

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HOW TO HELP KIDS GET INTO GOLF

Golf is a game of skill that can take years, if not decades, to master. Many golfers find their time on the golf course both rewarding and relaxing, even on those days when the fairways seem impossible to find.

Though many players never swing a golf club until they reach adulthood, it's never too early to hit the links. Some of the world's most accomplished golfers, including four-time Masters champion Tiger Woods, began playing as toddlers, and many feel that getting an early start can lead to a more successful game down the road.

Getting kids into golf is a great way for parents to bond with their children while enjoying the great outdoors. Golf can also be used to teach kids humility, sportsmanship and the importance of hard work. Thanks to the often frustrating nature of golf, parents may find it somewhat challenging to instill a love of the game in their youngsters. But there are ways to introduce kids to this wonderful game that kids might just play for the rest of their lives.

•Focus on having fun. Few, if any, golfers at your local golf course on a given weekend could say with certainty that golf has never frustrated them. The challenge of golf may be its most appealing characteristic to older players, but young kids can be easily overwhelmed by the challenges golf presents. By focusing on having fun instead of perfecting techniques, parents can get kids to look forward to their time on the links. •Purchase the correct equipment. Even the best golfers are bound to struggle when using the wrong equipment. While it might be unwise to invest in especially expensive equipment for youngsters likely to grow out of it in a few months' time, deals can be found on used kids' equipment. Used kids' equipment is typically subjected to less wear and tear than used equipment for adults, as kids tend to play less often and fewer holes than adults when they do play. But make sure to find correctly sized equipment that kids feel comfortable using.

Inflation rates in Canada are reaching new highs and are continuing to rise as they hit 7.7 per cent in May. This is up 0.9 per cent from April, when Canada's inflation was at 6.8 per cent. Here in Alberta, our inflation rate is also rising, but we remain below the national average, sitting at 7.1 per cent in May. Our government recognizes how hard this is making life for Albertans and is taking steps to immediately make life more affordable for families. While more is to come, just this week, we took three concreate steps to fight back against inflation and make life more affordable or Albertans.

One of the ways our government is working to make life more affordable for Albertans is by extending the fuel tax cut on gas and diesel. This means that Albertans will continue to save the 13-cent provincial fuel tax on every litre of fuel they purchase until at least the end of September. Extending this program supports Albertans and their ability to afford everyday items. This program has helped countless Albertans during these challeng-



ing economic times and is remaining in place for longer. Additionally, this relief means that despite the rising price of fuel, Albertans are paying less for fuel than Canadians in any other part of the country.

Another step our government is taking to combat inflation is by providing school boards with fuel cost relief on their transportation budgets. By reinstating the Fuel Price Contingency Program for school authorities, our government is providing \$8.2 million in fuel cost relief to school boards for the current school year, and additional relief next school year if required. The program being retroactively is enacted to March 2022 and will remain in place for the upcoming school year. Our government remains committed to helping school authorities continue to provide consistent student transportation services. This cost relief ensures that budgeted dollars remain

in the classroom, and that rising costs are not passed along to parents through school fees. By providing this relief, we are ensuring that students and their education remain the top priority and preventing the burden of inflation from being unfairly placed on parents.

The third immediate way our government is working to make life more affordable for Albertans is by ensuring that electricity rebates will start arriving in July. This rebate puts money back in the pockets of Albertans. Most Alberta electricity ratepayers will start receiving a series of electricity rebates in July. Approximately 1.9 million households, farms, and small businesses will receive \$50 for three consecutive months. Combined with the natural gas price protection program, Albertans will receive nine straight months of support on utility bills.

Unlike the NDP's rate cap, the electricity rebate will reach ratepayers on all types of contracts, offering relief to those on the variable regulated rate as well as those on competitive contracts. This step also shows that our government is taking real action to put money back into the pocket of Albertans to help ease the burden of the inflation.

These actions are just the beginning steps of our government's efforts to fight inflation and make life more affordable for families. We continue to be concerned about the impact inflation and the affect it is having on affordability for everyday people. That is why we will continue to take the necessary steps to ensure the cost of living remains affordable. The steps we have already taken represent more than \$2 billion in annual savings for Albertans.

Despite all these steps, Alberta cannot solve this problem alone. We continue to call on Ottawa to get their irresponsible spending under control and immediately suspend the federal carbon tax and federal fuel tax to provide relief to Canadians.

We will continue to fight for Albertans and do our best to ensure no one has to face the burden of inflation alone.

SIMPLE PRECAUTIONS REDUCE WEST NILE VIRUS RISK

Summer is here, and so are mosquitoes. Albertans are urged to take precautions to protect themselves against West Nile virus infection.

Exposure to mosquitoes brings a risk of West Nile Virus. Some carry the virus, so it's important to avoid being bitten.

Whenever engaging in outdoor activities, or even just relaxing outside, all Albertans can take these simple steps to prevent bites and protect themselves from West Nile virus:

• Wear a long-sleeved, light-colored shirt, pants, and a hat.

• Use a Health Canada-approved insect repellant (e.g. products containing DEET or Icaridin).

• Consider staying indoors at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most active.

After being bitten by a mosquito carrying West Nile virus, humans can develop West Nile non-neurological syndrome (formerly known as West Nile fever) or the more serious West Nile neurological syndrome.

Symptoms of non-neurological syndrome can be uncomfortable, including fever, chills, nausea, vomiting, fatigue, skin rash, swollen glands and headache. For people who develop neurological syndrome, symptoms can be more severe, including tremors, drowsiness, confusion, swallowing problems, high fever, unconsciousness, paralysis and even death.

From 2003 to 2018, 532 cases of West Nile virus were

confirmed in Alberta, many of which were acquired here in the province and not travel-related. Of all of these cases, 458 were non-neurological syndrome.




