





....payments in the form of refunds and benefits. These payments are issued by either direct deposit or by cheque. Over time, payments can remain uncashed for various reasons, such as the taxpayer misplacing the cheque or even a change of address which did not allow for delivery.

The CRA will be notifying some recipients of the Canada child benefit and related Provincial/Territorial programs, GST/HST Credit and Alberta Energy Tax Refund (AETR) recipients of any uncashed cheques they may have by email notification. Approximately 25,000 e-no-

tifications will be issued in August and another 25,000 in November 2022, followed by the next 25,000 in May 2023.

Since the CRA launched this initiative in February 2020, approximately two million uncashed cheques valued at \$802 million were redeemed by Canadians between February 10, 2020, and May 31, 2022.

In 2020, the CRA introduced a feature where taxpayers can view their uncashed cheques and collect unclaimed benefit and credit payments that belong to them. Through My Account, Canadians can check to see if they have an uncashed cheque with the CRA, some dating as far back as 1998. As

government cheques never expire or stale date, the CRA cannot void the original cheque and re-issue a new one unless requested by the taxpayer. These upcoming e-notifications are to encourage taxpayers to cash any cheques they have in their possession. The average amount per uncashed cheque is \$158. It can pay to sign up for the CRA's online services!

Any taxpayer, regardless of whether they receive a notification, can check if they have a cheque by logging into My Account. Taxpayers will see an option under "related services" entitled "uncashed cheques." From here, they will be able to easily check if they have a CRA cheque,

uncashed for six months or more. Then, all they have to do is complete and securely submit the displayed form online in My Account. Through the Represent a Client Service, representatives can also view uncashed cheques on behalf of their clients.




Will legal firearms owners be compensated?



...law enforcement with the resources they need to stop illegal firearm smuggling and gun violence at its root.

The federal government currently has a tender notice on their website for a "request for information (RFI)," not even

a "request for proposals," on how to design the program. The RFI was posted July 14 and amended on July 29 with a closing date of August 17 for those interested in helping with the BBP or buyback program. More than two years after the Trudeau government announced this program, they still don't have the basic structure, despite having already spent more than \$8.8 million on it.

As no buyback program exists, how does this government even put out this price list? Millions have been spent since May 1, 2020, and still nothing has happened.

The RCMP has said they can't oversee this program in terms of collecting firearms. Canada Post has also reportedly told the government that it can't be the main collection point for hundreds of thousands of firearms, either.

COVID-19 VISITOR RESTRICTIONS RESCINDED AT AHS ACUTE CARE SITES

Visitor restrictions at Alberta Health Services (AHS) acute care, ambulatory care, urgent care, and emergency care sites have now been rescinded.

This includes removing limits to visitation and limits to the number of designated family/support persons and visitors permitted per patient.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, access restrictions at AHS sites have been in place to limit the number of visitors and designated family/support persons permitted in healthcare settings.

While these limits have been necessary to reduce the risk of transmission of COVID-19, we understand how challenging they have been for patients and their families.

What families and visitors should keep in mind:

While most sites will be able to accommodate open access for visitors and designated family/support persons, it is important to know that some healthcare settings may need to impose access limits due to the vulnerability of their patients, or in the event of a COVID-19 outbreak. There may also be limits on how many people can be in an area at one time in order to maintain physical dis-

tancing requirements.

If you are planning to come to site to see a patient, speak with the site or patient's care team beforehand to find out if any access limits are in place.

It is also important to remember that, as healthcare facilities are vulnerable environments, certain measures must remain in place for the safety of patients, staff, and all on site. Anyone entering must continue to follow precautions such as continuous masking, entry screening, physical distancing, and hand hygiene.







WHAT MATTERS TO YOU

I am writing this note at 30,00 feet, travelling along at roughly 500 miles per hour. Yes, I'm using the correct units of measurement, because technically I am still in the USA. I was recently appointed (because I asked loudly enough) to attend the Mid-West Legislatures Conference in Wichita, Kansas. I am sure glad that I did because I met some very incredible people and learned a ton about our neighbors not only to the south, but in Saskatchewan and Manitoba as well. It is evident that the concept of economic corridors, as well as 'North America First' makes not only economic sense, but it is literally in all our best interest regarding security.

There were some attendees that were obviously from opposite ends of the political spectrum, but in this context, at the convention, I was absolutely impressed how most of the participants parked the "Company Lines" at the door and really listened to one another. Delegates from the Detroit area were very excited about turning the Motor City around when it comes to manufacturing. They were extremely surprised to know how much energy we provide them, and just as protective of keeping the lines that supply energy not only open to them but growing as well. They were astounded by the amount of potash that Saskatchewan had, and as well as how much lithium that both our provinces could provide. They invited us to meet with their Governor to discuss further and wanted to come and see for themselves why I was so proud of our oilsands production. They were extremely interested in the transition approach to technology and energy within our hydrogen programs. These were Democrat Representatives and Senators.

The problem with being Canadian is we have become 'Can't Nadians' over the years and have not shown up to the dance. We then sit on the sidelines and wonder why others are not excited to take us to the prom as it were. We need to be engaged, we need to tell our story ourselves, and no matter how hard working our bureaucrats are that attend these events on our behalf, they simply do not carry the same weight as our locally elected officials in these rooms or across these discussions. Alberta needs to attend these events, and we need to make sure we get folks up to our province, in conjunction with Saskatchewan and Manitoba to really show what the Northwest can do for the strategies that supply and protect North America.

The Midwest and the prairie provinces have the same or similar challenges when it comes to providing the supports required to ensure that the less populated parts of our country remain viable. We heard about the challenges, but more importantly about the successes not only on the economy, but in the quality of life. We need rural just as much as we need the big cities. We heard about the logistic challenges, transition fuels, electric vehicles, and all the other stretch targets. We also heard about the realistic expectations, and engineering realities of trying to obtain them in the timeline given by some of the "Big Dream" policy makers. A balance of where we may want to head, with realistically how we would be able to get there is needed; this discussion is vital, and we sure as heck can not plunge headlong over a cliff based on wishful thinking.

We were complimented many times on the value that my fellow MLA and I brought to the discussion, both in the way we approached challenges and in the practical experience that we had. I was told by one former cabinet minister that I was not the "typical" rep that Alberta sent, and he was very appreciative of that. He was encouraged that Alberta was sending people who really wanted to work in the best interest of the west and who had the experience to get the conversations heading in the right direction. I was rather flattered by that compliment, as I had been doing my utmost to pitch the concept of the economic corridors, and the Corridor Management Authority as being a Northwestern Canada nation building concept.

The former speaker of the house from Saskatchewan was my best advocate and connected me with the right folks at the conference, and they are just as excited as I am about getting out, seeing the sights and working the details, as opposed to just talking about it. In short, executing a plan to lay the foundations for advancement on the file, which will help with growth and prosperity for generations to come. 'Can- Nadians' through and through.

I had joked with a senator from Nebraska that after they played both of our national anthems that if they weren't careful a hockey game may break out, he laughed wholeheartedly. But when the "Canadian Contingent" was asked to stand and be recognized by

the host senator from Kansas because we had been very much missed over the last few years, he cheered like a long-lost brother. We were made not only to feel welcomed as visitors but welcomed home as family.

If we are going to capitalize on our relaunch however and ensure that we all think in the North American Context, we really must talk about not only freedom of movement of goods, but of services, and of our citizens. During our session on Canada-USA relations, we were addressed by a professor and a lawyer, who have performed work in this area, and have reviewed the issues as well as made recommendations. The Wilson Centre is a very well-respected organization, and literally has addressed the areas where governments and law makers got it wrong. I won't go into full details but basically, the medical community should not be the ones making the primary decisions or have that control over the borders, the movement of people, or some of the "we think its effective" restrictions.

The current federal travel protocols are not consistent, and they are out of touch with what is happening in the rest of the world and more importantly with our largest trading partner. I look forward to being home, but there is a definite contrast from the land of the free and the home of the brave, when compared to the federal government for the true north strong and free. We again need freedom of movement, freedom of choice, and for the remaining vaccine mandates, mask protocols, and restriction of work to be a thing of the past.





MONKEYPOX IMMUNIZATION APPOINTMENTS NOW AVAILABLE

Starting today, Albertans aged 18 and older who self-identify as meeting the eligibility criteria for targeted prevention of monkeypox, prior to an exposure, can book an appointment to receive monkeypox vaccine in nine cities across the province, including Edmonton, Calgary, Edson, Fort McMurray, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Red Deer and. St. Paul.

Appointments are required. Anyone who is eligible and interested in receiving the monkeypox vaccine must call Health Link at 1-866-301-2668 to review eligibility and book an appointment.

Imvamune (smallpox and monkeypox vaccine) has been authorized in Canada for adults who are 18 years and older and who are determined to be at high risk for exposure to the virus. Alberta has been providing Imvamune to close contacts of a confirmed

monkeypox case after exposure since June 7. To help curb the spread of the virus, Alberta expanded the monkeypox vaccine eligibility to include Albertans who are at higher risk of being exposed to monkeypox and began vaccine administration in Calgary and Edmonton on July 29. By expanding availability beyond these two cities, AHS is further enhancing the opportunity for more eligible people in Alberta to receive the vaccine.

Vaccine eligibility

Alberta residents 18 years and older eligible for the monkeypox vaccine include:

- Transgender, cisgender or two-spirit individuals who self-identify as belonging to the gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (gbMSM) community and who meet at least one of the following criteria:
- o Have received a recent (in the last six months) diagnosis of a sexually transmitted in-

fection.

- o Are planning to have, or in the past 90 days had, sex outside of a mutually monogamous relationship.
- o Have attended venues for sexual contact within the past 90 days (e.g., bath houses, sex clubs) or may be planning to.
- Any sexual contacts of the individuals described above.
- Staff and volunteers in a social setting or venue or event where sexual activities between men (individuals described above) may take place.

Protection against monkeypox virus

Close contacts of people suspected or confirmed to have a monkeypox infection may also be eligible for post-exposure immunization. Immunization is recommended up to 14 days, and ideally within 4 days, after exposure to help prevent illness. Close contacts are also advised to self-monitor for 21 days after their last exposure. If symptoms develop, they should self-isolate, seek care and get tested. Call 811 for further infor-

FINAL SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT ON COMPENSATION SIGNED FOR FIRST NATIONS CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Today, Canada, the Assembly of First Nations (AFN), and the plaintiffs in the Moushoom and Trout class actions announced that a final settlement agreement has been signed, regarding compensation for First Nations children and families harmed by discriminatory underfunding of the First Nations Child and Family Services program and the federal government's narrow definition of Jordan's Principle. Together, the Parties arrived at this historic settlement agreement - the largest in Canadian history - which recognizes harm to First Nations children and their families. The agreement ensures fair compensation for survivors and their families who suffered because of the discriminatory underfunding of services.

To reach this agreement, Canada, the Assembly of First Nations and counsel representing the plaintiffs in the Moushoom and Trout class actions have worked collaboratively and tirelessly over the past six months since announcing Agreements-in-Principle. Plaintiffs and their counsel took the lead on proposing a structure and roll-out of compensation that best meet the needs of the class members.

The next step is to bring the final settlement agreement to the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal asking for the Tribunal's confirmation that the settlement satisfies its orders on compensation. The final settlement agreement will then be brought to the Federal Court of Canada for approval. If approved, the process to implement the settlement will begin.

The agreement provides \$20 billion and, once approved by the Federal Court and the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal, the following groups will be eligible for compensation:

• children who were removed from their homes

under the First Nations Child and Family Services program between April 1, 1991 and March 31, 2022

- children who were impacted by the government's narrow definition of Jordan's Principle between December 12, 2007 and November 2, 2017
- children who did not receive or were delayed in receiving an essential public service or product between April 1, 1991 and December 11, 2007
- caregiving parents or caregiving grandparents of the children above may also be eligible for compensation

With respect to long-term reform of the First Nations Child and Family Services program, Parties are working hard at reaching a final settlement agreement to ensure a solid, reformed system to end the discrimination found by the Tribunal. On April 1, 2022, Canada implemented immediate measures to help reduce the number of First Nations children in care, and to pro-

vide additional supports to First Nations children, youth and families. These investments, amounting to approximately \$2.7 billion to date, represent an 80% increase in funding from 2020-21. They include increased funding in all provinces and the Yukon Territory for prevention, for First Nations representative services, and for the expansion of post-majority care services for young adults formerly in care up to their 26th birthday.

In reaching a resolution on compensation and in continuing the work to reform the First Nations Child and Family Services program, the shared goal is to prioritize the well-being of First Nations children and their families. On June 18, 2022, Parkland RCMP unveiled their Treaty 6 Land Acknowledgement display in honour of Indigenous History Month, just days before National Indigenous Peoples Day.

When Parkland RCMP Community Policing and Victim Services (CPVS) Unit received the original Treaty 6 Land Acknowledgement certificate from the Division, they knew they wanted to make an even larger statement.

High School Resource

Officer Constable Gord Marshall took the lead on the project, with the help of students at Memorial Composite High School. The feathers, Inukshuk and maple leaf were cut in the metal shop. The wood shop cut out the backing and prepared a blank plaque for acknowledgement. Cst. Marshall designed the plaque and laser engraved it in the Com Tech lab. The Metis sash was provided by the Indigenous student grad coach. In all, approximately 20 hours of design and labour went into its creation.

The display is now hanging in the front lobby of the Parkland RCMP Detachment. Inspector Mike Lokken, Cpl. Kandis Hiscock, Cpl. Cuneyt Zanbak, Elder Elsie Paul, and several other Parkland RCMP members were present for the official unveiling ceremony. Parkland RCMP were honoured that Elsie Paul smudged the plaque for the event and offered opening remarks.

Parkland RCMP would like to thank all who contributed to this project, and hope that this Land Acknowledgement will leave a lasting impact on all who come through the detachment doors.
