### PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE ROBBERY IN PARKLAND COUNTY

had pointed a gun at the caller, took his wallet, cell phone, and a small amount of marijuana before fleeing.

RCMP Capital West Traffic members responded to the area with Parkland Detachment members and the suspect vehicle was located. RCMP attempted to stop the vehicle, but it fled and a pursuit was initiated. As the vehicle travelled into Edmonton, Alta., the pursuit was taken over by Edmonton City Police helicopter, Air 1.

Edmonton Police were able to arrest the suspects a short time later at a car wash on 162 St and 118 Ave without incident. Parkland RCMP recovered a sawed-off shotgun, an air-soft pistol, and other items involved in the incident.

Four people were arrested in connection with the robbery with only two being charged as follows:

Caleb Marks(30) - Robbery x1 and Fail to Comply with Court ordered conditions x 4

Keegan Power(20) -Robbery x 1, Operation (of Conveyance) While Prohibited x 1, Fail to Comply with a Probation Order x 2 and Flight from Police x 1

Marks and Power were remanded into custody.

Both are set to appear in Stony Plain Provincial Court on Nov. 10, 2021. The other two suspects were released without charges and the investigation is ongoing.

The victim in this case was known to the offenders and is believed to be an isolated incident. The victim sustained minor injuries during the altercation.



### REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

### SNOW CLEARING AND SEASONAL MAINTENANCE SERVICES

The WILD Water Commission operates a potable water transmission line and truck fill network in the greater Lac Ste. Anne County – Parkland County service area. The service network includes several stations (truck fills and booster stations) spanning from the Stony Plain area west along Highway 16 and north along Highway 43, with ultimate reach to the communities of Entwistle in the west, and as far north as Rich Valley. The Commission is organized as a regional services commission with a Board of Directors derived from our member municipalities and partners, and an independent internal Administration.

As part of our ongoing system operation, the Commission requires a contractor to undertake the regular (and required) snow removal and seasonal site maintenance of the existing truck fill and booster locations throughout the network. Interested parties are invited to submit proposals considerate of the following:

I. Service shall be inclusive of all system stations (12 locations, full list provided on request);
II. Service shall be inclusive of the core services:

- a. Snow clearing within 24 hours of any single or cumulative 7.5cm (3") of accumulation,
- b. Sanding of locations following each snow clearing, or as otherwise required/requested at the direction of the Commission,
- c. Filling local sandboxes at each station, as required/requested by the Commission;
   III. Service shall be performed by a fully licenced and insured contractor (proof of same to be submitted with proposals);

IV. Service shall be proposed as seasonal (October through April, annually) and may be offered as a multiyear engagement, subject to annual review by the parties;

V. Service shall be proposed based on an expectation of 12 – 15 hours per occurrence (snow clearing event), with an hourly rate for additional required or requested works;

VI. The proposed start date for this service is January 1st, 2022 but could be earlier on agreement of the parties;

VII. Payment arrangements are to be as invoiced, paid by cheque and due payable not less than 30 days from date of invoice.



### PREPARE VEHICLES FOR HARSH WEATHER

Visibility is key in hazardous weather conditions, and keeping the windshield clean is a priority. This means ensuring there is enough windshield wiper fluid in the car and that



### THE HYDROGEN ROAD MAP

Submitted by Mark Smith, MLA for Drayton Valley

Can hydrogen really lead Alberta's energy industry into a low-carbon future? To be clear, we do not see hydrogen replacing Alberta's oil and gas industry. The Government sees it as a new opportunity that builds upon our collective expertise in the oil and gas sector. All credible forecasts point to resilient demand for oil and gas, and Alberta is well positioned to be a critical global supplier for decades to come.

However, Clean hydrogen offers us a new opportunity that can be integrated into Alberta's existing energy system, while tapping into the emerging global hydrogen market. It is a market that is still in its early stages - but one where we can compete globally and attract billions of dollars of new investment. These new investments are only possible because of our existing infrastructure, expertise, and skilled workforce in the oil and gas industry.

We expect the oil and gas and hydrogen industries to operate and grow in tandem, as we all work towards a lower emission future. Hydrogen can become part of Alberta's larger energy industry, integrated into industries across the province.

Will hydrogen produced by natural gas actually be "clean"? Some organizations refer to hydrogen by colour, such as blue or green hydrogen, based on how the hydrogen is produced. However, there is a global movement to move away from hydrogen colour descriptions and look at the overall carbon intensity from producing hydrogen – regardless of how it is produced. This is the approach that both Alberta and Canada

strongly support, as we both apply a technology-neutral approach in our hydrogen strategies. Alberta's Hydrogen Roadmap is open to all techniques of hydrogen production, and looked at international programs like CertifHy, which establishes standards for carbon emissions related to hydrogen production. Our roadmap shows that Alberta-based clean hydrogen can

meet these carbon intensity thresholds. Alberta will engage with others as global standards for carbon intensity of clean hydrogen are built and used around the world.

Hydrogen's benefits aren't just in the energy sector, as it also provides Alberta's larger economy with an important option to decarbonize. This includes transportation, residential and commercial heat-

ing, and industrial processes like those used by the oilsands – all of which have faced challenges lowering emissions in the past.

Clean hydrogen presents an opportunity to decarbonize Alberta's existing markets, but it is only one of many decarbonisation solutions that companies can consider as they make plans for the future.

A key part of the Hydrogen Roadmap is working to reduce the risk for early investors and to build greater demand for hydrogen right here in Alberta. Part of that will include looking at how we can find relatively straightfor-


ward ways to use hydrogen in existing applications. For example, this includes blending hydrogen into existing natural gas systems, which is not currently allowed. We are going to be discussing the topic of blending hydrogen into natural gas for heating with our industry partners, municipalities, and consumer groups in the next few months. Part of these conversations include how the cost of adding hydrogen into the system will be handled by industry and consumers.

The purpose of the Hydrogen Roadmap is to lay out the future direction of Alberta's

hydrogen sector, and identify potential policy actions the government can use to support and enable the growth of Alberta's clean hydrogen. In the coming weeks we will begin engaging with key partners on one policy opportunity - blending hydrogen into existing natural gas networks - and we will pursue other policy changes as technology, industry, and the market develop over the coming years. The Government of Alberta is also providing support for the hydrogen sector through the Technology Innovation and Emissions Reduction (TIER) program, which is funding a number of pilot programs to support emerging technology and innovative uses of hydrogen that could be rolled out across Alberta's economy.

Alberta's energy and natural gas sector continues to face challenges, especially in reaching new markets for our energy products. Hydrogen represents a premium, growing market for our natural gas in particular, but the market is not going to wait for Alberta.

Global governments are doubling down on hydrogen. Over 30 countries have committed more than CAD \$87 billion in public financing to kick-start their hydrogen economies. These governments recognize that the hydrogen value chain requires support before it will be self-sufficient, and that without they will miss out on a golden economic opportunity that spans decades into the future. This is our opportunity to build on Alberta's strengths, and demonstrate to the world that Albertan's innovation and ingenuity means our energy sector is here to say, and will continue to be a cornerstone of affordable and responsible global energy security.






