### LAYING CHARGES FOLLOWING SHOOTING INCIDENT

On May 23, 2022, Mayerthorpe RCMP were dispatched to the Mayerthorpe Health Centre after staff reported an adult male had been dropped off who was suffering apparent gun shot wounds. The male

was transported to an Edmonton hospital with non life-threatening injuries.

Through the investigation led by Whitecourt RCMP and including Mayerthorpe RCMP, Western Alberta District General Investigation Services (GIS), Alberta RCMP Police Dog Services & Forensic Identification Services, it was determined the male had been shot in the hand and leg at a private residence in Blue Ridge. A female suspect fired a round from a .22 caliber rifle, striking the male, before fleeing the scene in a vehicle. The firearm and suspect vehicle which was confirmed...

### NEW DOWNTOWN FOSTERS ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND COMMUNITY

### DRUG UNIT INVESTIGATION LEADS TO AN ARREST

St. Albert RCMP Drug Unit, assisted by ALERT Edmonton, St. Albert Traffic Unit and St. Albert General Duty, conducted an investigation into methamphetamine trafficking in the spring of 2022 that lead to the arrest a suspect on May 26, 2022.

Kendrah Wong (34) of Spruce Grove, Alta. was arrested and charged with the following:

- Trafficking methamphetamine x 2
- Possession of property obtained by crime x 2
- Failure to comply with a release order x 3

At the time of the arrest

Kendrah Wong had outstanding warrants for 58 charges. She was held for a Judicial Interim Release Hearing and was remanded in custody. Kendrah Wong's next court appearance is June 14, 2022 at Edmonton Provincial Court.

A search warrant was executed on a vehicle seized as part of the investigation.

  - 445 ml of GHB
- 7.17 grams of psilocybin

### THE SILLY SEASON

I was told several times by folks who have been in politics for longer than I have that during election periods it's often called "The Silly Season". Having been through one election cycle in 2019, I got a small glimpse of what they meant, but this year: WOW. I get it now in full detail. With all of the restrictions over the last 2 years, a federal election taking place during that time, a municipal election in Alberta, a Leadership Race for the Federal Conservative Party, a leadership review of the Provincial Conservative Party, and now a leadership race kicking off for UCP members, the media is having a field day, as are some of the political figures.

Over the last week I've been in the "Big City" newspapers twice. I suggested she get Bell to do it, because I was not going to break my neck over TV and I wasn't going to waste more of my home time trying to get it just right. After several failed attempts by Bell to bring a long enough ladder themselves to adjust the dish, she too gave up. No more satellite TV.

We then just decided to buy DVDs, when we wanted to see a movie, and although water cooler conversations on POP culture have never been quite the same, in the big scheme of things, it never really hampered my life. We have a TELUS hub now, and streaming is not exactly the best, so we get our clips here and there from the internet. Our entertainment at home is reading books, buying movies, being outside, learning to play instruments, or making things with the kids. So, when

it comes to a series called Yellowstone...I kind of get the high-level overview from others.

In my former industry, I have heard several colorful, and imaginative ways to describe having one's employment position being terminated. At no one given time, did I ever take these references to be a threat to the person's life. Being "Ran Off", "Fired", "Gunned", "Gassed", "Frog Marched", 'Punted", "Bounced" were just some of the ways I've heard to describe a person's contract, or employment coming to an abrupt close.

Recently speaking with a young married mother of two about her home-based business at a craft show, many familiar points of recent conversations were repeated several times. They were in regard to the rising costs of life, covid restriction impacts, inflation, and challenges small farms and businesses face. I did not think that the signs or stickers she had made, had any nefarious meaning or malicious intent. In fact, I found that several of her items used humor to deal with those frustrations, and from the reactions of others at the craft show, they took it the same way. I thought the play on words and the sticker showing folks riding horses, being requested to take someone who is ultra-green to a well-known mode of public transport, given that this same individual is responsible for driving the costs of life through the roof, and that folks are having trouble at the gas pumps with the cost of fuel, was quite witty. I took it as "We need to fire this guy, get rid of him, because he is doing a terrible job!" I sure as heck didn't take it that this mother of 2 was suggesting someone take a hit out on the Prime Minister.

So why did this all go sideways? Ah yes, enter "The Silly Season". When something gets negative attention on social media, we have communications folks that help us MLAs navigate through the swamp; as social never sleeps, yet we do. I received a call from them several days after posting pictures of the local event, and they too needed to look up the reference that was causing people such a concern. My swamp navigators advised that there was a story looming and wanted to give me the heads up. After they told me the reference, I told them I'd pull down the post which happened to contain the "Train Station" sticker made by the young mother of 2, that was only one of 8 pictures from the event that day. However, that story was just too juicy for some, and they decided that it needed the attention of the public.

The real issues, that most people are calling my office about, however, are in regard to the rising fuel costs, inflation, and rising interest rates. People are still very concerned about the travel restrictions imposed in our country, when all other countries are taking them away. People are concerned about the quality of education and what real challenges our youth are experiencing. They are concerned with property rights, personal freedoms, and the struggles we have ahead of us in order to be considered a meaningful part of a country with our Federal Government seeming to drive a wedge between us at any opportunity.

Why are the papers not covering that? I believe that it is because the 'Silly Season' is upon us, and it is way easier to run a story that keeps people distracted, and an outspoken rural MLA makes it far too easy for them. So for the remainder of the 'Silly Season' I'll keep my sticker posts to a minimum, and possibly watch more TV to educate myself. This will give the corporate media free time to report on the absolute dumpster fire that the Liberal / NDP alliance has caused in our country, so that the rest of us can all work toward getting our country back to normal.

### MORE SUPPORTS FOR STUDENTS AFFECTED BY THE PANDEMIC

Mental health

Current research clearly identifies the importance of mental health to learning, as well as to students' social and emotional development. Specialized assessments

assessments during the pandemic, can be assessed by qualified professionals including speech language pathologists, physical therapists, occupational therapists or psychologists.

...the long-term effects of learning loss. These assessments are critical for student success and targeted supports will assist school boards as they continue to make informed decisions based on the needs of their local school communities." Marilyn Dennis, president, Alberta School Boards Association

Learning loss supports

Assessing students in the critical early years of their education is key for ensuring long-term learning success and ensuring early interventions are in place to prevent future learning challenges. Up to \$10

million for the 2022-23 school year, as a one-time extension of the 2021-22 funding, will support additional interventions for students in grades 2-4 to continue getting back on track.

School authorities must have participated in the 2021-22 learning loss funding program and filed their required yearend report with Alberta Education by June 15 to qualify for the extension funding. They will be required to administer literacy and numeracy screening assessments selected from the approved list. This approved list was made available in April when the government announced that school authorities will be required to administer literacy and numeracy screening assessments starting in September 2022.

"Today's funding announcement is evidence of the government's continued focus on enhancing student success. Increasing access to specialized assessments and mental health supports will directly impact learning, achievement, and overall well-being for Alberta's children."


School nutrition

As part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, non-profit organizations selected through a call for proposals will collaborate with schools to pilot innovative ways to support vulnerable youth and reduce operating costs and the administrative burden on schools while ensuring students receive healthy, balanced meals.

### PREVENTING FALLS FROM WINDOWS AND BALCONIES

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

In the past year, 39 children were brought to emergency departments in Alberta due to window and balcony fall-related injuries. Every year, this type of child injury results in Emergency Medical Services calls, emergency department visits, and in serious cases, hospitalization or even death. With the return of warmer weather, many people will want to open their windows


and doors. However, open windows and balcony doors can be hazardous for young children.

Parents and guardians are encouraged to take safety precautions to prevent falls from windows or balconies:

- Beware of open windows. Remember, screens are not strong enough to keep in children.
- Install window guards on all windows on the second floor and above. These act like gates in front of windows.
- Consider installing safety devices that limit the distance to which a window can open to a maximum of 10 cm (four inches).
- Safety devices should be able to release quickly in case of an emergency.
- Ensure your balcony's vertical railings are not more than 10 cm (four inches) apart.
- Move furniture such as cribs, beds, stools and change tables away from windows to prevent access to the windows. Outside,

remember that furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb, resulting in a fall over a railing. It's best to remove these if you have children at home.

Toddlers and preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window, or balcony, but falls may happen at any age. Direct supervision of children is the most effective way to prevent falls and other childhood injuries.




