...\$400-\$600 million, (likely a lot more). This so-called program will do nothing to get the countless guns illegally held by gangs and criminals off the streets.

Eighty-five percent of handguns come from the United States. Should not the focus be on enforcement? Where is the program to collect and destroy the guns the Trudeau government is now claiming are too dangerous for licensed, law-abiding Canadians to own?

Will legal firearms owners be compensated?

What this buyback program will do is punish those who follow the law by financially punishing them.

Again, the government

should focus on supporting grassroots community organizations that prevent our youth from joining gangs and invest in CBSA and police anti-gang and gun units to provide law enforcement with the resources they need to stop illegal firearm smuggling and gun violence at its root.

The federal government currently has a tender notice on their website for a "request for information (RFI)," not even a "request for proposals," on how to design the program. The RFI was posted July 14 and amended on July 29 with a closing date of August 17 for those interested in helping with the BBP or buyback program. More than two years after the Trudeau government announced

this program, they still don't have the basic structure, despite having already spent more than \$8.8 million on it.

As no buyback program exists, how does this government even put out this price list? Millions have been spent since May 1, 2020, and still nothing has happened.

The RCMP has said they can't oversee this program in terms of collecting firearms. Canada Post has also reportedly told the government that it can't be the main collection point for hundreds of thousands of firearms, either.









APPROXIMATELY \$1.4 BILLION IN UNCASHED CHEQUES IS SITTING IN THE CANADA REVENUE AGENCY'S COFFERS

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) has approximately \$1.4 billion in cheques that have gone uncashed over the years. As of May 2022, there were an estimated 8.9 million uncashed cheques with the CRA and we want to make sure this money ends up where it belongs. In taxpayers' pockets!

Each year, the (CRA) issues millions of payments in the form of refunds and benefits. These payments are issued by either direct deposit or by cheque. Over time, payments can remain uncashed for various reasons, such as the taxpayer mis-

placing the cheque or even a change of address which did not allow for delivery.


The CRA will be notifying some recipients of the Canada child benefit and related Provincial/Territorial programs, GST/HST Credit and Alberta Energy Tax Refund (AETR) recipients of any uncashed cheques they may have by email notification. Approximately 25,000 e-notifications will be issued in August and another 25,000 in November 2022, followed by the next 25,000 in May 2023.


Since the CRA launched this initiative in February 2020, approximately two million uncashed cheques valued at \$802 million were redeemed by Canadians between February 10, 2020, and May 31, 2022.

In 2020, the CRA introduced a feature where taxpayers can view their uncashed cheques and collect unclaimed benefit and credit payments that belong to them. Through My Account, Canadians can check to see if they have an uncashed cheque with the CRA, some dating as far back as 1998. As government cheques never expire or stale date, the CRA cannot void the original cheque and re-issue a new one unless requested by the taxpayer. These upcoming e-notifications are to encourage taxpayers to cash any cheques they have in their possession. The average amount per uncashed

cheque is \$158. It can pay to sign up for the CRA's online services!

Any taxpayer, regardless of whether they receive a notification, can check if they have a cheque by logging into My Account. Taxpayers will see an option under "related services" entitled "uncashed cheques." From here, they will be able to easily check if they have a CRA cheque, uncashed for six months or more. Then, all they have to do is complete and securely submit the displayed form online in My Account. Through the Represent a Client Service, representatives can also view uncashed cheques on behalf of their clients.



NATURAL GAS REBATE TO SUPPORT ALBERTANS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

The upcoming natural gas rebate will support more than 1.6 million homes, farms and businesses facing high heating bills next winter.

In Budget 2022, Alberta's government committed to ensuring natural gas consumers are protected from European-style price spikes next fall and winter. Now, the government is providing additional information on the rebates, including clarity for natural gas customers who are not connected to the distribution system and customers who use other heating fuels, such as propane, kerosene or heating oils, all of which will also be eligible for rebates.

The rebates will provide critical support and cost certainty to at least 1.6 million homes, farms and businesses, including those in rural and remote areas, from Oct. 1, 2022, through March 31, 2023.

"We are stepping up to provide more and more relief for Albertans as prices remain high. This rebate will provide price protection for millions of Albertans using natural gas, kerosene, propane and other fuels next winter. It will help families, farms and businesses manage high heating costs in the upcoming winter to keep life affordable in Alberta."

Natural gas rebate program

Starting Oct. 1, all consumers connected to the natural gas distribution system and paying a bill directly to a natural gas retailer with less than 2,500 gigajoules (GJ) of annual natural gas consumption will be eligible for government-provided rebates, which will appear directly on bills. No application will be necessary to receive the rebates if you are connected to the natural gas distribution sys-

Under this rebate program, if the monthly default natural gas rate from the regulated utility providers (ATCO Gas North, ATCO Gas South and Apex Utilities) goes above \$6.50 per GJ, the government will provide rebates to all consumers covering the difference between \$6.50 and the regulated rate, on a consumption basis. For example, if any of the regulated rates go to \$7.50 per GJ for the month of November, then all consumers would receive a rebate

on their bill covering \$1 for every GJ used during the month of November.

These rebates will appear directly on eligible bills – protecting consumers on both regulated and competitive plans like fixed rate contracts.

Other heating fuels also qualify for rebates

Eligible consumers not on the natural gas distribution system or consumers using the annual equivalent of 2,500 GJ or less in other heating fuels (such as propane, kerosene and heating oil), will also be eligible and can apply directly for their rebates through a separate application system.

For example, if one of the default regulated rates goes to \$7.50 for the month of November and an eligible consumer with a natural gas storage tank on their property purchases the equivalent of 200 GJ, that consumer can apply for a \$1 per GJ rebate for that amount of fuel. Specific eligibility limits for each fuel type are listed on alberta.ca.

The rebate for these heating fuels will be calculated in the same method, using a standardized equation to determine the consumption equivalency for the alternative fuel. Information on how to ap-

ply will be released before the Oct. 1 start date.

To keep Albertans informed about when they can expect rebates to be paid, regular updates on the default rate will be posted on alberta.ca for the duration of the rebate program. In Alberta, the default regulated rates are set for the entire month and do not fluctuate throughout the month. If a regulated rate in Alberta is set above \$6.50 per GJ, the rebates will go into effect for all eligible consumers.

Delivering relief for Albertans

This rebate is another component of the Alberta government's work to help support consumers dealing with high costs of living. It follows an electricity rebate program implemented this summer and a gas tax repeal that will be in place until at least September.

With the electricity rebate reaching bills in July, August and September, and the natural gas rebate starting in October, the Government of Alberta will provide continuous monthly relief for millions of Albertans until March 31, 2023.

GROUND BEEF AND PORK WILL NOT REQUIRE WARNING LABELS






