CANADA EMERGENCY BUSINESS ACCOUNT LOAN FORGIVENESS REPAYMENT DEADLINE EXTENDED

Gerald Soroka Member of Parliament for Yellowhead wishes to advise that the - Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) Loan Forgiveness Repayment Deadline has been extended. The repayment deadline for CEBA loans to qualify for partial loan forgiveness is being extended from December 31, 2022, to December 31, 2023, for all eligible borrowers in good standing.

This extension will support short-term economic recovery and offer greater repayment flexibility to small businesses and notfor-profit organizations, many of which are facing continued challenges due to the pandemic. Repayment on or before the new deadline of December 31, 2023, will result in loan forgiveness of up to a third of the value of the loans (meaning up to \$20,000).

Outstanding loans would subsequently convert to two-year term loans with interest of 5 per cent per annum commencing on January 1, 2024, with the loans fully due by December 31, 2025.

The repayment deadline to qualify for partial forgiveness for CEBA-equivalent lending through the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund is also extended to December 31, 2023.





Reporting community concerns is now just a click away for Leduc residents with the City's launch of a partnership with the SeeClickFix app.

The app allows residents to

quickly and easily submit a report directly to Public Services staff when they see a problem in the community such as:

•potholes,

•broken playground equipment,

When an issue is reported through the app, residents can

opt to also submit a photo of the problem and can choose to be notified of progress as City staff respond to and fix the issue. All reports that are submitted are directed straight to Public Services staff for an efficient and expedited follow-up.

LEDUC RCMP CHARGE MALE FOR THEFT OF TRUCK

On Jan. 19, 2022 at approximately 3:56 a.m., Leduc RCMP responded to a report of a theft of vehicle in progress in the area of 49 Street in Calmar.

Leduc RCMP attended the area and observed a truck with a broken rear window and an unknown suspect inside attempting to steal the vehicle. During the arrest, the suspect resisted resulting in the deployment of a Conducted Energy Weapon to gain compliance of the male suspect.

Emergency Medical Services attended the scene

to assess the suspect who was released into police custody. Two officers required treatment for their injuries at a medical facility. "This is a clear example of the extent that criminals will undergo to avoid being arrested" says Inspector Jeff McBeth, Officer in Charge of the Leduc RCMP. "Our members will not be deterred from doing their duties in keeping Albertans Safe. And I am grateful they both will recover from their injuries."

As officer's continued their investigation, they located two additional suspects in another truck. ALBERTA'S ECONOMY IS HEATING UP, EVEN AS THE TEMPERATURES GROW COLD.

Despite the chilly season, our caucus has been hard at work. NAVIGATING AN INTERFAITH WEDDING

Traffic flow has resumed in the area of Highway 814 and Township Road 502 in Leduc County following two collisions.




The driver of the pickup truck, a 75-year-old male from Beaumont, Alta. was assessed for injuries and released on scene.


