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Increase In The Old Age Security Pension For Seniors Aged 75 And Older Begins Next Week

...by 10% for seniors aged 75 and over. This means that full pensioners will get more than \$800 extra over the first year.

This will be the first permanent increase to the OAS pension since 1973, other than adjustments due to inflation. It will strengthen the financial security of 3.3 million seniors. Eligible seniors will not have to take any action to receive this increase-their payments will be automatically increased.

This increase follows a

one-time payment of \$500 that the Government of Canada provided in August 2021 to seniors who were eligible for the OAS pension in June 2021 and born on or before June 30, 1947. The one-time payment was provided to help address the immediate needs of this group of seniors. Both measures were announced in Budget 2021.

These measures are part of broader work to support the financial security of seniors of all ages, including the following:

restoring the age of

eligibility for the OAS pension and the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) to 65 from 67;

• enhancing the Canada Pension Plan for future retirees;

• increasing the GIS for single seniors;

• raising the GIS earnings exemption; and

• amending the Old Age Security Act to exclude federal pandemic benefits from the calculation of income for GIS/Allowance purposes.

Job numbers are continuing to soar in Alberta.

According to Statistics Canada's latest labour force survey, Alberta created 2,000 new jobs this past June, marking eight consecutive months of provincial job gains. In total, Alberta has now created over 200,000 jobs since 2021, meaning we have officially undone the damage caused by the Notley NDP's job-killing policies.

Alberta is embarking on another economic boom, one that is more diverse and resilient than any boom we have ever seen before. Despite this, we know families are still struggling with high costs due to inflation right now. That is why your United Conservative government is taking immediate action to fight inflation and make life more affordable for everyday people. Just this past week, we announced that we are extending the electricity rebate for an additional three months. The program will now provide \$50 rebates for a total of six months, starting in July, to over 1.9 million homes, farms, and small businesses. In total, we will provide nearly \$600 million in relief that will be applied directly onto bills, meaning there is no need to apply.

Our government also recently announced that we are extending the fuel tax cut on gasoline, diesel, and marked farm fuel until at least the end of September. We are also reinstating the Fuel Price Contingency Program for school authorities, providing \$8.2 million in fuel cost relief to school boards for the current school year, and additional relief next school year if required.


More will need to be done to help working families cope with rising costs, but these are three immediate actions we are taking to make life more affordable at this important time in our economic recovery.

Alberta is in a strong position to help Alberta families fight inflation because our budget and our economy are in great shape. Alberta ended the 2021-22 fiscal year with a budget surplus of \$3.9 billion, the first surplus our province has seen in seven years. Further, the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund grew to its highest net value in Alberta history - earning \$1.95 billion in investments to bring the total value of the fund's investments to \$20 billion.

Unlike the disastrous Notely NDP, who lost hundreds of thousands of jobs and billions of investment dollars, we are maintaining fiscal balance, paying down the debt, investing in the future, and getting Albertans back to work.

We know it is important that all Albertans share in this economic recovery. In addition to leading the country in labour participation rates, Alberta's unemployment rate for women has dropped to 3.5 per cent, the lowest it has been since 2014, when conservatives were last in government. This is great news for our province. Further, several government initiatives are working very well to spur job creation. The Alberta Jobs Now program, for instance, has already helped 12,440 Albertans get back to work.

In every corner of the province and in all sectors of the economy, optimism is growing for the future – and our government is working tirelessly to make sure Albertans are going back to work and participating in this newfound prosperity.

ELECTRICITY REBATE PROGRAM EXTENDED UNTIL DECEMBER

Nearly two million homes, farms and businesses will receive electricity rebates for the rest of the year to help cover high bills amid rising energy costs.

The electricity rebate program will now offer about \$600 million in relief through the rest of 2022, providing eligible Albertans with a monthly \$50 bill credit for six consecutive months.

More than 1.9 million homes, farms and small businesses will receive monthly credits on their electricity bills starting this month and stretching until the end of December, for a total of \$300 in rebates.

"We are doubling the electricity rebate to help reduce the financial burden that many families in Alberta are dealing with due to the rising cost of living. This move will help millions of families and business owners pay their bills and keep their lights on while we continue working to build a stronger, more affordable long-term electricity system."

Expanded electricity rebate As the cost of living continues

to pose challenges for Albertans, the government is providing an additional three months of bill credits to alleviate some of the high utility costs that many families and businesses have faced during recent months.

The expanded electricity rebate will hold the criteria currently in place:

• Albertans currently connected to the system that have consumed electricity within the past calendar year, up to a maximum of 250 megawatt hours per year, are automatically eligible for the rebates.

• Eligible Albertans can expect to see an automatic \$50 rebate on their bills. No applica-

tion or other action is needed to start receiving the rebate.

The extended monthly rebates will apply to the entire bill, not just the energy portion. In addition, the \$50 rebates will be on all eligible bills – protecting consumers on the variable regulated rate option as well as those on competitive contracts.

The July rebate will be listed on each bill as a line titled "GOA Utility Commodity Rebate," and \$50 rebates will follow in August, September, October, November and December for a total of \$300. Exact timing will vary depending on the billing cycle of one's utility provider.

Upcoming natural gas rebate

Alberta's government is implementing two programs to ensure utilities remain affordable while providing stability for millions of Albertans through the next nine months.

Along with the electricity rebate, the natural gas rebate will protect eligible Alberta customers using natural gas and other heating fuels from European-style price spikes.

With the electricity rebate reaching bills in July, and the natural gas rebate starting in October, Alberta's government will be providing support on utility bills for millions of Albertans until March 31, 2023, if prices remain high.

Fixed rate contracts and other options

Along with the rebates, Albertans wishing to protect themselves from price volatility may also enter into a competitive fixed-rate contract. Albertans can visit the Utility Consumer Advocate to see what products are available in their area.

Consumers who believe they meet the eligibility criteria but have not started receiving the rebates by the end of July should contact the Utility Consumer Advocate.



Thank you for supporting Screen Test over the past 30 years. It has been our pleasure bringing screening mammography to you. Together we are saving lives, one community at a time.

Screen Test is a free service provided by Alberta Health Services that offers screening mammograms. Our mobile screening units travel to 120 communities throughout Alberta to provide convenient access to breast cancer screening.

Having regular screening mammograms is the best way to find breast cancer early, before symptoms appear and when treatment may work better.

Who should have a screening mammogram?

If you're 50 to 74, you don't need a referral to have a mammogram. Make screening part of your regular health routine. Plan to have a mammogram every 2 years or as decided by you and your healthcare provider.

If you're 40 to 49 or over 75, discuss the risks and benefits of screening with your healthcare provider. You will need a referral if you're 40 to 49 and it's your first mammogram, or if you're over 75.

Call 1-800-667-0604 (toll-free) to book a mammogram with Screen Test. Breast density scores are now included in your Screen Test result letter

Breast density is the amount of dense tissue

compared to the amount of fat in a person's breasts. It can be harder to find cancer in dense breasts because this tissue appears white on a mammogram, the same colour as many kinds of breast cancer. It's common to have dense breast tissue.

Dense breasts are only one of many risk factors for breast cancer. Other factors, such as age and genetics, have a bigger impact on your overall risk. You can't tell how dense your breasts are by size, look or feel. The only way to find out is by having a mammogram.

COVID-19 VISITOR RESTRICTIONS RESCINDED AT AHS ACUTE CARE SITES

Visitor restrictions at Alberta Health Services (AHS) acute care, ambulatory care, urgent care, and emergency care sites have now been rescinded.

This includes removing limits to visitation and limits to the number of designated family/support persons and visitors permitted per patient.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, access restric-

tions at AHS sites have been in place to limit the number of visitors and designated family/support persons permitted in healthcare settings.

While these limits have been necessary to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19, we understand how challenging they have been for patients and their families.

What families and visitors should keep in mind:

While most sites will be able to accommodate open

access for visitors and designated family/support persons, it is important to know that some healthcare settings may need to impose access limits due to the vulnerability of their patients, or in the event of a COVID-19 outbreak. There may also be limits on how many people can be in an area at one time in order to maintain physical distancing requirements.

If you are planning to come to site to see a patient, speak with the site or patient's care team beforehand to find out if any access limits are in place.

It is also important to remember that, as healthcare facilities are vulnerable environments, certain measures must remain in place for the safety of patients, staff, and all on site. Anyone entering must continue to follow precautions such as continuous masking, entry screening, physical distancing, and hand hygiene.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE (CYANOBACTERIA) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR BUCK LAKE.

Submitted by Alberta Health Service

A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Buck Lake, located southeast of Drayton Valley in the County of Wetaskiwin. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

Avoid all contact with

blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where bluegreen algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole

fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Buck Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be bluegreen, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red,...

.....and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae or who ingest water containing blue-green algae may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Buck Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Buck Lake in which the blue-green algae bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this bluegreen algae Health Advisory is in place.

A sunburn is skin damage from the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays. Most sunburns cause mild pain and redness but affect only the outer layer of skin. These are called first-degree burns. The red skin might hurt when you touch it. These sunburns are mild and can usually be treated at home.

Skin that is red and painful and that swells up and blisters may mean that deep skin layers and nerve endings have been damaged. These are second-degree burns. This type of sunburn is usually more painful and takes longer to heal.

How can you care for yourself at home?

· Use cool cloths on the sunburned areas.

· Take cool showers or baths often.

· Apply soothing lotions with aloe vera to sunburned areas. Do not

apply lotions to blistered skin. · A sunburn can cause a mild

fever and a headache. Lie down in a cool, quiet room to relieve the headache. A headache may be caused by not getting enough fluids, which is called dehydration, so drinking fluids may help.

· Take anti-inflammatory medicines to reduce pain, swelling, and fever. These include ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) and naproxen (Aleve). Read and follow all instructions on the label.

· Use lotion to relieve the itching when your skin peels. There is nothing you can do to stop skin



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from peeling after a sunburn. It is part of the healing process.

· Protect your skin from the sun with sunscreen, hats with wide brims, sunglasses, and loose-fitting, tightly woven clothing that covers your arms and legs.

Caring for blisters

Small blisters usually heal on their own

• Do not try to break the blisters. Just leave them alone.

· Do not cover the blisters unless something such as clothing is rubbing against them. If you do cover them, apply a loose bandage. You can use tape to hold the bandage on, but do not let the tape touch the blisters.

· Avoid wearing clothes or shoes or doing activities that rub or irritate the blisters until they have healed.

Larger blisters, which are the size of a nickel or larger, usually heal without problems.

· If you have a large blister, you can consider draining it, unless your doctor told you not to. Clean

a needle with rubbing alcohol or soap and water, then use it to gently puncture the edge of the

blister. Press the fluid in the blister toward the hole you made. Wash the blister after you have

drained it, and pat it dry with clean gauze.

· Do not remove the flap of skin covering the blister unless it tears or gets dirty or pus forms under it. The flap protects the

healing skin underneath.

· Put a thin layer of petroleum jelly on the bandage before you apply it. This will keep the

bandage from sticking to the blister. Do not use alcohol or iodine on the blister because these

may make the blister heal more slowly.

· Loosely apply a bandage or gauze. You can use tape to hold the bandage on, but do not let the

tape touch the blister. Do not wrap tape completely around a hand, arm, foot, or leg because it

could cut off the blood supply if the limb swells. If the tape is too tight, you may develop

numbness, tingling, pain, or cool and pale or swollen skin below the tape.

· Change the bandage every day and any time it gets wet or dirty. You can soak the bandage in

cool water just before removing it to make it less painful to take off.

 Avoid wearing clothes or shoes or doing activities that rub or irritate the blisters until they have healed.




