BLUE-GREEN ALGAE BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR LESSARD LAKE

A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Lessard Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

- Avoid all contact with blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.
- Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.
- Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Lessard Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, often becomes when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/ or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible bluegreen algae or who ingest water containing bluegreen algae may experience skin irritation, rash. sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one

to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced: however. all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Lessard Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Lessard Lake in which the blue-green algae bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this blue-green algae Health Advisory is in place.







Starting today, Albertans aged 18 and older who self-identify as meeting the eligibility criteria for targeted prevention of monkeypox, prior to an exposure, can book an appointment to receive monkeypox vaccine in nine cities across the province, including Edmonton, Calgary, Edson, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Red Deer and. St. Paul.


Appointments are re-

quired. Anyone who is eligible and interested in receiving the monkeypox vaccine must call Health Link at 1-866-301-2668 to review eligibility and book an appointment.

Imvamune (smallpox and monkeypox vaccine) has been authorized in Canada for adults who are 18 years and older and who are determined to be at high risk for exposure to the virus. Alberta has been providing Imvamune to close contacts of a confirmed monkeypox case after exposure...

ELECTRICITY REBATE PROGRAM EXTENDED UNTIL DECEMBER

Nearly two million homes, farms and businesses will receive electricity rebates for the rest of the year to help cover high bills amid rising energy costs.

The electricity rebate program will now offer about \$600 million in relief through the rest of 2022, providing eligible Albertans with a monthly \$50 bill credit for six consecutive months.

More than 1.9 million homes, farms and small businesses will receive monthly credits on their electricity bills starting this month and stretching until the end of December, for a total of \$300 in rebates.

"We are doubling the electricity rebate to help reduce the financial burden that many families in Alberta are dealing with due to the rising cost of living. This move will help millions of families and business owners pay their bills and keep their

lights on while we continue working to build a stronger, more affordable long-term electricity system."

Expanded electricity rebate

As the cost of living continues to pose challenges for Albertans, the government is providing an additional three months of bill credits to alleviate some of the high utility costs that many families and businesses have faced during recent months.

The expanded electricity rebate will hold the criteria currently in place:

- Albertans currently connected to the system that have consumed electricity within the past calendar year, up to a maximum of 250 megawatt hours per year, are automatically eligible for the rebates.
- Eligible Albertans can expect to see an automatic \$50 rebate on their bills. No application or oth-

er action is needed to start receiving the rebate.

The extended monthly rebates will apply to the entire bill, not just the energy portion. In addition, the \$50 rebates will be on all eligible bills – protecting consumers on the variable regulated rate option as well as those on competitive contracts

The July rebate will be listed on each bill as a line titled "GOA Utility Commodity Rebate," and \$50 rebates will follow in August, September, October, November and December for a total of \$300. Exact timing will vary depending on the billing cycle of one's utility provider.

Upcoming natural gas re-

Alberta's government is implementing two programs to ensure utilities remain affordable while providing stability for millions of Albertans through the next nine months.

Along with the electricity rebate, the natural gas rebate will protect eligible Al-

berta customers using natural gas and other heating fuels from European-style price spikes.

With the electricity rebate reaching bills in July, and the natural gas rebate starting in October, Alberta's government will be providing support on utility bills for millions of Albertans until March 31, 2023, if prices remain high.

Fixed rate contracts and other options

Along with the rebates, Albertans wishing to protect themselves from price volatility may also enter into a competitive fixed-rate contract. Albertans can visit the Utility Consumer Advocate to see what products are available in their area.

Consumers who believe they meet the eligibility criteria but have not started receiving the rebates by the end of July should contact the Utility Consumer Advocate.

COVID-19 VISITOR RESTRICTIONS RESCINDED AT AHS ACUTE CARE SITES

Visitor restrictions at Alberta Health Services (AHS) acute care, ambulatory care, urgent care, and emergency care sites have now been rescinded.

This includes removing limits to visitation and limits to the number of designated family/support persons and visitors permitted per patient.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, access restric-

tions at AHS sites have been in place to limit the number of visitors and designated family/support persons permitted in healthcare settings.

While these limits have been necessary to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19, we understand how challenging they have been for patients and their families.

What families and visitors should keep in mind:

While most sites will be able to accommodate open

access for visitors and designated family/support persons, it is important to know that some health-care settings may need to impose access limits due to the vulnerability of their patients, or in the event of a COVID-19 outbreak. There may also be limits on how many people can be in an area at one time in order to maintain physical distancing requirements.

If you are planning to come to site to see a patient, speak with the site or patient's care team beforehand to find out if any access limits are in place.

It is also important to remember that, as healthcare facilities are vulnerable environments, certain measures must remain in place for the safety of patients, staff, and all on site. Anyone entering must continue to follow precautions such as continuous masking, entry screening, physical distancing, and hand hygiene.

...since June 7. To help curb the spread of the virus, Alberta expanded the monkeypox vaccine eligibility to include Albertans who are at higher risk of being exposed to monkeypox and began vaccine administration in Calgary and Edmonton on July 29. By expanding availability beyond these two cities, AHS is further enhancing the opportunity for more eligible people in Alberta to receive the vaccine.

Vaccine eligibility

Alberta residents 18 years and older eligible for the monkeypox vaccine include:


- Transgender, cisgender or two-spirit individuals who self-identify as belonging to the gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (gbMSM) community and who meet at least one of the following criteria:
- o Have received a recent (in the last six months) diagnosis of a sexually transmitted infection.
- o Are planning to have, or in the past 90 days had, sex outside of a mutually monogamous relationship.
- o Have attended venues for sexual contact within the past 90 days (e.g., bath houses, sex clubs) or may be planning to.
- Any sexual contacts of the individuals described above.
- Staff and volunteers in a social setting or

venue or event where sexual activities between men (individuals described above) may take place.

Protection against monkeypox virus

Close contacts of people suspected or confirmed to have a monkeypox infection may also be eligible for post-exposure immunization. Immunization is recommended up to 14 days, and ideally within 4 days, after exposure to help prevent illness. Close contacts are also advised to self-monitor for 21 days

after their last exposure. If symptoms develop, they should self-isolate, seek care and get tested. Call 811 for further information.

AS ALBERTANS HEAD OUTDOORS FOR THE SUMMER, REMEMBER SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

With the weather warming up for the season, Albertans are heading outdoors to enjoy time with family and friends. Cooling off in Alberta's lakes and enjoying outdoor activities are great ways to stay active and spend quality time with loved ones, but it is important to remember safety tips for heat-related illnesses and recreational water.

Sunburns and heat-related illness:

- Apply a sunscreen that screens out both UVA and UVB rays and has a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30. Apply it 20 minutes before going outside and reapply frequently.
- Wear a widebrimmed hat and sunglasses (with a UVA/UVB CSA certified seal). If possible, wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts that cover skin.
- Drink lots of water and other non-alcoholic, non-caffeinated beverages to stay hydrated.

- If you feel dizzy, nauseous or faint, you may be suffering from heat exhaustion. Drink plenty of water and get into a shaded area. Keep in mind that children and older adults are more at risk of heat exhaustion and dehydration.
- Hot weather can also cause heat stroke. Symptoms include high body temperature, lack of sweat, confusion, fainting, and unresponsiveness. Move the person to a shaded area, remove their outer clothing and shoes, wrap them in a wet towel, and get medical attention as soon as possible.

Recreational Water

There is always a potential risk of injury when swimming, especially in un-monitored bodies of water. Here are a few ways you can prevent water-related injuries:

- Wear a life-jacket or Personal Flotation Device (PFD) in a boat and make sure it fits.
- Young children should wear lifejackets when they are in, on, or around the water. Stay

right beside your child.

- Not all beaches are monitored for biological, chemical, and physical hazards. Look for posted signs at designated beaches.
- Unlike the local swimming pool, lakes, rivers and streams may disease-causcontain ing micro-organisms. Be aware of local water quality advisories, blue-green algae, and cyanobacteria advisories. Do not go near lakes or ponds that are known to have outbreaks of swimmer's itch and be sure to shower or dry yourself off with a towel as soon as you get out of a lake or pond.
- Avoid alcohol or cannabis and any other substance that may impair your judgment before and during water activities.

FINAL SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT ON COMPENSATION SIGNED FOR FIRST NATIONS CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Submitted by Government of Canada

Today, Canada, the Assembly of First Nations (AFN), and the plaintiffs in the Moushoom


and Trout class actions announced that a final settlement agreement has been signed, regarding compensation for First Nations children and families harmed by discriminatory underfunding of the First Nations Child and Family Services program and the federal government's narrow definition of Jordan's Principle. Together, the Parties arrived at this historic settlement agreement – the largest in Canadian history – which recognizes harm to First Nations children and their families. The agreement ensures fair compensation for survivors and their families who suffered because of the discriminatory underfunding of services.

To reach this agreement, Canada, the Assembly of First Nations and counsel representing the plaintiffs in the Moushoom and Trout class actions have worked collaboratively and tirelessly over the past six months since announcing Agreements-in-Principle. Plaintiffs and their counsel took the lead on proposing a structure and roll-out of compensation that best meet the needs of the class members.

The next step is to bring the final settlement agreement to the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal asking for the Tribunal's confirmation that the settlement satisfies its orders on compensation. The final settlement agreement will then be brought to the Federal Court of Canada for approval. If approved, the process to implement the settlement will begin.

The agreement provides \$20 billion and, once approved....

Final Settlement Agreement On Compensation Signed For First Nations Children And Families

...by the Federal Court and the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal, the following groups will be eligible for compensation:

- children who were removed from their homes under the First Nations Child and Family Services program between April 1, 1991 and March 31, 2022
- children who were impacted by the government's narrow definition of Jordan's Principle between December 12, 2007 and November 2, 2017
- children who did not receive or were delayed in receiving an essential public service or product between April 1, 1991 and December 11, 2007

• caregiving parents or caregiving grandparents of the children above may also be eligible for compensation

With respect to longterm reform of the First Nations Child and Family Services program, Parties are working hard at reaching a final settlement agreement to ensure a solid, reformed system to end the discrimination found by the Tribunal. On April 1, 2022, Canada implemented immediate measures to help reduce the number of First Nations children in care, and to provide additional supports to First Nations children. youth and families. These investments, amounting to approximately \$2.7 billion to date, represent an 80% increase in funding from 2020-21. They include increased

funding in all provinces and the Yukon Territory for prevention, for First Nations representative services, and for the expansion of post-majority care services for young adults formerly in care up to their 26th birthday.

In reaching a resolution on compensation and in continuing the work to reform the First Nations Child and Family Services program, the shared goal is to prioritize the well-being of First Nations children and their families. Canada stands with First Nation partners in the commitment to make sure that a better system is in place for current and future generations.




