The 37-year-old female driver of the SUV from Edmonton, Alta. was taken to hospital by STARS air ambulance with serious injuries. The two truck drivers, a 27-year-old male from Edmonton and a 41-year old male from Sturgeon County, Alta. were both assessed and released on scene with minor injuries.

The RCMP Collision Analyst attended the scene. The intersection was closed over the duration of the investigation.

Parkland RCMP continue to investigate the cause of the collision.

WEST INTER LAKE DISTRICT (WILD) REGIONAL WATER SERVICES COMMISSION <u>REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS</u> SNOW CLEARING AND SEASONAL MAINTENANCE SERVICES

The WILD Water Commission operates a potable water transmission line and truck fill network in the greater Lac Ste. Anne County – Parkland County service area. The service network includes several stations (truck fills and booster stations) spanning from the Stony Plain area west along Highway 16 and north along Highway 43, with ultimate reach to the communities of Entwistle in the west, and as far north as Rich Valley. The Commission is organized as a regional services commission with a Board of Directors derived from our member municipalities and partners, and an independent internal Administration.

As part of our ongoing system operation, the Commission requires a contractor to undertake the regular (and required) snow removal and seasonal site maintenance of the existing truck fill and booster locations throughout the network. Interested parties are invited to submit proposals considerate of the following:

I. Service shall be inclusive of all system stations (12 locations, full list provided on request); II. Service shall be inclusive of the core services:

a. Snow clearing within 24 hours of any single or cumulative 7.5cm (3") of accumulation,

b. Sanding of locations following each snow clearing, or as otherwise required/requested at the direction of the Commission,

c. Filling local sandboxes at each station, as required/requested by the Commission; III. Service shall be performed by a fully licenced and insured contractor (proof of same to be submitted with proposals);

IV. Service shall be proposed as seasonal (October through April, annually) and may be offered as a multivear engagement, subject to annual review by the parties;

V. Service shall be proposed based on an expectation of 12 – 15 hours per occurrence (snow clearing event), with an hourly rate for additional required or requested works;

VI. The proposed start date for this service is January 1st, 2022 but could be earlier on agreement of the parties;

VII. Payment arrangements are to be as invoiced, paid by cheque and due payable not less than 30 days from date of invoice.





ALBERTA RCMP EDUCATES MOTORISTS ON CHILD SEAT SAFETY

The Alberta RCMP wants to ensure you and your little ones are properly buckled up this November. Parents and caretakers are responsible for ensuring young passengers' commutes are as safe as can be, that is why it is crucial motorists understand the importance of child safety seats. When used correctly, these restraint systems can save lives and reduce injury.

Below is child safety seat information you should know:

•Children under six years of age, weighing 18 kg (40 lb) or less, must be properly restrained in a car seat (Government of Alberta, 2021).

•It is highly recommended that children over the age of six use a booster seat until they reach the maximum height and weight (as stated by the manufacturer) and a seat belt fits properly (Government of Alberta, 2021).

•A child safety seat must have a Canada Motor Vehicle Safety Standards sticker on it to prove it meets national safety standards (Government of Alberta, 2021).

•It is not recommended that you purchase a preowned car seat as they may be damaged, recalled, or expired, and may not meet current safety standards (Alberta Health Services, 2019).

•When used properly, child safety seats can reduce the risk of serious injury or fatality by approximately 60-70% (Government of Alberta, 2021).

GET FULLY protected. You need both influenza and covid-19 vaccines.

Children under five years of age and their households can get their influenza vaccine at an AHS clinic. Appointments are required.

All other Albertans can get their flu shot from a participating pharmacy or doctor's office.

Don't have your COVID-19 vaccine? It's safe to get influenza and COVID-19 vaccines together. Both vaccines are available at selection locations.


