WHAT MATTERS TO YOU - 1984 AND ANIMAL FARM

I'd like to thank everyone for the feedback and taking time to read the writing that's become a weekly routine for me.

I've told a few folks in conversation that it's been extremely difficult to connect with people and have these discussions with the way things are right now. We do not have air superiority - it's extremely difficult to get any coverage that isn't negative in the corporate media stream. It's also difficult on social media, as we have seen the Twitter trolls are relentless in their task. Folks around here are good at the ground game though - the word-of-mouth face-to-face chats, town halls, and hollering across the fence to the neighbors. The small local papers also play a huge part and I'm so grateful that they're still around. And the brave souls out there that share things on social media - something more grass roots than what the mainstream media outlets want people to see and hear.

Of course, not all feedback I have received is people agreeing with me, and honestly, I am good with that. I encourage open conversation. And when a certain individual decided to write the Leader of the Official Opposition to bring to her attention my "outlandish" position when it comes to socialism and healthcare reform, well, honestly, that brought a smile to my face. I can't stomach the taste of the socialist kool-aid, and I sure as the heck won't shy away from doing what I can as an MLA to help fix the healthcare issues we have in our area.

The events we are seeing in our day are downright strange. I've heard dueling narrative that there are no issues with supply chains and that all the groceries you want are on the shelves, while at the same time hearing them say you may not be able to get what you want but you will be able to get what you need.

There are striking similarities between what we are experiencing today and what George Orwell wrote about in Animal Farm (1945) and 1984 (1949) where he was critical of communism and state socialism. The cause and effect of two world wars was still very fresh in the minds of many. WWII showed how deeply humanity could dive into darkness before, thankfully, enough people came together to pull us back from the brink. Tinkering with various forms of government commenced over the following decades, and it's no secret the most devastating effects on human rights and freedoms

came from countries that embraced communism. Countries where the citizens had the least number of rights and freedoms to control their own destiny. Countries that banned firearms ownership, controlled the means of production, and ran their own state media.

Fast-forward to our own day, where the Prime Minister speaks of the citizens in his own country by when asking "how long are we going to tolerate them?" All while his crew and the folks in Alberta's Official Opposition cozy up to groups like Extinction Rebellion who openly state they would not be above killing public figures and blowing up infrastructure. These same political figures, who openly want additional restrictions, control of the media, removal of firearms from lawful citizens, are now citing the truckers in this peaceful cross-country protest as pseudo terrorists and are using their influence to keep the story from reaching

the Canadian public. We are in strange times indeed.

It's up to all of us who remember what it was like to have freedoms to ensure that the real Canada emerges from these last two years, and not the "built back better" version. An addition or renovation is nice occasionally, but we can't sit back and let a whole neo-Marxist demolition and rebuild take place.

There are many opportunities throughout Alberta and Canada's political process for folks to be involved, and they need to before that ability disappears - before our country resembles a George Orwell novel (if you haven't read the novels, please do - it takes on a far more serious nature reading it as an adult than it did when I was young).

Join a political party. Take part in forming policy. Take

part in the internal party elections, choosing who sits on the boards and who ultimately leads the party. I can tell you firsthand, that grass roots involvement does make an impact, and that if you don't participate in the process, ultimately the minority of the population will dictate what the majority will be doing.

Let's keep talking with one another, even when we have contradictory opinions. Let's keep expressing ourselves and sharing real stories from real people. Those truckers rolling on down to Ottawa show that in a free country, everyone has a voice. We may have to resort to social media, private pod casts (like the Shaun Newman podcast that I'll be on Feb 05 in Kitscoty), or the small local papers to be able to speak openly with one another and share ideas, but it is a small price to pay to keep the dream of our country alive.


the discussion, and, frankly, many of us are sick and tired of the topic.

HOW TO PLAN A WEDDING CEREMONY

Months of planning is par for the course for couples about to tie the knot. Much of that planning concerns the reception, and rightfully so. - •Give the ceremony equal footing with the reception. Spend time trying to put a personalized spin on the preceedings, whether that entails writing your own vows or choosing moving music that means something to you. When given ample attention, seemingly minor details can make for a special, memorable ceremony.
- •Choose a ceremony location that is close to the reception site. If a ceremony will take place in a house of worship, try to choose a reception venue close to the ceremony site. This

keeps guests, some of whom may be out-of-towners who have already traveled extensively, from spending too much time on the road during the day of the wedding.

- •Get to know the officiant. The officiant should be someone with whom you both feel comfortable. This person should know you well enough that he or she can preside over the ceremony and add sentiments that come across as authentic and personalized.
- •Do your best to avoid especially lengthy ceremonies. Couples will need to meet the religious requirements if they are getting married in the faith, and there may be some as-

pects of the ceremony that you cannot cut short or modify. But if you have wiggle room, try to keep the ceremony to around 30 minutes; otherwise, you run the risk of guests getting antsy, especially if children are in the audience.

•Decorate the ceremony space. While the altar and aisle are key places to draw attention, couples also can dress up the chairs/pews, ceiling (if allowed), and entrance to the space to make it welcoming and romantic.

Even wedding ceremonies that likely won't run long can benefit from some pre-wedding planning.

HOW TO AVOID WEDDING RECEPTION SEATING MISTAKES

Weddings are great opportunities for people to gather and celebrate the melding of two families into one. Weddings are a melting pot, and while the ultimate goal is for all guests invited to mingle and have a good time, preexisting relationships may cause some wedding-day interactions to be strained. However, with careful planning and some best behavior on the parts of all involved, getting hitched can go off without a hitch.

It's possible for guests who may have tumultuous pasts to keep the peace, but this also can be ensured through careful seating arrangements. This is just one factor couples need to consider when deciding where guests will sit and dine at receptions. It's important to avoid some common mistakes.

Seating arrangements also ensure everyone is accounted for across the room. Mistake #2: Seating families

Mistake #3: Trying to force new friendships. Avoid trying to figure out who will get along by creating a potpourri table. A cousin in a band will not necessarily want to sit next to your coworker who plays guitar simply because they have a shared love of music. A wedding is not the time to try to create new friendships. If it's meant to be, they'll connect in a more organic way.


Mistake #4: The dreaded kids' table. Young children can probably get away with sitting at a dedicated kids' table, although it may mean their parents have to interrupt their experiences by checking on their kids throughout the night. A bigger faux pas is to sit teenagers or twentysomethings at the kids table even if they seem like youngsters to you. Set a strict cut-off age for a children's table.

Mistake #5: Being too strict in seating. It's one thing to direct couples or singletons to specific tables, quite another to assign specific seats. Do not dictate exactly where at the table a guest should sit. Some people arrive early, others late, and it is up to them to work out how to arrange themselves at the table.


Mistake #6: Failing to get family feedback. Always check with your parents and future in-laws as resources about how to seat certain guests. They'll likely know who will make the best table-mates, especially if couples are not familiar with everyone on the guest list.

Mistake #7: Not being aware of disabilities or needs. Be conscious of guests' needs. An elderly relative may not be comfortable in front of the DJ table. A person in a wheelchair may need easy access to and from the reception room. It's important to be mindful of these special needs.




