

CHILDREN AGED 5-11 NOW ELIGIBLE FOR COVID-19 VACCINE

Children aged five to 11 years old will soon have the opportunity to get protected from COVID-19.

Alberta's government welcomes the news that Health Canada has approved the Pfizer vaccine for children aged five to 11. Vaccines are expected to arrive in the province the week of Nov. 22.

Provided supply is delivered as expected, Alberta plans to begin administration by late next week. More information regarding bookings and appointments will be shared once they are available.

Currently, parents and guardians can pre-register their children in the Alberta Vaccine Booking system to be ready when appointments open.

Restrictions Exemption Program

Children under 12 will continue to have access to businesses and venues participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program, regardless of their vaccination sta-

The Restrictions Exemption Program has been working well with these younger children being able to access facilities with their parents or guardians who are able to meet the program requirements, or participating in youth activities while following current public health measures.

Ouick facts

•Pfizer-BioNTech's Comirnaty COVID-19 vaccine is the only vaccine approved for

use in children aged five to 11 in Canada.

•Health Canada approved the Pfizer vaccine for children aged five to 11 on Nov. 19. It has also been approved for use in the U.S.

•More than 390,000 Albertans aged five to 11 will be eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine.

•To date in Alberta:

oFor children aged five to 11, there have been about 30,700 cases of COVID-19 diagnosed since March of 2020, with 78 of those cases ending up in hospital and 20 in intensive care.

COVID-19 in children

•Children under 12 years of age have the highest rate of new cases in Canada.

•Most cases in children are milder than adults but some kids can get very sick, have long-lasting symptoms or complications such as multisystem inflammatory syndrome in children (MIS-C).

•Children can spread the virus even if they don't have symptoms, potentially exposing vulnerable friends, family or community members


•Each person infected with COVID-19 provides a chance for the virus to mutate and become more resistant to treatments or vaccines. Fewer infections means less chance of dangerous variants.

•The Canadian Pediatric Society recommends eligible children be vaccinated. While kids have a lower risk of severe illness, vaccines offer the best protection from getting or spreading COVID-19.

MAKING CHILD CARE MORE AFFORDABLE FOR FAMILIES

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Following the signing of the historic child-care agreement with the federal government, Alberta is lowering child-care fees for working families.

Alberta's government is reducing fees for parents with kids aged zero to kindergarten in licensed daycares, preschools and family day homes.

Parents will see fees reduced by half, on average, by early 2022, with families most in need receiving additional subsidy. By 2026, families will be paying an average of \$10 per day per child.

Beginning in January 2022, the government will reduce fees for more families by offering:

- Subsidies for families earning under \$180,000. Parents can apply online starting in the new year.
- New operating grants for facility-based child-care programs starting in mid-January 2022. This will help providers lower fees for parents without shouldering extra costs.

"These investments will make a big difference for families, but we know that this targeted approach will also actually make sure dollars go to parents and kids who need it and really have an impact on economic recovery."

Both the operating grants and subsidy will go to the provider who will then reduce fees for parents. The subsidy is layered in addition to the operating grant to make sure parents who need it most see greater benefits.

For example, a family earning \$75,000 per year with one toddler attending a daycare program would be eligible for full subsidy. If the current fees are \$1,000 per month, the daycare program will receive \$510 per month in an operating grant and the family would be eligible for \$266 per month. The remaining parent portion will be \$224 per month or approximately \$10 per day.

A family earning \$130,000 per year with an infant attending a daycare program would be eligible for partial subsidy. If the current fees are \$1,200 per month, the program will receive \$635 per month in an operating grant and the family would be eligible for \$226 per month in subsidy. The remaining parent portion is \$339 per month or \$15.60 per day.

These numbers are for licensed spaces in child-care facilities and preschools. Government is working with family day homes and family day home agencies to finalize the grants and subsidy levels for day home providers and parents in the coming weeks, but they are expected to roll out in mid-January as well.

Starting in spring 2022, the Alberta government will be making licensed child care more accessible by increasing the number of spaces to meet the anticipated demand. This includes adding spaces in locations with limited or no access to child care and making sure spaces are also available for underserved and vulnerable populations.

- \$3.8 billion will be invested in child care for children kindergarten age and younger over the next five years:
- o \$2.865 billion to lower child-care fees for Alberta parents
- o \$240.64 million to increase the number of child-care spaces
- o \$202.6 million to develop and fund childcare options to support vulnerable and diverse populations as well as children with extra needs
- o \$306.16 million to support licensed programs and certified educators in offering high-quality support for families in their communities
- At least 42,500 new licensed child-care spaces will be created over the next five years.



FUNDING PALLIATIVE AND END-OF-LIFE CARE IN ALBERTA

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Grants totalling \$11 million will transform palliative and end-of-life care that eases suffering for Albertans with a life-limiting illness.

In September 2020, the province announced \$20 million for palliative and end-of-life care initiatives. Since then, Alberta's government has invested almost \$9 million for new projects such as community hospice care, and education and training for health professionals.

The new grant program will use the remaining \$11 million for projects that support four priority recommendations in the Advancing Palliative and End-of-Life Care in Alberta final report. These priorities include earlier access, education and training, community supports and services, and research and innovation.

The deadline for submissions is Jan. 7, 2022, for eligible applicants. The application form, eligibility criteria

and program guidelines are available online at Palliative and end-of-life care grant fund on alberta.ca.

Dan Williams, MLA for Peace River, was appointed to consult with palliative and end-of-life care Albertans and interest groups to gain further insights into the palliative care system, provide recommendations for the remaining \$11 million in funding, as well as provide the final report to government.

Ouick facts

•Palliative and end-of-life care is specialized medical care for adults and children diagnosed with a life-limiting illness.

•One of the government's priorities is to enhance the palliative care system for Albertans, such as expanding supports for individuals and their families in their homes and communities.

•The new grant program will be targeted to address the following priority outcomes:

oAlbertans have earlier

access to high-quality care upon diagnosis of their condition.

oHealth-care providers, families, caregivers and volunteers have increased capacity to provide care and supports.

oAlbertans have access to palliative and end-of-life care in their setting of choice.

oAcademics, health service providers and community organizations will engage in additional research to advance navigation and care pathways.

•To date, the government has invested almost \$9 million of the total \$20 million.

oMore than \$6.5 million to Covenant Health for public awareness initiatives, such as advance care planning and developing education for health-care providers.

oMore than \$1 million to the Alberta Hospice Palliative Care Association for in-person and online support groups for Albertans with a terminal illness, a telephone grief support service

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and expansion of workshops on palliative care for Albertans.


o\$1 million for the government-sponsored Palliative Coverage Program to cover the costs associated with pre-filling syringes for palliative clients.

o\$150,000 to Pilgrim's Hospice Society to advance community hospice care.

•The government eliminated copayments for end-oflife-drugs for palliative clients that choose to remain at home or in a hospice under the Palliative Coverage Program.

One of the government's priorities is to transform the province's continuing care system to be more responsive to the needs of Albertans, which includes palliative and end-of-life care. Work is underway to expand home and community care, implementing recommended actions from the review of continuing care homes and new streamlined continuing care legislation.

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
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
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
