PART I Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms Whereas Canada is founded upon principles that recognize the supremacy of God and the rule of law:

Rights and freedoms in Canada 1 The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guarantees the rights and freedoms set out in it subject only to such reasonable limits prescribed by law as can be demonstrably justified in a free and democratic society.

Fundamental freedoms 2 Everyone has the following fundamental freedoms: (a) freedom of conscience and religion; (b) freedom of thought, belief, opinion, and expression, including freedom of the press and other media of communication; (c) freedom of peaceful assembly; and (d) freedom of association.

We are fortunate to have a very fulsome, yet simple charter of rights in our country, ...

.... to be used under the direst circumstances...like well, a war or in the case of PM Elliot Trudeau when a domestic terrorist group, known as the FLQ kidnapped a foreign ambassador (James Cross), and murdered a Quebec cabinet minister (Pierre LaPorte). Some say that the circumstances there didn't even warrant the act being invoked, but it was limited in time, and location to end very quickly a violent situation.

The preamble of the act below, the Coles notes version as it were, something that the current PM should have read states the purpose, and how in general terms the act should be used. Here is the link so you can read for yourself. (Emergencies Act (justice.gc.ca)).

WHEREAS the safety and

BRAD

security of the individual, the protection of the values of the body politic and the preservation of the sovereignty, security and territorial integrity of the state are fundamental obligations of government.

AND WHEREAS the fulfilment of those obligations in Canada may be seriously threatened by a national emergency and, to ensure safety and security during such an emergency, the Governor in Council should be authorized, subject to the supervision of Parliament, to take special temporary measures that may not be appropriate in normal times.

AND WHEREAS the Governor in Council, in taking such special temporary measures, would be subject to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the Canadian Bill of Rights and must have regard to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, particularly with respect to those fundamental rights that are not to be limited or abridged even in a national emergency.

So herein lies the rub. I honestly believe that neither the founding fathers of our country, nor those that create the laws, especially the constitution, the War Measures Act, or the Emergency Measures Act for that matter could have conceived that we would have such an underqualified Prime Minister that would be elected. Moreover, that there would be checks and balances in place, that would not allow only foolhardy actions but reckless abandon when it comes to rights and freedoms.

I'll ask all of you to help me to put this to an end, I fear

that we are going to have a stain on our country's history at this point, but there also have been so many good things that have come out of the last three weeks. We have seen many of the leaders for what they are. We have seen the best and the worst of ourselves along the way as well. What I am asking you is this.



NO SPRAY PROGRAM YEARLY RENEWAL

Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires landowners who do not want herbicide applied adjacent to their property to enter into an agreement with the county prior to April 1^{s} of each year. The landowner becomes responsible for weed and brush control in the designated areas, as defined by the no spray agreement.

If you cannot meet this deadline, please call our Agricultural Services Department at 780-325-3782 or 1-800-814-3935.

- Once an agreement has been completed no spray signs must be purchased at a cost of \$5.00 for two signs, at the Yellowhead County Edson or Wildwood Offices. These signs must be placed by the landowner in a highly visible area as close as possible to the property line.
- Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires each landowner who has signed the agreement to fulfill their obligations before the July 1st deadline. After the July 1st deadline, Yellowhead County re-assumes responsibility for weed and brush control and may apply herbicide adjacent to non-compliant roadsides if necessary.
- · If you chose not to renew your agreement for 2022, we ask that you please remove your signs prior to the start of the spray season starting May 1st, 2022.


that were way to tight before!

Size

Until they can agree on a guest list, couples might want to delay even looking for venues. However, some couples might want to first look at some venues so they can determine just how many guests they can afford to invite. If possible, look for venues with multiple reception areas, which might allow for some wiggle room if the guest list grows or dwindles during the planning process.

Availability

Some couples might have an ideal time of year they hope to get married. Some even know the exact date they hope to get married. While

that can help with the planning, it can also limit couples with regard to their venue options. Some venues may be booked for as much as a year or more in advance during peak wedding season. The Real Weddings Study found that the most popular months to get married in 2016 were October and September. Couples who hope to follow in the footsteps of many 2016 brides and grooms may need to book their wedding venues well in advance.

Those who can be more flexible regarding their wedding dates may find it easier to book their dream venues. Insurance

Ask about the venue's insurance policies, including the policies the venue has to protect itself. In addition, ask if the venue requires couples to have their own wedding liability insurance for protection in the event of injury, property damage or incidents related to alcohol. Couples may also want to make the investment in cancellation/postponement insurance, and some venues

may even require it. Financials

It's easy for couples to be focused on the bottom line when choosing wedding venues, but it's also important that they get a complete grasp of the financials before choosing a wedding venue. Ask about the amount of the initial deposit and if that deposit is refundable. In addition, ask when the deposit is due and when each subsequent payment is due until the balance is paid in full. ues while recognizing that certain factors must be given ample consideration before signing any contracts.

MP SOROKA'S STATEMENT ON FREEDOM OF SPEECH

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, gave the following statement in the House.

"Mr. Speaker, prior to my time in Parliament, I served in municipal government. I was encouraged to speak up on behalf of the people who put their trust in me. I am concerned I do not have the same freedom to ask legitimate questions about the government or popular narratives of society. In the past two years, many of the people in my riding have expressed concerns about their rights and freedoms. We say every Canadian has individual rights and freedoms, but our right to free speech is under attack. I am not talking about hate speech, but about having one's own opinion or questioning the government or society's popular narrative. For me, it seems that if someone asks questions about or does not agree with this narrative, their voice is shut down by hateful rhetoric, labelling them racist, misogynistic or a conspiracy theorist.

What has happened to our freedom of speech? I hope we all can work to re-establishing this core principle in our domestic society."





Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is proud to collaborate with a number of partners to ensure that Indigenous perspectives are appropriately included in all programs of study offered in our schools. This collaboration is to assist our teachers in learning more about the history and the legacy of residential schools, the Treaties and the history of Indigenous peoples in order to better meet the needs of Aboriginal students.

Many of our schools also offer a Cree and Michif program taught by certificated teacher, Ms. Sandra Davenport, who has been teaching Plains Cree 'Y' dialect for over 18 years in GYPSD. Wildwood School. Niton Central. Crescent Valley Elementary in Hinton, Pine Grove Middle School in Edson, and both Sheldon Coates School and Summitview School in Grande

Cache, have all welcomed Miss Davenport to work with their students from Grades 2 to 8.

Originally from the historic Mêtis community of Ilea-la Crosse, Saskatchewan, Sandra has called Edson home since 2002. She started sharing her knowledge of Northern Michif with students in GYPSD schools three years ago. This educational opportunity is key to keeping Michif alive and well.

Language and culture are inextricably related. And you can't learn one without first knowing the other. Language is related to all features of human life in society. And comprehension of the surrounding culture is key to learning a language. The language also allows for the development and evolution of cultural values.


