conference on Tuesday, starting with the Restriction Exemption Program. Aside from the segregation, which is an issue unto itself, the passports have been ineffective in this Omicron wave. We have close to 90 percent of the population vaccinated, yet cases exploded with this variant. It's time to get back to our "pre-pandemic normal" and the light at the end

of the tunnel is drawing closer.

## RURAL COMMUNITIES WILL ATTRACT NEW DOCTORS

Applications open Feb. 1 for a program providing benefits to bring new family physicians to rural Alberta.

The Rural Education Supplement and Integrated Doctor Experience (RE-SIDE) program will provide \$2 million to 20 new family

physicians in each of the next three years. The physicians will practise in 15 identified rural or remote communities of need. Further communities will be identified in subsequent years.

"RESIDE will be key in attracting new family physicians to bring Albertans in rural communities the health care they deserve. By addressing rural physician recruitment and retention, this \$6-million program is another part of our \$90-million commitment this year to ensure Albertans have equitable access to physicians no matter where they live."



Family physicians who choose to work in specific communities will be eligible for \$60,000 for undergraduate tuition fee reimbursement, as well as a remote community incentive ranging from \$20,000 to \$40,000, depending on the community's remoteness. In exchange, successful physicians will provide three years of service in a designated rural community.

"Rural and remote communities continue to face challenges recruiting and retaining family physicians, with deep consequences for the care Albertans receive. RESIDE will help bring 20 family physicians to provide needed care in every corner of our province each year - and help them stay. I'm pleased to see Alberta's government is committed to attracting doctors to communities like Grande Cache and committed to providing health care in rural Alberta."



### **WE'RE 100 YEARS OLD!**

On Monday morning the children of the Beaufre School District, Onoway, began their studies in the new \$11,000 brick school the removal of equipment from the old schoolhouse having been made over this week end by Messrs. Ledger and Watkins."

This quote from the Journal praised the extraordinary new school in Onoway. (The name

of the school was incorrectly spelled but ...) The building referred to was located on a four-acre lot near the depot (train station). It was of "solid brick construction on a cement concrete foundation ... all exposed parts of the wall are laid up with pressed brick, the front walls having ornamental panels of brick of neat design."

The story goes on to describe the building in detail: its two classrooms, playrooms in the basement, furnace rooms enclosed with brick (thus practically fireproof), a teachers room above the entrance, etc. The contract had been signed in October 1921 and the building completed 20 days ahead of the due date!

There was no doubt that the Beaupré School was in a totally different league from the 4,000 schoolhouses that were popping up in Alberta in the early 20th century. \$11,000 was spent on the building and equipment which were designed to accommodate 80 scholars. After the official opening, the school board announced that the principal, Mr. Bramley, would soon be having an assistant (Miss Husband). There were 42 students registered.

Now, 100 years later, the Old Brick School still stands out as a unique structure in our community. Many of the other country schools were built by groups of farmers who pooled their efforts and resources to build a one-room wooden frame school building – anything, just so their children would be able to attend a school not too far from their homestead.

Which was the case with the first Beaupré School (1905 -1922). It was built on the crossroads of today's Highway 37 and Highway 43, on RR23 just east of the west bend. Because the railroad had been built along Lac Ste. Anne Trail and consequently a hamlet was evolving, the original Beaupré School was closed when this new high-class school was built north of the railway track. (The first Beaupré School was loaded on skids pulled by 14 horses and hauled to the new Onoway site where it was re-purposed as a store, church, and farm implement shop before being demolished in 1968.

At the same time, the barn from the first Beaupré School was moved behind the Brick School to fill that need at the new school.)

By the end of 1922, there were 33 students in Mr. Bramley's senior room (grades IV to X) and 36 in Miss Husband's junior room (grades I to III). Among the students that first year were many from long-time Onoway area families: Turnbull, Armitstead, Gray, Jolly, Ablett, Young, Green, Blacklock, Gunn, Yeoman, Spreen, Ledger, Greer, Guenette, Alsop, Moren.

Although this fine new building was impressive, the two classrooms were very soon not enough. In January 1927 a room was opened in the annex of the Onoway Community Hall; this site was used through to the 1940s. Classes were also held in the Pentecostal Church.

In 1945 two classrooms were added to the Brick School and two more acres of land purchased (with another four acres purchased later). More rooms were added in 1950 as east and west wings, and by 1952, there were 15 rooms in operation (some in the basement of the school). By yearend in 1953, 400 pupils were registered and the school board again looked ahead to accommodating growing numbers of students because of centralization and small rural schools closing. School 'bus' transportation made this all possible.

In order to complete high school, students had to go to a larger centre outside the division, e.g. Stony Plain or Edmonton or the "Dormitory" in Sangudo. It wasn't until the 1945-1946 school year that four students registered in grade 12 and in 1947, the Beaupré School could boast about its first grade 12 graduates: Beatrice Evans, Violet

Gudmundson, Harry Taylor and Clarence Tomlinson. From then up to 2021, the total number of grads rose to 4,672.

Huge changes came in 1954 when a gym was built on to the north side of the Brick School + girls and boys washrooms. A separate three-room primary school was built in 1956 east of the Brick School. But again, more space was needed so a "school" was built linking the Brick School with the primary school.

In 1960 Onoway High School (with five classrooms) was built so students in grades 10 to 12 now had their own home. Then in 1969-1970, Beaupré School was crossed off the operational school list and was replaced by Onoway Jr. Sr. High School and Onoway Elementary School.

Onoway's residents have good reason to think of and to celebrate this unique brick building – the start of education in Onoway. How many students have spent time in the rooms of the Brick School? In Onoway Elementary School? Or in the demolished Onoway Jr. Sr. High School? And what about the teachers and non-teaching staff? Let's acknowledge the old school days and visit the Old Brick School – now Onoway Museum – to recognize how far we've come education-wise in this community.

## Bridal Guide

## YOUR WEDDING TIMELINE GUIDE

Wedding planning involves many movable pieces that ultimately need to come together on the big day. Planning is typically a monthslong process, and adhering to certain monthly benchmarks can help couples stay the course.

Brides magazine offers that the perfect engagement period is 12 to 14 months, which affords ample time to get organized and work with vendors. With that in mind, here's a 12-month timeline for couples getting ready to say "I do."

#### 12 months out

At the start of the planning process, establish your budget, hire a wedding planner (optional), choose the wedding party, pick a date, and start to assemble a cursory guest list. This also is a great time to begin touring venues to get a feel for potential ceremony and reception locales.

#### 11 months out

Now is the time to get a firm handle on the theme and scope of the wedding. Start picking wedding colors and overall design. Also, interview and hire vendors, such as photographers, bands and videographers. These vendors tend to book up quickly as wedding season draws near, so it's never too early to book them.

#### 10 months out

This is a good time to start shopping for a wedding gown because it might take some trial and error to find the perfect dress. You also can start shopping for wedding party attire at this time. Check with formal-

wear vendors to see how long it will take for the gowns to arrive in the shop for alterations. If you haven't already done so, be sure to book the wedding venue.

#### 8 months out

Reception halls may have their own schedules, but you should think about setting your menu at this time, including deciding if you will host a seated dinner, a buffet or something else.

Eight months out also is a good time to finalize the guest list and send save-the-date cards.

This also is a good time to visit stores to create registry gift lists.

#### 6 months out

Meet with potential florists and other vendors, like transportation companies and hotels, to secure these arrangements. Your place of worship also may require certain classes or preparatory meetings, so be sure to inquire about these.

Meet with a makeup and hair stylist and book a trial. Choose attire for groomsmen and give them a deadline for fittings and orders. If you will not be getting married in a place of worship, hire an officiant at this time.

#### 4 months out


Grooms traditionally arrange the honeymoon, so this is a fine time to get those travel plans in order. If you need passports, you should secure them as early as possible, and no later than four months prior to the wedding to ensure processing times. Book cake tastings and order the cake if it is not part of the venue food and beverage package. If you haven't already done so, the bride should have an initial gown fitting, and wedding invitations should be ordered at this time.

#### 2 months out

Secure your wedding license and buy wedding party gifts. Address and mail the wedding invitations. Undergo a second gown fitting and work with the seamstress for the final fitting date just before the wedding. Finalize any song selections with the DJ or band.

The final details will occur in the last weeks before the wedding. Buy all the small accessories and items, undergo final fittings and check in with all vendors for final payments and to ensure they are on schedule. Notify the reception hall of the final guest count.

Once the wedding day arrives, couples who have done their best to stay on schedule can relax and have a great time with family and friends.

## NAVIGATING AN INTERFAITH WEDDING

Celebrating family histories and traditions is a major component of weddings. During a wedding, two families come together and begin to merge their unique takes on life.

When couples tying the knot come from the same cultural or religious backgrounds, fitting the pieces together may be relatively easy. However, when a wedding must incorporate two different religions - each with its specific traditions and requirements - a couple may not know where to start. These tips may help the process along.

#### Communication

It is important to open a dialogue with all involved parties at the onset to be able to craft a ceremony and subsequent celebration that aligns with the faiths of the couple and their families. This dialogue shares what everyone expects. Ask everyone to rank the rituals they would like to be included by order of importance, and then use this as a guide when planning the ceremony.

#### Discuss options

Certain houses of worship may be strict in regard to what they allow during interfaith ceremonies. Conservative congregations may even frown upon marrying outside of one's religion. That may spark an entirely new conversation about converting so couples can be married in the eyes of the church, temple or mosque. More reformed places may be open to blending certain traditions from both faiths. Couples often lean toward having one officiant from each faith at the ceremony to incorporate key rites into the wedding.

#### Neutral ground

Interfaith couples may opt to have the ceremony at a neutral location so they do not appear to be paying favor to one faith over another. Determine if religious officiants can oversee the ceremony outside of a place of worship and still have the marriage recognized by the tenets of that faith.

#### Secular officiant

In instances when it may seem like there are too many obstacles to having faith-guided ceremonies for interfaith weddings, wedding planners may suggest some

creative solutions, including working with a secular officiant. Traditions such as lighting a unity candle or blending two different sands together to signify the blending of two faiths and families can be part of the ceremony, suggests the lifestyle company Sheerluxe.

#### Give others tasks


Couples may be unfamiliar with each other's religious traditions. Sharing faith-specific wedding planning tasks can help couples and their families become more familiar with these customs.




