... but it will help officers track down video evidence in an ongoing criminal investigation in the area.

The program aims to reduce the time an officer needs to search for and gather video evidence when conducting an investigation. The Parkland CAP-TURE program allows a person or business to upload a portion of the video requested. This allows the officer to evaluate the video footage before deciding to ask for a copy.

To get started, visit the website at www.parklandcapture.ca and create an account. From there you can enter your contact information and video cameras on the secure site. Your infor-

mation is not available for anyone to see. If an officer needs to contact you, they will do so by the information provided.

Things to know about the program:

- This is completely voluntary and consent can be withdrawn at any time
- You can share your video footage through the website for an officer to view before they decide if the video will help in their investigation
- An officer can provide you with a USB thumb drive to copy the video onto
- An officer can not download the video, they can only view it
- Registering a camera and contact information allows the RCMP to see a list of security cameras so

they can contact the owners during an investigation

This strategy is another way the Parkland RCMP are working with our communities to help solve crime faster, together. By providing video footage to police during an investigation, communities increase the chance of a successful prosecution.



ALBERTA RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT INVESTIGATE HOMICIDE AT DRUMHELLER INSTITUTION

The assault on 34-year-

old Jeffrey Ryan of Parkland County, Alta., by Ashley Baird (38) of Nanaimo, B.C., was allegedly unprovoked.

Jeffrey Ryan sustained serious injuries and was transported to hospital where he died.

The Alberta RCMP Major

Crimes Unit has taken carriage of the investigation.

An autopsy has been ordered by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner and will be performed in the coming days.

Ashley Baird has been charged with second degree

murder and will be appearing in Drumheller Provincial Court on Feb. 11, 2022.

As these matters are before the courts, no further details surrounding the incident can be released.

GROW YOUR OWN OYSTER MUSHROOMS!

Take Home Grow Kit and Live Webinar hosted by Yellowhead County (January 26, 2022 - Edson, AB) Learn how to grow your own oyster mushrooms with a take-home grow kit and accompanying webinar with a fungi enthusiast on March 3rd, 2022, 7pm-9pm.

Tara Stephens, a budding mycologist and the co-owner of Fungi Akuafo, will take participants through the basic ecology of fungi, followed by step-bystep instructions for your grow kit and how to use your kit to grow mushrooms in your backyard.

Kits will be available for pick-up from Yellowhead County's Edson and Wildwood offices between February 24th to March 1st. In addition to the step-bystep instructions given in the webinar, printed instructions will be included when you pick up your kit. Participants will need a small spray/mister bottle and a large clear plastic bag that will serve as a humidity tent.

Once the kits arrive from

the growers, emails will be sent to confirm when they're ready for pick-up.

Register early as the number of kits available is limited. The cost for both the oyster mushroom grow kit and access to the webinar is \$20.00. Maximum 1 kit per household.

PREDATOR CONTROL WORKSHOP FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Livestock predation is an ongoing problem for agricultural producers in Alberta - with coyotes, wolves, bear and cougar, depending on the area.

This one-day workshop provides training to livestock producers to help mitigate problems from predation. The workshop takes place at the Peers Multiplex on February 26, 2022, from 9am to 5pm. The cost per person is \$20 to register and lunch is provided. The workshop is hosted by Yellowhead County in partnership with the Alberta Trappers Association.

Participants will learn:

- How to create an unfriendly environment for large predators and an understanding of the biology of wolves and coyotes.
- Capture methods, both lethal and live capture.
- · Safe handling of equip-

ment and legal requirements.

- The use of "properly made neck snares" and how to set them where legally permitted. Also, why many people have very poor success. What works and what doesn't, so that you're not wasting your time.
- Traps that are safe for pets where legal.
- A hands-on field portion is included in this workshop.
- A program set up by the

Trappers association to link livestock producers with trappers that have been properly trained to deal with coyotes and wolves.

The object of this program is not only to provide training, but also to get livestock producers working together with the Alberta Trappers Association to create a cooperative approach for predator control.
