# RELIEF AT THE PUMPS IS HERE FOR ALBERTANS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Alberta's government is no longer collecting the provincial fuel tax while oil prices are high.

Drivers will save the 13cent provincial fuel tax on every litre of gasoline or diesel they purchase. With the corresponding reduction in GST, this amounts to total savings of about \$6.80 per tank for a compact car (50 litres), \$7.21 for a small SUV (53 litres), \$12.65 for a mid-size SUV (93 litres), \$18.50 for a large pickup truck (136 litres) and \$185.50 for a semi-trailer (1,364 litres). The measure is in effect now and will remain in place until at least June 30. The government will consider the future of the tax, based on a sliding scale of the price of West Texas Intermediate crude.

# AMNESTY PERIOD FOR ARBITRARY FIREARM BAN EXTENDED

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise the amnesty period for the arbitrary firearms ban that was due to expire in April, is now extended for an additional year and a half.

In May 2020 the Liberals announced they were banning more than 1,500 models of firearms, including the AR-15. Owners of these guns would have a two-year amnesty period to come into compliance with the prohibition.

The Liberals are nearly doubling the amnesty period and stretching out their failed campaign promise beyond 3 elections, leaving the entire process in limbo.

This Liberal firearm ban and plans for a buy-

back program should be scrapped, and the resources should be provided to our police officers, border officials, and grassroots youth diversion programs.

What the Liberals should do is focus on making our streets safer by targeting the true source of gun violence in Canada: illegally smuggled guns in the hands of gangs and criminals.

In providing relief at the pumps to Albertans, the government will see an estimated \$100 to \$115 million decrease in fuel tax revenue for each of the first three months.

Albertans will see further relief through other cost-saving measures to be introduced in the coming months:

•Alberta's government will provide \$150 in electricity rebates to more than one million eligible homes, farms and businesses that have been affected by above-average consumption costs over the past several months.

•A natural gas relief program, announced as part of Budget 2022, will see eligible consumers receive a rebate when natural gas prices exceed \$6.50 per gigajoule starting in October.

•Further details about both programs will be announced in the coming weeks.

Enhancing and maintaining affordability remains a key component of Alberta's Recovery Plan, developed to foster and facilitate the province's economic recovery in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

## Deadline will be June 30

Please note that Property Tax Notices will be mailed in May, with a payment deadline of June 30, 2022, in accordance with Tax Rate Penalty Bylaw #05-2022.

Your property tax notice consists of amounts for municipal taxes; education taxes; the new provincial policing protocol; the seniors housing requisition; and, if applicable, local improvement levies and special taxes. Property taxes are for the full calendar year (January 1 to December 31, 2022). More details will be provided in the mailout.

The revenue collected from property taxes helps the County provide the essential services that ratepayers rely upon. Penalties on current taxes (not including the Tax Prepayment Plan) will result in a penalty of 6% of the unpaid balance of the current taxes, which will be added to and form part of the unpaid tax on July 1 of 2022. A further penalty of 9% of the unpaid balance of the current taxes will be added to and form part of the unpaid tax on October 1, 2022.

Please contact our office if you have purchased a new property in the past 3 months, to ensure we have your correct mailing information on file. Note that the Land Titles office is currently behind in processing address additions and changes.

The Town of Whitecourt is proud to announce that Tehya Ophus and Josiah Moore have been appointed 2022 Mayors for a Day. Both Tehya and Josiah will be accompanying Whitecourt Mayor Pickard throughout his day on April 25 as part of the annual initiative.

Whitecourt Town Council has proclaimed June 18, 2022 as Lemonade Day. Community Futures Yellowhead East is hosting the 2022 Lemonade Day event that teaches youth how to start, own and operate their own business – a lemonade stand. Registration to the program is open until May 1, and further information can be found on https://lemonadeday.org/northern-alberta.

The Government of Canada recently signed the first collective agreement with the National Police Federation (NPF), and updated provinces, territories, and municipalities on the impact the collective bargaining process would have on policing contribution adjustments dating back to 2017. Public Safety Canada provided the Town of Whitecourt an estimate of \$433,000 to \$455,000 as the retroactive amount payable by Whitecourt. Reserve funds have been set aside, and Whitecourt will be required to pay this expenditure once an invoice is received from Public Safety Canada.

Whitecourt Town Council has scheduled a joint workshop for April 11 at 7:00 p.m. so that BR2 Architecture can present the completed detailed designs for the Culture & Events Centre.

The Living Waters Catholic Schools Board of Trustees invited Whitecourt Town Council to meet on June 28. The purpose of the meeting is to provide updates on the school division and school community.

# CANADA EXPANDS SIMPLIFIED RENEWAL PROCESS FOR PASSPORTS

As COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, more and more Canadians are looking to travel abroad. The Government of Canada will continue to modernize and improve its services to better respond to the changing needs of Canadians.

The Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, and the Honourable Karina Gould, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, today announced the expansion of the simplified renewal application process for Canadian passports.

Beginning today, March 31, Canadians in Canada and abroad can now use the simplified process to renew an expired passport as long as it was issued within the last 15 years. The simplified process is also available to individuals who had their passport lost, stolen or damaged. Previously, the simplified renewal process wasn't available for passports expired longer than a year or those that were lost, stolen or damaged.

With the simplified renewal process, applicants don't need to have a guarantor or to provide their original documents, such as proof of citizenship or photo identification. They simply need 2 photos, 2 references, their completed form and the applicable fees. These changes make renewing a passport easier, while maintaining the highest level of program integrity.

With the easing of COVID-19 travel restrictions, the demand for passportsboth new and renewals-has started to increase and is returning to pre-pandemic levels. The Government of Canada recommends that Canadians apply early and not finalize any travel plans until they have received their new passport. Thanks to the simplified process, Canadians without imminent travel plans do not need to rush to renew an expired or soon-toexpire passport.

### Managing and Mitigating Infrastructure Strain

Lac Ste. Anne County is responsible for the preservation and maintenance of all municipal roads, highways and bridges within Lac Ste. Anne County which are under the direction, control and management of the County. A very important part of this responsibility is the protection of roadways during the spring thaw. This time of year can create serious structural damage to roads and bridges if appropriate measures are not taken.

When a road ban occurs, signs indicating the allowed axle percentages are posted on some oiled surfaces and subdivisions. Road ban signage is not posted on gravel roads; however, all roads will be monitored and road bans enforced by Lac Ste. Anne County Enforcement Services to ensure compliance.

In conjunction with the road ban, please note that Lac Ste, Anne County, North 43 Lagoon Commission, and Darwell Lagoon Commission are implementing a wastewater hauler rate decrease to \$32.50 per legal load from the current rate of \$65 per legal load until Lac Ste, Anne County spring road bans are lifted.

Dust Control Program

Calcium suppression

This program helps reduce the impact of dust on residential rural properties adjacent to County roadways. To participate, application forms are required by April 30, 2022 and can be found on our website at: lsac.ca/dust

At this time, two dust applications are available: Purchasing Calcium with a gravel application = \$877 + gst/100 meters and purchasing calcium without a gravel application = \$558 + gst/100 meters.

Roadside Vegetation Management Program

The County spot sprays roadsides and subdivisions between May and September, and mows from June to October. Spot herbicide applications and other integrated management practices will be used throughout the County to control noxious/ prohibited noxious weeds and brush.

Selective herbicide application on roadsides is done to control the spread of noxious and prohibited noxious weeds and brush. The Provincial Weed Control Act dictates which species of weeds are to be controlled by the municipality and on private property.

The county offers a Fence Line Spray Program for those who would like enhanced vegetation control on developed roadsides bordering their property. Those who wish to assume the responsibility of weed and brush control of the roadsides adjacent to their property can apply for the county's No-Spray Program (remember to renew annually).

Alberta's government is introducing a motion in the legislative assembly to urge the Government of Canada to halt the increase to the carbon tax scheduled for April 1.

Alberta's economic recovery is at risk if everyday Albertans are left behind and unable to absorb the costs being imposed on them by the federal government. That's why Alberta's government is urging the Government of Canada to halt the scheduled increase to the carbon tax.

Alberta's government is already taking action by stopping the collection of the provincial fuel tax effective April 1 and providing families with \$150 electricity rebates to help Albertans with the rising cost of living, while capping the price of natural gas to protect consumers.

According to the Bank of Canada, the scheduled April 1 increase of the carbon tax to \$50 a ton will increase inflation by an estimated 0.5 per cent while inflation is already at a 30-year high.

"Albertans will be receivmuch-needed relief ing from the provincial fuel tax and the \$150 electricity rebate, on top of our cap on natural gas prices. Now we need the Government of Canada to stop increasing the cost of living by shelving their planned April 1 carbon tax hike, which they intend to more than triple over the years to come." The federal carbon tax rate on gasoline is set to increase again on April 1, from just under nine cents per litre to just over 11 cents per litre.


Alberta's government will

Though they are often easy to overlook, driveways are durable parts of a home that can greatly impact a home's curb appeal. Driveways endure quite a bit of wear and tear over their lifespans, and homeowners who have not given their driveways much thought may want to start looking for potential trouble signs that indicate a need for some driveway maintenance.

According to the on-

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line home improvement resource HomeAdvisor. com, the average cost of a driveway installation in 2015 was just under \$3,700. Those costs are influenced by a host of factors, including the size of the driveway and the material its made of. Damaged driveways do not necessarily need to be replaced, as some may just need minor repairs. But homeowners who see any of the following trouble signs

in their driveways may want to consult a professional contractor to determine what their next steps should be.

1. Potholes

Potholes might be most often associated with heavily trafficked roadways, but even driveways are susceptible to potholes. As the ground beneath the driveway expands and contracts, the pavement above that ground weakens and becomes more susceptible

to damage. That damage may ultimately lead to large chunks of the driveway breaking down, creating holes as a result. Homeowners who live in areas that experience heavy snowfall may see their driveways develop potholes after they are shoveled or plowed. Potholes that are not fixed may damage vehicles that drive on the pavement, and potholes may even expand over time.

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2. Accumulation of water

Puddles that form during a rainstorm may not be indicative of anything other than a rainy day. But water that pools or runs down the middle of the driveway may indicate drainage problems. Such problems may be the result of structural problems with the slope of the driveway, which can cause bigger issues down the road. When water is not absorbed into the ground or directed away from your home, it can then flow into the house, potentially making your garage or home susceptible to water damage.

3. Cracks

Cracking is one of the more noticeable issues that can plague driveways. Many driveways experience cracking as materials inevitably succumb to the elements. Driveway cracks may develop for various reasons, including poor initial installation. Tree roots that grow beneath the driveway surface may also contribute to cracking as the driveways ultimately succumb to the pressure created by the growing roots. Some cracks may prove less problematic than others, but homeowners should still speak with a contractor if they notice their driveway is starting to succumb to cracks.

Driveways may not draw the attention of

homeowners too often, but damaged driveways that go ignored may ultimately lead to very costly problems.

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According to the International Association of Certified Home Inspectors, as much as half of the energy used in homes goes toward heating and cooling. The following are a handful of ways to make heating and cooling a home more eco-friendly.

Insulate

Insulation often is associated with warmth, and rightfully so, as it is used to protect a home from cold weather. However, insulation also is effective at cooling homes. Many insulation materials work by slowing down the way heat moves through materials and into spaces. Proper insulation can provide effective resistance to the flow of heat, meaning it can help block hot air from flowing into the interior of a home. Insulation will help reduce the amount of work a cooling system will have to do to cool a home thanks to the flow of heat.

Replace air filters

Air filters trap dust, debris and other microscopic particles so they are not circulating in the air or clogging up vents. Over time, air filters can become so bogged down with dirt that air cannot move through a home very easily, forcing cooling systems to work harder. Simply replacing the

filters can help cooling systems work more efficiently.

Adjust the thermostat

Programmable thermostats allow homeowners to adjust their cooling systems for when they are home and when they are out. Air conditioners can be set at higher temperatures when residents are at work or school, and then lowered before residents arrive home.

Reduce Energy Costs While Ensuring Homes Stay Cool

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Try evaporative coolers Sometimes called "swamp coolers," these devices can be effective in regions with low humidity. The U.S. Department of Energy notes that these coolers evaporate water into the air to provide a natural and energy-efficient means of cooling a home. When operating an evaporative cooler, windows are opened part way to allow warm indoor air to escape as it is replaced

by cooled air. Unlike central air conditioning systems that recirculate the same air, evaporative coolers provide a steady stream of fresh air into the house. Plus, they consume only about one-quarter of the energy consumed by more traditional air conditioners.

Ceiling fans

Fans help to circulate air throughout a home and create an effective draft. Ceiling fans are usually most effective at circulating air throughout a room. The larger the blades, the more air that can be offset by the fan. Many fans operate quietly and effectively. In some locations, fans may be all that's needed to cool a space. In others, fans may work in conjunction with air conditioners to enable homeowners to raise the thermostat by about 4 F.

Keeping a home cool and saving money in the process is possible by making a few tweaks to the cooling system.

Upon reaching retirement age, new retirees may face decisions regarding their living arrangements. Some seniors may opt to stay put, while others may want to downsize their homes to save money and relieve themselves of the burdens of maintaining larger homes. But those are not the only situations seniors find themselves in. Some seniors realize they can no longer care for themselves without assistance. In such instances, seniors

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may opt for assisted living facilities or choose to move in with a relative, such as a grown son or daughter. While assisted living facilities are designed to meet the needs of the elderly, young men and women welcoming seniors into their homes may need to take on some home improvement projects to ensure their homes are as safe as possible for elderly residents.

• Convert a room on the first floor into a bedroom. While this may not apply to all seniors, some men and women struggle with stairs as they age, and that can make it difficult for them to fully participate in a household. Homeowners with an extra room to spare can convert a room on the first floor of their homes into a bedroom so seniors won't have to climb up and down stairs throughout the day. That ease of accessibility to the primary floor of the house encourages seniors to be active participants in a household. If possible, choose an area that is close to a first-floor bathroom.

•Take steps to make bathrooms safer. The National Institute on Aging says that more than one in three seniors over age 65 fall each year, and 80 percent of those falls take place in the bathroom. Slippery tile floors can make it difficult for seniors to navigate bathrooms safely, and bathtubs and shower stalls present additional challenges.

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Install grab bars on bathroom walls and next to toilets to provide support. In addition, consider installing a shower chair or bench and removable shower nozzle in the shower or tub so seniors can sit down while they bathe and rinse without having to stand up on slippery surfaces. Make sure any mats around bathtubs and sinks are nonskid to reduce the risk of falls even further.

· Install an extra phone line or two. While kids and adults between the ages of 18 and 50 may never use the landlines in their homes, many seniors still rely on traditional telephones as their primary means of communicating with the outside world. Install extra landlines in your home, including in seniors' bedrooms, so they can more readily access the phone should they fall and need to call for emergency help. Phones in seniors' bedrooms may

also provide some additional privacy to seniors who don't want to carry on phone conversations in busy areas of the home, such as the kitchen or living room. Such lines may also reduce feelings of isolation.

• Prioritize accessibility when storing items. When storing groceries, books, magazines, or other items seniors are likely to use, choose locations that are accessible to seniors. Avoid storing items on the top shelf of pantries, bookcases or entertainment centers, as seniors with limited mobility may not be able to reach them.

Many seniors move in with their adult children to make their golden years safer and more enjoyable and manageable. Such a change in living arrangements may necessitate some changes on the part of homeowners so they can ensure their homes are safe for seniors.

•The Open Access Wabamun Carbon Hub, Enbridge Inc. for a potential sequestration hub west of Edmonton

•The Origins Project, Enhance Energy Inc. for a potential sequestration hub south of Edmonton

•Alberta Carbon Grid<sup>™</sup>, Pembina Pipeline Corporation and TC Energy for a potential sequestration hub north and northeast of Edmonton

•Atlas Carbon Sequestration Hub (Atlas Hub), Shell Canada Limited, ATCO Energy Solutions Ltd. Suncor Energy Inc., for a potential sequestration hub east of Edmonton

•Wolf Midstream and partners for a potential sequestration hub east of Edmonton.

Companies will be invited to work with government to further evaluate the suitability of each location for safely storing carbon from industrial emissions. If the evaluation demonstrates that the proposed projects can provide permanent storage, companies can work with the government on an agreement that provides them with the right to inject captured carbon dioxide. This agreement will also ensure they will provide open access to all emitters and affordable use of the hub.

The Alberta Energy Regulator will ultimately approve only projects that meet Alberta's rigorous safety and environmental standards.

Alberta's skilled workforce and years of expertise in carbon capture, utilization and storage (CCUS) are critical to helping industries in Alberta - and across Canada - meet our country's emissions goals. For example, the Quest and Alberta Carbon Trunk Line projects have safely captured and stored more than seven million tonnes of carbon dioxide since starting operations. CCUS is also used in several jurisdictions in the world to reduce emissions, including Saskatchewan, several U.S. states and Norway.

A second request for full project proposals to provide carbon storage services to regions across the rest of the province is now open. Applications will be

accepted from April 25 to May 2.


