and stuff the sleeves of shirts and the legs of pants with leaves, which are less expensive and easier to come by than straw. Use a few pieces of straw around the neck and hand areas of the scarecrow for visual effect.

Tie off with twine and display your scarecrow.


• Bedding: Chicken owners can use fallen leaves as bedding in their chicken coops. Dry leaves also may create more comfortable and drier conditions for goats and other livestock. Goats may look to recently fallen leaves as a nutritious food source. Gather the leaves and let the goats munch before you further rake and compost the leaves.

· Decorations: Natu-


ral leaves can be used as decorations both inside and outside a home. String freshly fallen leaves together and wrap them grapevine around а wreath for a rustic door decoration. Leaves can be placed in clear vases and put on display for a cheap way to showcase some autumn color. Preserve favorite leaves with a lamination machine or by sealing them between heated sheets of waxed paper. Cut out the leaf shapes and use for hanging window decorations.

· Recreation: Leaves have

long been favorite toys for children, who eagerly await jumping into large piles of fallen leaves. Fill paper bags with leaves and draw a target on the front. Let kids test their skill aiming for the targets. Children can camouflage their clothing with leaves and masking tape and have a more intense session of "hide and seek."

In response to the upcoming federal election on September 20, 2021, the Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) has released its Federal Election Platform (attached). As RMA represents Alberta's rural municipalities, the platform includes recommendations in the following four key rural municipal priority areas:

Rural broadband

Disaster mitigation and recovery

Infrastructure

Drought recovery

RMA is requesting all Alberta Member of Parliament candidates to pledge action on RMA's recommendations in each category.

Rural Alberta continues to lag behind the province's towns and cities in access to broadband. As connectivity becomes increasingly important for economic development, maintaining local businesses, and participating in the digital economy, federal support of rural broadband is now more important than ever. RMA is calling on federal candidates to commit to ensuring that the funding already available under the Universal Broadband Fund (UBF) is allocated to rural areas in Alberta that truly need the support, rather than those which may be most profitable for internet service providers.

"The Universal Broadband Fund could be a game-changer for rural communities across Alberta and Canada. However, the federal government must ensure the funding goes to projects in areas that are most underserved. Pre-

vious federal broadband funding programs tended to focus on the 'low-hanging fruit' - projects in areas that already had decent connectivity and were more profitable for internet service providers, while the most isolated areas were left behind. Candidates for this year's election will have a chance to ensure this most recent round of funding is used to truly level the connectivity playing field between rural and urban communities." - Paul Mc-Lauchlin, RMA President

Natural disasters and extreme weather have become more severe in Alberta. When climate related disasters strike, local governments are the first to respond and their services and infrastructure are increasingly being affected by these events, with each region experiencing impacts differently. RMA is calling on federal candidates to continue to empower local leaders with the right tools to adapt to climate change and protect families and businesses from new weather extremes.

"The RMA appreciates that the Government of Canada provided \$1.4 billion over 12 years to top off the Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation Fund in Budget 2021. It is critical that this funding is not distributed strictly on a per capita basis, but that it considers high risk areas as well as communities that may lack the capacity to effectively implement mitigation strategies," McLauchlin said. "Candidates in this year's election will have an opportunity to ensure that this funding will be used to empower local leaders to protect their communities from climate change."

Rural municipalities manage approximately 75% of roads and 60% of bridges in Alberta. This critical infrastructure helps Alberta's and Canada's economy grow by providing the oil, gas, forestry, and agriculture industries with access to the natural resources that they depend on. As Alberta and Canada plan for post-COVID-19 recovery, RMA is calling for all federal candidates to recognize and support the important role that rural infrastructure plays in supporting Canada's economy and community growth.

McLauchlin said, "Proper investment in Alberta's rural municipal transportation networks benefits not only local communities, but also Alberta and Canada. Despite the outsized role that Alberta's rural municipal infrastructure plays in supporting Canada's economy, recent federal infrastructure programs treat rural infrastructure as an afterthought, with small portions of funding available for general rural support, and most funding reserved for projects only feasible in large urban centres. Candidates in this year's election have the chance to recognize rural infrastructure needs as unique by ensuring that future funding aligns with the capacity and geographic realities of rural areas rather than only tailoring programs to major projects in large cities."

The agriculture industry in the Prairies have been severely affected by drought conditions, sustained high temperatures, and wildfires. This has resulted in reduced yields for crop producers and a lack of feed for livestock producers. Agriculture is a vital industry in Alberta as it sustains many rural communities, and its products provide benefits across Canada. As extreme weather events are becoming more frequent in the Prairies, the RMA is calling on federal candidates to engage with the agricultural industry to create tools and resources that will help lessen the impact on these events in the future.

"Summer 2021 has been a challenge for farmers and agriculture producers across the Prairies due to severe drought conditions. To date, 31 rural municipalities across Alberta have declared agricultural disasters as the extreme weather has caused projected crop yields to drop by as much as 75% in some regions," said McLauchlin. "Agriculture is a vital industry in Alberta and across Canada, and it is important that we support farmers and producers during these challenging times. Candidates running in this year's election have the opportunity to show their support for farmers and producers by continuing to work together to create tools and resources that have the potential to lessen the impact of extreme weather events in the future."

RMA looks forward to engaging with federal election candidates on these priority issues.

AHS Postpones Scheduled Surgeries Due To COVID-19

• In the Edmonton Zone, postponements of scheduled surgeries and procedures will increase to up to 50 percent.

• Central Zone will be postponing up to 40 percent of endoscopy procedures and up to 30 per cent of scheduled surgeries.

• Calgary Zone and South Zone are postponing up to 30 percent of scheduled surgeries, endoscopy and outpatient visits.

AHS will maintain urgent and emergent procedures,

as well as prioritized cancer surgeries.

AHS is working to open and staff additional acute care and ICU beds across the province as quickly as possible.

Calgary Zone is opening five beds in the Pandemic Response Unit (PRU) located at South Health Campus to be used for day medicine patients, not patients with COVID-19. The day medicine spaces in SHC will be used for general inpatients.

Edmonton Zone is also preparing the PRU at the Kaye Edmonton Clinic to potentially open in the next few weeks. Patients who are recovering from COVID-19 and are deemed to be at low risk of transmitting the virus would be treated at the PRU if that additional capacity is required.

These surgical postponements will help free up space in our hospitals for patients who need a higher level of care, and support redeployment of frontline staff and resources to areas of greatest need. AHS is also asking all part-time and casual staff who are available to take extra shifts to please do so. Staffing has become the critical issue in this wave of the pandemic.

We acknowledge that our frontline physicians and staff are tired after 19 months of pandemic response. We are extremely grateful for everything they have done for Albertans, and we regret asking them to go above and beyond again.

This situation is serious, and we would like to remind all Albertans that we need their help in reducing the transmission of COVID-19 in the community, which in turn will reduce strain on the healthcare system.

We strongly urge all eligible Albertans to get immunized as quickly as possible, which is your best defence against a severe outcome from COVID-19.

FURTHER ACTIONS TO PROTECT HEALTH SYSTEM FROM COVID-19

Due to increasing COVID-19 transmission and rising hospital admissions, overwhelmingly amongst unvaccinated Albertans, temporary measures are needed to reduce transmission and prevent the health-care system from being overwhelmed. Currently, more than 80 per cent of COVID-19 cases in hospital are unvaccinated, including 91 per cent of patients in intensive care.

"Vaccines are safe, effective, and a game-changer. This is why the current wave is different than what we've experienced before. While we do not need to return to the same widespread and dramatic measures we had in place earlier in the pandemic, unvaccinated Albertans in particular are still at risk and are placing a heavy load on our health-care system. This is why we are

New vaccine incentive program

A one-time incentive of \$100 is now available for all Albertans age 18 or older who receive a first or second dose of vaccine between Sept. 3 and Oct. 14. This incentive is intended to encourage unvaccinated Albertans to get protected as soon as possible. After vaccination, eligible Albertans will be able to register online. Alberta Health will validate registrations against provincial immunization data. This website will be available starting on Sept. 13. If Albertans do not have access to a computer, they can contact 310-0000 for assistance, starting on Sept. 13.

Temporary measures

• The province will

make masks mandatory for all indoor public spaces and workplaces starting Sept. 4 at 8 a.m. Schools are not required to implement masking but school boards will continue to set COVID-19 management policies as they deem appropriate.

• Also, as of Sept. 4 at 8 a.m., restaurants, cafés, bars, pubs, nightclubs and other licensed establishments will be required to end alcohol service at 10 p.m.

• In addition, Albertans are encouraged to limit in-person contacts. To support this, the province strongly recommends that unvaccinated Albertans limit their indoor social gatherings to close contacts of only two cohort families up to a maximum of 10 people.

• It is also recommended that employers pause their plans to have staff return to work and instead continue with workfrom-home measures. If employees are working on location, employees must mask for all indoor settings, except in work stations or where two-metre physical distancing or adequate physical barriers are in place.

Additional vaccine incentives

All Albertans who have received two doses of vaccine and are aged 18 and over are eligible for the remaining \$1-million draw for the Open for Summer Lottery. To register and for complete details, visit alberta. ca/lottery. The final draw closes Sept. 23.

Fully protected Albertans are also eligible to enter the Outdoor Adventure vaccine lottery. To register and for complete details, visit alberta.ca/outdoor-adventure-vaccine-lottery.aspx. The lottery closes Sept. 9.



HELP KIDS LEARN THE GAME OF GOLF
