It is clear to all Albertans that inflation is beginning to impact our quality of life.

As a part of Alberta's recovery plan, we are providing \$10.4 million to continuing care operators, on behalf of residents, to offset one-quarter of this year's increase in accommodation charges for Albertans in long-term care and designated supportive living. Operators are permitted by legislation to raise accommodation rates each July 1 by the rate of inflation over the previous year. This year's increase will be 5.5 per cent. The government will pay operators directly for the increase for July 1 to Sept. 30.

Furthermore, as part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, a record number of students will receive the Women in STEM Scholarship this year.

This scholarship supports women studying in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields, areas in which women are often under-represented. This year, \$732,500 is being distributed to 293 students. This one-time top-up funding will mean 243 more students are ...

...receiving funding than last year. Each will receive \$2,500 to pay for their studies. When women are supported in pursuing careers in which they are often under-represented, they have new opportunities to reach their full potential, support their families and contribute to Alberta's growing knowledge-based economy.

Lastly, new funding for the Civil Society Fund will support 37 projects, helping vulnerable Albertans and contributing to the province's social and economic recovery.

As part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, these projects will help organizations supporting Albertans address a range of social issues such as mental health, homelessness, and domestic violence. A total of \$7 million is being invested into

this program, with funding per project ranging from \$35,900 to \$550,000. Organizations will have up to two years to complete their projects. Budget 2022 includes an additional \$6 million for the Civil Society Fund - completing our United Conservative, three-year \$20-million platform commitment to increase the capacity of civil society to address social issues.

As we move forward in 2022 the Alberta Government will continue to grow the economy through the Alberta Recovery Plan. We will address inflationary pressures on Albertans, provide help to those looking to grow the Alberta economy through a knowledge based economy and fund projects though civil society groups that will help vulnerable Alber-

work better than others.

Near the top of his effect list, Hattie noted the influence on student learning when the students self-report on their grades. But in the absence of grades, how do students know that they know?


odd and unusual places for all the little ones out there, as he has for so many years.

GYPSD Transportation Services Information for 2022/2023 School Year

What Transportation Services are School Jurisdictions Funded to Provide?

Alberta Education provides transportation funding for eligible students. The criteria for eligibility is:

- students reside more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- students with special needs who require specialized transportation

Under the School Transportation Regulation, school divisions are not required to transport students beyond their designated school.

How Do I Determine my Child's Designated School?

- Every student in GYPSD has a designated school.
- Find your designated school at www.gypsd.ca under Transportation Services/School Bus Registration and enter your home address on the link What is My Designated School?

What Transportation Services are Offered through GYPSD?

GYPSD offers a range of unfunded services. The fees for unfunded services are subsidized by the Board and average out over the year to \$2.60/school day to families requesting these services. Services are available for:

- Ineligible: students who live less than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- School of Choice: students who choose to attend a school other than their designated school
- Transportation Out of District: students who choose to attend a different school jurisdiction
- Reserved Second Seat: students who require a second seat on a different bus to an alternate address

How Do Families Register for the Bus?

- All new and returning students requiring transportation services must register by June 30th for the following school year.
- The registration deadline for busing for the 2022/2023 school year is June 30th.
- If there is a request for an unfunded service, payment must be received by June 30th.
- Families who miss the June 30th deadline are subject to seat availability.

When Do Families Receive Confirmation that Their Child is Registered on a Bus?

- Families will receive an email from the transportation department before the start of the new school
 year with their route number, driver information, and pick-up times.
- Applications and payment for unfunded services received after the June 30th deadline cannot be guaranteed.
- Only those families who have registered and paid any applicable fees (including overdue accounts) will be assigned a seat on the bus.

Mountain Pine Beetle Removal in Your Area



Mountain Pine Beetle Surveys are being conducted on pine trees in Yellowhead County.

Survey crews may require access to private property to conduct surveys and will provide identification upon request.

Follow up control activities will be conducted until completed. Only trees that are heavily hit by beetles will be removed.

You can expect to see smoke and flame in the forest. However, if you suspect it's a wildfire, please report it by calling 310-FIRE.

How can I tell if my trees have been attacked? Look for creamy globs that look like crystalized honey, called pitch tubes, and sawdust at the base of the tree and in the bark's crevices.

If my tree is attacked, will it die?

Unfortunately, yes. Trees successfully attacked by mountain pine beetles usually die within one year.

What do I do if my tree is infested?

If you suspect a Mountain Pine Beetle infestation on your property, please contact the Yellowhead Agriculture Department in Wildwood for assistance at 1-800-814-3935

One of my wife's cousins is sponsoring a family member and her daughter to come live with them in Calgary, as she and her daughter find a safe place to be while the conflict runs it's course, her husband stayed behind to fight. I have heard that many more families in our area, and across the province are doing the same for their friends and family from Ukraine.



...as such items can create a cluttered feel. If the front door is old, replace it. Custom doors may be expensive, but they might add the wow factor buyers are looking for. If you want to include even scaled-down versions of such equipment in your office, you will need ample space. In addition, less spacious home offices can feel too tight and enclosed, making workers uncomfortable and less enthusiastic about working every day. Pick a spot in your home that affords room for your equipment and the ability to move around so you don't feel

cramped throughout the workday.

Lighting

Lighting is another factor remote workers must consider when they're planning their home offices. Natural light can provide an energetic boost and improve your mood, so choose a room in your home that gets lots of sunlight during the day. Many professionals who work remotely do so from the basements of their homes,

....which can make it difficult to rely on natural light. If the basement is

the only location in your home that can fit a home office, look for lighting sources that replicate daylight so you are not working in dark quarters. Speak with your physician about how to arrange lighting to reduce eyestrain caused by staring at a computer.

Connectivity

Connectivity also must

be considered when planning a home office. While wireless Internet has made Internet dead zones less problematic, certain areas or rooms in your home may still be touchand-go with regard to Internet connectivity. Such areas should be avoided when choosing a room for your home office, as it can be difficult to remain productive if your connection to your office's external server is routinely compromised. Find an area where the wireless connection is always strong.

Distractions

While your home might be empty for much of the day, you don't want to be distracted when the kids come home from school or when your spouse or roommate arrives home from work. Avoid putting your home office too close to popular hangout areas in your home, such as the kitchen and the living room. Instead, choose a room where you have lots of privacy so you can focus on your work and won't be routinely interrupted.

Working from home can pay numerous dividends, but professionals who telework must put careful thought into the rooms or areas of their homes where they plan to work.

•Hang whimsical artwork. Employ framing and lighting to make kids' artwork look like professional pieces. Routinely change the pictures when a new look is desired.

•Designate a place for play. Devote an entire room or a nook in a house for imaginative play. Store toys here so these items will not create clutter in individual bedrooms.

Creating child-friendly spaces while ensuring a home maintains a sophisticated feel is easier than parents might think.






