No one wants a "spring break" and enter. This May, Alberta RCMP are offering tips for how Albertans can protect their residential, seasonal and outbuilding properties from break and enters and providing information on how to file a report in the event that they are victims of crime.

In 2021, 10,529 reports

of break and enters were reported in Alberta RCMP jurisdictions. By practicing good crime prevention and deterring would-be criminals, we can work to reduce this number.

In order for Albertans to have an a-May-zing spring, the RCMP are hoping some of the following tips help protect them from break and enters:

As the weather turns warmer and individuals begin to use seasonal tools and equipment, we recommend that they are extra careful not to leave expensive items lying around or in unlocked sheds or garages.

Opportunity crimes are iris-istible to thieves. While no one invites thieves in, practicing good crime prevention can help keep properties safer. Updating locks, deadbolts or security

WHY WEEDS CAN BE FOUND EVERYWHERE

The ubiquitous nature of weeds can make them seem like they can grow anywhere, and that's because they can. Weeds can grow anywhere there's room for them to sprout, including gardens, sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots. Weeds also put up a fight when they're confronted by humans. Humans who try to pull weeds may instead break them. The broken weeds can then resprout,

ultimately spreading their seeds again. The resiliency of weeds also is evident in their ability to stay dormant for long periods of time. For example, weeds can stay in the soil for years before germinating, proving that these unwelcome guests aren't just pesky, but also patient.

Albertans can now renew their driver's licences and identification cards online any time, anywhere.

Alberta's government continues to reduce red tape and improve access to services, making life better and more convenient for Albertans. As of May 17, Albertans can renew their driver's licences and identification cards online. Services will be available through the MyAlberta eServices portal.

"Online driver's licences and ID card renewals are one of the most requested registry service changes that we receive, so I am very excited to announce this new online service. Albertans want more choice and convenience when it comes to accessing government services, and Alberta's government is working hard to make that a reality."Nate Glubish. Minister of Service Alberta

To renew online. Albertans will log in with a verified account and will need to meet the following eligibility criteria:

Be 18 to 75 years old to renew a driver's licence or at least 18 years old to renew an ID card.

Be a resident of Alberta.

Have a driver's licence that is not suspended. Not require changes to demographic information, such as address, height or sex, on their driver's licence or ID card.

• Have a card that has not been expired for more than six months.

Not require a medical examination report to renew their driver's licence. Have a photo and signature on the card that are less than 10 years old.

School authorities can pilot three updated draft K-6 subjects with students in classrooms across the province this fall.

Alberta's government is continuing to take a balanced, phased approach to kindergarten to Grade 6 (K-6) curriculum renewal based on advice from the Curriculum Implementation Advisory Group. In September, classroom piloting for updated draft K-6 curriculum will begin with Science, French First Language and Literature, and French Immersion Language Arts and Literature.

"We have updated the draft K-6 Science, French First Language and Literature, and French Immersion Language Arts and Literature curriculums with insights we heard from this year's classroom piloting process and engagement with Albertans, including our francophone education partners and their communities. School authorities will have the opportunity to pilot these subjects with teachers and students to help us understand how the updated curriculum transfers to classrooms." Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Education

"I'm pleased that Minister LaGrange and Alberta Education have worked closely with francophone stakeholders, including Alberta's four francophone school authorities, to ensure that francophone identity and perspectives are authentically reflected in the new draft K-6 curriculum." Alberta's government is providing maximum flexibility in how school authorities participate in optional classroom piloting of the updated draft curriculums. The piloting experience will include:

• supporting teachers with professional learning opportunities

• information and tools to work with the updated subjects in class-rooms

• collecting feedback from teachers piloting the draft curriculums

By June 6, school authorities will identify their intent to participate in classroom piloting, including how many teachers are involved, the subjects and grade levels they will pilot.

While classroom piloting is underway, Albertans will also be able to provide feedback on the updated draft K-6 subjects. In spring 2023, the feedback from classroom piloting and Albertans will inform final updates to the three curriculums prior to provincewide implementation during the 2023-24 school year.

"The College of Alberta School Superintendents is appreciative of the opportunity for teachers to pilot draft curriculum. We are pleased that the government continues to seek feedback from experts in the field and believe that piloting not only provides the government with valuable information but better prepares teachers for implementation." Content updates in the three subjects

The draft K-6 Science, French First Language and Literature, and French **Immersion Language Arts** and Literature curriculums were updated by considering all feedback from classroom piloting and engagement activities between March 2021 and March 2022. The content was also aligned with top-performing jurisdictions within Canada and internationally, as well as those jurisdictions with knowledge-rich curriculums. Updates included:

• Revisions and additions to the draft K-6 Science content to integrate scientific methods and hands-on activities, emphasize connections to nature and address digital literacy and ethics.

 Enhancements to the draft K-6 French First Language and Literature content will support the development of francophone identity through inclusion of francophone perspectives and cultures.
 Enhancements to

the draft K-6 French Immersion Language Arts and Literature curriculum to strengthen francophone perspectives and culture, provide logical learning progressions, develop effective and meaningful communication, and support critical thinking and language skills.

• Changes across the three K-6 subjects to address instances of concern with content load, age appropriateness, wording clarity and First Nations, Métis and Inuit content.

"Starting in September 2022, the four francophone school boards in Alberta will pilot this updated French first language and literature program. The Fédération des conseils scolaires francophones de l'Alberta (FCS-FA) and the francophone school boards appreciate the openness shown by Alberta Education in recent months regarding the update of the curriculum. Teachers and educational consultants from the four boards had the opportunity to analyze the curriculum and to provide recommendations to Alberta Education." "We've been anticipating the modernization of the curriculum. The fact that the four francophone authorities are ready to pilot the subjects mentioned is reassuring. Learning French as a first language is of primary importance to parents and we are willing to work with the ministry, through school authorities, for implementation." May 24, 2022 Community**VOICE** Page 15 SIX SEARCH WARRANTS OVER TWO DAYS SEES SIGNIFICANT SEIZURE AND CHARGES LAID

In June 2021, members of the Maskwacis General Investigation Section (GIS) became aware through criminal intelligence of illegal trafficking of substances into the four communities that make up Maskwacis. In the following months, Maskwacis GIS would conduct a complete and thorough investigation focusing on disrupting and dismantling the trafficking network.

Between Tuesday, May 17, 2022, and Wednesday, May 18, 2022, Maskwacis GIS executed six search warrants in a joint operation with the Maskwacis General Duty Members, the Maskwacis Community Policing (CPVS) unit, the Wetaskiwin GIS, the Wetaskiwin Crime Reduction Unit (CRU), the Central Alberta District GIS, and the Edmonton Police Service. These warrants were executed at a residence on the Ermineskin Cree Nation along with two residences, and a storage locker within the City of Edmonton, and finally two vehicles associated to the illegal trafficking network. As a result, police located and seized the following items:

50,000 Illicit cigarettes, valued at \$44,000 17lbs of illegal Cannabis, with a street value of \$75,000

1200 unidentified • pills

1 liter of Cannabis resin

\$38,000 in cash

proceeds

The seizure is valued at \$160,000. The investigation is still ongoing, and more charges are pending.

"This was a significant seizure of illegal substances, and without the help of our RCMP partners and the Edmonton Po-

lice Service this wouldn't have been possible; a big thank you them." says Cst. Guillaume Wilson of the Maskwacis RCMP. "We will continue working on identifying and arresting persons engaged trafficking illegal substances on the four nations of Maskwacis. We encourage the residents in our community to report any illegal activity to police and assist us in disrupting criminal groups by calling the detachment, speaking to an officer, or providing tips through crime...

Both Khoshnaw and Dennehy were held for bail hearings, and released by a Justice of the Peace with conditions. Khoshnaw is scheduled to appear in Edmonton Provincial Court on Wednesday, June 15th, 2022, at 8:15 a.m., and Dennehy is scheduled to appear in Edmonton Provincial Court on Friday, June 10th, 2022 at 8:15 a.m.

Caring for just one newborn is a big job. Raising more than one baby means even less sleep, more work, and less time for yourself. On some days, you may feel frustrated that you can't keep up with work at home. Do not wait for stress to become a problem before you ask for help. Your family, friends, and doctor can help you find ways to cope.

Ways to cope

Be a good planner. Buying supplies, getting your babies in and out of cars and strollers, and keeping track of what your babies have eaten or done can become overwhelming with more than one baby. Diapers, naps, nursing, and everything else that is part of your babies' lives can take over your life and keep you from taking care of yourself, if you let it. Charts and systems to stay organized and efficient will help you to cope.

• Get as much rest as you can. Do not feel guilty if you let chores go undone so that you can rest. Try to sleep when your babies are sleeping, rather than using that time to get chores done.

• If you are going to breastfeed, be flexible. You may be able to breastfeed all your babies, or you may use your breast pump or formula so that your helpers can feed your babies too. A lactation consultant can help you find positions and systems to make nursing work. • Give each of your children time alone with you. If you have an older child or children, schedule regular time with each one.

• Try to put aside time to be with your partner. It is easy to forget about taking time to be a couple, but life will be better if you take care of each other.

• It is okay to feel nega-

tive about your life once in a while. But if you feel sad or mad often, talk to your doctor.

Get support

• Ask family and friends for help. Then let them help with the babies, the house, and your family's errands.

• Bathing your babies can be a big job and can wear

you out. Whether you bathe your babies

together or one at a time, ask for help.

• Consider joining a support group for parents of twins or more. Sharing your experience with

other people who are in a similar situation may help you with the demands of caring for your babies.
