PARKLAND RCMP SEEK ASSISTANCE IDENTIFYING SUSPECT IN SEXUAL ASSAULT

On June 29, 2021, at approximately 10:00 p.m., Parkland RCMP received a report of a sexual assault in a parking lot off Highway 16A. An unknown male approached a young girl and started trying to flirt with her. She tried to end the conversation but the male continued to get closer to her and then grabbed her groin area. The girl screamed, and the male fled. He may be associated to a small dark coloured car.

Efforts to locate this male

are ongoing. Parkland RCMP are seeking the public's assistance to identify him. A composite sketch of the suspect has been compiled, and he is described as follows:

October 19, 2021 CommunityVOICE Page 3 CURRICULUM REVIEW SHOWS K-6 DRAFT FAILS TO MEET GOVERNMENT'S OWN STANDARDS

If the Alberta government were grading the new draft K-6 curriculum, it would have to fail itself.

A professional review conducted by the Alberta Teachers' Association, including feedback gained through an online survey, written submissions and focus groups with more than 6,500 teacher participants, assessed the curriculum by comparing the draft to the Government of Alberta's own vision and guidelines. The conclusion of teachers: the draft curriculum does not even meet the government's own standards.

In addition to failing to meet provincial guidelines, other key findings of the report show that the new curriculum has a variety of shortcomings: 1. Not logically sequenced and not appropriately designed for teacher use

2. Narrowly defined content that does not reflect the development of knowledge, understanding and skills for the 21st century

3. Developmentally inappropriate learning outcomes that lack high academic standards and do not adequately describe what students must know and be able to do

4. Inclusion of Indigenous content that is not authentic and appears as tokenism

5. Inadequate inclusion of francophone histories, contributions and perspectives

6. Lack of respect for Alberta's diversity and support for a peaceful, pluralistic society

7. Failure to address racism, sexism and other forms of bigotry, and the use of language that, in fact, promotes such bigotry

8. Inclusion of world reli-

gions as a mandatory topic in K–12, which infringes on the religious freedoms of Alberta parents

The research follows the release of preliminary survey results showing that 91 per cent of teachers and school administrators are unhappy with the draft curriculum, with three in four teachers stating that they are "very unhappy." The survey also showed that 90 per cent of elementary school teachers feel uncomfortable about teaching the new K-6 curriculum, and 95 per cent of principals feel uncomfortable about supporting the curriculum in their school and community.

The ATA is directing parents and the public who are concerned about the draft curriculum to pledge support for the moratorium and review by visiting curriculum.thelearningteam.ca. Parents are also encouraged to reach out to their local school trustee candidate to find out where they stand on the draft at vote4kids.ca.

The Alberta Teachers' Association, as the professional

organization of teachers, promotes and advances public education, safeguards standards of professional practice and serves as the advocate for its 46,000 members.

October 18-22 is School Bus Safety Week. This is an opportunity for everyone who rides a school bus, or knows someone who rides a school bus, to join forces in highlighting the imlights flashing on an undivided highway -you must stop! The fine for passing a school bus with its red lights flashing is \$567 and six demerit points. Alberta Transportation states that every driver, approaching from both directions toward a school bus with overhead red signal-lights flashing, must stop and shall not proceed until the bus moves or the overhead red signal-lights have stopped flashing. Also, school buses are required by law to stop at all railway crossings. For more information on rail safety for drivers, visit **Operation Lifesaver.**

Travel by school bus is 16 times safer than travelling in a family car per passenger per kilometre of travel, according to a study by Transport Canada.

Each school bus made and imported into Canada has approximately 40 standard safety features built into the design and

construction. These include specialized brake systems, lighting, emergency exits, escape hatches in the roof, and high padded seatbacks that cushion the impact of a crash.

Prevention is the key to safety. With education and awareness, all children should be able to get safely to school and home again. Here are some other tips and resources to review with your children:

PROTECT YOUR VEHICLE FROM SNOW, ICE AND DAMAGE FROM THE COLD

Winter can be an unforgiving season. Freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can take its toll on people who live in climates where cold weather is a fact of winter life.

While winter can test people's patience, it also can be harsh on cars and trucks. Understanding what components of a vehicle can be compromised by dropping temperatures and snowy roads can help drivers take action to safeguard their automotive investments.

While the Canadian Automobile Association notes that winter can wreak havoc on just about every part of a vehicle, there are some parts that seem to bear the brunt of Old Man Winter's abuse. Properly servicing and caring for a car or truck can help.

Drivers should take their vehicles for a tuneup and inspection before wintry weather arrives. A mechanic will examine the car battery and check antifreeze levels and make sure that the thermostat, defroster, brakes, and even wiper blades are working effectively. Have the tires inspected for adequate tread, which can make navigating roads safer. If the treads are worn, replace the tires.

In addition to visiting their mechanics, drivers can perform some inspections and fixes themselves.

• Check that all of the vehicle's lights are operational so your car can be easily seen during inclement weather. Exchange your existing windshield washer fluid with one that will not freeze in cold conditions. Check the nozzles on the windshield-washer system routinely and clear out any blockages of ice or debris. While addressing windshield washer fluid, also replace worn out windshield wiper blades with ones that can withstand snow and icy weather.

A new coating of wax can serve as a shield against road salt, snow, sleet, and rain. Try a polymer wax to protect the paint. Whenever possible, rinse off salt and grime so it does not dry on the car and gradually wear away at the paint. Some drivers mistakenly believe that salt stops being a problem once it dries simply because moisture is the active ingredient for a corrosive reaction.

But humidity in the air is enough to keep the salt eating away at the car's paint, and that can contribute to rust. Be sure to rinse off the undercarriage of the vehicle as well.

Have your tires' alignment checked toward the end of winter or early spring. A season of traveling over pothole-ridden roads or hitting curbs buried under snow drifts can affect the alignment. Get everything back on track. Similarly, inspect tires

routinely, as weather changes can affect tire pressure and strength.

. Use a soft snow brush or a foam brush to clear snow off of the car. Avoid hard plastic scrapers you might use on your windshield, as they can scratch painted surfaces.

Try to park the vehicle in a garage or under a car port, each of which can protect cars and trucks from the often harsh elements of winter.

Vehicles can be affect-

ed by the cold weather. Keep them running efficiently to prevent damage this winter.



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
