On April 28, 2022, Parkland RCMP received a complaint of a possible homicide in Parkland County. RCMP with the assistance of EPS Air One located an abandoned vehicle South of Township 505 and Range Road 275. Inside the vehicle, RCMP located a deceased man identified as a 45 year-old Leduc County resident. The Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit took over the investigation.

As a result of the investigation, RCMP have charged Stavon Maurice Allen (38), of Spruce Grove with:

• First Degree Murder

Allen has been located and arrested. He is remanded in custody with his next court appearance set for May 4, 2022, in Stony Plain Provincial Court. As this matter is before the courts no further details will be provided.

(May 10, 2022 - Edson, AB) Although a long time in the works, the efforts put in by the Brule Community Society and Yellowhead County staff for the new Brule Community Hall have come to fruition. The new facility is finished and open to the public.

The new hall, which had its Grand Opening on May 3rd, replaces the fifty-

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Evansburg 780-727-2791 year-old community hall that was originally a local schoolhouse used by residents in the community. It later became a hub for various community events and activities.

The new facility features a meeting room, a banquet hall with a stage, and a state-of-the-art commercial kitchen that can host community events and meetings and will be a central site where Brule and area residents can take part in a variety of activities on a regular basis. Gardening is widely considered as relaxing a hobby as it is rewarding. Although gardening when temperatures are mild, such as in spring and fall, can be relaxing, gardening can be much more physically taxing and even dangerous when temperatures rise during the dog days of summer. Gardens need tending even when temperatures outside are especially hot, so gardeners must take steps to protect their health when working in their gardens during the summer. ·Stay hydrated. Staying hydrated by drinking plenty of water is something gardeners must do to stay safe when gardening in summer. Water carries heat away from internal organs, help-

ing to prevent heat stroke along the way. Water takes heat through the bloodstream to the skin, resulting in sweat. Gardeners who notice they are not sweating despite the heat should drink more water and even head indoors to cool down. In addition, the American Heart Association notes that keeping the body hydrated helps the heart pump blood more easily, making gardening less taxing on the heart on hot days.

•Take frequent breaks indoors or in shady areas. Limit marathon gardening sessions to spring and fall when the weather permits. When gardening in harsh summertime heat, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advises

gardeners to take frequent breaks. Head inside to air conditioned rooms, if necessary, or find shady areas to sit, relax and drink some water. Sitting in the shade will give the body's thermostat a chance to recover from exposure to extreme heat. ·Take note of your physical condition. Many people garden alone, so it's important that gardeners learn the symptoms of heat-related illnesses. The CDC notes that elevated body temperatures, headache, rapid pulse, dizziness, nausea, and/or confusion are some common symptoms of heat-related illnesses. Gardeners should go indoors the moment any such symptoms appear.

•Garden during the cooler

parts of the day. Lawncare professionals advise against watering lawns between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. in the summertime, as water is more likely to evaporate during this time, which tends to be the hottest time of the day. Gardeners should avoid working in their gardens during these hours as well. Garden in the early morning hours when the sun is not burning as hot or in late afternoon or early evening hours when temperatures are less threatening. Gardening in summer requires gardeners to exercise caution and assess their

physical conditions routinely

and honestly.

What Transportation Services are School Jurisdictions Funded to Provide?

Alberta Education provides transportation funding for eligible students. The criteria for eligibility is:

- students reside more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- students with special needs who require specialized transportation

Under the School Transportation Regulation, school divisions are not required to transport students beyond their designated school.

How Do I Determine my Child's Designated School?

- · Every student in GYPSD has a designated school.
- Find your designated school at www.gypsd.ca under Transportation Services/School Bus Registration and enter your home address on the link What is My Designated School?

What Transportation Services are Offered through GYPSD?

GYPSD offers a range of unfunded services. The fees for unfunded services are subsidized by the Board and average out over the year to \$2.60/school day to families requesting these services. Services are available for:

- Ineligible: students who live less than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- School of Choice: students who choose to attend a school other than their designated school
- Transportation Out of District: students who choose to attend a different school jurisdiction
- · Reserved Second Seat: students who require a second seat on a different bus to an alternate address

How Do Families Register for the Bus?

- All new and returning students requiring transportation services must register by June 30th for the following school year.
- The registration deadline for busing for the 2022/2023 school year is June 30th.
- If there is a request for an unfunded service, payment must be received by June 30th.
- Families who miss the June 30th deadline are subject to seat availability.

When Do Families Receive Confirmation that Their Child is Registered on a Bus?

- Families will receive an email from the transportation department before the start of the new school
 year with their route number, driver information, and pick-up times.
- Applications and payment for unfunded services received after the June 30th deadline cannot be guaranteed.
- Only those families who have registered and paid any applicable fees (including overdue accounts) will be assigned a seat on the bus.

WHAT MATTERS TO YOU

When I was a kid there was a popular song by Janet Jackson titled "What Have You Done For Me Lately?". That song came to mind as I was reading a number of emails that we have received recently. I think we can all agree that with the turmoil of the last 2 years it's been difficult to remember some of the good things that have been accomplished. My staff suggested that I jot a few down, and perhaps even make a few videos about them in the future. I've listed a few of those items below.

Abolishment of the 1. Provincial Carbon Tax. We made this bill number one in the house, and passed it with exceptional speed. We then challenged the Federal Liberal Tax and won at the provincial court level. To paraphrase, one of the judges had called the carbon levy a 'Trojan Horse' ... and we all know how that horse worked out for the Trojans after the Spartans left it as a gift at the city gates. We lost at the supreme court level, however, which still astounds me, as they essentially said that the tax was valid, as it was intended to address a crisis. Where the logic escapes me is that it was not a requirement to demonstrate any efficacy of the tax to address the apparent crisis. Like jumping out of an airplane with an umbrella, the thought is there, but will it work? Don't bet your life on it.

2. I was assigned to the Skilled Trades Task Force. It provided recommendations to the Minister of Advanced Education to reform our trades program. It also included addressing the parity of esteem issues, and reviewing why other countries don't have similar challenges. The report was completed, and many of the recommendations are being implemented, and it will be to the benefit of generations of Albertans.

3. Assigned by the Minister of Justice to the Firearms Task Force. We consulted with Albertans, on firearms, and what they would like to see going forward from their government to represent the best interest of all Albertans. One of the immediate recommendations was for the assignment of an Albertan Chief Firearms Officer. with a mandate of education. advocacy and representation; not only of public safety, but for the creation of responsible firearms owners. Given that our present PM is now putting into play the long gun registry part 2...we are going to need all the help we can get.

4. After bringing the high probability of the risk of shutting down the entire aggregate and construction industry due to a court ruling on materials classification to the attention of the Environment Minister, was able to assist in the creation of Bill 31. The Minister asked me to carry that bill through the house, the first time in 25 years that a minister had asked an MLA to do so. It was quite an honor. More importantly the creation of this law allowed us to avoid a 2 year shutdown of the majority of construction in the province. We did this to the disbelief of the industry (and many a lawyer) as something of this magnitude should have taken 9 months, not 2. I then sat on a committee to help bring forward recommendations to allow for counties, companies, and the department to make consultations and review changes to ensure something like this never happens again.

5. I was appointed as a special advisor to the Strategic Alberta Aviation Council, which has a mandate to essentially advise the government on how to grow the aerospace and aviation sector. I bring the perspective of general aviation, small airports, and local economies to the table, and I was also able to help facilitate and coordinate the return of the Alberta International Airshow in Villeneuve. It was a massive team effort. and the result of that work was nothing short of a rousing success, which brought nearly 3.5 million dollars back into our local economy.

6. I am the Deputy Chair of the Minister's Advisory Council for Seniors and Low income housing, and had the opportunity to lead a sub group to provide a report on a mixed income housing model.

7. I'm one of six MLAs that were requested by the current Minister of Health to be part of an advisory committee regarding Covid policy, and other items regarding the improvements required in the healthcare system.

8. I was appointed Chair of the Economics Corridor Task force (ECTF) by the Premier. The mandate was to review the rail system, determine its capacity and operations, recognize areas of improvement based on cross jurisdictional demands, and provide guidance on how to protect and grow economic corridors within our province in cooperation with our provincial partners and international connections. The recommendations came down to the following:

Facilitate the growth of short line rail services to compliment the mainline system.

Strategically protect and develop routes and infrastructure to grow ports of interest.

Creation of a Corridor Management Authority that crosses provincial boundaries as needed to ensure that there is a coordinated management of growth, flow of goods, and development that enhances not only the economy of Alberta, but for all of North West Canada.

For me the next big push will be focused on forwarding the recommendations of the ECTF, the management of the pandemic, healthcare reforms, mental health of our youth, and management of local environmental conditions. Reflection is always good: let's see what we have done, how far we have come, and where we need to go for a prosperous future. I hope that if you have items that you feel need my focus over the next year, please reach out to my office and advise me on what matters to you.



When it comes to golf, it's the little things that can have the biggest impact on your game. Whether it's your first attempt, or 10th season, golf expert Bob Weeks has got you covered at the links this summer with these five tips:

Choose the right clubs: Regardless of your experience or skill level, choosing the right equipment can be the difference between duffing it and striking the ball straight down the fairway. It's important to work with a professional to get the clubs best-suited to your game and then, to have them custom fit. You should be fit for the length, loft, lie angle, shaft flex and even the grip size. If your clubs aren't custom fit, it will be like walking around in shoes that are the wrong size.

Get on the ball: Choose the right kind of golf ball for your game. While golf balls all look the same, it's what's inside that determines if it's right for you. Golf balls fall into two categories: distance or control. Distance balls are generally twopiece balls with a large core and a cover. They are harder and better suited for higher handicappers or beginners. Control balls, usually three- or fourpiece balls, are softer and spin more meaning they will land on the green and stop. More skillful players should use these.

elements: Consider the Weather is always a factor in golf and dealing with it must always be considered. For instance, in cold temperatures, the ball will travel shorter distances, so take more club. The opposite is true for warmer temperatures. If you're playing into the wind, swing easy as that will keep the ball from spinning too much and rising up into the breezes. And downwind, make sure to judge the intensity of the breezes so you can choose the proper club. Your ball will roll further than normal on a downwind shot so take that into account.

Putting and chipping is priority: Lots of players like to boom their drives and will spend a lot of time on the range hitting their drivers. But if you want to improve your scores, you should spend more time working on your putting and chipping. Since most average players miss a lot of greens, the best way to save strokes is by chipping it close and making more putts. Focus more on your short game than your drive and you will improve.

Play the 19th hole: Win or lose, there's no better way to celebrate than hitting the 19th hole. Less is often more in golf and the same applies when considering what to eat and drink after a round. 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
