According to the update, the deficit for 2021-22 is now forecast at \$5.8 billion. This is \$12.4 billion lower than the budget estimate and \$1.9 billion lower than the first quarter fiscal update. Total revenue in 2021-22, meanwhile, is forecast at \$57.9 billion, \$14.2 billion higher than the budget estimate and \$2.9 billion higher than the first quarter fiscal update.

Alberta's updated forecasts show that real gross domestic product is expected to grow by 6.1 per cent this year, which is significantly higher than the 4.8 per cent forecast released at the start of the year.

Job numbers are way up, with Statics Canada's latest report showing that Alberta created 15,000 new jobs in November and has created 105,400 new jobs over the past 12 months. These jobs are in addition to the hundreds of thousands of jobs that were lost and restored since the start of the pandemic. At 64 per cent, Alberta now has the highest employment rate in the nation!

Further, evidence now shows that the Job Creation Tax Cut and continued efforts to make Alberta the most competitive business environment in North America are working. Corporate income tax revenue of \$2.9 billion is forecast for 2021-22. \$1 billion more than what was forecast in February's budget. This revenue is now forecast to increase by an average of 19 per cent over the next two years to reach \$4.1 billion in

2023-24 as growth in investment and profits continue.

In true Alberta fashion, we are leading Canada's economy recovery. This is an astounding turnaround from the challenging times we saw under the NDP's terrible policies, low oil prices and the heights of the pandemic. According to economist Trevor Tombe, "This week's fiscal update represents the largest improvement in provincial finances ever recorded."

Various factors are supporting this strong economic comeback, including improved commodity prices, but our government's persistent focus on attracting new investment and improving competitiveness for our key sectors is making a major difference at this challenging economic time. Thanks to our policy efforts, our province is seeing billions of dollars in new investment and capital being deployed across the province right now. This is happening in hydrogen, tech, aerospace, petrochemicals, and many other areas.

In late November 2021, Edson RCMP arrested a male and laid charges in relation to an investigation into and break and enter at an oil lease site which had occurred in May 2021, as well as other incidents.

On June 3, 2021, Edson RCMP responded to a report of a break and enter that had occurred just after midnight on May 31, 2021, at an oil lease site in the rural area of Edson in Yellowhead County, Alta.

At that time, two field cameras each containing SIM cards and SD cards as well as a solar charger were stolen.

On Oct. 29, 2021, Edson RCMP were advised that one of the SIM cards stolen in the May 2021 incident was active and being used.

Edson RCMP's investigation led to obtaining tracking warrants for the stolen SIM cards. As a result, on Nov. 25, 2021 the Edson RCMP General Investigation Section (GIS) and the Western Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit, arrested an adult male in possession of a stolen pick-up truck in Edson. A search warrant was subsequently obtained which was executed at a residence in Edson on Nov. 27, 2021, and additional stolen property was recovered in relation to other incidents. Copper wire casings that had been stripped were located in the garage.

Multiple items of stolen property were recovered during the investigation including a GMC pick up which had been reported stolen from Whitecourt on Nov.25, 2021 and two oilfield batteries that had been stolen on Nov. 13, 2021, in Yellowhead County. The Edson RCMP were able to return some of the items to their rightful owners.

Scot Waddell (33) of Ed-

son was arrested and has been charged with:

• Possession of stolen property over \$5000

Break and enter
Possess stolen

property under (x7)

 Possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine)
 Drive while sus-

pended (TSA)

After a judicial hearing, Waddell was released on a \$1500 no-cash release order and will next be appearing in Edson Provincial Court on Jan. 4, 2022.

Edson RCMP continue their investigation. As these matters are now before the courts, no further details can be provided.

•Impaired driving is criminal and dangerous.




