

Supporting community-driven projects like the rent-to-own initiative undertaken by the Paul First Nation is a key action under Alberta's Stronger Foundations affordable housing strategy and responds to the recommendations of the 2020 Affordable Housing Review Panel.

Federal funding for the IHCP is provided through the 10-year bilateral housing agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of Alberta, announced in spring 2019.





PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL COLLISION INVOLVING STOLEN VEHICLE

On Sept. 26, 2022, Parkland RCMP concluded a complex and lengthy investigation into a fatal collision involving a stolen vehicle

from October 2021.

25-year-old Thomas Bailey Rain, a resident of Paul First Nation, Alta., was arrested and charged with multiple offences including:

• Operation of a motor vehicle while impaired

causing death

- Dangerous operation of a motor vehicle causing death
- Possession of stolen property over \$5000 for the purposes of trafficking Thomas Bailey Rain was

held for a Judicial Interim Release Hearing and was remanded into custody. He is set to appear before the courts on Sept. 28, 2022, in Stony Plain.

On Sept. 25, 2022, at approximately 5:15 p.m., Parkland RCMP responded to multiple reports of a collision involving two pickup trucks at Highway 627 and Range Road 12 in Parkland County.

A pickup truck is alleged to have failed to stop at the stop sign when crossing the Highway, and was struck on the passenger side by a second pickup truck heading westbound. The 58-year-old female passenger of the first truck was transported to hospital via STARS, where she succumbed to her injuries. Her 60-year-old husband, and the 39-year-old male driver of the second vehicle both sustained lesser injuries as well. All parties were residents of Edmonton.

The collision is still under investigation with the assistance of a collision analyst.

We are thrilled to announce our new toddler program at Tipple Park Museum, Evansburg.


Every Wednesday, starting October 5th, from 11:00-11:40, children will learn about our town's his-

Our entire United Conservative government welcomes these new Albertans and wishes them nothing but success and happiness in our great province, now and for generations to come.


TRUSTEES VISIT CLASSROOMS

Parkland County Administration has received an application to amend Land Use Bylaw 2017-18 to add Site Specific Use in the AGG-Agricultural General District, being Storage, Warehousing and Distribution, Outdoor as a discretionary use only on a parcel legally described as Plan 167MC Lot 3. The purpose of proposed Bylaw 2022-10 is to allow for the future development of a Storage, Warehousing and Distribution, Outdoor business to occur on Plan 167MC Lot 3. This use is not listed in the AGG-Agricultural General District and as such, the applicant is proposing a site specific Land Use Bylaw amendment to allow for this type of development, specifically on the subject parcel. The Bylaw received First Reading on September 13, 2022.

Hearing Procedure



Written submissions or presentations may either be submitted in advance to Planning & Development by 4:00 p.m. on September 27, 2022, or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing on October 11, 2022.

Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation to Council must notify Planning & Development Services in advance of the Public Hearing by 4:00 p.m., on September 27, 2022. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.





COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS FOR YELLOWHEAD COUNTTY

Submitted by Yellowhead County

A Public Hearing was held for Bylaw 02.22 to amend the Hinton-Yellowhead County Intermunicipal Development Plan (IDP). Minor text amendments are required for consistency between Land Use Bylaw 09.21 and the Statutory Plan. The bylaw will be brought back at a future council meeting.

Yellowhead Agricultural Society- Representatives of the Yellowhead Agricultural Society made a presentation to Council regarding mould and air quality issues in their facility, with the remediation work estimated at \$456,226.75. The society requested \$100,000 from Yellowhead County. Council accepted the presentation as information and requested Administration bring it back to a future Council meeting for further deliberation.

Edson & District Library Funding Request – Council voted to include \$538,000 in the 2023 Yellowhead County budget considerations for the proposed extension and renovations to the Edson & District Public Library. The request was made by Library representatives at the September 20, 2022 Council Meeting.

Bylaw 17.22 Revised – Council gave first reading of Bylaw 17.22 that would return a property in Niton Junction to a district matching more closely to what it was prior to the adoption of Land Use Bylaw 09.21. The new bylaw changes the Urban Neighbourhood District zoning to Urban Neighbourhood District, Commercial District and Rural District. A

Public Hearing will be held on October 25, 2022.

Grazing Lease – Council approved a five-year lease to Gloria Lowey for a grazing lease for the 3.85 acres for \$138.60 per year.

Roadway Capital Plan - Council adopted the short-range capital roadway construction and rehabilitation plan for local road improvements in the County. The plan covers work scheduled to be done from 2023 to 2028 and will extend the life of the existing local road network. The plan is estimated to cost approximately 11 million dollars in 2023 for both minor and major reconstruction work.

Multi-Year Special Project – Council voted to support the potential multi-year Community Connect Project for \$19,939,646 and to bring a funding model for the project to the 2023 Yellowhead County budget deliberations.

Financial Request – Council denied a request from the Town of White-court to support a proposed Whitecourt Cultural & Events Centre as it does not fall within Yellowhead County's Strategic Plan.
