called the Rapid Response Stream.

This fund was intended for shovel-ready projects in communities that were identified by Innovation, Science, and Economic Development Canada (ISED) as having inadequate or no coverage. After applying for the grant, a section of the western part of Yellowhead County was found to meet the ISED requirements and fund-


ing limits.

The project to provide Robb, Brule, Mountain View Estates, Aspen Heights, Seabolt, Grandview, Maskuta, Carldale, and Yellowhead County East River Road with better broadband services has been underway since. The project is 60% funded by the Rapid Response Stream funding under the UBF, and 40% by Yellowhead County. The work in these communities is expected to be com-

pleted by December 2022.

On August 22, 2022, Yellowhead County Council traveled to Robb to break ground on the project in that community, and to talk with and ask questions of those working on the project.

Council was very pleased to see the progress that has been made towards bringing better internet service to residents in Yellowhead County.

The investigation is still ongoing and the RCMP are requesting that anyone who was a victim of this event to report the incident to the Drayton Valley RCMP.

Drayton Valley RCMP are also asking that the residents of Drayton Valley review their surveillance footage on Sept. 4, 2022, between the hours of 01:30 a.m. and 5 a.m. for video surveillance of 3 suspects.

The suspects are all described as youths approximately 18-years-old: One male was believed to be wearing jeans, a ball cap, a black hoody and a white shirt; a second male was believed to be wearing ripped

blue jeans, a black hoody and a grey and black ball cap; the third suspect is a female youth wearing a red top.

## ALBERTA RCMP STATEMENT ON TRANSPORTATION OF INDIVIDUAL INTO EDMONTON

On June 9, 2022, the Alberta RCMP released a statement to CBC outlining the actions our officers took prior to the tragic loss of two lives that

unfolded in the City of Edmonton three days later. The statement included details about the transportation of Justin Bone, and is included in this release. The statement addressed specific questions posed by CBC.

While the statement indicated a review was underway, we feel it is important to provide additional detail as to what that involves. It imperative that all involved agencies look at the actions that ultimately lead to an outcome

no one ever wants to have

The review will examine the decisions officers made; the operational policies and procedures currently in place that guide decisions like these; any gaps in support systems; and how we coordinate our responses with partner agencies when there are a multitude of social and judicial factors involved.

The Alberta RCMP is keenly aware that not all matters police officers respond to require a police response alone. Dynamic and complex calls for service, often involving mental health, addictions and repeat incarceration, require coordinated, multi-agency responses that can better address these social issues.

Please see the statement issued yesterday below.

On Sunday, May 15, 2022, Parkland RCMP responded to a complaint of threats at a home in the Alberta Beach area involving Justin Bone.

Responding officers gathered information from both parties involved, consulted with the Detachment's domestic violence coordinator and determined that the situation did not meet threshold for charges.

## Alberta RCMP Statement On Transportation Of Individual Into Edmonton

The homeowner indicated that Mr. Bone could no longer stay at the home. As Mr. Bone was under conditions not to travel into Edmonton without being under escort of the Alberta Beach homeowner, RCMP officers attempted to contact Mr. Bone's probation officer to discuss alternate arrangements, but they could not be reached. Officers, in consultation with their supervisor, determined the best course of action would be to take Mr. Bone to an area where supports and services were available to him, and he was dropped off near a

social services hub in the west end of Edmonton, so he could easily access those services. Officers notified Edmonton Police Service of their actions.

Contact with Mr. Bone's probation officer was made the following day, Monday, May 16, to ensure they were both aware, and in contact, with Mr. Bone. Officers were able to confirm that communication had occurred between Mr. Bone and his probation officer, and that Mr. Bone was working with his probation officer to get supports he needed.

The Alberta RCMP has undertaken a review of


the actions taken by officers with respect to Mr. Bone. Given this review is underway, it would be inappropriate to comment any further at this time. Once the review is completed, more details may be shared. It should be noted that the Director of Law Enforcement for Alberta was notified of these events, and determined the review of the matter should remain with the Alberta RCMP.


Our hearts are heavy for the family and friends of Hung Trang and Ban Phuc Hoang, and our thoughts are with them as they navigate this terrible tragedy.





#### 5 WAYS TO MAKE HOMES SAFER

Injuries that occur around the home contribute to millions of medical visits and tens of thousands of fatalities each year. Falls account for the largest percentage of home accidents, with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reporting that around 30,000 fall-related fatalities occur each year in the United States. Many home accidents are entirely preventable when proper caution is

exercised.

As homeowners prepare for home-improvement projects, improving safety inside and outside the home should be a priority.

1. Improve lighting

One of the easiest ways to reduce the risk of falls is to improve lighting around the home. The National Institutes of Health state that adequate lighting is important at entrances to the home, stairways,

hallways, and other frequently traversed areas. Make sure lighting fixtures are using the highest wattage light bulb allowed. Artificial lighting sources become even more vital in fall and autumn, when natural light is less abundant in a home. In addition, install lighting outdoors by the front door, over the garage and where garbage pails are stored to facilitate safe passage.

2. Eliminate slick sur-

**Improving** traction around the house also minimize falls. Throw rugs and runners can be made more secure with nonslip rubber backings. Bath rugs can reduce slipping on wet surfaces in the bathroom. Also, nonslip mats can be used inside of showers and bathtubs.

Use shoe trays to reduce puddling from melting

snow or rain runoff in entryways. Mop up spills quickly, and consider the use of matte- or textured-finished flooring to improve stability underfoot.

Promptly remove snow and ice from driveways and walkways. For those who live in cold climates, heated concrete can help melt precipitation before it accumulates.

3. Make needed repairs

Repair loose floor-boards and pull carpet taut if it has started to stretch out. Address cracks outdoors and ensure that patio stones, bricks and pavers are secure and level to reduce tripping hazards. Fix areas of the landscape where water may pool and freeze, creating potential hazards.

4. Declutter all spaces
Remove unnecessary
items and furniture from
rooms to free up more

space to get around. Be sure there are no obstructions in walkways, entryways and near doors. Keep staircases clear at all times.


5. Invest in assistive devices

Handrails, grab bars, nonslip stair treads, and many other devices can make homes safer for people of all ages and abilities. Outfit cabinets and closets with organizers that put frequently used items within

easy reach. A sturdy step stool can reduce the risk of injury while reaching for items stored on high shelves.

Taking measures to reduce the risk of falling around the home is a worthwhile home improvement project.

affording homeowners the chance to protect their vehicles from the elements. Homeowners who want to turn their garages into something more than cluttered storage units can employ the following strategies to transform these largely overlooked areas into more valuable spaces.

· Choose the right day. Garages tend to be separate from the rest of the homes they're a part of, meaning the only way to organize a garage is to first remove all items from the garage and into the driveway. Because items removed from the garage will be exposed to the elements, homeowners should choose a day that's temperate and sunny to clean their garages. If possible, homeowners should opt to organize their garages in late spring, summer or early fall when there are additional hours of daylight. This protects homeowners from having to work in the dark

should the job take longer than they initially anticipated.

• Discard or donate duplicate items. Duplicate items are some of the main culprits behind cluttered garages. As garages gradually become more cluttered, homeowners may buy tools they already have simply because they cannot find their original tools. When organizing the garage, create separate piles for duplicate tools, placing

still-useful items in a pile that can be donated to neighbors, local charities or organizations and another pile for old tools that are no longer useful.


Host a garage sale. Homeowners who want to organize their garages and make a buck at the same time

can host garage sales. Make only those items that are still functional available for purchase, and let neighbors and bargain hunters do the

bulk of your organization work for you.

- Designate eas of the garage for certain items. Once the items that won't be going back into the garage have been sold, donated or discarded, organize the garage by designating areas for certain items, making sure to separate items that can pose safety risks. For example, store kids' bicycles and outdoor toys in a corner of the garage that is opposite the corner where potentially dangerous items such as power tools and gas cans will be stored. Keep the center of the garage open for vehicles.
- Periodically park cars in the garage. Homeowners who are comfortable parking their vehicles in their driveways can improve their chances of maintaining organized garages over the long haul by periodically parking in the garage. Doing so not only prevents the gradual buildup of clutter that can slowly take over a garage, but also protects homeowners' automotive investments.

Maintaining an organized garage can help homeowners make more practical use of the space in their homes.



Alberta's centennial year in 2005. On May 24, 2005, Her Majesty addressed the Legislative Assembly of Alberta in the Chamber, becoming the first reigning monarch to do so.

In 2012, the Legislative Assembly of Alberta hosted public events to celebrate Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee; garden parties took place at the Legislature Grounds and at the McDougall Centre in Calgary. Over the past year we have been celebrating the Platinum Jubilee.

Queen Elizabeth II was the longest reigning British monarch and leaves behind a strong legacy of public service through the over 600 royal patronages across the Commonwealth. including 36 charitable organizations in Canada, attached to her name. Her work also highlighted the critical role of the Canadian Forces; she served as Colonel-in-Chief, Captain General and Air Commodore-in-Chief for numerous units, including the Calgary Highlanders and the King's Own Calgary Regiment.

Albertans will have the chance to honour the life and legacy of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth in the coming days. There will be books of condolence for public signing in the Legislature. A Celebration of Life will follow. Further details about these public memorials are forthcoming.

#### EXPANDING SURGERY ACCESS IN **CENTRAL, SOUTHERN ALBERTA**

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Expanding contracts with chartered surgical facilities in central and southern Alberta will reduce wait times and deliver about 2,600 more surgeries closer to home.

As part of the Alberta Surgical Initiative, Alberta Health Services (AHS) aims to schedule an additional 1,350 surgeries in the central zone and about 1,250 more procedures in the south zone, ranging from hip and knee to general surgeries, by inviting chartered surgical facilities to submit proposals.

These procedures are ex-

funded surgeries in central zone communities such as Red Deer and in communities in the south zone like Lethbridge and Medicine Hat by five per cent. Moving more orthopedic and other general surgeries into chartered surgical facilities also frees up operating room space in hospitals to provide more complex surgeries.

Alberta Health and AHS have been increasing surgical capacity in hospitals and the number of surgeries at chartered surgical facilities as part of the Alberta Surgical Initiative. Main operating room surgical suite hours have been increased at hospi-

ducing the surgical waitlist. Budget 2022 provides \$133 million over three years to expand and build new operating rooms in hospitals across the province, including in Calgary, Edmonton, Edson, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat and Rocky Mountain House.

Through requests for proposals issued last year for chartered surgical facilities in Calgary and Edmonton, AHS is targeting about 30,000 ophthalmology surgeries in these facilities this fiscal year. In addition, AHS is targeting about 6,000 orthopedic surgeries in chartered surgical facilities per year, and contracts are being fi-

Chartered surgical facilities have been offering publicly funded surgeries to Albertans since the 1990s. Prior to launching the Alberta Surgical Initiative in 2019, about 39,000 procedures were formed at chartered surgical facilities - 13 per cent of surgeries in Alberta. In 2021-22, about 55,000 surgeries were performed in these facilities, or 20 per cent of surgeries.
