ALBERTA RCMP INTEGRATED BORDER ENFORCEMENT TEAM LAY CHARGES FOR IMPORTING PROHIBITED DEVICE

An investigation launched by the Alberta RCMP Federal Policing Integrated Border Enforcement Team (IBET) has resulted in charges laid against a man for importing prohibited devices, which included 5 pistol selector switches to convert a Glock handgun from semi-automatic to fully automatic.

On August 17, 2022, Yuriy Bilonog, 43, a resident of Spruce Grove, Alta., was charged with the following offences:

- Importation of Prohibited Device under section 104(1)(A) of the Criminal Code;
- Possession of Prohibited Device under

section 91(2) of the Criminal Code; and

• Smuggling a Prohibited Device under section 159(1) of the Customs Act.

Bilonog is scheduled to appear in court on Oct. 5, 2022, at the Stony Plain Provincial Court.

"Through our partner-

ships with CBSA and the Edmonton Police Service, as well as the assistance of various RCMP members, we were able to prevent these prohibited devices from being illegally imported into Canada and potentially causing significant harm."

- Sgt. Greg Eagle, Alberta RCMP Integrated Border Enforcement Team IBET is an integrated federal policing unit based out of Calgary and Edmonton that contributes to maintaining Canada's safety and security including the land and air border domains in Alberta. Their mandate is to enhance border integrity and security along the shared border, between designated ports of entry,

by identifying, investigating and interdicting persons, organizations and goods that are involved in criminal activities. The unit is comprised of members of the Alberta RCMP, CBSA and Calgary Police Service.

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



to raise the carbon tax from the current level of \$50 a tonne to \$170 a tonne by 2030, with increases each and every year even though in 2019 the Liberals promised the plan would not increase the price (carbon tax) post-2022. The

Supreme Court of Canada has confirmed that the federal government can impose its own carbon tax as a backstop. This is a problem. Higher gas prices harm household budgets, it also increases transportation costs and in turn raises prices on groceries and other consumer goods – all

increasing inflation.

Earlier this year the Bank of Canada stated: "if the charge (carbon tax) were to be removed from the three main fuel components of the consumer price index (gasoline, natural gas and fuel oil) it would reduce the inflation rate by 0.4 percentage points. In oth-

er words, if that policy had come into effect at the start of the year, January's inflation rate would have been 4.7% instead of 5.1%."

As the Official Opposition we are calling on this Trudeau Liberal government to stop its planned tripling of the carbon tax.

GOVERNMENT OF CANADA ANNOUNCES NEW FRAMEWORK FOR DIABETES IN CANADA





ALBERTA RCMP REMINDS THE PUBLIC OF THE DANGERS OF DISTRACTED DRIVING AS MOTORIST RECEIVES 13TH CONVICTION

The Alberta RCMP are always on the lookout for distracted drivers, working hard to reduce fatalities and serious injury collisions caused by distracted driving. Today, in Provincial Traffic Court in Airdrie, Alta., a 40-yearold male from Alberta, was sentenced for his 13th distracted driving conviction. For this 13th conviction, he received a \$2,000 fine and a \$300 victim surcharge. The individual also received three demerit points for the conviction.

Following a large public education campaign, distracted driving became illegal in Alberta on Sept. 1, 2011. That same day, this individual was issued a distracted driving ticket. In the 11 years that followed, he has now been convicted a total of 13 times for distracted driving here in the province, with fines totalling \$5,371.

Research has shown driver distraction is the primary cause of over 20% of all crashes, and that distracted drivers are three times more likely to be involved in a collision than attentive drivers.

Alberta's distracted driving law applies to all vehicles as defined by the Traffic Safety Act and all roads in Alberta. It restricts drivers from doing any of the following, even while stopped in traffic or at red lights:

- Using hand-held mobile devices
- Texting or emailing
- Using electronic devices such as laptop computers, video games, cameras, video entertain-

ment displays, and portable audio players

- Entering information on GPS units
- Reading printed materials
- Writing, printing, or sketching
- Personal grooming, such as brushing and flossing teeth, putting on makeup, curling hair, clipping nails, or shaving

Sadly, motor vehicle collisions caused by distracted driving are happening every day in Alberta. Please, leave the phone alone.





Road trips are a staple of autumn for many motorists. Fall foliage and moderate temperatures make the months of September and October ideal months to hit the open road for weekend getaways.

Black Knot - What Is It?

Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has eceived numerous calls regarding black growths on residents

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the *Prunus* genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning.

Black Knot - Pruning

Only prune between November and March.
Cleanly cut off at least 6 - 8 inches below the knot, better to prune back to a healthy collar, then leaving a stub.
For knots on branches or trunks that can't be removed, use a knife to cut away diseased tissue down to good wood and then ½ inch beyond the edge of the knot.
Cleaning your equipment properly is another good way to prevent the spread. Pruning shears should be dipped in a 1% bleach/water solution between cuts and once you are finished pruning ensure you run your tools under water for 10 minutes and dry thoroughly.
Treat pruned branches like hazardous waste, they can release spores for up to 4 months. Burn, bury, or wrap them in plastic and throw them in the trash. Do not compost.

It's that time of year again; the leaves have turned color (let's hope they cling to their respective branches as long as possible), most of the garden is out, the majority of the crops are off, and the kids have probably brought home a cold or flu bug to lovingly share with the rest of the family. Like many I'm hoping for a long warm fall. Last year was such a nice treat, one that I would love to repeat.

When you read this, we will officially have a new Premier of our province. I'm deep in the world of politics, and despite reaching my saturation point some time ago, I'm hopeful again. I've had the chance to catch up with many people over the summer and the early weeks of fall to find out what matters to folks, and to get feedback on how I'm doing so far as the MLA. I appreciate the interaction, and the honest feedback, Good, Bad, or Ugly, it all makes me better at what I do; and to know in my heart when I speak on your behalf in caucus, or in the chamber, that I'm providing the best perspective I can for the folks I represent. We go back into the house on October 31st and I would once again love some honest feedback and suggestions to share. You'll find an online survey on my website, and I will be dropping off paper questionnaires again at various local gathering spots. Please take the time to fill them out and help keep me pointed in the right direction; it's a team effort to move the ball down field...so if you can, help me to help you and our community.

There have been several events I've attended over the last few weeks and again, certain themes keep coming to the forefront: logistics, economic corridors, and labor shortages. Regarding logistics, we can't get our products to market...there is literally a backlog in the supply chain not only from a local or interprovincial standpoint but globally. It has brought to light that our supply chains are far too thin, and far too reliant on other countries. Although we are in a rough patch right how in this regard, there is a massive opportunity to correct this issue, and become a stronger player for our region. When you have major trading partners that are keen to 'shop local', we need to adapt and make these deals. Trains, train cars, junior rail companies, and capacity partnerships are very much needed (and wanted) going forward. I believe our region is in a very strong position to fill the evident gap in supply chain and logistics.

I was pleased to be able to sit with the owner of Anohka Distillery near Carvel last week (if you've never been, you need to go!), so that he could educate me on the business of fine spirits, all the good things that are happening in the industry and, quite frankly, the gaps that can and should be filled. He holds degrees in both Physics and Law, and most recently a Masters of Science in Brewing and Distilling from Heriot Watt University in Edinburgh, Scotland. He understands the spirits industry. Earlier this year, his distillery won the award for the 'Best Canadian London Dry' at the World Gin Awards. Their whiskey is in the works and has also won an IWSC award, even before aging! Not bad for an Alberta upstart! As it turns out, Alberta has all the top-quality raw materials to make the absolute best products in the world. Even better, we have yet to develop the at home supply chain items we need, so there is a great opportunity for the local agriculture industry to adapt and grow. Developing agricultural sectors such as: barley, grain, peat moss (used for the smoking treatment of grains), as well as the apprenticeship opportunities that go along with these sectors presents a huge opportunity for Alberta. It's a 5-billion-dollar industry in Scotland alone, and we have an order of magnitude of natural resources that is far larger. We could not only supply local companies, but international ones as well.

Soon, our office will be trying our hand at a podcast so we can help share the success stories, opportunities, and challenges in our area. I'm looking forward to getting that up and running, and am open for suggestions, as I want it to be an open line for feedback and discussion.

Regarding the Firearm File, we are going to be helping with and hosting a couple of events to not only bring awareness to the community on firearms and provide education on the many different related sports and disciplines out there, but also to get folks together again. Our Zombie Shoot will be taking place on October 29 at the Canadian Historical Arms Society range, with a supper and silent auction to follow at the Genessee Hall. We only have capacity for 150 people at the range, so grab your tickets early when they become available. We will also be helping with an event in Ponoka at the arena to help bring awareness of the Mounted Shooters discipline and to let folks try their hand at it. It'll give folks the opportunity to be able to ride a horse and shoot balloons with old school western firearms. We will keep you posted on that as well.



Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

- Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.
- 2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.
- 3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children.
- Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.
- 5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.
- 6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires.
- 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.
- 8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.
- 9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.
