The CSJ Program is a long-standing Government of Canada program that strives to help youth from ages 15–30 obtain their first summer work experience.

... (a secondary payment) to help cover costs over and above the phase one initial payment. Due to prolonged dry weather and extreme high temperatures, many producers experienced reduced grazing capacity causing a severe eco-

nomic hit.

The secondary payment will be calculated using a feedneed calculation, supplemented by proof of eligible expenses, for all livestock with the exception of bees. Eligible beekeepers can be compensated for up to 70 per cent of the extraordinary costs associated with feed (pollen patties or syrup) required to prepare eligible hives for winter to a maximum of \$7.50 per hive/colony.

Application deadline is January 31, 2022.

This investigation began in December, 2020 when North Battleford RCMP and North Battleford RCMP General Investigation Services received a report of alleged child abuse.

EDSON & COUNTY RECREATION MULTI-USE FACILITY UPDATE

Progress continues on the joint Edson and Yellowhead County Recreation Multi-Use Facility.

The Project Management Committee has been meeting virtually with three pre-qualified bidders working on their proposal submissions for the project. Proposals will include a design of the facility, costing, and a construction timeline.

The goal is for proposals to be presented to the Town of Edson and Yel-

lowhead County Councils in the spring, with potential ground-breaking at the Hillendale location in the late fall of 2022. The build time will span two-and-ahalf to three years, and the joint Council-based Steering Committee directing the project sees no barriers to meeting that timeline.

"The Town of Edson is very pleased to see this exciting project moving forward," said Edson Mayor Zahara. "This type of facility will be a great benefit to the region, and we're extremely pleased to work with our partners in Yellowhead County, as well as the provincial and federal governments to see it to fruition."

County Mayor Wade Williams said, "The steering committee is eagerly awaiting the design options from the three bidders. The committee and administration have worked hard to ensure the input from our residents and stakeholder groups is reflected accurately in this new facility--we want to get it right."

This \$70 million project will provide a full range of ice, aquatic, walking track,

and gymnasium-based recreation and sport development opportunities for the residents of all ages in the region, now and into the future. The project priorities that were set are function over form, maximized utilization, and operational efficiencies through design with a focus on flexible spaces.

Both municipalities remain committed to the project and to fostering their historic partnership, which is one of the strongest in the province.



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ALBERTA RCMP ENFORCE ROADWAY SAFETY THROUGHOUT THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Over the course of the holidays, the Alberta RCMP were helping to make the season safe, merry, and bright for all road users. Between Dec. 24, 2021 and Jan. 3, 2022, RCMP carried out enforcement initiatives focussed on promoting traffic safety and issued a total

of 1,812 traffic tickets across the province.

Overall, 506 individuals were ticketed for speeding, 55 motorists were caught distracted driving, and 125 impaired drivers were removed from the roads by way of provincial Immediate Roadside Sanctions. Due to a variety of aggravating factors, of the 125 impaired

drivers, 15 were also charged with Criminal Code Impaired Driving by Alcohol. Another 1,251 motorists received tickets for traffic safety violations including careless driving, driving with a prohibited or suspended license, moving offences, and more.

In total, Alberta RCMP recorded 1,952 roadway offences

compared to last year's 2,578.

The holidays are a time spent creating memories and #Un-wrappingMoments with loved ones. This season, through traffic education and enforcement initiatives, the Alberta RCMP worked to help you and yours arrive home safely.

ALBERTA RCMP LAUNCH MOBILE APP TO HELP KEEP ALBERTANS INFORMED

Alberta RCMP has officially launched their brand-new mobile app for iOS and Android devices. The app has been developed to simplify online user experience on mobile devices to ensure that Albertans can access information quickly and conveniently. The app is

available as a free download through Apple or Google Play.

Developing the app allows the Alberta RCMP to provide the public with online access to news, crime reporting, detachment locations, crime mapping and statistics, and a map for initiatives like Project Lock Up. The app also provides access to partner law enforcement services, mental health supports, Crime Stoppers and links to Alberta RCMP social media accounts.

Even though the app provides convenient links to Alberta RCMP social media account, this app will not replace existing website, social media feeds, or other sources for information. The tool also will

not replace other methods of crime reporting, engagement, or emergency assistance. Citizens should remember that social media posts or use of other third-party crime apps are not appropriate ways to report a crime.

EDSON RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL COLLISION

On Jan. 5, 2022, at approximately 6:35 p.m. Edson RCMP, RCMP Forensic Collision Reconstruction, Yellowhead County Fire Department, Yellowhead County Peace Officers and EMS responded to a two vehicle collision in the west-

bound lanes of Highway 16 near Range Road 130 (Niton Junction).

The preliminary investigation revealed a small passenger car that was travelling westbound had collided with the rear of a westbound semi-tractor trailer. The semi-tractor trailer had entered onto the

highway and was accelerating when it was struck by the car. The driver of the car was the sole occupant and had to be extricated from the vehicle by fire crews. A 37-year-old man, from Edson, was pronounced deceased at the scene. The name of the deceased will not be released.

The driver of the semi-tractor unit was not physically injured.

The Edson RCMP and RCMP Forensic Collision Reconstruction continue to investigate this collision; however, no charges are anticipated.

Pinpointing every detail, the Bride chooses everything from colors, bridesmaid dresses, cake, and the most important thing of all, the dress. Dresses come in all colors, shapes, and designs, the wedding dress defines a Bride's personality and makes her stand out

amongst everyone.

As the years, and decades change, so does the wedding dress. In the 1930s, most Brides wore silk or satin dresses, typically opting for long-sleeve styles with a small train and a minimal ornamental design.

During the 1960s long veils and trails fell out of style, brides reached for birdcage veils and hats while walking down the aisle in a short swing dress. The eighties showed us the bigger the dress, the better. Dresses were made to take up space with high lace necklines, gathered sleeves, and fluffy details.

While 2021 has been a challenging year for many Albertans, there is a lot worth celebrating from this past year.

Alberta is leading Canada's economic comeback. We replaced approximately 340,000 jobs that were lost due to the pandemic, and we added approximately 105,000 new jobs that will help Albertans pay their bills and mortgages. At 64 per cent, Alberta now has the highest employment rate in the nation.

2021 saw the return of

high oil prices. Our province is now producing more oil than ever before in our history. According to a recent forecast from the Canadian Association of Energy Contractors, Alberta will see over 6,000 new wells drilled in 2022 – a 26 per cent increase from 2021.


In 2021, we continued our focus on diversification, with burgeoning industries like technology having banner years in our province. Alberta is now home to more than 3,000 technology companies, a 233 per cent increase since 2012. 2021 also saw Amazon Web Services recently announce

that it's building a data hub in Calgary. This \$4.3 billion investment will create 1,000 new jobs and marks the largest technology sector investment in Alberta history.

Our film and television industry also had a record year in our province, with more than 50 major productions underway, supporting over 9,000 jobs. These projects include HBO's The Last of Us, the largest production in Canadian history. With Alberta being featured in movies like Ghostbusters: Afterlife, it's easy to understand why our province is fast becoming the new "Hollywood North."

2021 saw historic industry investments in renewables. Air Products is investing \$1.3 billion to build a net-ze-ro hydrogen energy complex near Edmonton and Dow Chemical is investing up to \$10 billion to build the world's first net-zero carbon emissions ethylene and derivatives complex near Fort Saskatchewan, marking the biggest capital investment in the province in 15 years.

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This is just a couple of the exciting investments happening in Alberta that will create thousands of new jobs for our workers.

We know the pandemic has been hard on many Albertans, so we made historic investments to support those struggling with addiction. In 2021, we doubled down on addiction treatment announcing that the government will fund more than 8,000 addiction treatment spaces annually, doubling the original commitment made in 2019 and firmly establishing Alberta as a national leader in treating addiction.


In 2021, we fought for and delivered a made-in-Alberta childcare plan that protects Alberta's mixed-market system. This new plan will make childcare more affordable for families with kids aged zero to kindergarten by reducing fees by an average of half in early 2022 and by 2026, all Alberta families will pay an average of \$10 per-day for childcare. And unlike the NDP's proposed plan, we delivered a plan that includes private operators who make-up most of our system.

In 2021, we were proud to deliver on a promise to give Albertans a say on Canada's broken equalization system and watched as over 60 per cent of voters voted in favour of reform. We will continue to update you as we proceed to our next steps of fighting for a fair deal for Alberta within our confederation. 2021 also saw what economist Trevor Tombe called "the largest

improvement in provincial finances ever recorded." The deficit for 2021-22 is now forecast at \$5.8 billion. This is \$12.4 billion lower than the budget estimate and \$1.9 billion lower than the first quarter fiscal update. Total revenue in 2021-22, meanwhile, is forecast at \$57.9 billion, \$14.2 billion higher than the budget estimate and \$2.9 billion higher than the first quarter fiscal update. In 2022, we will remain focused on prudent fiscal management to ensure our province's books are healthy.

Alberta's Recovery Plan is working, and Albertans are going back to work. In 2022, our United Conservative government will remain relentless in delivering jobs and investment for Alberta families and businesses. Truly, our best days are still

to come.





NEW YEARS ARTICLE

For Albertans living outside the two big cities of Edmonton and Calgary, the announcement of a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for broadband funding between the Government of Alberta and the Government of Canada was an early Christmas present.

Having reliable, highspeed internet connectivity is important for all Albertans, and it is essential to Alberta's recovery and for economic diversification. That's why it's so great that Service Alberta Minister Nate Glubish secured a dollar-for-dollar matching funding agreement between the Government of Alberta and the Government of Canada.

From education to agriculture to small business, reliable connectivity will help Albertans interact with the global economy, innovate for local solutions, and succeed. The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted more than anything else could, the need for better connectivity in rural, remote and Indigenous Alberta communities.

Since Alberta's government announced up to \$150 million in broadband funding this past July, many people have asked how the money would be deployed and what the province's timeline for universal connectivity is. While the MOU was signed in August between Minister Glubish and his former federal counterpart, Maryam Monsef, a federal election was called and a new cabinet sworn in, which meant that those details could not be released until now.

Now that we can talk about how the \$300 mil-

lion in joint funding will be deployed, it's important to reiterate something Minister Glubish has consistently said over the past two years: we cannot afford to duplicate work and overbuild. With a need to reach the 80 per cent of First Nations communities and the 67 per cent of rural and remote communities that do not

currently have reliable internet access, we need to be strategic and work together with all levels of government and the private sector to fund shovel-ready projects that have the greatest impact. The best way to do this is to leverage the applications that were already submitted to the Universal Broadband Fund (UBF). In

doing this instead of creating a separate provincial grant program, all parties working to eliminate the digital divide are working together and not in competition.

Leveraging the UBF program also means that both governments have been able to spend the past several months reviewing the hundreds of applications received from Alberta project proponents so that the first projects can be announced in early 2022 and shovels can be in the ground during the 2022 construction season. Broadband connectivity is a priority for Alberta's government, and we are pushing to connect Albertans as soon as 2023/24. That is an aggressive date, but it is important that we signal to all Albertans and all our partners in the private sector and in other levels of government that we are committed to ending the rural-urban connectivitv divide.

We also must be realistic, and it is far more likely to take an additional several years to achieve universal connectivity. Part of the reason for this is that there is only so much industry capacity to complete the work and, because of the pandemic, supply chain issues are affecting the global availability of materials – for fibre optic cable, electronics, and other items be-

cause of the pandemic.

This collaboration is a game changer for rural Alberta and we're working hard to get projects announced and shovels in the ground.

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


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




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
