TEACHERS WANT NORMALCY, BUT CAUTION IS STILL NEEDED

In response to the latest COVID-19 provincial update, ATA president Jason Schilling has released the following statement:

Just one month ago, the government decided to extend winter break and provided new, medical grade masks to all schools. Now just days after those masks have arrived in some schools, the provincial government has decided to eliminate masking requirements entirely. The school community expects that the government will make decisions after carefully considering expert scientific advice and, when appropriate, proceed with a gradual reduction in safety protocols so that students and teachers can continue to learn and teach with confidence that our schools are safe and healthy places.

"A return to a more normal school setting is something that everyone is hoping for. However, we do not want a hasty decision, only to take us a step backwards in a few weeks. We urge the government to take a more cautious approach regarding the safety protocols in schools."

"Teachers, like most Albertans, are tired of the pandemic, but they are also worried about the speed at which the government announced the removal of the one protection that was available to all studentsmasking."

Throughout the past two years, the minister of education has consistently abdicated the responsibility of the pandemic response to school boards. The minister has stated the importance of school boards' autonomy and their ability to make decisions and respond to specific local needs. In response, many boards stepped up and made the hard, but necessary, decisions to ensure community safety. However yesterday, this strategy changed, and the minister stripped school boards of their capacity to respond to COVID in their schools and communities.

"Once again, the government has made a decision without consulting educational stakeholders, including the Association and school boards. Consulting those working every day in schools was the bare minimum the government should have done. They didn't."

The government of Alberta has repeatedly stated that schools reflect the COVID that is present in the community. Average COVID rates remain at a high level across the province, and students will now be in crowded spaces, many poorly ventilated, without masks.

"We have consistently heard from the government that schools reflect the COVID that is present in the community. Why remove the mask mandate so quickly when community spread has not decreased significantly? What will be so different next week from this week?"

"Mr. Speaker, we have consistently introduced responsible legislation on firearms to make sure that the laws in place protect Canadians and that lawful firearms ownership is also protected, but that, like all forms of rights and freedoms in our society, comes with reasonable restrictions. Just as in any other element of life, that is what we do with firearms because our priority is the safety of Canadians and making sure that we do not let ideology get in the way of making decisions for public safety."

City will follow provincial direction in lifting of public health measures

In response to the Province of Alberta's announcement on Feb. 8, the Restriction Exemption Program was removed within the City of Leduc as of 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 8.

RURAL COMMUNITIES WILL ATTRACT NEW DOCTORS

Applications open Feb. 1 for a program providing benefits to bring new family physicians to rural Alberta.

The Rural Education Supplement and Integrated Doctor Experience (RESIDE) program will provide \$2 million to 20 new family physicians in each of the next three years. The physicians will practise in 15 identified rural or remote communities of need. Further communities will be identified in subsequent years.

"RESIDE will be key in attracting new family physicians to bring Albertans in rural communities the health care they deserve. By addressing rural physician recruitment and retention, this \$6-million program is another part of our \$90-million commitment this year to ensure Albertans have equitable access to physicians no matter where they live."

Family physicians who choose to work in specific communities will be eligible for \$60,000 for undergraduate tuition fee reimbursement, as well as a remote community incentive ranging from \$20,000 to \$40,000, depending on the community's remoteness. In exchange, successful physicians will provide three years of service in a designated rural community.

"Rural and remote communities continue to face challenges recruiting and retaining family physicians, with deep consequences for the care Albertans receive. RE-SIDE will help bring 20 family physicians to provide needed care in every corner of our province each year – and help them stay. I'm pleased to see Alberta's government is committed to attracting doctors to communities like Grande Cache and committed to providing health care in rural Alberta."



Check with formalwear vendors to see how long it will take for the gowns to arrive in the shop for alterations. If you haven't already done so, be sure to book the wedding venue.

8 months out

Eight months out also is a good time to finalize the guest list and send save-the-date cards.

This also is a good time to visit stores to create registry gift lists.

6 months out

.... or preparatory meetings, so be sure to inquire about these.

Meet with a makeup and hair stylist and book a trial. Choose attire for groomsmen and give them a deadline for fittings and orders. If you will not be getting married in a place of worship, hire an officiant at this time.

4 months out

Grooms traditionally arrange the honeymoon, so this is a fine time to get those travel plans in order. If you need passports, you should secure

them as early as possible, and no later than four months prior to the wedding to ensure processing times. Book cake tastings and order the cake if it is not part of the venue food and beverage package. If you haven't already done so, the bride should have an initial gown fitting, and wedding invitations should be ordered at this time.

2 months out

Secure your wedding license and buy wedding party gifts. Address and mail the wedding invitations. Undergo a second gown fitting and work with the seamstress for the final fitting date just before the wedding.

Finalize any song selections with the DJ or band.

The final details will occur in the last weeks before the wedding. Buy all the small accessories and items, undergo final fittings and check in with all vendors for final payments and to ensure they are on schedule. Notify the reception hall of the final guest count.

Once the wedding day arrives, couples who have done their best to stay on schedule can relax and have a great time with family and friends.





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JOBS, JOBS, JOBS

That is what Albertans were seeing when they looked at January's Labour Force Survey from Statistics Canada that showed Alberta created 7,000 net new jobs in January, while much of the country saw significant losses.

The report shows Alberta continued to lead Canada with an employment rate of 64.5 per cent and a declining unemployment rate. Alberta is one of only five provinces to see such growth and one of only four provinces to see a drop in its unemployment rate.

This data followed a strong year for Alberta that saw nearly 130,000 net new jobs created and our unemployment rate drop to its lowest since before the pandemic began. While modest, January's numbers show a continuation of those trends. Year over year, Alberta's unemployment rate has gone from 10.8 per cent in January of last year to 7.2 per cent last month.

Our people are going back to work. The share of those ages 25 to 54 with jobs – the "prime age employment rate" – exceeded to approximately 85 per cent in January – the highest rate we've seen in seven years.

The January labour numbers also showed very strong numbers for female labour participation. The labour force participation rate for women ages 25 to 54 is now approximately 85 per cent – the highest rate in the history of our province. That is amazing news for our economy.

As the pandemic wanes, Alberta's economic recovery continues to show strong momentum. This is a far cry from when the Notley NDP lost 200,000 jobs with no pandemic. Alberta is starting to look like its old self again as our oilpatch roars and our people go back to work. As many have said, Alberta is starting to get its "swagger back".

Our economy is also continuing to experience strong economic diversification, and I am confident we will continue to see growth in our province as word spreads that Alberta is a business and entrepreneur-friendly jurisdiction with a high quality of life and low cost of living.

Last year, we saw several record-breaking investments in our province, and we are looking forward to even more investment in 2022. The most recent reports show increases in retail sales, restaurant sales, wholesale trade and oil production. Further, the province saw building permits increase by 30 per cent over the past year.

The pandemic has been challenging for so many Albertans, but we will soon be back to normal, at which point our economy will really take-off. I am very excited about the outlook for our province. If we can produce such strong numbers with a pandemic weighing on us, imagine what we will do when we are back to normal. Alberta is coming back, and I am very much looking forward to the days ahead.

Thank you, as always, for your strength and fortitude. I look forward to providing you with more positive updates soon about jobs and Alberta's economic recovery soon.

MP SOROKA'S STATEMENT ON FREEDOM OF SPEECH

"Mr. Speaker, prior to my time in Parliament, I served in municipal government. I was encouraged to speak up on behalf of the people who put their trust in me. I am concerned I do not have the same freedom to ask legitimate questions about the government or popular narratives of society. In the past two years, many of the people in my riding have expressed concerns about their rights and freedoms. We say every Canadian has individual rights and freedoms, but our right to free speech is under attack. I am not talking about hate speech, but about having one's own opinion or questioning the government or society's popular narrative. For me, it seems that if someone asks questions about or does not agree with this narrative, their voice is shut down by hateful rhetoric, labelling them racist, misogynistic or a conspiracy theorist.

What has happened to our freedom of speech? I hope we all can work to re-establishing this core principle in our domestic society."

Alberta's government continues to reduce red tape by modernizing and streamlining services.

Since June 2020, when changes were introduced to make registry services more accessible, more than 350,000 transactions have been completed online.

"We've been working hard with industry partners to make sure Albertans have options that are flexible, convenient and modern. The increased use in online services is an important milestone as we continue to reduce red tape and make services more accessible."

Services can be completed anytime, anywhere, and Albertans are increasingly looking to complete these transactions online. For example, new parents can register the birth of their child and order their child's first birth certificate before they leave the hospital, or when they return home. Since changes were made, more than 83 per cent of all birth registrations and about 75 per cent of first birth certificate orders have been

completed online.

The following registry services were brought online in 2020 and 2021:

Birth registrations

• Extra-provincial registration for corporations and limited partnerships across western Canada

• Name Search Report ordering

• Annual registration renewals for various vehicle types

• In-transit permit orders

• Specialty licence plate orders

• Duplicate vehicle registration certificates

MyAlberta Digital ID has been a key element for Alberta's government to bring more services online. A verified MyAlberta Digital ID account allows Albertans to sign in, verify their identities using their driver's licences or ID cards, and complete registry services without needing to visit a registry agent in person.
