As a result of the search, two individuals were arrested and charged with various offences. VACCINATION INCENTIVE LAUNCHES

Eligible Albertans can now register to get a \$100 debit card for receiving a first or second dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

This one-time incentive is for all Albertans age 18 or older who receive either a first or second dose of vaccine between Sept. 3 and Oct. 14.

"Vaccines offer the best

protection from COVID-19 we've seen the results of vaccination, right here in Alberta. The more Albertans we can encourage to get vaccinated, the safer all of us will be. This incentive is just the latest in a number of approaches we've used to make the vaccines accessible and available to all eligible Albertans. Now is the time to get your shot."

After vaccination, individu-

als can go to alberta.ca/VaccineDebitCard and register online to receive a prefilled debit card. Alberta Health will validate all registrations against provincial immunization data. CIBC will distribute the debit cards on behalf of the Government of Alberta.

The first 15,000 Albertans will receive their debit cards in October. Debit cards for additional eligible registrants will be delivered in November and December.

Albertans who do not have access to a computer or a mobile device can phone 310-0000 for assistance.

All Albertans who have received two doses of vaccine and are aged 18 and over are eligible for the remaining \$1-million draw for Alberta's vaccine lottery. To register and for complete details, visit alberta.ca/lottery. The final draw closes Sept. 23.

Visitors to select City facilities will be screened; essential service locations will operate within Government of Alberta mandated capacity limits

Effective Sept. 20, 2021, the City of Leduc will be introducing COVID-19 screening protocols to City-run facilities where discretionary services are offered, in accordance with the provincial Restriction Exemption Program.

This means visitors 12 years of age and older to the following facilities will be required to provide proof of vaccination, medical exemption or a negative PCR or rapid test (privately-paid, completed within the last 72 hours):

All other City-run indoor facilities – including the Leduc Civic Centre – will not require proof of vaccination or a negative PCR or rapid test to enter but will

operate with reduced capacity limits as directed by the Government of Alberta. This will allow the City of Leduc to maintain access to essential services for all residents and community members.

Riders on Leduc Transit will not be required to provide proof of vaccination, medical exemption or a negative PCR or rapid test to board.

"Since the pandemic began 18 months ago, the City of Leduc has taken a measured approach - following provincial protocols, while balancing the obligation to provide reliable and efficient services to the community," says Leduc's City Manager Derek Prohar. "Using the Government of Alberta's recent direction as a framework, we believe this approach will best meet the needs of the various stakeholder groups to whom we are accountable."

• Please be prepared to provide proof of vaccination, medical exemption or a negative PCR/rapid COVID-19 test that has been privately paid for within the last 72 hours.

• Once past the Rec Check Table, guests will



Injuries that occur around the home contribute to millions of medical visits and tens of thousands of fatalities each year. Falls account for the largest percentage of home accidents, with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reporting that around 30,000 fall-related fatalities occur each year in the United States. Many home accidents are entirely preventable when proper caution is exercised.

pare for home-improvement projects, improving safety inside and outside the home should be a priority.

1. Improve lighting

One of the easiest ways to reduce the risk of falls is to improve lighting around the home. The National Institutes of Health state that adequate lighting is important at entrances to the home, stairways, hallways, and other frequently traversed areas. Make sure lighting fixtures are using the highest wattage light bulb allowed. Artificial lighting sources become even more vital in fall and autumn, when natural light is less abundant in a home. In addition, install lighting outdoors by the front door, over the garage and where garbage pails are stored to facilitate safe passage. 2. Eliminate slick surfaces

Improving traction around the house also can minimize falls. Throw rugs and runners can be made more secure with nonslip rubber backings. Bath rugs can reduce slipping on wet surfaces in the bathroom. Also, nonslip mats can be used inside of showers and bathtubs.

Use shoe trays to reduce puddling from melting snow or rain runoff in entryways. Mop up spills quickly, and consider the use of matte- or textured-finished flooring to improve stability underfoot.

Promptly remove snow and ice from driveways and walkways. For those who live in cold climates, heated concrete can help melt precipitation before it accumulates.

3. Make needed repairs Repair loose floorboards and pull carpet taut if it has started to stretch out. Address cracks outdoors and ensure that patio stones, bricks and pavers are secure and level to reduce tripping hazards. Fix

areas of the landscape where water may pool and freeze, creating potential hazards.

4. Declutter all spaces

Remove unnecessary items and furniture from rooms to free up more space to get around. Be sure there are no obstructions in walkways, entryways and near doors. Keep staircases clear at all times.

5. Invest in assistive devices

Handrails, grab bars, nonslip stair treads, and many other devices can make homes safer for people of all ages and abilities. Outfit cabinets and closets with organizers that put frequently used items within easy reach. A sturdy step stool can reduce the risk of injury while reaching for items stored on high shelves.

Taking measures to reduce the risk of falling around the home is a worthwhile home improvement project.



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Many homes do not have space for guest rooms, kids' play areas and home theater lounges that are possible in homes with substantial square footage. But they may not be missing out at all.

While large homes remain popular, many people are embracing the benefits of smaller residences. Small homes help homeowners save money, require less maintenance, have smaller environmental impact, and reduce the temptation to accumulate "stuff."

Owners of small homes or apartments can still enjoy the benefits of larger spaces, they just need to equip rooms to perform double duty.

Living room/guest room

Entertaining guests is easier when there's a dedicated space where visitors can feel at home. When furnishing a living room, keep the guest room in mind. A sofa that opens up to a bed or a convertible sectional can be a comfortable place for guests to lay their heads. Side tables provide guests with places to store their belongings, and an empty storage chest can house bed linens or guests' clothing.

Den/playroom

Children tend to accumulate toys and games. And as kids grow from children to young adults, their list of must-have items - from video gaming systems to other electronics - grows along with them. Storage can make a room functional for both adults and children. Devote an entire wall to a closet or drawer system where toys can be stored out of sight when necessary. Storage ottomans can be used for extra seating while also providing somewhere for homeowners to stash stuffed animals or games for easy access. When choosing furniture, look for fabrics that are resistant to stains and modular pieces that can be moved around as necessary to create room for playing or entertaining.

Bedroom/home office

In 2015, 24 percent of employed people in the United

DRAYTON VALLEY RCMP SEEK PUBLIC ASSISTANCE ON SUSPICIOUS DEATH HOMICIDE

Drayton Valley RCMP General Investigation Section was able to locate the scene of a collision involving the victim being struck by motor vehicle, at a farm located in Breton, Alta.

The female suspect was identified as 33-year-old, Hannah-Jane Bronwyn Luckham, of Carstairs, Alta. Luckham was arrested on Sept. 2, in Calgary. After consulation with the Crown Attorney's office, Bronwyn Luckham has been charged with second degree murder. After an in-custody judicial hearing, Luckham was remanded in police custody and is scheduled to appear on Sept. 9, 2021, in Wetaskiwin Provincial Court.

If you have yet to provide police any video surveillance or dash camera footage, that involves the victim's vehicle travelling from Breton to Drayton Valley on Aug. 30, from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., you are asked to contact the Drayton Valley RCMP Detachment at 780-542-4456.

RCMP Major Crimes Unit has taken carriage of this ongoing investigation.

On Aug. 30, shortly after 8:30 p.m., Drayton Valley RCMP responded to a call for assistance at the local hospital. Shortly after 8 p.m., a male was dropped off outside the local hospital with serious life-threatening injuries. The victim was able to share some information prior to succumbing to his injuries in hospital.

Surveillance obtained by police shows the victim being dropped off in the parking lot of the hospital and that vehicle immediately departing without providing any information. Drayton Valley RCMP are looking for the victim's vehicle: a 2005 Nissan Armada SUV, maroon in colour, with four doors and Alberta licence plate CKC6763. A stock image of a 2005 Nissan Armada vehicle is attached.

Police have contacted the next of kin. The male victim has been identified as Jonathan James Paul, 40-yearsold, of Calgary, Alta.

Drayton Valley RCMP are seeking public assistance in

this suspicious death investigation. The public is asked to contact Drayton Valley RCMP at 780-542-4456 if they are able to provide:

• the location of the victim's vehicle,

• any information in relation to this incident,

• identifying those responsible, or who dropped Jon off at the hospital,

• review and provide any dash camera footage or surveillance footage that may have the victim's vehicle in your recordings, or

• witnessed or was involved in this incident.

Drayton Valley RCMP investigation is ongoing. Police do not believe this was a random act.


