- One focusing on railway-related fire prevention
- Another focusing on improving the resiliency

of Canada's railway infrastructure against flooding, landslides, or fire

These new rules require railway companies to:

- Reduce train speeds and perform extra track inspections during high temperatures to reduce derailment risks caused by track conditions.
- · Inspect locomotive ex-

haust systems more frequently to ensure that there are no hazardous deposits that could pose a fire risk

• Implement a fire risk reduction plan.



Jobs are up, the budget is balanced, and Alberta has finished the fiscal year strong.

Thanks to a growing economy, improved energy prices, and a commitment to fiscal discipline, Alberta ended the 2021-22 fiscal year with a budget surplus of \$3.9 billion, the first surplus our province has seen in seven years. 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REEVE'S REPORT ON THE UPCOMING PAPAL VISIT **AND PILGRIMAGE**

The Lac Ste Anne Pilgrimage is a one-of-a-kind gathering that has drawn hundreds of thousands of visitors to our sacred lake each summer for the past 123 years.

With the presence of His Holiness Pope Francis, attendance at this year's event is certain to be on an entirely different scale. While this is a truly historic occurrence — both for the devout and the County at large — it does require focused and coordinated effort from multiple stakeholders. Here are some highlights on how things are taking shape.

STAKEHOLDERS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

To be clear: Council and Administration had no prior knowledge of the papal visit, nor the authority to say no to its occurrence. Further, an event of this magnitude takes about two years to properly plan (rather than the two months we were given). Regardless, the County is committed to making this event as safe and memorable as possible while minimizing any negative impacts on our communities.

To help achieve these outcomes, the County is part of a larger group that includes:

- Alberta Transportation
- Alexis Nakota Sioux Nation
- Alberta Health Services and EMS
 Catholic Archdiocese of Edmonton
 Metis Association of Alberta
 - Government of Alberta
 - Lac Ste. Anne Pilgrimage
- Provincial Office of the Papal Visit
- Royal Canadian Mounted Police

In addition to working closely with these organizations, the County has reached out to adjacent municipalities for their support with policing, signage, emergency services and logistics. I am grateful for their camaraderie and willingness to help.

PILGRIMAGE AND PAPAL VISIT SCHEDULE

The Lac Ste. Anne Pilgrimage is scheduled to place July 26-29. Pope Francis has been confirmed to attend the Lac Ste. Anne Pilgrimage for one hour on July 26 after hosting an open-air mass at Edmonton's Commonwealth Stadium that same day.

ROUTES, TRAFFIC AND ROAD CLOSURES

The County is primarily taking direction from Alberta Transportation and the RCMP regarding approved routes for traffic, park-and-rides to the pilgrimage site, road closures and other logistical details.

Residents should factor in considerable traffic congestion on provincial highways and County roadways before, during and after the pilgrimage. It goes without saying that pedestrian traffic will be unusually high at the pilgrimage site and in surrounding communities. Throughout this timeframe the County will prioritize public safety, and will work to mitigate any harm to property or our environment.

For anyone planning to circumvent traffic via back roads or summer villages: **this will not happen.** There will be no access to the pilgrimage grounds via Val Quentin, Sunset Point, Alberta Beach or any other non-approved route. These roadways will be reserved for local traffic only.

MAPS, SCHEDULES AND UPDATES

The County has created a dedicated information page at LSAC.ca/pilgrimage. Here you'll find approved routes, road closures, boat launch closures, bus shuttle schedules and other important event details. Most of this information will be County-generated, but we will also share any relevant information provided by other stakeholders.

To find out what's taking place in other communities, I encourage you to contact the administration offices of Alberta Beach, Sunset Point, West Cove and Val Quentin — or visit their respective websites.

FINAL THOUGHTS

Lac Ste. Anne County and its neighbouring municipalities recognize the importance of reconciliation. The wisdom, tradition and pride of Indigenous communities are woven into the social fabric of our communities, adding to the rich history of the Lac Ste. Anne region. Because of these influences, we are keenly aware of the importance of this visit. We understand what it means to our communities going forward, and the legacy it will leave behind.

Speaking on behalf of Lac Ste. Anne County Council and Administration as well as neighbouring municipal leaders, I sincerely thank local families and business owners in advance for their patience and understanding during this important — yet impactful — historic spiritual gathering. I also want to commend all staff involved for going above and beyond to provide for the safety and security of visitors and community members alike.

HELP KIDS LEARN THE GAME OF GOLF

Adults who play golf know just how fun and frustrating the game can be. Whether you're a veteran golfer or someone just learning the links, golf can be challenging.

But as exacting as the game can be, it also can be just as rewarding, even for kids. Children who embrace the game of golf will learn a host of lessons they can apply in all facets of life. A humbling game even for professional golfers, golf can teach kids lessons in humility and the value of persistence even when things aren't going your way.

Golf is also a great way for parents to get kids off the couch and outdoors for some fun in the sun. Instead of spending summer afternoons in front of the television, kids who play golf are out patrolling pristine golf courses while getting some cardiovascular exercise along the way. Golf can also strengthen a child's hand-eye coordination, which can help them in other activities, including many different sports.

Though many people do not begin playing golf until they've reached adulthood, it's never too early for boys and girls to start learning the game of golf. Parents of preschoolers can start their kids off with a toddler play set. Though it's just a toy, a play set can help lay a solid foundation for future golfers. Kids who have watched Mom and Dad

play golf or practice their swing can develop their own swings on their play set.

As kids approach school age, don't overlook the nearby puttputt or miniature golf range as a valuable teaching tool. Miniature golf clubs are small enough for many children to use comfortably, and kids can use miniature golf courses as a place to put any lessons or advice on putting to good use. What's more, a miniature golf course is more than just golf, with creative courses and other fun activities, so kids won't feel overwhelmed with golf.

When kids move on from preschool to elementary school, some might want to tag along with Mom or Dad to the driving range. You should try to avoid overwhelming kids with too much instruction or information. Instead, keep things as simple as possible, teaching them the basic swing and encouraging them no matter how quickly they adapt.

As kids enter middle school and approach high school, those who are enjoying the game of golf can take advantage of the driving range if they haven't already begun to. A driving range typically has markers that indicate the distance of a regular hole, regardless of which tee you will play from on an actual golf course. Kids can aim for holes at shorter distances to learn how far their drives are going. You can then adjust the lessons you teach your children based on how far youngsters can drive the ball.

As a child gets closer to high school, you might want to buy the child his or her own set of clubs. Look for inexpensive clubs (oftentimes, thrift stores or other secondhand retailers have clubs for sale) because growing children will eventually grow out of their first set of clubs. When your child finds a set of clubs that suits him or her, teach the proper way to swing and consider signing up your son or daughter for lessons. Those first few lessons can prove invaluable, turning a pastime into a passion kids will carry with them throughout their lives.

Our new set of fiscal anchors have already worked to get Alberta's finances back on track. This includes keeping Alberta's net debt-to-GDP ratio well below 30 per cent and aligning our overall spending levels with other comparable provinc-

It's fair to say the Alberta Advantage is back. Alberta has the fastest growing economy in the country, the lowest taxes, and an affordability advantage relative to other provinces of similar size. And with more than 200,000 new jobs cre-

ated since 2021 and unemployment at its lowest level since 2015, our province has reversed the steep economic damage caused by the Notley NDP and their disastrous policies.

ELECTRICITY REBATE PROGRAM EXTENDED UNTIL DECEMBER

Nearly two million homes, farms and businesses will receive electricity rebates for the rest of the year to help cover high bills amid rising energy costs.

The electricity rebate program will now offer about \$600 million in relief through the rest of 2022, providing eligible Albertans with a monthly \$50 bill credit for six consecutive months.

More than 1.9 million homes, farms and small businesses will receive monthly credits on their electricity bills starting this month and stretching until the end of December, for a total of \$300 in rebates.

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Electricity Rebate Program Extended Until December

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"We are doubling the electricity rebate to help reduce the financial burden that many families in Alberta are dealing with due to the rising cost of living. This move will help millions of families and business owners pay their bills and keep their lights on while we continue working to build a stronger, more affordable long-term electricity system."

Expanded electricity rebate

As the cost of living continues to pose challenges for Albertans, the government is providing an additional three months of bill credits to alleviate some of the high utility costs that many families

and businesses have faced during recent months.

The expanded electricity rebate will hold the criteria currently in place:

- Albertans currently connected to the system that have consumed electricity within the past calendar year, up to a maximum of 250 megawatt hours per year, are automatically eligible for the rebates.
- Eligible Albertans can expect to see an automatic \$50 rebate on their bills. No application or other action is needed to start receiving the rebate.

The extended monthly rebates will apply to the entire bill, not just the energy portion. In addition, the \$50 rebates will be on all eligible bills – protecting consumers on the variable regulated rate option as well as those on

competitive contracts.

The July rebate will be listed on each bill as a line titled "GOA Utility Commodity Rebate," and \$50 rebates will follow in August, September, October, November and December for a total of \$300. Exact timing will vary depending on the billing cycle of one's utility provider.

Upcoming natural gas rebate

Alberta's government is implementing two programs to ensure utilities remain affordable while providing stability for millions of Albertans through the next nine months.

Along with the electricity rebate, the natural gas rebate will protect eligible Alberta customers using natural gas and other heating fuels from European-style price spikes.

With the electricity re-

bate reaching bills in July, and the natural gas rebate starting in October, Alberta's government will be providing support on utility bills for millions of Albertans until March 31, 2023, if prices remain high.

Fixed rate contracts and other options

Along with the rebates, Albertans wishing to protect themselves from price volatility may also enter into a competitive fixed-rate contract. Albertans can visit the Utility Consumer Advocate to see what products are available in their area.

Consumers who believe they meet the eligibility criteria but have not started receiving the rebates by the end of July should contact the Utility Consumer Advocate.
